Observe the same of the rest, which is plain to the meanest Capacity. The Day of the Moon's Age you have in the fixth Country on every Lest-Hand Part of the Almanack.

INTRODUCTION

The Signs of Peace o'er Europe's Stage now run, And great Alliances we see begun; Great Britain's Friendship sought by all, doth shew, Her Greatness in the most delightful View; Sav'd from Rome's Priests, no longer shall she mourn, No longer dread that dreadful Chance to burn; Or worship their high Host, and Saints invoke, Bow down to Idols, or a heavier Yoke: But Thanks to Heaven and George, our Fears are flown, The Mist's dispell'd, and their vile Schemes o'erthrown. If Enemies we have still, may they feel The keen Effects of harden'd British Steel. Find Rebels Fate, like those that try'd their Skill, Of late for Popish Cause, and Victims fell; When their Devices were broken in one Hour, And Popish Priests mist of tyrannick Power. Then spare no Pains, but with unwearied Mind. Seek Britons, till whate'er you feek you find ; Till facred Powers arise and bring to light, All Popish Treasons, and their Sons of Night, Shimei's rebellious Tribe to Juffice bring, And hang all those that Plot against the King;

The TABLE of the TERMS explained.

NOW every Term hath part or all these Returns, viz. Crastins, Octabis, Quindene, Tres, Mente, and Quinque. Every Return also has a Basis or Know-day, from whence they make their Reckoning; the Signification of which are, Crastins is the Morrow after the Basis, as Crastins Trinitatis is the Morrow after Trinity Sunday, it being the Day of Denomination; Octabis is eight Days inclusively; Quindene is sisteen Days after, and Tres three Weeks, Mente a Month, and Quinque sive Weeks after.

Note, Now every one of these Returns has sour Days to confift upon, the first whereof has a double Signification; for the one is the Day of Return, the other the Day of Essoin, for the Defendant in a Personal Action, or the Tenant in a real Action to be efformed; the second is the Day of Exceptions, for the Plaintiff to lay an Exception if no Essoin be cast, that the Defendant shall not be essoined or amerced; the third is Returna Brevinus, or Day whereupon the Sheriff must return the Writ; and the fourth is the Day of Appearance for Parties and Jutors in the Court of Common-Pleas. But if any of these Days sall on a Holy-day, that is no Court-Day, as in Easter-Term, on Holy-Thursday; or upon St. John Baptist, in Trinity-Term; in Michaelmas-Term, on All-Saints, or All-Souls Day; and in Hilary-Term, on Candlemas-Day; or upon any Sunday, which are no Court-Days, then must the next Day following serve for both; as if the Effoin Day, and Day of Exception; and fo of the rest. These Days are of most Use in the Common-Pleas, where all Suits commence, &c. But for Latitats, or other Process upon a Bill certain, it is upon a Day certain, as Die Lung prox, post Purif, which always is reckoned from the Essoin Day. In the Chancery Court none of these Returns are used, but only the Day of Appearance, which is Quarto die post. But if a Capias, Exigent, Scire-Facias, or Distring as be executed after the Essoin Day by the Sheriff, or a Commission set upon, out of any of the aforesaid Courts, after the faid Essoin Day, 'tis neither justifiable nor warrantable.

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

The Learned Mr. Whiston observes, (tho' great Friend to Astrology,) that both the partial a the total Downfalls or Destructions of every one of t Four Grand Monarchies, the Affyrian or Babyloni. the Medo-Persian, the Grecian, and the Roman, w ushered in, and in part occasioned by Eclipses of Sun'and Moon; And so that the intermediate Bread made upon the feveral Empires, were constantly troduced by great Eclipses of the Sun: And the

Final Periods by great Eclipses of the Moon, visible

over the same Monarchies.

The First of these visible Lunar Eclipses happens in the last Decade of I, which Proclus says, denotes the Death of some eminent and samous Man; the other sall in the last Decade of A, which generally signifies Plagues and very great Evils to afflict Mankind.

In some of my former Almanacks I have taken notice that the Spirit of God is now performing great Wonders in all Nations, in order to bring about the great work of Reformation; and that it was the Opinion of many good Christians; That the Call of the Jews will be in this Age, and that too very suddenly; particularly in my last: where I think I have made it very probable from a numerous Train of Deductions, that in this very Year 1750, we may expect some more than ordinary Appearances and Motions in most Parts of the World, especially in the Northern and Eastern parts thereof, tending to the overthrow and destruction of Antichrist. Tidings out of the East, and out of the North shall trouble him (says Daniel, chap. xi.) yet he shall come to his End, and none shall help him.

That the time of the Jews Restoration, and Commencement of the Millennium is near at hand is certain, whether so near as the time above-mentioned is as yet uncertain; But this uncertainty arises from the many Historical and Chronological Difficulties to be found among Historians. Some Authors making the time of the same Event sooner, others later, A. B. User and other Chronologers since his time, place the Birth of Christ just 4000 Years from the Creation, Scaliger, Petavius, and some others not so much; But the Septuagint and Josephus much more: The like difference in Accounts is to be found amongst them in

many other Historical Facts.

There is a Tradition among the Jews, that the World shall continue 6000 Years, viz. 2000 Years void, 2000 Years under the Law, and 2000 Years under the Messias; and at the End of this fix Thousand Years, will commence the Millennium, or One Thousand Years of Rest for the People of God; and particularly for his chosen People the Jews, Lastantius

fays, wherefore, because all the Works of God were compleated in Six Days, it is necessary that the World continue in this State Six Thousand Years, which Six Thousand Years, Coprian says, are already almost compleat, since the Devil attacked Mankind. Mr. Worston observes, That this Notion of a Millennium is universal, and is derived from the earliest Tradition, both among the Old Heathen Philosophers, the Antient Jews, the Apostles, and the Printive Fathers



of the Church; and is an undeniable and most important Portion of Divine Revelation; In his Sacred History lately published, vol. ii. p. 435. he says, that by the exactest Chronology, the first Six Thousand Years from the Creation, end about A.D. 1766. (which is 16 Years hence,)-That is for certain supposed the Beginning of the Millennium, when the Jews will be restored to their own Country, and rebuild their Temple upon the sounding of the seventh Trumpet.

A Trumpet is the Symbol of War; and in the Revelations we find, that all the Seven Trumpets were to be attended with Woes and Lamentions; Six of which are already past, and the 7th which is yet to come, denounceth the third and last Woe; under it the Seven Vials of God's Wrath are to be poured out. both upon the Eastern and Western Antichrist, that is the Turk and Pope. It is faid, Revel. viii. 13. Woe to the Inhabitants of the Earth, by reason of the Trumpets that are yet to found, and ch. xv. ver. 8. it is laid, no Man was able to enter into the Temple till the Seven Piagues of the Seven Angels were fulfilled: which intimateth, that the Holy City and Temple cannot be prepared to receive the righteous part of Mankind, till the Power of the Turk and Pope are both destroyed, or that the Seven Vialsare all poured out.

A famous French Author in his Account of the Non--flusion of the Seven Vials, says, The first Vial poured on the Earth, intends the Lois of Church Revenues. and to falls upon the worldly Interest of Antichristian Men. The second Vial poured upon the Sea, which he fays is the Papal Kingdom in its greatest Extent, which will become as the Blood of a dead Man, to hat every Soul which liveth in it shall die; for as Fish cannot live in Water turned into Blood, neither an Mankind any longer endure to live under the Yoke of Populh Priests and Governors. The third Vial which is poured on the Rivers, denotes the Destruction f Popille Doctrines. The fourth Vial which is poued forth on the Sun, threatneth the Ottoman Empire nd Religion; the 4th Trumpet raised that Empire, nd the fourth Vial shall destroy it. The fifth Vial

is poured out upon the Seat of the Beast, or the City of Rome, which predicts her Destruction: The Angel represents the Popes Kingdom as full of Darkness, and his Subjects gnawing their Tongues thro' Dispair. The fixth Vial is poured on the great River Euphrates, that is, on the great Empire of the Turks and their Religion: after which there will be nothing to hinder the Princes and People of the East, who shall be Endightned or Converted; or the Jews who are there dispersed in great Numbers, from marching into the West to help on the Destruction of the Beast. The seventh and last Vial is poured into the Air, and denotes the clearing of all places from the Darkness and Fog of Superstition and Antichristianism: after which will be manifest the Mystery of God in reuniting all Nations, and the Kingdoms of this World will be-

come the Kingdom of Righteoufness.

I have already observed, that the precise time when all these mighty Revolutions will happen is doubtful; however there is no doubt but we are arrived near to the time of their Manifestation; and when the Scene of Affairs both in Asia and Europe will be very much changed: Of this we are affured from computation of Scripture Prophecy, and the concurrent Testimonies of the Sybils, and other Heathen Oracles; As also from fuch certain outward and visible Signs which we know were nearly to preceed that great Day. I will tell you very clearly, fays the Sybiline Oracles, the Signs whereby you may know when will be the End of all these things that shall happen on the Earth, viz. when (the likeness of) Swords shall be seen in the Heaven's towards Sun-setting or Sun-rising. And the Prophet Joel fays, ch. ii. ver. 30. the Lord will shew wonders in the Heavens, Blood and Fire and Pillars of Smoke; every Body knows, that upon the first Appearance of the Northern Lights, they were by all forts of People compared to Swords, Lances, and other Military Weapons, or else to Blood, Fire, and Pillars of Smoke, in the very Expressions of the Prophet Joel: And indeed they most certainly do greatly resemble all these things; and in fact are Fires and Pillars of Smoke or Vapour, which do frequently

in their Colour represent Blood; and by their Form and Motion, Swords, Lances, and other Military Enfigns: But these Appearances (as also Comets) you will fay, may be accounted for from natural Causes; allow'd they may so, yet as their Appearances are so universal and uncommon (except of late Years) and are exactly fuch as we see were to happen some short time before the commencement of these extraordinary Revolutions, preparatory to the Millennium, we may and ought to look upon them as ominous, and fent in a peculiar and wonderful manner, to prefage the approach of those wonderful and tremendious Times: Let us then, not be ignorant of the Signs of the Times, but look suddenly for that great and fearful Earthquake mentioned in the Revelations, for it will come and cannot be afar off; But I fear it is with us, as with the Jews, when our Saviour came into the World; or with the Christians, when Antichrist stept upon the Stage: Christ was both come and gone before the Tews knew that he was the Messias: and Antichrist was grown old in the World, before the World took any notice of him; so it may be that Antichrist is going apace to Perdition, before the People of God begin to discern it.

This is generally looked upon as a very malignant and powerful Aspect; and we find it often attended with great Changes of Empire and Dominion in the World, and eminent D.F. pensations of God's Providence with regard to Religion and Religious Worship: We may reasonably expect about this time a visible Retrogradation in the Affairs of several Popish Nations in Europe, the Heavens are averse to all their Tyrannical, Antichristian, and oppressive Schemes: The Spanish Nation, that great Prop and Support of Panal Power and Superflition is eminently concern'd, fome great Changes feems to approach them apace; the Princes and Powers in Italy are in the utmost Confusion and Distress, and they will find none to relieve them; there are other places also in the South and Eastern parts of the World, which will feel the fevere and heavy Hand of Divine Providence: The Turks are very Active, it is some Northern Powers that carry their Fate in their Banners, and it feems not far off. We know that the Turk and Pope appear'd in the World in their Bloody Colours at the same time, and no Wonder if their Power and Dominion be suppressed nearly at the same time also.

There feems to be fuch a concurrence of Caufes and Predictions to center in these Times, that it looks very much like the approach of those Days before spoken off out of Divine Writ; to those before men-

That he met with a Person at Astracan, called the Traveling Jew, who positively afferted in the open Streets. that after the Year 1700, the Turks shall overflow Christendom like a mighty Torrent; when there will be great Desolation in Hungary, Germany, France, and other Regions in the West; but above all others, Italy will be made a perfect Wilderness; That England shall become the Refuge of all that escape the Calamities overwhelming the adjacent Countries; and there (he fays) they will be shewn a new pattern of the Law of Jesus, or rather the old and true one freed from the Corruptions and Errors which have been superinduced for many Ages, when the Jews will be convinced of their Infidelity, and chase away Darkness and Superstition from the Earth: In those Days (says this Tew) Foreign Princes shall send their Ambassadors to the King of Great-Britain for Holy and Pious Teachers to instruct them; Mighty Armics shall be raised in the North, which shall be joyned by a prodigious Army collected in other parts of Christendom; which shall drive out the Turks, recover from them the Holy Land: and gloriously rebuild the City of Ferusalem; and make a worthy and excellent Englishman Patriarch of thesame: Then shall the Eyes of us Jews (fays he) be opened, and we shall all acknowledge Jesus to be the true Messias.
