## The TABLE of the TERMS explained.

NOW every Term hath part or all thefe Returns, yix. Craftins, Octabis, Cuindene, Tres, Mente, and Quinquee. Every Return alio has a Batis or Know-day, fiom whence they make their Reckoning; the Signification of which are, Craftins is the Morrow after the Bafis, as Craflins Trinitatis is the Morrow after Trinity Sunday, it being the Day of Denomination; Octabis is eight Days inclufively; Quindene is fifteen Days after, and Tres three Weeks, Mente a Month, and Quinque five Weeks after.

Note, Now every one of thefe Returns has four Days to confift upon, the firf whereof has a double Signification; for the one is the Day of Return, the other the Day of Effoin, for the Defendant in a Perfonal Action, or the Tenant in a real Action to be efloined; the fecond is the Day of Exceptions, for the Plaintiff to lay an Exception if no Effoin be caft, that the Defendant fhall not be effoined or amercod; the third is Returna Brevinus, or Day whereupon the Sherift mut return the Writ ; and the fourth is the Dry of Appearance for Parties and Jutors in the Court of CommonPleas. But if any of thefe Days fallon a Holy-day, that is no Court-Day, as in Eafter-Term, on Holy-Thuıfday; or upon St. John Baptift, in Trinity-Terin ; in MichaelmasTerm, on Als-Saitits, or All-Souls Isuy; and in HilaryTerm, on Candlemas-Day; or upon any Sunday, whichare no Court-Days, then mutt the next Day following ferve for both; as if the Effoin Day, and Day of Exception; and fo of the reft. Thefe Days are of moll Ufe in the CommonPleas, where all Suits commence, $\varepsilon^{\circ}$ c. But for Latitats, or other frocefs upon a Bill certain, is is upon a Day certain, as Dic Lunae prox. pof Purif. which always is reckoned from the Efloin Day. In the Chancery Court none of thefe Returnsare ulec, but only the Day of Appearance, which is Quarto die polt. But if a Cupias, Exigent, Scire-Facias, or Diftringas beezccuted after the Effoin Day by the Sheriff,ora Cominifion fet upon, out of any of the aforefaid Courts, after the faid Effoin Day, 'tis neither jufifiable nor warrantable.

Final Periods by great Eclipfes of the Moon, vifible over the fame Monarchies.
The Firft of thefe vifible Lunar Eclipfes happens in the laft Decade of II, which Preclus fays, denotes the Death of fome eminent and famous Man; the other fall in the laft Decade of $\AA$, which generally fig. nifies Plagues and very great Evils to affliet Mankind.

In fome of my former Almanacks I have taken notice that the Spirit of God is now performing great Wonders in all Nations, in order to bring about the great work of Reformation; and that it was the Opinion of many, good Chriftians; That the Call of the Jews will be in this Age, and that too very fuddenly; particularly in my laft: where I think I have made it very probable from a numerous Train of Deductions, that in this very Year 1750, we may expect fome more than ordinary Appearances and Motions in moft Parts of the World, efpecially in the Northern and Eaftern parts thereof, tending to the overthrow and deftruetion of Antichrift. Tidings out of the Eaft, and out of the North fhall trouble him (fays Daniel, chap. xi.) yet he fhall come to his End, and none Shall help him.

That the time of the Fews Reforation, and Commencement of the Millennium is near at hand is certain, whether fo near as the time above-mentioned is as yet uncertain; But this uncertainty arifes from the many Hiftorical and Chronological Difficulties to be found among Hiftorians. Some Authors making the time of the fame Event fooner, others later, A.B. Uber and other Chronologers fince his time, place the Birth of Chrift jaft 4000 Years from the Creation, Scaliger, Petavius, and fome others not fo much; Bưt the Septuagint and Fofepbus much more: The like difference in Accounts is to be found amongft them in many other Hiftorical Facts.

There is 2 Tradition among the Jews, that the World fhall continue 6000 Years, viz. 2000 Years void, 2010 Years under the Law, and 2000 Years under the Meffias; and at the End of this fix Thoufand Years, will commence the Millennium, or One ThouFand Years of Reft for the People of God; and particularly for his chofen People the Jews, Lastantius
fays, wherefore, becaufe all the Works of God were compleated in Six Days, it is neceffary that the World continue in this State Six Thoufand Years, which Six Thouland Xears, Cyprian fays, are already almoft compleat, fince the Devil attacked Mankind. Mr. Whifon oblerves, That this Notion of a Millennium is univerfal, and is derived from the earlieft. Tradition, both among the Old Heathen Philofophers, the Antient Jews, the Apoftes, and the Prmitive Fathers

of the Church ; and is an undeniable and moft important Portion of Divine Revelation; In his Sacred Hiftory lately publifhed, vol. ii. p. 435. he fays, that by the exacteft Chronology, the firft Six 'Thouland Years from the Creation, end about A.D. 1766. (which is 16 Years hence, ) That is for certain fuppofed the Beginning of the Millennium, when the Jews will be reftored to their own Country, and rebuild their Temple upon the founding of the fevents Trumpet.

A Trumpet is the Syntbol of War ; and in the Revelations we find, that all the Seven Trumpets were to be attended with Woes and Lamentions; Six of which are already paft, and the 7 th which is yet to come, denounceth the third and laft Woe; under it the Seven Vials of God's Wrath are to be poured out, both upon the Eaftern and Weftern Antichrift, that is the Turk and Pope. It is faid, Revel. viii. 13. Woe to the Inhabitants of the Earth, by reaton of the Trumpets that are yet to found $x_{2}$ and $\mathrm{ch}, \mathrm{xv}$. ver. 8 . it is taid, no Man was able to enter into the Temple till the Seven Piagues of the Seven Angels were fulfilled: which intimateth, that the Holy City and Temple cannot be prepared to receive the righteous part of Mankind, till the Power of the Turk and Pipe are buth deffroyed, or that the Seven Vialsrare all poured out.

A famous French Author in his Account of the Nonffufion of the Seven Vials, fays, The firt Vial poured on the Earth, intends the Lofs of Church Revenues, and to falls upon the worldly Interefl of Antichriftian Hen. The iccond Vial poured upon the Sea, whach re fays is the Papal Kingdom in its greateft Extent, which will become as the Blood of a dead Man, fo hat every Soul which liveth in it Thall die; for as Fifh cannot live in Water turned into Blnod, neither an Mankind any longer endure t, live under the Yoke of Popifh Prieits and Governors. 'The third Vial which is poured on the Rivers, denotes the Deftruction f Popilla Ductrines. The fourth Vial which is poued forth on the Sun, threatneth the Ottoman tmpire nd Keligion; the 4th Trumpet railed that Empire, nd tie tourth Vial fhall dettroy it. The fifth Vial
is poured out upon the Seat of the Beaft, or the City of Rome, which predicts her Deftruction: The Angel reprefents the Popes Kingdom as full of Darknefs, and his Subjects gnawing their Tongues thro' Difpair. The fixth Vial is poared on the great River Euphrates, that is, on the great Empire of the Turks and their Religion; after which there will be nothing to hinder the Princes and People of the Eaft, who Thall be En. dightned or Converted; or the $\mathcal{F}$ ezus who are there difperfed in great Numbers, from marching into the Weft to help on the Deftruction of the Beaft. The feventh and laft Vial is poured into the Air, and denotes the clearing of all places from the Darknefs and Fog of Supertition and Antichriftianifm: after which will be manifeft the Myftery of God in reuniting all Nations, and the Kingdoms of this World will become the Kingdom of Righteoufnefs.

I have already obferved, that the precife time when all thefe nighty Revolutions will happen is doubtful; however there is no doubt but we are arrived near to the time of their Manifeftation; and when the Scene of Affairs both in $A \mathcal{i} a$ and Europe will be very much changed: Of this we are affured from computation of Scripture Prophecy, and the concurrent Teftimonies of the Sybils, and other Heathen Oracles; As alfo from fuch certain outward and vifible Signs which we know were nearly to preceed that great Day. I will tell you very clearly, fays the Sybiline Oracles, the Signs whereby you may know when will be the End of all thefe things that fhall happen on the Earth, viz. when (the likenefs of) Swords thall be feen in the Heavens towards Sun-fetting or Sun-rifing. And the Prophet Goel fays, ch. ii. ver. 3o. the Lord will Shew wonders in the Heavens, Blood and Fire and Pillars of Smoke; every Body knows, that upon the firft Appearance of the Northern Lights, they were by all forts of People compared to Swords, Lances, and other Military Weapons, or elfe to Blood, Fire, and Pillars of Smoke, in the very Expreffions of the Prophet Foel: And indeed they moft certainly do greatiy'relemble all thefe things; and in fact are Fires and Plllirs of Smoke or Vapour, which do frequently
in their Colour reprefent Blood; and by their Form and Motion, Swords, Lances, and other Military Enfigns : But thefe Appearances (as alfo Comets) you will fay, may be accounted for from natural Caufes; al. low'd they may fo , yet as their Appearances are fo univerfal and uncommon (except of late Years) and are exactly fuch as we fee were to happen fome fhort time before the commencement of thefe extraordinary Revolutions, preparatory to the Millennium, we may and ought to look upon them as ominous, and fent in a peculiar and wonderful manner, to pr efage the approach of thofe wonderful and tremendious Times; Let us then, not be ignorant of the Signs of the Times, but look fuddenly for that great and fearful Earthquake mentioned in the Revelations, for it will come and cannot be afar off; But I fear it is with us, as with the Jews, when our Saviour came into the World; or with the Chriffians, when Antichrift ftept upon the Stage; Chrift was both come and gone before the Jews knew that he was the Meffias: and Antichrift was grown old in the World, before the World took any notice of him ; fo it may be that Antichrift is going apace to Perdition, before the People of God begin to difcern it.

It alfo denotes fome new and unheard of Mifchiefs in divers parts of the World; Murmurings, Tumults, Riots, Infurrections, and malicious Projects, are al moft univerfal, more particularly in the North and Eaftern parts of the World, where Men of the molt malicious and corrupt Minds are very active.

## II. Of the Spring Quarter.

THIS Quarter begins on Friday the oth Day of

According to the Rules of the Ancient Fathers of this Science, Mercury muit be admitted Lord of this Ingrefs, he having moft Dignities in the place of the Moon, the Afcendant, and tne Mid-heaven; 客 we know is like a Weather-Cock, ever changeable, ftill conforming his Influence to that of the Planet he is moft attacn'd to: : Simply confider'd, he ftirs up Craft, Deceit, Frauds, Factions, Plots and Confpiracies; but we mult always regard and mixture of Kays with the other Planets: Here we find him in the 6 th Houte in oppofition to the $D$

in the 12th, and in $\square$ to $\sqrt{6}$, weak and dehilitated; Mercury in his own Simple Nature is malevolent, as 1 before obferved; And by being thus pofited and a peeted he becomes much more fo, and will more powerfully diffife his poifonous Atoms among Mortals, in great Loffes

Loffes, Imprifonments, decay of Trade, and Mortality among all forts of Cattle: Thefe Calamities will be principally felt in the South and Eaftern parts of the World; the Britilb Nations have reafon to houe for better things; Jupiter in $\sigma$ with the $\rho$ and $q$, and all of them in the Sign $r$. Euglard's Alcendant fhews great Felicity, Succels, and a growing Glory to attend this happy Ifland: The King will adtninifter Juftice and be had in great Honour, the People will thrive by Trade and Husbandry, and the Nation in general bs in a profperous and happy Condition.
Saturn entered into the $\operatorname{Sign} \neq$ about the beginning of the Year', he is now Retrograde, and towards the end of this Month meets with the oppofite Ray of $\delta$ juft as he enters the Sign II. This is sencrally looked upon as a very malignant and powerful Afpect; and we find it often attended with great Changes of Empire and Dominion in the World, and eminent Dif penfations of God's Providence with regard to Religion and Religious Worfhip: We may reafonably expect about this time a vifible Retrogradation in the Affairs of feveral Ponifh Nations in Europe, the Heavens are averfe to all their Tyrannical, Antichriftian, and oppreffive Schemes: The Spanifs Nation, that great Prop and Support of Papal Power and Superftition is eminently concern'd, fome great Changes feems to approach them apase; the Princes and Powers in Italy are in the utmof Confafion and Diftrefs, and they will find none to relieve them; there are other places alfn in the Esouth and Eaftern parts of the World, which will feel the fevere and heavy Hand of Divine Providence: The Tuikes are very Active, it is fome Northern Powers that carry their Fate in their Banners, and it feems not far off. We know that the Turk and Pope appear'd in the World in their Bloody Colours at the fame time, and no Wonder if their Power and Dominion be fuppreffed nearly at the fame time alfo.

There feems to be fuch a concurrence of Caufes and Predictions to center in thefe Times, that it looks very much like the approach of thofe Days before Ipolen off out of Divine Writ; to thofe before men-
tioned I will only add part of a Prophecy as it is given us by the Author of the Turkiß3 Spy, who lays, That he met with a Perfon at Afracan, called the Traveling Gew, who pofitively afferted in the open Streets, that after the Year 1700, the Turks fhall overflow Cbrifendorn like a mighty Torrent; when there will be great Defolation in Hungary, Germany, France, and other Regions in the Weft ; but above all others, Italy will be made a perfect Wildernefs; That England fhall become the Refuge of all that efcape the Calamities overwhelming the adjacent Countries; and there (he fays) they willbe fhewn a new pattern of the Law of Jefus, or rather the old and true one freed from the Corruptions and Errors which have been fuperinduced for many Ages, when the Jews will be convinced of their Infidelity, and chafe away Darknefs and Superftition from the Earth: In thote Days (fays this Jew) Foreign Princes fhall fend their Ambaffadors to the King of Great-Britain for Holy and Pious Teachers to inftruct them; Mighty Armics fhall be raifed in the North, which fhall be joyned by a prodigious Army colleeted in other parts of Chriftendom; which Thall drive out the Turks, recover from them the Holy Land; and glorioufly rebuild the City of Ferwfalem; and make a worthy and excellent Engliforman Patriarch of thefame. Then thall the Eyes of us Jews (fays he) be opened, and we fhall all acknowledge Jefus to be the true Meffias. III. Of the Summer Quarter.

The Moon feperating from their oppofition, and applying to the Square of Jupiter in Arics, adds violence to their Effects, and thews great troubles to happen by
reafon of Oppreffion and Tyranny, and great Loffes by reaton of fudden Invafions, and the Death and Deftruction of great Cattle: And indeed here feenis to be a great Storm arifing, for $\sigma_{\sigma}$ where $\delta$ and $\begin{gathered} \\ \text { have }\end{gathered}$ taken up their Refidence is the Dignities of 4 , and in Domus Religionis. Mercury as I have before obferved, is ever conforming his Note to the Planet he is in Company with, which here is Mars; and they oppofed by the $D$ and fquared by 4 their Difpofitors; what can we expeet trom fuch Pofitions as thefe are, but rafh and perverfe Counfels, turbulent and daring Actions, and all upon a Religious pretence? Religion is the Cloak, but Villany the Defign. I hope no more Popifh Maffacries, tho' it looks too much like it.

## IV. Of the Autumnal Quarter.

THIS Quarter begins on Wedneflay the 1 2th Day of Seqtember, 18 minutes paft 5 in the Morning, when 22 deg. of IR Afcends, and 20 deg. of II Cul. minates. The $D$ is in the roth Houfe in 7 deg. of $\sigma_{5}$ his own Dignities, feperating from the Sextile of $\psi$ in 8 , and applying to the $*$ of $\sigma^{\pi}$ in $\mathbb{R}$, near the Cufp of the Alcendant.
