THE INTRODUCTION.

B RITONS your Monarch's high Renown proclaim,

With *English* Courage how they plow their Way,
Through raging Billows, to the destin'd Bay :
How *England* in her Grandeur is retriev'd,
By *George* and by *Britain's* brave Sons reliev'd.
The Signs of Peace o'er *Europe's* Stage now run,
And great Alliances we see begun ;
Great Britain's Friendship sought by all, doth shew,
Her Greatness in the most delightful View ;
Sav'd from *Rome's* Priests, no longer shall she mourn,
No longer dread that dreadful Chance to burn ;
Or worship their high Host, and Saints invoke,
Bow down to Idols, or a heavier Yoke :
But Thanks to Heaven and *George*, our Fears are flown,
The Mist's dispell'd, and their vile Schemes o'erthrown.
If Enemies we have still, may they feel
The keen Effects of harden'd *British* Steel.
Find Rebels Fate, like those that try'd their Skill,
Of late for Popish Cause, and Victims sell ;
When their Devices were broken in one Hour,
And Popish Priests mist of tyrannick Power.

The TABLE of the TERMS explained.

NOW every Term hath part or all these Returns, *viz.* Crastins, Octabis, Quindene, Tres, Mente, and Quinque. Every Return also has a Basis or Know-day, from whence they make their Reckoning; the Signification of which are, Crastins is the Morrow after the Basis, as Crastins Trinitatis is the Morrow after Trinity Sunday, it being the Day of Denomination; Octabis is eight Days inclusively; Quindene is fifteen Days after, and Tres three Weeks, Mente a Month, and Quinque five Weeks after.

Note, Now every one of these Returns has four Days to consist upon, the first whereof has a double Signification; for the one is the Day of Return, the other the Day of Effoin, for the Defendant in a Personal Action, or the Tenant in a real Action to be effoined; the second is the Day of Exceptions, for the Plaintiff to lay an Exception if no Effoin be cast, that the Defendant shall not be effoined or amerced; the third is Returna Brevinus, or Day whereupon the Sheriff must return the Writ; and the fourth is the Day of Appearance for Parties and Jurors in the Court of Common-Pleas. But if any of these Days fall on a Holy-day, that is no Court-Day, as in Easter-Term, on Holy-Thursdai; or upon St. John Baptist, in Trinity-Term; in Michaelmas-Term, on All-Saints, or All-Souls Day; and in Hilary-Term, on Candlemas-Day; or upon any Sunday, which are no Court-Days, then must the next Day following serve for both; as if the Effoin Day, and Day of Exception; and so of the rest. These Days are of most Use in the Common-Pleas, where all Suits commence, &c. But for Latitats, or other Process upon a Bill certain, it is upon a Day certain, as Die Lunæ prox. post Purif. which always is reckoned from the Effoin Day. In the Chancery Court none of these Returns are used, but only the Day of Appearance, which is Quarto die post. But if a Capias, Exigent, Scire-Facias, or Distringas be executed after the Effoin Day by the Sheriff, or a Commission set upon, out of any of the aforesaid Courts, after the said Effoin Day, 'tis neither justifiable nor warrantable.

The fixed Stars all rise, south, and set about 4 min. or every Night than they did the Night before; this considered, the exact time of their Rising, Southing and Setting for any intermediate Night not herein noted, may be easily deduced from these Tables, by Inspection only. To know the time of the Rising, Southing and Setting of any Star in this Table, for any Day required, it is but considering how many Hours and Minutes, that Star Rises Souths or Sets, either before or after the 7 Stars on any day, and you will have your desire; observing that in this Table, a stands for after, and b for before.

Of the Eclipses this present Year.

THE Sun will be Three times Eclipsed this Year and the Moon twice; and those of the Moon only will be visible, they happen as follows.

The First is a total, and in part visible Eclipse of the Moon, on *Friday* the 8th Day of *June*, at Sun-setting, when she will rise totally Eclipsed 12 Minutes after 8 at Night, at 41 Minutes past 9 she will begin to recover Light, and at 49 Minutes past 10 the Eclipse ends.

The Second is an invisible Eclipse of the Sun, on *Friday* the 22d Day of *June*, at 7 in the Evening.

The Third is another invisible Eclipse of the Sun on *Sunday* the 18th Day of *November*, at 1 in the Morning.

The Fourth is a total and visible Eclipse of the Moon, on *Advent Sunday* in the Morning, according to the following Times.

The continuance of Total Darkness is 1 Hour and 40 Minutes, of the whole Eclipse 3 Hours 37 Minutes.

The Fifth and last Eclipse is of the Sun, on *Monday* the 17th Day of *December*, near 7 at Night, invisible.

It is universally allowed by all good Astrologers that Eclipses of the Luminaries are of sad Import general; and this according to their Quantity, Obscuration, Duration, Visibility, and part of Heaven they fall in. The Learned Mr. *Whiston* observes, (tho' great Friend to Astrology,) that both the partial and the total Downfalls or Destructions of every one of the Four Grand Monarchies, the *Assyrian* or *Babylonian*, the *Medo-Persian*, the *Grecian*, and the *Roman*, were ushered in, and in part occasioned by Eclipses of the Sun and Moon; And so that the intermediate Breaches made upon the several Empires, were constantly produced by great Eclipses of the Sun: And the

Final Periods by great Eclipses of the Moon, visible over the same Monarchies.

The First of these visible Lunar Eclipses happens in the last Decade of Π , which *Preclus* says, denotes the Death of some eminent and famous Man; the other fall in the last Decade of χ , which generally signifies Plagues and very great Evils to afflict Mankind.

In some of my former Almanacks I have taken notice that the Spirit of God is now performing great Wonders in all Nations, in order to bring about the great work of Reformation; and that it was the Opinion of many good Christians; That the Call of the Jews will be in this Age, and that too very suddenly; particularly in my last: where I think I have made it very probable from a numerous Train of Deductions, that in this very Year 1750, we may expect some more than ordinary Appearances and Motions in most Parts of the World, especially in the Northern and Eastern parts thereof, tending to the overthrow and destruction of Antichrist. Tidings out of the East, and out of the North shall trouble him (says *Daniel*, chap. xi.) yet he shall come to his End, and none shall help him.

That the time of the Jews Restoration, and Commencement of the Millennium is near at hand is certain, whether so near as the time above-mentioned is as yet uncertain; But this uncertainty arises from the many Historical and Chronological Difficulties to be found among Historians. Some Authors making the time of the same Event sooner, others later, *A. B. Usker* and other Chronologers since his time, place the Birth of Christ just 4000 Years from the Creation, *Scaliger*, *Petavius*, and some others not so much; But the *Septuagint* and *Josephus* much more: The like difference in Accounts is to be found amongst them in many other Historical Facts.

There is a Tradition among the Jews, that the World shall continue 6000 Years, viz. 2000 Years void, 2000 Years under the Law, and 2000 Years under the Messias; and at the End of this six Thousand Years, will commence the Millennium, or One Thousand Years of Rest for the People of God; and particularly for his chosen People the Jews. *Lactantius*

says, wherefore, because all the Works of God were compleated in Six Days, it is necessary that the World continue in this State six Thousand Years, which Six Thousand Years, *Cyprian* says, are already almost compleat, since the Devil attacked Mankind. Mr. *Whiston* observes, That this Notion of a Millennium is universal, and is derived from the earliest Tradition, both among the Old Heathen Philosophers, the Ancient Jews, the Apostles, and the Primitive Fathers



of the Church; and is an undeniable and most important Portion of Divine Revelation; In his Sacred History lately published, vol. ii. p. 435. he says, that by the exactest Chronology, the first Six Thousand Years from the Creation, end about A.D. 1766. (which is 16 Years hence,) That is for certain supposed the Beginning of the Millennium, when the Jews will be restored to their own Country, and rebuild their Temple upon the sounding of the seventh Trumpet.

A Trumpet is the Symbol of War; and in the Revelations we find, that all the Seven Trumpets were to be attended with Woes and Lamentations; Six of which are already past, and the 7th which is yet to come, denounceth the third and last Woe; under it the Seven Vials of God's Wrath are to be poured out, both upon the Eastern and Western Antichrist, that is the *Turk* and *Pope*. It is said, *Revel. viii. 13.* Woe to the Inhabitants of the Earth, by reason of the Trumpets that are yet to sound, and ch. xv. ver. 8. it is said, no Man was able to enter into the Temple till the Seven Piagues of the Seven Angels were fulfilled: which intimateth, that the Holy City and Temple cannot be prepared to receive the righteous part of Mankind, till the Power of the *Turk* and *Pope* are both destroyed, or that the Seven Vials are all poured out.

A famous *French* Author in his Account of the Non-estimation of the Seven Vials, says, The first Vial poured on the Earth, intends the Loss of Church Revenues, and so falls upon the worldly Interest of Antichristian Men. The second Vial poured upon the Sea, which he says is the Papal Kingdom in its greatest Extent, which will become as the Blood of a dead Man, so that every Soul which liveth in it shall die; for as Fish cannot live in Water turned into Blood, neither can Mankind any longer endure to live under the Yoke of Popish Priests and Governors. The third Vial which is poured on the Rivers, denotes the Destruction of Popish Doctrines. The fourth Vial which is poured forth on the Sun, threatneth the *Ottoman* Empire and Religion; the 4th Trumpet raised that Empire, and the fourth Vial shall destroy it. The fifth Vial

is poured out upon the Seat of the Beast, or the City of *Rome*, which predicts her Destruction: The Angel represents the Popes Kingdom as full of Darknes, and his Subjects gnawing their Tongues thro' Dispair. The sixth Vial is poured on the great River *Euphrates*, that is, on the great Empire of the *Turks* and their Religion; after which there will be nothing to hinder the Princes and People of the East, who shall be Enlightened or Converted; or the *Jews* who are there dispersed in great Numbers, from marching into the West to help on the Destruction of the Beast. The seventh and last Vial is poured into the Air, and denotes the clearing of all places from the Darknes and Fog of Superstition and Antichristianism: after which will be manifest the Mystery of God in reuniting all Nations, and the Kingdoms of this World will become the Kingdom of Righteousness.

I have already observed, that the precise time when all these mighty Revolutions will happen is doubtful; however there is no doubt but we are arrived near to the time of their Manifestation; and when the Scene of Affairs both in *Asia* and *Europe* will be very much changed: Of this we are assured from computation of Scripture Prophecy, and the concurrent Testimonies of the Sybils, and other Heathen Oracles; As also from such certain outward and visible Signs which we know were nearly to precede that great Day. I will tell you very clearly, says the Sybiline Oracles, the Signs whereby you may know when will be the End of all these things that shall happen on the Earth, viz. when (the likeness of) Swords shall be seen in the Heavens towards Sun-setting or Sun-rising. And the Prophet *Joel* says, *ch. ii. ver. 30.* the Lord will shew wonders in the Heavens, Blood and Fire and Pillars of Smoke; every Body knows, that upon the first Appearance of the Northern Lights, they were by all sorts of People compared to Swords, Lances, and other Military Weapons, or else to Blood, Fire, and Pillars of Smoke, in the very Expressions of the Prophet *Joel*: And indeed they most certainly do greatly resemble all these things; and in fact are Fires and Pillars of Smoke or Vapour, which do frequently
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in their Colour represent Blood; and by their Form and Motion, Swords, Lances, and other Military Ensigns: But these Appearances (as also Comets) you will say, may be accounted for from natural Causes; allow'd they may so, yet as their Appearances are so universal and uncommon (except of late Years) and are exactly such as we see were to happen some short time before the commencement of these extraordinary Revolutions, preparatory to the Millennium, we may and ought to look upon them as ominous, and sent in a peculiar and wonderful manner, to preface the approach of those wonderful and tremendous Times; Let us then, not be ignorant of the Signs of the Times, but look suddenly for that great and fearful Earthquake mentioned in the *Revelations*, for it will come and cannot be afar off; But I fear it is with us, as with the Jews, when our Saviour came into the World; or with the Christians, when Antichrist stepped upon the Stage; Christ was both come and gone before the Jews knew that he was the Messiah: and Antichrist was grown old in the World, before the World took any notice of him; so it may be that Antichrist is going apace to Perdition, before the People of God begin to discern it.

Observations of the Four Quarters of the Year.

I. Of the Winter Quarter.

THIS Quarter begins on *Sunday*, the 10th Day of *December*, at 3 in the Afternoon; at which time we have 17 deg. of Π Ascends, and 12 deg. of Ξ on the Medium Celi; the Δ is in the beginning of Π departing from the \oint of h , and applying to the \square of \oint : Mercury is in Δ in \square to \oint in \times . This is a sickly Face of the Heavens, and it will be well if the Seeds of some Pestilential Distemper be not now Sown. It also denotes some new and unheard of Mischiefs in divers parts of the World; Murmurings, Tumults, Riots, Insurrections, and malicious Projects, are almost universal, more particularly in the North and Eastern parts of the World, where Men of the most malicious and corrupt Minds are very active.

II. Of

II. Of the Spring Quarter.

THIS Quarter begins on *Friday* the 9th Day of *March*, at 5 in the Evening, when 21 deg of MR Ascends, and 17 deg. of II Culminates. The D is in the 12th House in 5 deg. of MR in \square to H , and P of Q . According to the Rules of the Ancient Fathers of this Science, Mercury must be admitted Lord of this Ingress, he having most Dignities in the place of the Moon, the Ascendant, and the Mid-heaven; Q we know is like a Weather-Cock, ever changeable; still conforming his Influence to that of the Planet he is most attach'd to: Simply consider'd, he stirs up Craft, Deceit, Frauds, Factions, Plots and Conspiracies; but we must always regard Q according to his Position and mixture of Rays with the other Planets: Here we find him in the 6th House in opposition to the D



in the 12th, and in \square to H , weak and debilitated; Mercury in his own Simple Nature is malevolent, as I before observed; And by being thus posited and aspected he becomes much more so, and will more powerfully diffuse his poisonous Atoms among Mortals, in great
Losses

Losses, Imprisonments, decay of Trade, and Mortality among all sorts of Cattle: These Calamities will be principally felt in the South and Eastern parts of the World; the *British* Nations have reason to hope for better things; Jupiter in σ with the \odot and \ominus , and all of them in the Sign γ . *England's* Ascendant shews great Felicity, Success, and a growing Glory to attend this happy Island: The King will administer Justice and be had in great Honour, the People will thrive by Trade and Husbandry, and the Nation in general be in a prosperous and happy Condition.

Saturn entered into the Sign π about the beginning of the Year, he is now Retrograde, and towards the end of this Month meets with the opposite Ray of $\♂$ just as he enters the Sign Π . This is generally looked upon as a very malignant and powerful Aspect; and we find it often attended with great Changes of Empire and Dominion in the World, and eminent Dispensations of God's Providence with regard to Religion and Religious Worship: We may reasonably expect about this time a visible Retrogradation in the Affairs of several Popish Nations in Europe, the Heavens are averse to all their Tyrannical, Antichristian, and oppressive Schemes: The *Spanish* Nation, that great Prop and Support of Papal Power and Superstition is eminently concern'd, some great Changes seems to approach them apace; the Princes and Powers in *Italy* are in the utmost Confusion and Distress, and they will find none to relieve them; there are other places also in the South and Eastern parts of the World, which will feel the severe and heavy Hand of Divine Providence: The *Turks* are very Active, it is some Northern Powers that carry their Fate in their Banners, and it seems not far off. We know that the Turk and Pope appear'd in the World in their Bloody Colours at the same time, and no Wonder if their Power and Dominion be suppressed nearly at the same time also.

There seems to be such a concurrence of Causes and Predictions to center in these Times, that it looks very much like the approach of those Days before spoken off out of Divine Writ; to those before mentioned

tioned I will only add part of a Prophecy as it is given us by the Author of the *Turkish Spy*; who says, That he met with a Person at *Astracan*, called the *Traveling Jew*, who positively asserted in the open Streets, that after the Year 1700. the *Turks* shall overflow *Christendom* like a mighty Torrent; when there will be great Desolation in *Hungary*, *Germany*, *France*, and other Regions in the West; but above all others, *Italy* will be made a perfect Wilderness; That *England* shall become the Refuge of all that escape the Calamities overwhelming the adjacent Countries; and there (he says) they will be shewn a new pattern of the Law of Jesus, or rather the old and true one freed from the Corruptions and Errors which have been superinduced for many Ages, when the Jews will be convinced of their Infidelity, and chase away Darknes and Superstition from the Earth: In those Days (says this Jew) Foreign Princes shall send their Ambassadors to the King of *Great-Britain* for Holy and Pious Teachers to instruct them; Mighty Armies shall be raised in the North, which shall be joyned by a prodigious Army collected in other parts of *Christendom*; which shall drive out the *Turks*, recover from them the Holy Land; and gloriously rebuild the City of *Jerusalem*; and make a worthy and excellent *Englisman* Patriarch of the same: Then shall the Eyes of us Jews (says he) be opened, and we shall all acknowledge Jesus to be the true Messias.

III. Of the Summer Quarter.

THIS Quarter begins on *Sunday* the 10th Day of *June*, very near 4 in the Afternoon, when 12 deg. of ♄ Ascends, and 27 deg. of ♅ is on the Mid-heaven: The ♄ is in 22 deg. of ♊ in the 3d House, departing from the ♂ of ♊ and ♋ , applying to the ♂ of ♊ , and ♋ of ♊ . To say the truth, this is none of the best Positions; there still seems to be some Roguery in hand, Mars and Mercury can never be conjoyn'd in Cancer, but they will stir up Mischiefs to Mankind; in *Italy* and the Northern parts of the World it shews Fighting, Plundering, and the utter Ruin of many. The Moon seperating from their opposition, and applying to the Square of Jupiter in Aries, adds violence to their Effects, and shews great troubles to happen by reason

reason of Oppression and Tyranny, and great Losses by reason of sudden Invasions, and the Death and Destruction of great Cattle: And indeed here seems to be a great Storm arising, for $\text{\textcircled{S}}$ where $\text{\textcircled{J}}$ and $\text{\textcircled{Q}}$ have taken up their Residence is the Dignities of $\text{\textcircled{4}}$, and in *Dormus Religionis*. Mercury as I have before observed, is ever conforming his Note to the Planet he is in Company with, which here is Mars; and they opposed by the $\text{\textcircled{D}}$ and squared by $\text{\textcircled{4}}$ their Dispositors; what can we expect from such Positions as these are, but rash and perverse Counsels, turbulent and daring Actions, and all upon a Religious pretence? Religion is the Cloak, but Villany the Design. I hope no more Popish Massacres, tho' it looks too much like it.

IV. *Of the Autumnal Quarter.*

THIS Quarter begins on *Wednesday* the 12th Day of *September*, 18 minutes past 5 in the Morning, when 22 deg. of $\text{\textcircled{M}}$ Ascends, and 20 deg. of $\text{\textcircled{II}}$ Culminates. The $\text{\textcircled{D}}$ is in the 10th House in 7 deg. of $\text{\textcircled{S}}$ his own Dignities, separating from the Sextile of $\text{\textcircled{4}}$ in $\text{\textcircled{U}}$, and applying to the $\text{\textcircled{*}}$ of $\text{\textcircled{J}}$ in $\text{\textcircled{M}}$, near the Cusp of the Ascendant. Under the Influence of the last Quarter, some Seditious and Tyrannical Spirits began to disturb the Peace of the Church, and of Mankind in general: And of this we may be assured, that wherever Romish Priests preside in the Courts and Counsels of Princes, they will ever be promoting their Pomp, Grandeur, and Worldly Interest, and that too under the specious name and pretence of Religion. But the Stars now promise better things, and shew the condition of the People in several Countries to be much better than it hath been for some time past. They denote a Cessation of Hostilities, a mutual Harmony and good Understanding between the Countries concerned in such Influence.

Let us implore Heavens providential Hand,
Which so eminently hath preserv'd this Land,
From Foreign Foes, and from Domestick Jars,
From Popish Rebels, and from Civil Wars;
Let every Subject in his proper Station,
Promote the Peace and Interest of the Nation.
