Your capacity for acquiring treowledge is unlimited by your MAEER; and the blessedness of an enlightened mind will bring you the consolations of joy and happiness. Do not then deface your matare, nor make yourself unworthy of these celestial gifts; do not deprive yourself of the power and glory God hath allotted you, for the possession of a fey imperfect, rain and temporary pleaзанея.

When you have perfected the contemplation of your GoD, and considered the extent of those faculties with which you are endowed, you will be fit to receive the fillowing instruetion, and to know in your practice how to conduct your self. As you will daily converse with the Heavers, so instruct and form your mind acrcording to the image of divinity. Learn aft the ornap ments of virtue, aad be apficiently instructed thexein.

Be humane, courtcous, familiar to all, and casy of access. Afflict not the unforturnate with the terrors of a severe fate; in such cases, inform them of theis hard fortune with sympalketic concern; divect them to call upon God to divert the judgements impending over them; to stmmon up all their fortitude and to endeavour to remove the threatened evil by a manly exercise of that free.wiH with which the all-merciful Goos hath endowed them. Be modest in conversation, ainl associate with the sober and learned. Covet not riches, But give freely to the poor both money and judgement. Let no worldly consideration procure an erroneous jodgement from you, or such as may dishonor this sacred science. Love all your fellow creatures, and ches rish all who cordially embrace this art. He spariag its delivering judgemeut concerning your King and Counv tey; or of the death of your Prince, for I know expr-s fimentally that Reges suljacent legilus stellurum. Rejoice in the number of your friends, and avoid litigion: suils and controversies In your study be totus initill;, that you may be singulut in arte. Be not exira ragant in the destire of learning every science; be not aliquid tanturm in omnibus. Be faithful and complacent; betray no one's secrets; I charge yon, never divulge the trust either friend or enemy hath committed to your faith. Instruct all men to live well, and be a good example yourself. Avoid the lashions of the times, its luxuries and lascivionsness; but love gour Country, and be its friend. Be not dismayed, though evil spoken of: Cunscientia,prcestat mille testibus.

## INTRODUCTION.

ACCORDING to the concurrent doetrine of ancient and eminent Philosophers, it appears, a Life is infused thronghout all things, an intellectual and artificial fire, an inward principle, animal spirit, or nataral life, producing and forming within, as art doth without, regulating, moderating, and reconciling the various motions and qualities of this mundape system. By virtue of this Life, the great masces are held to: gether in their orderly courses, as well as the minutest particles governed in their natural motions, according to the several laws of attraction or gravity wibh which every partical of matter is endowed. Hence it may be sapposed agreably to the configuration and respective temperamenty of the heavenly bodies, together with the various configurations or aspects, and influrnces the one upon the other, and of course apon the individual that is born ; for in proportion as these respectively operate together, will be the bent and inelination of the person who is born under such and such position of the selestial Stars. If their aspeets or positions are favourable, and benevolent planets are above the Horizon, muct good will certainly ensue to the Native. If evil configurations, and the benevolent planets are ander the Earth and evilly posited, much anxiety and sorrow will enevitably enaue. This, long experience daily manifestr to the leves of this science;
and that the Native will be able by the apparent strengit of the Stars at his birth to achieve the most stupendous actions. On the contrary, if the positions of the principal Planets are weak, he will naturally be unfortunate, supine, and quite in ${ }^{-}$ active. This is most wonderfully and clearly perceived in atl Men's nativities, as well às thetr inclinations to vicious or virtuons persuits. By directions, the time of marriage, fortane, death, \&rc. is most accurately known; and if the mithmertic is right, there is a great certainty is it.-
> " A'll are but parts of one stupendous whole " Wlrose Dody nature is, and God the seul."

Thiese and the twelve finies that follow in the next page are very isublime, in Pope's Essay on Man.
Astrology thien, 1 consider as the effects derived from the amazing powers of inutual attraction of the different parts and niássés (great or small) of matter, the one upon the other; which knowledge is to be attained by study and observation of the influences produced by the motions of the heaenly bodies; for as Astronomy hath its origin in the motion and revolution of the Stars, so Astrology is founded on the effects and influenees of attraction or gravitation in the same bodies, observed from the nativities of different persons: and should any deay the situation of the Stars, as they are set down by our skilful Astronomers, he nsust be sent to their most accurate astronomical tables, founded on the best mathematical principles; so the who denies the influences of Astrology must be referred for conviction; to the predictions verified in the genitures of different persons, and observe bow beautifully the actious and accidents of various persons agree with the Horoseope and correspond with the Astrologer's predictions. Hụman nature is subject to error; so that no sciênce can be decined absodutely perfect:-only according to the
courne of nature, Gox permittiag, sucb aecidents will be-: fal the Native at such a time, saith the Artist. Astrology cannot be repugnant to the Christian religion, unless it be a sin to study Nature or Astronomy : on the centrary, it has a tendency to elevate the mind to the contemplation of God the Fsrebl of all.-It may be, as our treatise mentions, attendea with real service to lead every individual to know future events -fore-warned, fore-armed. For a person to know the leading features or dispositions in his nature, by means of the configurations of the Stars at the hour of birth, especially if those features or aspects predict an evil tendency, must be of the greatest consequence to the individual concerned; namely that be may thereby, when he is arrived to years of maturity, (and, let us hope of discretion also,) make use of his reason and better judgement, as a correeter of the natural proneness to vice, which be sees predominant in his constitution; or as Pope expresses it in his Essay on Man:-

Allextending, that is, according to Sir Isaac Newton, in his Principia: "God is omnipotent, not only by his power,
on but also by his substance or essence : for power cannot sub"sist without the Being in which it is contained."

Astrology is the most ancient of all human sciences: Josephus reports, that the Antediluvians were well aequainted with it, and engraved the rudiments thereof upon permanent pillars of stone to preserve them to posterity from the flood; which by this art they probably foresaw. These pillars endured through many generations, and were not entirely effaced till some time after the deluge.

A fter the flood, the Assyrians were the first People we read' of that devoted themselves to the study of this Science; soon' followed by the Chaldeans, Egyptians and Arabians; who' blessed with ingenuity, and a pure, serene atmosphere, seemed' invited thereunto by nature, and by continued observations and 'xperience, brought it to such a degree of estimation that zone but those who obtained any proficiency therein; were aduitted to the administration of sacred rites; or to the mangement of the affairs of state.

After these, the Indians and Greeks found new beauties, In these Siderial Studies; and lastly, the Europeans borrowed their knowledge from the Greeks and ${ }^{\text {Orientale; }}$ who are stillJovers of this science, even to enthosiasm.

We will just speak here a little of the utitity of it. It di-
rects persons, in a matoral way, how they may most fortanately manage their affairs in the World; as by elections; to chuse a fit time to begin any considerable enterprise; by directions of the Planets in their nativities, and annual revolutions, to discover the most dangerous or propitious times that are approaching to any Native. In Horary Questions. full natisfaction may be given, if mapaged by a skilful Artist. Astrology also is of various other nises, which my limits will not permit me to mention. Before $I$ proceed to the Argolian and Ptolomean method of teaching, which is the easiest, most simple and instructive, of any in the World, we must premise a very particular and authentic story, concerning the celebrated Dryden.
When his Lady (for he had married Lady Elizabeth Hown ard, Sister to the Earl of Berkshire) was in labour with his Sorr Charles; being told it was decent to withdraw, he laid his watch on the table, and begged one of the Ladies then present, in a most solemn manner to take notice exactly of the very minute the Child was bors ; which she did, and aeguainted the Father accordingly : about a week after, when the Lady was pretty well recovered, Dryden took an occasion of telling her, that he had been calculating the Child's nativity, and observed with grief, that he was bova in an evil. hour ; Jupiter, Venus and the Sun, said he, are all under the Earth; and the Lord of his Ascendent afflicted with a direfuil square of Mars and Saturn. If he lives to the 8th year of bis Age, he will go near to die a violent death on his birthday;' but should he escape; I see but small hopes: be will be under the same direction in his 23 rd year; and should be eacape that adio, the 33rd or 34th year is, I fear-. Here he was interrupted by the violent anguish of his Lady, who. could no longer hear the calauities he was fortelling of ber Scn.

The time predicted was now come: The Ladys anxiety was so great, that it occasioned soch an effervescence in het blood and apirits, as threw her into suct a viotent fever; that her life was despaired of; until a letter came from her Husband, reproving her womanish credulity, and assuring her that her Child was well. This recovered her health and spirits ; and in six weeks after, she received an eclairicssement of the whole affair ; for Dryden either through fear of being seckoned saperatitious, or thinking Astrology a science beneath his srudy, was extremely caatiows to let any bodr know he wns a dabbler in that way ; for which reason he could not excuse lis own absence on his Son's anniversary, from : general hunting-match which Lord Berkubire made, and to which all the seighboaring Gentlemen were invited: but before he weut, he took care to set his ${ }^{-}$Son a double exercise inthe Latin tongue, (as he taught his Children himself,) witha strick charge not to stir out of the Room until this return ; well knowing the task be had set him would take him up Donger time. As Charles was perforning his duty in obedience to his Father, the Stag made towards the House, and the thoise alarning, the Servants, one of them took young Drydenby the hand, in order to see the sport. Just as they came to the gate, the Stag, being at bay with the dogs, leaped over the court-wall, which was very low as well as very old, and the dogs following, threw down a part of this wall, ten yards. in length, under which Cbarjen Dryden lay buried. He was immediatrily dug out, and after six weeks languishing in a: dangerous way, he recovered : so far Dryden's prediction was fulfilled. In the 23 rd year, Charles fert from the top of an ofd Tower, belonging to the Vatican at Rome, occassioned by a swinning in his head, with which he was seized, the hear of the day being exceosive. He again recoverod; but was
erer after in a languishing sickly state. In the 33rd year of his age, he was drowned at Windsor, having with another Gentlemen swam over the Thames; but in returning a third time it was supposed he was taken with the cramp, as he called out, though too tate for melp. Thus the Father's prediction' was amply fulfilled, and will serve to illustrate the truth of Astrolugy. Not only many passages might be quoted from the Holy Scriptures, as a sufficient confrmation of it roevery, dispassionate reader, but there are also some very extraordf:nary instances of this predictive faculty recorded by different Historians of character and eminence. For instapce: Ther Archbishop of Pisa consulted several different professors of Astrology concerning his deatiny, and they all caleulated his nativity aidifferent times, and without any communication with ore another; but they all foretold him he would be hanged ${ }_{4}$ It seemed highly incredible at the time, becanse be was in $s p$ muct honor and power; but the event jastified the predic: tions, for in the sedition of Pope Sextus IVth, in the sudden rage and uproar of the People be was seized and hanged. Petrus Leoptius, a celebrated Physiciaa and Astrologer, of Spole: tanum, cast his own Nativity, a ad foretold that bis death wuld be occasioned by water, and many years afterwards ba was found drowned in a pond, into which be had fallen the preceeding night, by mistaking his way. Josephus tells us be cast the nativities of Vespasian and his Son Titus, and predicted that they would both be Emperors; and so il turnod out. I could adduce a great variety of facts, equally as extraordinary, wherein the time of death has been ascertained s but let this suffice.

Tuly, the great Roman Orator, was versed in this science; so was Solomon undoubtedly convertant in it, having affipipr with Pharoh's Daughter, whose Father was Egypt's King-

He was skilled in all wisdom both divine and human, for all the Kings of the earth sought bis presence to hear this wisdom which Goo had put into his heart ; for he knew the root and foundation of all Philosophy.

Now finding that Astrology in all ages has beerf much pros fessed and encouraged by many eminent and exalted characters, surely then no person has the least reason to deem this study beneath their most profound attention, but, on the contrary, ther will find it well deserving their leisure and regard; for so simple and easy is the knowiedge of Astrology, that oniy by making it the amusement of a few hours, or by attentively perasing this work will soon find ir become familiar to them, and the more they dive inde it, the more beautien will they continually discover.

## 

ASTROLOGY comprehends every operation that proceeds out of the frame of nature, and furnishes us with a knowledge of the occult virtues of all earthly substances, and of the nature and end of every particle of God's Creation. The Sun, Moon and Stars, were not made by a wise and beneficent Crestor, that the wondern of them should open themselves Ao eyes that soe not, or display their influences unregarded to the unintellectual inhabitants of the earth. It was indeed princeipally for the pleasure of him by whom all things exist, that they are and were created; who rejoiceth in his works, in surveying that structure which Omnipotence alone could raise; ibut they are likewise designed to commusicate wisdom and :happiness to mankind. Would we contemplate the inex,pressible greatness and Majeaty of God, let us bat look up and survey the Heavens, which are stretched out tike a curtain ; " they declare the glory of God, and shew forth his han.dy work." They visibly shew it forth to the rude and illiterate;

but the mind which is fraught with this comprehen ive study may for ever expand itself in the immensity of the prospec*. Even the irrational and inanimate part of the creation, are held forth by the wisdom of Gon to direct the Beings of reason in the way that they should go; and our Saviour in his parables descends to the lifeless emblems of seed sown, of the fig-tree and of a single grain of mustard seed, to eulighten the understanding of Mankind. Is it not then the duty of every rafional creature to improve by this divine example, and to increase their inuperfect knowledge in the subjects of creation?
Such knowledge as this lies open even to the way-faring man.: it grows in every field, and meets us in all our paths; and is requisite to be understood by the reader before any progression be made in that excellent part of Astrology calicd Elementary Pbilosophy. I shall now conclude these observations and begin with arranging the Signs of the Zociac under all there different qualities and forms.

OF THE TWELVE BIGNS AND THEIR DIVISIONS.

The Zodiac is a great circle of the Sphere, and is divided into 360 degrees; every degree is subdivided into 60 o:her di_ visions, called minutes, and every miuuse into 00 seconds; every Sign contans 30 of those chegrecs, and so the 12 Signs fill the whole Zodiac; for 12 times 30 is 360 , \&c. They, aro thus characterised.

Observe that the circle of the Zodiac cuts the Equator (or Equinox) in the very midst, in two points, which are the very beginning of Aries and Libra, usually called the Equinoctial points.
These 12 signs of the Zodiac are divided into 4 Triplicitice according to the $\&$ Elements.

The seven Planets hy their motion through the Signs makes sexeral Aspects, the one to the other from the Signs they move in, and they are called radiations; these Aspects are chiefly five, that is a Conjuction, (though improperly termed an Aspect) a Sextile, a Quartile or Square, a Triues and Opposition.

A Conjunction is when two Planets possess the same sign and degree of the Zouiac, and is thus characterized, $\delta$ :

A Sextile asject is when two Plavets are 60 degrees distant, and so possess a sixul part of the Zodiac and characterizthus, *
A Quarile aspect is when two Planets are 90 degrees distant, a: d so contain a fourtb part of the Zodiac and is thus characterized, $\square$

A Trine aspect is when two Planets are distant 120 degrees or a third ${ }_{i}$ art of the Zodiac, and is characterized thus, $\Delta$.
$\mathrm{T}!$ e * aspect is two whole Signs distant, and is termed ap spect of imperfect love.
The aspect is three Signs distant, and is an aspect of inuperfect hatred.

The $\Delta$ aspect contains four Signs and is an aspect of perfect love and concord.

The 8 opposition is an aspect of perfect hatred, and is when two Planets are in the opposite parts of the circle, or 180 degrees distant ; note also, that these aspects are two-fold, sinister and dexter, the sinister falls according to the succeasion of the Signs, and the dexter contrary, which are most powerful in their operations. I shall here impress the mind with an observation on the influence and government of the twelve Zodiacal Constellations or Signs.

of A Conjunction is improperly called an Aspect, because it is a hen two Planets are both in the same degree and minute of a Sign. and are said to be in copjunction, consequently cannot at that time be in aspect to each other. The effects of Conjunctions are either good or bad, according as the Manets are friends or enemies to each other, or to the subject then under consideration.

* A Sextile Aspect. implies two of the l eavenly bodies powited, at the distance of sxty aeg ees in lougrade, or one pixth part of the Zodiac from each other. The Sextile, is fermod an ..spect of inperfect lowr, or friendsbip; because when t.o Planets, or Signif rators, are in' Sextile to each oiher, th $y$ ituport that iny matter in dispute, treatj of marriage, or any other subject of inquiry, may be bappily terC 3
minated, or brought about by the means of Friends; or that for want thereof the contrary may happen; it is generally con-idered an omen of the favourable kind.

By a п Quartile aspect, two Planets are understood to be posited at ninety, degrees, or one fourth part of the circle of the Zodiac from each other. The Quartile is considered an Aspect of imperfect hatred; and acts vice versa with the Sextile, inclining rather to contention and misfortune, as the other dons to friendship, harmony and good fortune.
$\Delta$ A Trine Aspect, imports the Planets to be situated at the distance of one hundred and twenty degrees, or one third part of the circle of the Zodiac, from each other. This is an Aspect of the most perfect unanimity, friendship and peace; and it is so considered, recanse when the Planets are in a $\Delta$ Aspect, they are posited in Signs precisely of the same triplicity and nature; that is to say, they are both in an earthy, airy, fiery or watery Sign ; and consequently both contribute their mutual influences. But in $a *$, which is an Aspect of imperfect amity, the Planets are posited in Signs of only a partile nature, viz. fiery and airy, or an earthy with a watery Sign; and as the fiery Sign is hot and dry, and the airy, hot and moist, the earthy, cold and dry, and the watery, cold and moist, so the Planets thus posited, agreeing only in one point out of two, give but an imperfect influence.

8 The Opposition of two Planets, signifies their being posited at one hundred and eighty degrees, or just half the distance of the Zodias apart, which places them diametrically opposite to each other in the Heavens.: 'This is considered an Aspect of rerfect hatred, or of inveterate malice and enmity, 28 analignamt in its effect as the Trinc is benevolent; and of
double the destructive tendency, of the $\square$ Axpect, therefore an 8 is jastly termed an Aspect ot perfect enmity.

These aspects are all divided into partile and platick aspecta. A partile Aspect considers two Planets, exactly so many degrees from each other as make a perfect Aspect; that is if Venus be in 12 degrees of Cancer, and Jupiter in 12 degrees of Virgo, they are in partile seztile Aspect. Again if the Sun be in two degrees of Leo, and the Moon in two degrees of Libra; they are in a partile sextile aspect also ; so that all perfect Aspects are partile; and imply the matter or thing threatened, wherher good or evil, to be near at hand.

By a platic Aspect we are to understand two Planets se posited as to admit balf the degrees of each of theirown rays or orbs; for instance if Saturn be posited in 20 degrees of Libra, and Jupiter in 28 degrees of Sagittarius, then Saturn would $b c$ in a platic sextile Aspect to Jupiter, because Saturn would be situated within the moiety of both their orbs added together, which is seen by the following table. the same circumstance applies to the A 4 pects of all the Planets; or if their distance from each other brings them within onehalf of each of their orbs or radiations, when added together, they will then form a platic Aspect.

It must be doserved in these Aspects, whether the co operation of the two Planets is going off or coming on. In the above example, the effect of Suturns platic sextile Arspect, with Jnpiter was going off, Jupiter having seperated from the sextile of Saturn 8 degrees, but if we reverse their situations and plaee Saturn in 28 degrees of Sagittarius and Jupiter in 2.) degrees of Libra, then Jupiter the lighter Planet would be hastenjing to a Zodiacal sexule of Saturn, con o
eequentlv the Aspect would be coming on with all its force and influrnce, and would in proportion affect the subject, whatever it might be.

I shall here ins ri a Table of the 12 Signs, Planets and Aspects that they may be refirred to with pleasure, reccommending it to all my reader, not to proceed any further till whey Gave learm them by heart.

OF THE PLANETARY HOUSES, AND THEIR EFEECTS.

To give a more competent knowledge of the nature and arrangement of the 12 Houses of the Planets, we shall cansider them according to the following Scheme.


Thus, Cancer and Leo have assigned unto them the two great Luminaries, Sol and Luna; because they are agreeable to each other in nature; for the Sun bring naturally loot and dry, shews his effects in a more eminent manner when posited in Leo, than he doth in either Aries or Sagittarius; and the Moon, for the same reason, hath Cancer allotted for her government, because she is cold and moist, and of the nature of this Sign ; and being the first of the watery triplicity, and next to . the Sun's House, she receives ber light from him; and all things are generated by their joint influence.
Saturn is uaturally cold, and therefore an enemy to heat ; and has for his Mansion or Houses, Capricorn and Aquarius; which are the opposite Signs to Leo and Cancer, and are consequently cold and moist : Saturn is accounted the mots -bnoxions, and most malevolent of all the planets, becaum
he opposes the two great luminaries which are the fountains of lite, light and nutrition.
Jupiter, is placed unser Saturn, and has the two Signa that go hefore and after Capricorn and Aquarius allotted for his Honses, namely Saggittary and Pisces, which are in trine to the Houses of the two Luminaries; Pisces lis night Honso is in rine io Cancer, the ouse of the nocturual Luminary; and Saqittary, his day Honse, in trine to Leo, the ifouse of the din:nai luminary. Jupiter being naturally temperate, and ha ing these amicable aspects, is considered the most benevoleat of all the Planets to markind, and the greater fortune.

Mars next in order follows Jupiter, being placed under him ; and therefore those Signs that go before and aftur the Houses of Jupiter, ale alloted to Mars, viz. Scoipio. aud Aries, which are in quartile te the Houses of the Sure and Mum, as Aries his day House is to Cancer, and Scorpio his night House is to Leo. A sid andee a quartise is found to be an a pecet of enmity, he is accounted modignaut and untertunitte in an inferior degrre to Saturn, who behoids the Lumi maries with an opposition, therefure be walled the lesser in fortune.

Venus a more remperate planet, hatb appointed unio her those Houses that go before the Houses of Mars, viz. Libra and Taurus, which are in a sextile to the Houbrs of the two Luminaries. and form an aspect of love and amity ; lut because a sextile is bot so strong and perfect an aspect as a trine, che is accounted the lesser fortune.

Mercury being situated within the orbits of all the other Planets, has the Signs allotted him which precede the two thouser of the great Lumusuries, namely Geroun and Virgois
and because Mercury is never distant from the Sun above one Sign, be uaturally inclines neither to gond nor evil. but participates either in the grod or evil iufluences of whatever Planet be is joined with in aspect.
$\therefore$ be Plancts are said to be in their jnys, when they are poo sited in thowe Housts, wherein they are most strong and powerful; an


It may perbape he inquired, why b joyeth not in we well as in $m$, since both these Sigus are his Howers. 1 ho reasun is, that in. $\overline{\prime \prime}$ he hath both 1 !ouse and nipicity, and is therefore better dignited, and anore potent in vf. - 77 In practice, the Dignities and Debilities of the Planets ate to be collected; then subtiact the lenser from the greater, the remainder will be the surplus of Dignities or Debiltice, as an example in the latter part of this treatise will clucidate.

A Planet is essentially strong, or operates with the greatest force when posited in his own House, Exaltation, Triphcity, Term or Phase, according to the fullowing Table.

Over against $r$, in the 5 th, 6 th, 7 th, 8 th and 9 th columns, you find $\psi 6$, 9 14, which tells you the first 6 degrees of $r$, are in the terms of $\psi$; from 6 to 14 the terms of $q, 8 c$. Over against $r$, in the 10th, 11th and 12 th columns, you find $\delta$ 10, $\odot$ 20,930 , viz. the first 10 degrees of $r$, are the phase of $\delta$, from 10 to 20 the phase of $\odot$; from 20 to 30 the phase of $\ell, \& c$. In the 13th column, over against $r$ you find $q$ detriment, viz. $\&$ being in $r$, is in a Sign opposite to $\bumpeq$, her .own House, and se is said to be in her detriment. In the 14th column over against $r$ you find $h$, over his head fall;

A Planet, dignified as above, is said to be in his essential dignities; accidental dignities are, when Planets are cabsually in an Angle or succeadant House, direct, free from combustion.
A. Planet in his House or' Exaltation, being siguificator of apy Person, denotes him to be in a happy and'prosperous condition ; not wanting for the goods of this life, and comparitively as a Man in his own Castle, secure from danger.- $\mathrm{Bi}^{\mathrm{t}}$ a Planet debilitated, as being in detriment, or fall; and afflicted, denoted the Person to be in a very low and mean condition, much dejected, and disconsolate, \&c.

the reins and bladder, small pox, \&c. and all disorders proceeding from abundance of heat.

Under the Sun pimples, burles in the face, afflictions of the heart; as heart burnings, faintings, tremblings, sore eyes and red choler.

Under Venus, are all diseases of the womb, suffocation, palpitation, heart burn, and all disorders of the genitals, kidnies, reins, back and loins, and all diseases proceeding from love or lust.

Under Mercury, are catarrhs, illiac, psssion, stammering lisping, hoarseness, coughs, snufling in the nose, asthme, imperfections in the tongue, and all diseases in the brain, and whatever impairs the intellectual faculty.

Under the Moon are the cholic, complaints of the bowels, dropsies, fluxes, all cold rheumatic diseases, worms, rheumes in the eyes, surfeits, coughs, convulsions, falling sickness, king's-evil, imposthumes, small pox, letbargy, measles, phrenzies, apoplexies, vertigo, lunacy, and all crude humours, in any part of the body.

All the Planets except Sol, are sometimes on the north side of the Ecliptic, sometimes on the south side; but the Sun always moves in the Ecliptic, therefore can have no latitude.

Now it must be observed that the aspects of the Planets are projected, or cast contrary ways, either forward in a line progressively with the Sign of the Zodiac, which are termed Sinister Aspects; or else backward, in a line reverse to the order of the Zodiac, which are termed Dexter Aspects; as appears at one view in the following Table.

In the foregoing Table, at the top of the thind column, note the characters of the Aspects, sextile $*$, quartile $\mathbf{\square}$, trine $\Delta$ and opposition 8 , as placed over the Signs of the Zodiac. In the first, observe the words dexter and sinister, and in the second column, the Sign $r$ : these are intended to shew that a Planet posited in Aries, would send his sextile Aspect dexter to Aquarius, and sinister to Gemini, his quartile dexter to Capricorn, his sinister to Cancer, his trine dexter to Sagittary, his sinister to Leo, and would bé in oppesition to a Planet posited in equal degrees of Libra; and so on through the Table. It must be observed that the dexter Aspects are more powerful than the sinister.

## THE LNTISCIONS OF THE PLANETS.

A Planet's Anstiscion, is a certain virtue, it acquires by being posited in conjunction with any Star or Planet, in degrees equally distant from the two kropical Signs $\sigma 8$ and $v 9$; in which degrees the Sun, when it arrives, occassions equal day and night all over the World. For instance, when the $\mathcal{O}$ is in the 10th degree of $\gamma$, he is as far distant from the 1 st degree of $\Phi$, as when in the 12th degree of $\Omega$; therefore when the $O$, or any Planet is posited in the 10 th degree of $\sigma$, it mends its Anstiscion to the 20th degree of $\Omega$; that is, it gives additional force and virtue to any Planet, at that time, in the anme degree by conjunction, or that casteth any Aspect to it.

The Planet's Antiscions may at all times be found by the following Table.

ATAELE OF THE ANTIACIONA OF THi PLANETS.


The foregoing Table shews, that a Planet situated in 1 degree, 1 minute of $r$, sends his Antiscion into 29 degrees 59 minutes of ; a Planet in 2 degrees 2 minutes of $\gamma$, into 28 degrees 58 minutes of $\Omega$, and so on through the Table. These Antiscions are considered, in the rules of Astrology, equivalent to a sextile, or a trine, particularly if the Planets are of the benevolent or fortunate kind. These Planets have also their contra-Anstiscions, which are of the nature of a quartile or opposition. To know where these fall, it only requires to find the Antiscion, and in the opposite sign to that will be the contra-Antiscion. For instance, suppose $\psi$ in 1 degree of $r$, his Antiscion will then fall in 29 degrees of吹, and his contra-Antiscion in 29 degrees of $\mathfrak{f}$; because $\mathcal{H}$, is the Sign immediately opposite to $\mathrm{P}_{\mathrm{X}}$ where the Antiscion falls.

## EXPLANATION of the FOLLOWING TABLE.

In the first column against $\gamma$, you find $8,15,30$, under the column of masculine degrees; and under the column of feminine, you have 9,22 , which shews that the first eight degrees of $r$ are masculine, and the ninth degree feminine, from 9 to 15 are masculine, and from 15 to 22, are feminine; and from 22 to 30 are masculine. The use of which is, that $\mathrm{i}^{\mathrm{f}}$ the principal significator in a nativity be posited in the degrees and Signs masculine, be the native male or female, it argucs that he or she shall inherit a more masculine temper and resolution than ordinary : but if the signifiqator be in feminine Signs and Degrees, the native will be more effeminate, timid, and less robust. The same observation holds good with respect to the other Signs and degrees, as in the Table they stand directed. The fourth column points out that there are certain degrees in each Sign, which are termed light; and if either of these ascend in a nativity, the native will be of a fairet and clearer complexion than ordinary. The fifih column shews that there are degrees termed dark or obscure; and whenever these happen to be horiscopical in a nativity, it declares the native to be of a dark and sallow complexion, and if he should be born deformed, his deformity will be considerably greater. The sixth column shews which degree of the Zodiac are called smoky; and if any of these should arise on the eastern fineter at the time of birth, they declare the native of a mixed compléxion, neither fair nor swarthy, but partaking of both; and similar to his complexion, will be his understanding. The seventh column shews which of the degrees of the Zodiac are called void; and if the ascendant in

the radix of any nativity, be posited in them, it declares, an imbecility in the judgment and understanding of the native ; and the further he enters into conversation or business, the more obvious will this defect appear. The eighth column points out what degrees in each of the twelve Signs, are called deep and pitted; and these in a nativity signify that if the ascendant, his Lord and the Moon, be situated in any of them, the Native will be of an hasty "and imperfect speech, incapable of expfessing his desires, or of declaring his sentiments, and will be always involved in vexations, litigations and disputes; and like a man in a pit or snare, will want the assistance of another to help him out. The ninth column distinguishes the azimene or deficient degrees, and if in a nativity any one of these asscend or the Lord of the asscendant, or the Moon, be in any of them, the native will be crooked, lame, or deformed, or in some manner vitiated in the member or part of the body that the Sign governs, in which buch azimene degrees shall happen to be. This rule is so unexceptionable and invariable that it ought to be well considered in the judgment of every nativity. . The tenth column points out all the degrees of the twelve Signs, that are increasers of fortune, and the knowledge to be derived from them is, that if, in a nativity, the cusp of the 2nd House, or Lord of the 2nd, Jupiter, or Part of Fortune, be in degrees augmenting, they then became arguments of much wealth, and presage that the native shall, according to his capacity or situation in life, attain to greater bonour, riches, or preferment.

Cancer is a sign cold and moist, phlegmatic, lipuid, feminine, nocturnal and moveable, the summer solstice, and the watery triplicity.

It represents one of a middle atatuse, the upper part of the mody big, strong and well set, round visage, and indifferent.
handsome complexion; sersetitnes wam, pale and sickitr mean eyes, and dark brown hair.

## $\Omega$ Leo.

Leo is a Sign hot and dry, choleric, mascaline and diurnal bestial, barren, and commanding, eastern, and the second of the fiery triplicity.

It gives a large fitl body, abave the middle size; broad and well set shoulders, but narrow sides; yellow or flaxen hair. mbch thereof and curling; a great round bead, and large eyes, yet quick sighted and of a ferce and terryfying coun-. tenance, of a ruddy high and sanguine colour, a strong, ${ }^{4}$ active, valiant, and courageous Persom.

Virgo is an earthy, barren, cold, melancholy; feminine; southern, nocturnal Sign, and the second of the earthy triplicity.

Pisces is a nocturnal, watery, cold and moist, phlegmatic, femenine, nocturnal, common, bicorporal, northern, idle, effeminate, sickly, fruitful Sign, and of the watery Trigon.

The Person signified hereby is of a low and short stap ture, an ill:composed body, the face inclining large, of , a white or pate complexion, the Body fleshy, or swelling, rather stooping when walking and holding down the head.

AOf the: Properties and Influences of the Sum, Heons and Planets, and first of the Georgium Sidus.

## H Georgium Sidus.

The Geargium Sidus is now considered the most elevated though not the largest of all the Planets, approaching nearest

40 the starry Gramiont, at one thoumand oight huindred millions of miles, trom the Sun; he goes in his orbit; at the fote of hhirty seven thousand railes an hour, and performs bis lanal petiod round the Sun in three hundred and forty eight thousad, one.hundred and five days; and though he is scarceily alserved withput a good. Telescope, yet bis diameter is iconaputed to be no less than thirty five thousand, one hundred and bine miles, conseqnently is four times larger than the Earth; but his diarnal notation on its axis, is to us wholdy unknown.
$\because$ He has no Fopses alloted him, but partiripates of the nafare of the malevolent Planet Saturn, in the highest degree; and is therefore .equally urfortunate, aocording to the place in Which be falls, in the Radical figure.

## 7. Saturn.

Saturn is placed between Jupiter and the Georgium Sidus, at about seven hundred and eighty millions of mules from the Sun, and would fall thereto, in seyen bundred and sixty seven days, if his projectile force was dest ojed, as computed by modera Antronomers; he travels in his orbit at the rate of eightteen thousand miles every hour; and performs his annual revolution round the Sun, in twenty nine years, one hundred and sixfy seven days, and five hours of our time; which, .makes only one year to that Pianet; and though it appears molarger than a Scar of the third magnitude, yet his diameter is found to, be no less than sixty seven thousand English miles, therefore near six bundred times larger than our Earth. A i. hiu hroad ring surropunds this Pianet, somewhat resembling
the borizon of an artificial Globe, and may be zoen to appear double through a gobd Telescope : it is inclined thirty degreee to the Ecliptic, and is about twenty one thousand miles in breadth; which is equal to its distance from Saturn on all sides. There is reason to believe that the ring turns round its axis, because, when it is almost edge-ways to us, it appeart somewhat thicker on one side of the Planer than on the other; and the thickest edge has been seen on different sides at different times. But Saturn having no visible spots on his body, whereby to determine the time of his turning round his axis, the length of his days and nighti, and the position of his axis, are wholly unknown to us. He has two degrees forts eight minutes, north; and two degrees forty pine minutes south latitude. His exalcation is in twenty one degrees of Libra, bis detriment in Cancer and Leo, and his fall in twenty one degrees of Aries. He is Retrograde one hundred and forty days; and stationary five days before, and five days after his retrogradation. His Orb is nine degrees before and after any aspect; that is, his influence begins to operate, when either he applies, or any Planet applies to him, within nine degrees of his perfect aspect, and his inflaence continues in force until he is seperated nine degrees from the aspect partile.

Saturn is in nature cold and dry, in consequence of being so far removed from the heat of the Sun, abounds in moist va, pours, and is a melancholy, earthy, solitary, diurna!, mascu* line, malevolent Planet: his effects when lord of the Ascendant, or principal ruser of a Geniture, with all his qualities are as follow He produces a middle'stature, with a dark swarthy, or pale complexion, small leering black eyes, leán face, broad forehead, lowering brow, thick nose and lips, his
head stooping, large ears thick nose and lipe, broad shoulders, black or brown hair, thin beard, with small lean Uighp and legs. If this Planet is weit dignified in the nativity, the Native will be of an acute apd penerrating imagination, reserved in conversalign and aypere in bis canduct, very: spare botb in apeaking and giring, grave in disputing, and patient io labequr, very anxıous and salicitsus to obtain the goods of fortwne, fungtapt in his attachmeyts to wife or friond, but sexere and cruel ip prejudice, or resentment agrinst any one. But if bis Planet should be ill posited at the time of birth, the Native will be naturaly heavy and lumpish, sordid, envious, covetous, mistrustful, cosardly, sluggish, outwardly dissembling, artful, false, stubborn, malicious, perpetually dissat isfied with bimself, and all about him ; and consegueptly of a mostexil nature. When Satuin is orientrly, the humatu statures will be shorter than usual, and when occidental, thin, tenn, and Jese hairy. If his Jatitude be north, the Native will be hairy. and corpulent; if withour any latitude, he will be of large bones and muscles; and if pueridional, fat, amooth, and fleshy ; in his first station strong, and well favoured; and in his second station, weak and ilh-f;voured. These remarks likewiso bold good with reapect to the other Planets.

It is abo to be remarked, that when Saturn is significator of travelling, he,indicates long and laborious journies, unfortur nate adventures, and dangenous imprimonment. He is friendHy. to Jupiter, Sol and Mercury ; but at enmity with Mars, Venas, and the Moon :' Saturn's greatest year is four hundred and bixty Give; hiegreat is fifty seven; his mean is forty threo and a halfs and his least is thirty, the meaning of which is, that ifflatitim belord of the geniture, and not aflicted by $20 y$
evil aspect, the Native may live fifty seren years, but if meanly, diguified the Native will not live 'more than torty three years, and if he is weakly dignified, he will not live more than thirty years, as the nature of Saturn at best is cold and dry, which are qualities destractive to health and long tife.

It should also be remembered that this Planet is of a destructive, nature and debelitated at times; for whenever he or Mare rises at a birth, in a debilitated state, it in more than probable but the Child diés that year, unless Jupiter or Venus interpose ${ }_{4}$ with their friendly influences strongly in the Siga.

## HERES UNDER SATURN.

Hlack-alder, Birds-foot, Bull, Clounds wounds-wort, Catstail, Háwkweed, Henulock, Henbane, Mandrake, Moss of oak, Night-shade, Oak, black-Poppy, Poly-podium of the oak and Tway-blade, or Two-leared-grass.

## \% Jupiter.

Jupiter is the next Planet below Saturn, and is calied the greater fortune: to our sight he appears the largest of any Star in magnitude, except Venus; and is of a bright clear aspect. Modern Astronomers have proved him to be four hunr dred and twenty six millions of miles from the Sun, to which he would fall in two hundred and ninety days, if his projeetile force was destroyed. He is computed to be above a thousand times bigger than our Earth, and goes in his orbit at the astonishing rate of near twenty six thousand milea every Dour. His diameter is computed at eightecn thousand Eage
lish miles, which is more than ten times the diameter of the Earth : he completes his course through the twelve celestial Signs in eieven years, chree hundred and fourteen days; and twelve bours. He is considerably swifter in motion than Saturn; but to us his mean motion is four minutes fifty nine scconds; his swift motion fourteen minutes. He has exaltation in fifteen degrees of Cancer; suffers detriment in Gemini and Virgo, and receives his fall in fifteen degrees of Ca pricorn. His greatest latitude north is one degree thirty eight minutes; and his greatest latitude south, one degree and forty minutes. He is retrograde one hundred and twenty days; and stationary tive days before, and four days atter his retrogradation. His orb or radiation, is nine degrees befure and after any of his aspects.

Jupiter is a diurnal masculine Planet, temperately hot and moist, airy and sanguine; when be rules over a Nativity, or is lord of the Geniture, he gives an erect and tall stature, a handsome rosy complexion, oval visage, high forehead, large grey eyes, soft thick brown hair, a well set comely body, short neck, large wide chest, strong and well proportioned thighs and legs, with long fret; he is sober and manly in speech, and in his conversation grave and commandiag, and will give mrast excellent manners and disposition to the $\mathbf{N}_{\text {ative. If }}$ well dignified at the time of his birih; he will be in general faithful and prudent, honourably aspiring after noble actions, tair in his dealings, desirous of serving all men, just, honest, and religious, kind and affectionate to his family and friends, charitable and liberal, wise and prudent, hating all mean and sordid actions. But if Jupiter be debilitated and afflicted at the time of *irth, he then ipdicates a protligate, careless dise
position, of mean abitities and shallow understanding; of no religious principle, addicted to evil comparay, easily persuaded to folly and extravagance; and a tyratt in his farnily. If this Planet be castward at the birth, the Native will be more 'sanguine and ruddy, with' larger eyes, and more corpalent. -If occidental in a feminine Geniture it gives a mest fair and -lovely complexion to the female, her stature somewhat shorter, the hair light brown, or approaching to flaxen, but thin round the temples and forehead.

When he is significaror of journies be denotes pleasant itravelling, good success, safety, healch and mirth:

He is friendly with Saturn, Sol, Venus, Mercury and En-- ma, but at enmity with Mars. Jupter's greatest year is foar hundred and twenty eight, his greater year is sevemty nins; 'his mean year is forty five; and his least year is twelve.

## Ơ Mars.

Mars is next to Jupiter, and is the first planet above the Eanth, and Moons orbit. His distance from the Sun is computed at one hundred and twenty five millions of miles; and by travelling at the rate of forty seven thousand miles every hour, be goes round the Sun ir six hundred and eighty six of our days, and four hours, which is the length of his year. His diameter is found to be four thousand four hundred and forty four miles, which is but a fifth part so large as the Earth, And would fall to the Sun in one hundred and twen. ty one days, if his projectile force was destroyed. He is of a deep fiery red color, and by his approaching some of the fixed Stars seems to be encompassed by a very gross atmosphere. His mean motion is thirty one degrees twenty seven minutes and bis swift motion from thirty two to forty fcur minutes. His exaltation is in twenty eight degrees of Capricorn, his detriment in Libra and Taurus, and makes his fall in twenty eight degrees of Cancer. His greatest north latitude is four degrees thirty one minutes, and his greatest south latitude six degrees forty sever minutes. He is retrograde eighty days and stationary two or three days befcre retrogradation, and two days before direction. His orb or raciation is seven degrees before and after any of his aspects. Mars is a masculine, nocturnal, malevolent Planet, in nature hot and dry, chuleric añd
fiery: the lesser in fortune, author of quarrels, war and bat1le. Wheii this Planet presides at a birth it renders a strong well set body, of short stature, but large bones, rather lean than fat, a brown ruddy complexion, red, sandy, flaxen or light brown hair, sharp hazle-ryes, round face, hold countenance, active and fearless. If well dignified, the Native will be of a courageous disposition, wilhout fear or danger ; hazarding his life onall occasions; of no reason in war or contention; unwilling to submit to any, superior, and will endeavour to triumph over his enemy, and yet prudent in the management of his private concerns. If the Planct be ill posited, and aflicted with cross aspects, the party will then grow up a trumpeter of his cwn fame and consequence, without decency or honesty, a lover of malicious quarrels and affri:ys, prone to wicheduess and slaughter, and in danger of conmitiing murder, of robhing on the highway, of becoming a thief, traitor, or incendiary ; of a turbulent spirit, obscene, rash, inhuman and treacherous, fearing neither God nor-man, given up to every speices of fraud, violence, cruelty and oppression. If the Planet be oriental at the nativity, the Native will be above the middle stature, very hairy, and of a clearer complexion. If occidental, the Native will be short, of a more usids complexion, a small head, with yellow hair, and a dry constitution. He is friendly only with Venus, and at ennity with all the other Planets. Ia journies he portends danger of robbery, loss of life, and all the o her perile altendant on the raveller. His greatest revolutionary year is iwo hundred and fourteen, bis great year is sixty six, his mean year is forty, his least year is fiftuen.

## (The Moon.

The Moon is next below Mars, being a Satalite, or pttendant of the Earth, and goes round it, from change to change in twenty nine days, twelve loours, and forty four minutes; and round the Sun with it every year. The Moon's diameter is two thousand, one hundred and eighty miles, and her distance from the Earth's cenire is two hundred and forty thou' sind miles, and would fall to the Sun in sixty four days, ten hours ; and to the Earth in four days and twenty one hours, if her projectile force was destrojed. She goes round her orbit in twenty seven days, seven hours and forty three minutes, moving about two thousand, two hundred and ninety miles every hour ; and turns round her axis exactly in the time that she goes round the Earth, which is the reason of her always keeping the same side towards us, and that her day nud nigit taken together, is as long as our lunar month. She is an opaque Globe, like the Earth, and Shines only by reflecting the light of the Sun ; therefore whilst that balf of her which is tonards the Sun is enlightened, the other part must be dark and invissible, and consequently she disappears when she comes between us and the Sun; because her dark side is then towards us. When she is gone a little way forward, we see a little of her enlightenel side, which still increases to ou: tiew as she advances forward, until she comes to be opposite the Sun, aud then her whole enlightened side is towards the E.rth, and she appears with a round illumined orb, which we call the Full-Muon; her duik side being then turned away from the Earth. From the Full she seems to decrease gradually as she ro:s th:oug' tha other half of her course, shew*
ing us less and less of her enlightened side every iav tiil hrer actit change, or conjauction with the Sur, and the., she dissappears as before. Her man motion is thirieen degrecs, ten minutes, and thirty six seconds; her swift or diurnal motion oflen varies, but never exceeds fifteen degrees two minuter, in twenty four hours. Her greatest north latirude is five degrees and seventeen minutes; and ber greatest south latitude is f.v; degrees and twelve minutes, or thereabout.
The Munn is never stationary nor retrograde, but always diret ; though when she is slow in motion, and goes less than thiten degrees in twenty four hours ; slie is considered eqnivalent to retrograde Planet. Her exaltation is in the third degree of Taurus, her detriment in Capricurn, and her fall in three degrees of Scorpio. Ller orb or radiation, is twelve d:grees before and after any of her aspects; and she rules vier all infants until the seventh year of their age.
The Moon is feminine, nocturnal, cold moist, and phlegnatic. Her influence, in its self is neither fortunate or unfortunate, but as she happens to fall in with the configurations of the other Planets, and is then either malevolent or otherwise. as those aspects happen to be. And under these circumstances side becomes the most powerful of all the heavenly bodies. in her operations, by reason of her proximity to the Earth. and the swiftness of her motion, by which she receives and transe. mits to us the light and infurnce of all the suppriots, by ber condigurations with them. When she hats rule in a nativity she produces a full stature, with tair and inge complexion, round face. grey eyes, lowering brow, very hairy, short arins thick hânds and feet, smooth body's inclined to be fit, corcuG 2

Lent and phlegmatic. If she be impeded of the Sun at the time of birth she leaves a blemish on or near the eye; if she bs impeded in succedant Houses, the blemish will be near the eye; but if unfortunate in angles, and with nebulous fixed Stars, the blemish will fall in the eye, and will affect the sight. If she be well placed, or dignified at the nativity, the Native will be of soft engaging manners and disposition, a lover of the polite arts, and of an ingenious imagination, fond of novelties, ard given to travelling, or rambling about the country; unstable, and providing only for the present time, careless of futurity ; timorous, prodigal, and easily affrighted, but laving peace, and desiring to live free from the cares and anxjeties of the worid. If the Native be brought up to a mechanical employment, he will be frequently tempering with a variety of different trades, but pursuing none of them long together. If the Moon be unfortunate at the birth, the Native will then be slothful, indolent, and of no forecast, given up to a drunken, disorderly, beggarly life, hating labour, or any kind of buiiness or employment. When oriental she enclineth more to corpulence; but whon occidental, rather lean awkward, and ill formed.

She is in friendship with Jupiter, Sol, Venus and Mercury, but at enmity with Saturn and Mars. Her greatest year is three hundred and twenty; her greater is one hundred and eight; her incan year is sixty six; and her least year is twenty five.

## 9 Venus

Venus is the next Planet below the Earth and Moon, haring ber orbit within that of the Earth. She is computed to be fifty nine millions of miles from the Sun, to which she would fall in thirty nine days, and seventeen hours if her projectile force was destrojed, and by moving at the rate of sixty nine thousand miles every hour, she passes through the twelve Signs of the Zodiac, in two hundred and twenty four days, peventeen hours of our time nearly. Her diameter is seven thousand nine bundred and six miles, and by diurnal motion she is carried about her equator forty three miles every lour, besides the sixty nine thousand above mentioned. When she appears west of the Sun, she rises before him in the morning aad is catted the morning Star; but when she appears east of the Sua, she shines in the evening after ho ects; and is then called the evening Star; and continues alternately for the space of two hundred and ninety days, in each of these situations. It may perhaps be thougbt susprising at first, that Venus should continue longer on the east or west side of the Sun, than the whole time of ber period round binn, but the difficulty vamishes when we consider that the Earth is aly the while going round the Sun the same way,
though not so quick as Venus; and therefore her relative motion to the Earih must in every period be much slower than her absolute motion in her orbit, as the Earth during that time advances forward in the Ecliptic, which is two bundred and twenty degrees. To us she appears through the teiescope : in all the various shapes of the Moon. 'ter mian motion is fifty nine minutes eight seconds, and her daily or swift motion is from sixty two minutes, to one degree iwents two minutes. Her exaltation is in twenty seven degrees of Pices; her detriment in Aries and Scorpio, and her fall in twenty seven degrecs of Virgo.

She cmoninues retrograde forty two days, and is stationary two days before and two days after retrogradation. Her orb ot radiation, is seven degrees before and after any of her aspects.

Venus is a feminine Planet, temperately cold and moist, nocturnal, the lesser For:une, author of mirth and conviviality, alluring to procreation, and to the propagation of the species. When she ascends at a nativity, she gwes a handsomebut not tall stature ; complexion fair and lovely, bright sparkling eyes, of a dark hazle or black, the fice round, regular, smooth and engaging; the bair bright brown, hazel, of chesnut, shining and plentiful; the body regular and well propotioned, and of a neat, smart, and airy disposition; generally with dimples in the cheeks or chin, and ofteti in both; the eye wandering, and naturaly amorcu: ; in notion light and nomble; in joice sott sweet, and agreeable, inciined to amorous conversation, and rarly arguments in love. If well dignified at the time of birth, the Native will be of a
quiet, even, and friendly disposition, naturally inclined to neatness, loving mirth and cheartulness, and delighting in music; anourous, and prone to venery, though truly virtuons, if a. woman; yet she will be given to jealousy, even without cause. If this Planet be weak and aftlicted bv cross aspects, then will the Nativo be riotous, profigate, abandon. ed to evil company and lewd women, regardless of reputation or character, a frequenter of taverns, night-houses, and places of ill fame; delighting in all the incitements to incestuous and adulterous practices; in principle a mere athiest, wholly given up to the brutal passions of unbridled and un$\cdot$ ltivated nature. If Venus be oriental at the time, the stature will be tall, and straight ; but if occidental, short and stooping: though comely and well favoured. If she be significator in a journey, and well dignified, she portends much mirth, pleasure, and success, and promises safety and good fortune by the way.

She is friondly with Jupiter, Marn, Mercury, and the San and Moons, but at enmity with Saturn.

Her greatest year is one hundred and fifty-one; her groatez year is eighty-twe ; her meah year is forty-five, and her least year is fifteen.

## HERESUNDER TENUS.

White flowers, Paul's Bettony, Primrose, Rib-wort, White-roses, Knshes, White Saunderis flower, Snake-weed, Sarrel-wood, Sow-thistle, Stich-wort, Spinach, Strawberries, Sycamore-tice, Throat-wort, or Picle flowern, Three-leav'd-grasi, Turmip-root, Vine-leaves, Vio-let-leaves and roots, and Water-creasuen.

## \% Mercury,

Nert to Venus, and within the orbits of all the other Planets, in Mercury, and of course, the nearest of them ail to the central Sun, and in proportion to his disfance, would require fifteen days and thirteen hours, to fall to his stupendous body, if his projectile force was destroyed. He completes his revolution, or traverses through the twelve Signs of the Zodiac in eighty seven day's and twenty-three hours of our time nearly; which is the length of his year. Bet being seldom seen, on account of his proximity to the Sun, and having no spots visible on his disk, or surface, the rotation upon his own axis, and the length of his days and nights, are as yet anknown to us. His distance from the Sun is computed to be thirty two millions of miles, and his diameter two thousand

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six hundred. He moves round the Sun at the rate of ninety fire thousand miles, every hour ; and receives from that lun:inary a propotion of ligbt and beat, alnoct seven times as that of the Earin. At be times he becomes visible, he sppears of a bright silver cclor, il. legh erictally foint and daskish to the naked eye. His mean motion is filiy nine minutes and eighty seconds, and sometimes sixty minutes; and bis diurnal motion is most times one hundred mmutes a day. His greatest latitude, both north and south, is three degrees thirty three minuses. His exaltation is in fifieen degrees of Virgo; detriment io Sajittarius and Pisces, and his fall in fifteen degrees of Pisces. He is retrograde Iwenty four day.; and stationary one day before, and one day aficr retrogradatio on. His orb, or radiaton is seven degrees befure and aticr any aspect.

Mercury is the least of all the Plancts, in nature cold dry and melancholy; but author of the most pointed wit, ingenaity and invention. He is occasionally both masculine and fernivine ; and lucky, or unlucky, as his position in the heavens may happen to be. When he is in conjunction with a masculine Planet, he is masculine; when with a feminine Planet, feminine; grod and fortunate, when joined with the Forrunes; but evil and mischievious, when in conjunction with malevolent aspects.

When he governs a naivity, he denotes tall, straight, thin, spare body, uarrow face, and deep forhead, long straight now, eyes neither black nor grey, thin lips and chin, with but little beard ; brown complexion, and hazle or cicesnut coloured hair; the arms, hands, and fingers, long and slender; and thighs, legs, and feet the same. If oriemtally

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posited, the stature will be shorter, with sandy hair, and sanguine complexion, somewhat sun burnt; the limbs and joints large and well set, with small grey eyes. But it occidental, the complexion will be quite sallow, lank body, small slender limbs, hollow eyes, of a red cast, and of a dry constitution. If Mercury be well dignified at the time of birth, the Person will inherit a strong subtile imagination, and retentive memory; likely to become an excellent orator* and logician, arguing with much eloquence of speech, and with strong powers of persuasion. Is generally given to the attainment of all kinds of learning; an encourager of the liberal arts; of a sharp, witty, and pleasant conversation; of an unwearied fancy, and curious in the search of all natural and occult knowledge; with an inclination to travel, or trade into foreign countries. If brought up in the mercantile line, will be ambitious of excelling in his merchandize, and will most times prove succesful in obtaining wealth.

But if he is evilly posited, or debilitated, then the Native will betray a disposition to slander, and abuse the charater of every one without distinction; he will be a boaster, a flatter$e^{r}$, a sycophant, busy-body, a tale bearer, given to prpogate idle tales and false stories; pretending to all kinds of knowledge, though a mere idiot in his intellectual faculty, and incapable of acquiring any solid or substantial learning, apt to boast of great honesty, yet very addicted to mean and petly thievery.

Sol, or the Sun is an immense globe or body of fire, placed in the common centre, or rather in the lower focus of the orbits of all the Planets and Comets, and turns round his axis in twenty five days and six hours, as is evident by the motion of the spots visible on bis surface. His diameter is computed to be seven hundered and sixty three thousand miles; and by the various attractions of the circumvolving Planets, he is agitated by a small motion round the centre of the gravity of the system. He passes through the twelve signs of the Zodiac in three hundred and sixty five days, five hours, forty eight minutes, and fifty-seven seconds, which forms the tropical, or solar year, by which standard all our periods of time are measured. Fis mean motion is fifty nine minutes and eigh-
seconds; but his swift or diurnal motion is sirty minates, and sometimes sixty one minutes, six seconds. He constantly nhoves in the ecliptic, bis royal path, and is therfore roid of 1 ititude ; and for the same reason, is never stationary or retrograde. His exaltation is in nineteen degrees of Aries; his detriment in Aquarius; and his fall in nincteen degrees of Libra. His orb, or radiation, is fifteen degrees before and after aH his aspects.

The Sun is in nature masculine, diurnal and dry, but more temperate than Mars, and if well dignified, is aiways found equivalent to one of the Fortunes. When he presides at a birth, the Native is generally of a large, bory, strang body, of a sallow sun-burnt complexion, large high forchead, with light or sandy curling hair, but inclimed to be soon bald; a tine, full, piercing, hazel eye; and all the limbs straight and well proportioned. If he is well dignified, the Native will be of a noble, magnanimous, and generous disposition; high minded, but very humane; of a large and benevolent heart, àffable, and courteous; in friendship faithfnl and sincere; in promises slow, but punctual. The solar man is not of many words; but when be speaks it is with confidence, and to the purpose ; be is usually thoughtful, secret, and reserved; his deportment is stately and majestic; a lover of sumpturousness and magnificence; and possesses a mind far superior to any sordid, base, or dishonourable practises. If the Sun be unfortunate, then will the Native be born of a mean and loquacious disposition; proud and arrogant; disdaining alf bis inferiors, and a sycophant to his supetiors; of shallow understanding, and imperfect judgment; resthess, troublesome and domineering; of no gravity in words, or soberness, in

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actions; prone to michievoumpess, austerity, wacharitableness, cruelty, and ill-nature.

He is friendly with Jupiter, Mars, Venas, Mercury, and the Moon; but is constantly at varianoe with Satarn.

His greatest year is ome thousand six bundred and forty; bot otboys say, onily four buedrod and sixty-one; bis greas year is one humdred and twenty; his mean year is sixty mine ; sad tin least is nipetcon.

Angelies, Aleeast, or Costmary; Anise, Ash-tree, At. monds, Allgood, Aveus, Bazil-street, Birds'-eye, Burnet, Eugie, Calanients, Camonile, Cenbaury, Chervil, or SweetCicely, Celandine, Clary, Cabmint, Cowslip, Comfrey, with yellow flowers, Crown'imperial, good for palsies, Daffy-dills, or Daffy-down-dilly; Dili, Dibany, Eglantine, Elecampane, Eye-bright, Pennel, Fag-wort,' Galden-rod, Sweet Gillyflowers, Herbs'ears, Holly-rose; yellow Higbaler-flowers, with wooley leaves, St. Catharines'-Aowers, St. John's-wort, St. James'-wort, Ladies" Bed-straw, with yellow-flowers, Juniper, Lavender, Lavender Gotton, Ladiẹs Mantle, Lovage, Lïllies, yellowish flowers; Marigolds, Sweet Marjorum, Sweet Maulder, Master-wort, May-weed, Melilot, Garden-mints, Misletoe, Mug-wort, Mother-wort, Mullein, One-blade, or berb, True-love, Oxslips, Pursley, St. Peter's-wort, Palina, Chifsti, Penny-royal, Plimpenill, Piony, Red-roses, Rosa-solis, Rosemary, Roses-damask, Rue, Saffron, Sanicle, Sage, Sampire, Saundets, Scordium, Sebwall, Summe, Savery, Sou-thern-wood; Sundew, 8pignel and Sun-flowers,

## $\delta$ Dragon's Head and $\mathcal{Y}$ Dragon's Tail.

The head of the Dragon is mascular, partaking of the nature both of Jupiter and Venus; but the Dragon's tail is fe. mainine, and of a direct opposite quality to the head. These are neither Signs nor constellations, but are only the node, or points wherein the eclyptic is intersected by the orbits of the Planets, and particularly by that of the Moon, making with it angles of five degrees and eighteen minutes. One of these points looks northward, the Moon beginning then to have a northern Jatitude; and the other points southward, where she commences her southern latitude. But it must be observed that these points do not always abide in one place, but have a motion of their own in the Zodiac, and retrogradewise, three minutes and eleven seconds per day; compleating their circle, in eighteen years and two hundred and twenty ${ }^{-}$ five days; so that the Moon can be but twice in the ecliptic during her monthly period; but at all other times she will have a latitude or declination from the ecliptic. The head of the Dragon is considered of a benevolent nature, and almost equivalent to one of the Fortunes, and when in aspect with: evil Planets is found to lessen their malignant effects in a grcat degree, But the Dragon's tail I have always found of a most evil and unhappy tendency, not only tending to the malevolence of unfortunate aspects, when joined with them, but lessening considerably the beneficial influences of the Fortunes, and other good aspects, whenever found in conjunctiun with them.

Should the reader be desirous of more information on the Placetary system I beg leave to recommend to his attentive

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perusal, the Astronomical works of the ingenious Mr. Terguson.

> Another brief description of the shapes and forms of the Planets.

(from Lilly.)
b Signifieth one of a swarthy colour, palish, like unto lead or of a black earthly brown; one of a rough skin, thick and very hairy on the body, not grey eyes, frequently his complexion is betwixt black and yellow, he is lean, crooked, or beetle browed, a thin way beard, great lips, like the Black-aMoors' ; he looks to the ground, is slow in motion, either is bow-legged, or ink-kneed; generally of unpleasant breath, seldom free from a cough: crafty for his own ends, seducing people to his opinion, full of revenge and malice, little caring for church or religion; a foul, nasty, slovenly knave, or a whore; a great eater, or one of a large stomach, a brawling fellow, great shoulders, covelous, and seidom rich, \&c. This is to be understood when he is peregrine, or unfortunate, and so observe of the rest of the Planets.

4 We mast describe $\psi$ and a Jovialist, to be one of a comely stature, full faced, full eyed, a sanguine complexion, $\mathrm{H}_{2}$

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or mixed with red and white, a large space between his eyebrows; usually his beard is of a flaxen or sandycflaxen colour; sometimes also when $\psi$ is combust, very sad or black, his hair thick, his eyes not black, his teeth well set, good broad teeth, but usually sone mark of difference in the two foreteeth, either by their standing awry, or some blackness or imperfections in them; his hair generally curls if he be in a fiery Sign : a man well spoken, religions, or at ieast a good moral, bonest man; a person comely and somewhat fat if $\psi$ Ir in moist signs fleshy; if in airy Signs, big and strong; if in cathly Signs, a man usually well descended; but if he be, significator, of an ordinary clown, as sometimes he may be then is he of more humanity than usually is in such kiud of men.

才 A martial man; is many times full faced, with a lively high colour, like sun-burnt. or like raw tanned leather, a fierce countenance, his tyes being sparkling or sharp and dart. tiug, and of a yellow colour; his hair both of head and beard being redish, but herein you must vary according to the Sign; in fir ry Signs and airy, where of happens to be with fixed Stars. of bis own nature, there he shews a deep sandy redish coo lour, but in watery Siyns, being with fixed Stars of his own nature, he; is of a thixenish or whiteish bright hair; if in earthly Signs, the hair is like a sad brown, or of a sad chesnut colour. He haih a mark or scar in his face, is broad shouldered, a sturdy strong body, being bold and proud, given to mock, scuän, quarel, drink, game, and wench; which you - may casil, hau: $b_{j}$ the Siga he is in ; if in the house of \&
he wenches, if in the house of $\forall$ he steals; but if he be in bis own bouse be quarrels, in $h$ is dogged; in $\mathcal{U}$ in lordly ; in $\mathbb{C}$ is a drunkard.
(-) Generally denotes one of an obscure white coloar, mired with red; a round face, and short chin, a fair stature, and one of a comely body; his colour sometimes betwixt yellow and blisk, but for the most part sanguine than otherwise; a bold man and resolute, his hair curling; he bath a white and tender skin, one desirous of praise, fame and estimation among men ; be hath a clear voice and great bead, bis teeth somewhat distort or obliquely set, of slow speech, but of a composel judgment; using outwardly a great decorum in bis acions, but privately be is lascivious, and inclinable to many vices.

Q Whoever is signified by Venus, whether Man or Woman, hath a goodly and fair round visage, a full eye, usually we say goggle-tyed, and ruddy lips, the under more thick or bigger than the upper, the eye-lids black, however Iovely and graceful, the hair of a lovely colour, but for the most part according to the Sigu, (as before repeated.) in some it is a coal-black, in others a light brown, a soft smooth hair, and the body extremely well shaped, always rather inclining to shortness than tallness.

We describe Mercary, to be a man neither black of white, but between both, of a sad brown, or dark yellowist colour, long visage, high forebead, black or grey eyes, a thin long sharp nose, a thin spare beard, (many times none at all) of an auburn sad colour, next to black, slender of body, small lega, a prating busy fellow, and in walking he goes nimbly, and always would be thought full of aetion.

- She by reason of her swiftness varies her shape very often, but in general, she personates one having a round visage and fall face, in whose complexion you may perceive a mixture of red and white, but paleness overcomes; if she be in fiery Signs, the man or woman speaks hastily; in watery Signs, he or she hath some freckles in bis or herface, or is, blub cheeked; no very handsome body, but a mudling crezture, and unless very well dignified, she always signifies an ordinary vulgar person.


## THE COLOURS OF THE PLANETS AND BIGNS.

Thus by knowing the colour or complexion attributed to cach of the Planeis and Signs, it is easy to determine the complexion of the Native, or of any person or thing enquired after; for as the complexion or colour of the lord of the Ascendant, or the Siga, or significators are, that represents the party, such will be their colour or complexion. So if it be asked concerning two Cocks just going to pit, which shall be the winner? erect the figure exactly when the question is propoanded, and the two Plapets representing the distinguishing colours of the two Cocks, namely the lord of the Ascendaut and lord of the seventh shall be their significators, and that Planet which is the superior, or that has most essential dignitica, and is mout atrongly, fortified, shall by his colour point out the Cock that shall win his batto, so of any other queation determinable by colours.
Besides the foregoing natural influenees of the Planets, which they produce on the human frame, as ofteit as they bear absolute rule at a birth; it must also be remembered, that they differ in their effects, according as they are possited or impeded by other aspects at the time; and these variations must be attentively perused and digested, before any correct judgment can beformed an the circumstances of a nativity.

I shall therefore arrange them under distinct heads, and shew in the first place, how their natural qualities are changed, by their different aspects and positions in the Heavens.

The Moon of her own nature is cold and moist, and always intermises her influmenes with every Planet that joins in aspect with her, or from which ber aspect is separated. Hes offects also incroase or decrease as follows : increasing with $\delta$, she canses heat and dryness; but decroasing with $\psi$, she produces cold and moisture.

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Of the Numbers atributed to the nepen Planctr, according to the opinion of an eminent $A$ uthor.

Numbers attributed to the Planet 8aturn, 2.7. 9.
To this Planet $\psi$ belongeth three numbers, viz. two senen, nine. The number two as being next beneath the starry firmament, and also as being one of the two Infortunes ; and the number seven as being the seventh in order, and bighest from the Earth; it's also a number fatal and climacterical, as joined with the number rine; also the number nine is a number fatal and climacterical, as joined with the number seven, for sine times seven makes sixty throe, which number all Phitomphers consider fatal and climacterical, becanse the nines and the everem do meet.

Numbers attributed to the Planet Jupiter, 1, 3, 8.
Jupiter hath three numbers allotted to him, viz. one, three, eight. The number one, as being the head and chief Fortune; the number three as being the third Star or Planet in order from the starry fermament beneath Saturn; also as being one of the three Fortunes. The number eight, as containing the mystery of justice and religion; for Jupiter in Astrology, always represents the sober priest, or minister, according to which number Chbist was circumcised; we read also of eight degrees of blessedness.

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Numbers attributed to the Planet Mars, 2, 4, 7, 9.
Mars hath four numbers allotted to him, viz, two, four, seven, nine. The number two, as being one of the two Infortunes; the number four, as being the fourth in number from the starry firmament next to Jupiter; the number seven, as being a number fatal and climacterical, as joined with nine, he hath also the number nine, as being a nunber fatal and elimacterical, because inined'with seven; this Planet, and likewise Saturn are both enemies to nature.

Numbers attributed to the Planet Sol, 1, 3, 4, 10, 12.
The sun hath five several numbers allotted to him, viz. one, three, four, ten, twelve. The number one, as being the sole monarch cf the Heavens; the number three, as' heing one of the three Fortunes; the number four, from the four quarters of the year; the number ten, as being the number of the end of life, bring multiplied by seven; the number twelve, at passing through the twelve signs of the Zodiac.

Numbers attributed to the ${ }^{-}$Planet Venus, 2, 3, 6.
Venus hath three numbers allotted to her, viz. two, three, six. 'I he number two, as being female; the number three,' as being one of the three Fortunes; the number six; as being the nuniter of generation, consisting of two threes.

ENanbate ittrivitef to the Planet Mercury, 2, s.
Thin Planet, Mercury hath two mumabers allotted to him, vis. two, five. The number two, as being part male, and pert fornales, and therefore called the Hemaphrodite; the number five, ablhaving predominancy over the operation of the five senver.


Numbers attribated to the Planet Luna, 2, 6, 9.
The Moon hath three numbers allotted to her, viz. two, six, finiei The namber two, as being female; the number tix, as being the number of generation, the number nine, as beling the utmost receptacle of celestial influencer. .

Rules to gather such Herbs and Plants which are in controversy, that thereby you may have the true Planetary influence.

When you are inclined to gather any herb or plant, in controversy, as for instance, Dandelion before mentioned, thisplant being by my rules under Venus, but some Authors at-- rribate it to Jupiter, because it has a virtue to open the obatructions of the liver (being under Jupiter, but it has also a virtue to open and cleanse the passage of urine, as I have already aeclared, which is under Venus) but chiefly it hath the frit elimental quality of being cold, agreeing with Venus,

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whereas Jupiter is hot: Now to reconcile this, or any differrence of the like nature, observe the following rules. Let both Planets in dispute at the time of gathering, be in conjunc$t_{\text {ion, }}$ sextile, or trine aspect to each other; or otherwise ket the Moon be separating, and applying by any of those aspects from the one Planet to the other, by this rule yon may have the true planetary influence of both Planets in question, provided always that the lord of the bour accord with the first elemental quality of the Planet, whether hot or cold; wherefore in this condition, Venus must be-lord of the hoar at the time of gathering the herb, or plant accordingly. I shall instance one herb more; suppose it was required to gather Sweet-marjoram, which plant is by many Authors attributed to the Plapet Mercury ; the reason they give is, because Mer. cury is conjoined in some particular operations of the brain, and this plant is of known virtue to comfort the brain. But by my rules and daily experience, I find it to be under the dominion of the Sun ; first, by reason of its elemental qualities, as agreeing with heat and draught; secondly, in regard of is virtues, for all herbs and plants which are of a sweet smell, and of approved virtues to comfort the heart, brain, nerves, arteries and vital spirits, as this plant is, are justly, and rationally accounted to be under the government of the Sun, who is the fountain of life, light and motion, lord of Leo, and exalted in Aries, whereas Mercury bath only predominance over some particular operations of the brain, as he hath also in the five senses. It is generally approved of by all Authors, that the bulk of the brain in all creatures; is under the power and dominion of the Moon. The vital and quickening part under the Sun, the operation, of Mercury as aforesaid. Now
to gather this plant at the right planetary hour, that so you may have the influence of both Planets in question, you must do as before expressed; let those Planets concerned, either be in conjunction sexfile or trine aspect to each other at the time of gathering ; or otherwise let the Moon be separating and applying from the one Planet to the other, at the time of gathering by any of the forementioned aspects; for instance, suppose I was inclined to gather the said Sweet-marjorum in August 1809, about which time such like plants are in their prime to gather; in which month, on the 251 h . day the Sun and Mercury are in partile conjunction, but their influence holds above a week befoze and after, for 'till they are separated ten degrees from each other, their orbs rays, or influeace holds strong to perfection, wherefore you may gather plants aright on sunday the thirteenth day, from Sun tising, (fifty minutes after four) 'till one minute after six, when the first planetary hour ends, or on Sunday the twentieth day, from Sun rising 'till the end of the first planetary hour, and Jikewise in the afternoon, from the seventh to the eigth hour, as appears in the table of the planetary hours. I'ou may also gather herbs any days of those weeks, when the Sun is lord of the hour, and let the Moon apply to him by sextile or trine which will be so much the better; and herẹby let it be remembered, the Planet which is lord of the hour, and the plant which is to be gathered must both agree in elemental qualities, especially of the furst part of heat or cold, as for in. stance, Balm, Rosemary, Marigolds, Angelica and such like plants, are aH hot and dry in the first and second degree, perhaps nearer to the third, and theyefore are all attributed to the Sun.

## Some observations concorning sympatiny: of ower.

Whereas in the description of plants, the Planet Saturn bath but few herbs or plants allotted hira, yet notwithstanding what griefs, or infirmities whatever produced by any Plapet, there are herbs by sympathy, as well as antipathy to cure it; therefore observe, that although an herb, or plant may by elemental qualities be under the dominion of Mars, as being hot: and dry, and so gathered at his hour, yet, because of his virtues, and being good to cure such infirmities which are under the dominion of Saturn, it may justly and rationally be callod a sympathetical cure, because Mars is exalted in Capricorn, the bouse of Satum. For instance, agues, especially quarlans, are usually pro'yced by Saturn. Now Wormworde Cardis, Benedictus, and such like plants, being hot and dry, ape properly attributed to Mare, both in point of gathering and numbers, yet, because these herbs and plants are of,well known virtues to cure agues, which Satura, produceth, and Mars being exalted in Capricorn, which is the house of Saturn; therefore it may be properly called a sympathetical cure, Abd so berbs under the dominion of Sol, cure infirmities by sympathy produced by Mars, because the Sun is exalted in Aries, the house of Mars; also herbs under Venus cure by sympathy infirmities upder Jupiter, because Venus is exalted in Pisces, the house of Jupiter; and so herbs of Jupiter ccure by sympathy such diseases which are under the dominion of. the Moon; because Jupiter is exalted in Cancer, which is her house. The benefit which we have from this observation is thus: if Saturn, Mars, or any other Planet be the afllicting. Planet, and strong, (which argues a compliance) then thome:
herbs which are under the dominion of that Pianet which is exalted in his house, being good for curing, the infirmity may be used, and (for this reason) it shall be called a sympathetical cure, for when Planets are strong and afflicting, we must comply with them. Let it also be remembered that in all aympathetical cures uhatever, there must be one elemental quality in the Planet, of compliance with the nature of the Planet afflicting; for instance, herbs under Mars have the quality of drought with Saturn, and herbs under the Sun have the quality of heat with Mars, and herbs under Venus have the quality of moisture with the Moon. The truth is I find by good experience, especially in very cold infirmities, as agues, dead palsies, and such like, it is impossible to make a sympathetical cure when Saturn is strong, was it not for those observations before mentioned being in force approved; as for example, if the patient be old, his disease cold, complexion cold, the season of the year cold, and bis remedies to be applied cold, it must consequently destroy nature, for where heat is wanting, there can be no life; but if Saturn he the afflicting Planet and weak, then herbs which are uuder the dominion of the Sun and Jupiter, being of known virtue to cure the distemper or grief will do it ; they being by nature hot and moist; whereas Saturn is by nature cold and dry, quite different in elemental qualities to each other, and this is called an antipathetical cure, but in all infirmities whatever which are produced by the evil influence of Mars, he being strong in the Heavens, the remedies usell must be by such berbs or plants which are under his own dominion, together with herbs of the Sun ; but if the complexion of the Patient,

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his age, and the season of the year doth naturally produce head, then to use some small numbers and doses of such heribs which are under the dominion of Venus, may be proper at spme convenient times. to give the patient towards, the rafreshening of nafure, yet chiefly in point of cure, y\&u must adhere to thooe herbe and plants which are under Mars, and the Sun, whereby to work your cure ; for, if you should give cooling rempdies in hot distempers, when Mars is strong it will destroy the Pationt, as I have sufficiently proved; but if Mars be the afficting Planet and weak, then those herbs and planety under the dominion of Venus and the Mpon, together with a select number of herbs under the domipion of the Sun will do it, (for his herbs must always be used,) and here note, that when the Sun, or any other Planet whose herbs you intend to gathpr be strong in the Heavens, the lesser number of his herbs afo required. N. B. In gathering all kinds of herbs and plant whatever, more especially when you intend to do any great care, to get the influential virtue of ope of the Fortunes, viz. the Sun, Jupiter, or Venus, to be jpined, or be in some friendly aspect with that Planet which owns the plant, alwars have regard to the infirmity, or grief, which either by sy甲pathy or antipathy hath any relation to the Fortuncs; as for instance, Endive, which is cold and dry under Mercury, yet because it's approved good to cool the heat of the liver, whigh is under Jupiter, therefore let Jupiter be in conjunction seftile, or trine aspect to Mercury, or the Noon separating apd applying by any of those aspects from the one Planet to the other, when you gather the plant. This is to be dane whan an Iufortune owns the plant or herb you intend to gather.

It is needless for me to dwell upon a longer explanation of
the different virtups and effects of the Planeta and Signs. Sufficient has now bpen said, to point out their operations and patural influences, to the understanding of the mon limited capacity: it therefore only remains for my readers, or such of them as intend to make any progress in the study, to familiarise themselys with the subject, by a frequent perusal of it ; and particularly to acquire a correct knowledge of all the characters by which the Signs, Planets, and Aspects are severally distinguished. It will them be proper to understand the following terms peculiar to this art.

Explanation of some Technical Words and Terms of Axt, used is Asliology, which every Student aught well ta understand.

Application signifieth the approach of two Planets together, either by conjunction,or aspect, and is of three kinds $3_{3}$ the first is when a Planet, swift in motion applies to one of a slawer progress; for example, suppose Mercury posited in fourteen degrees of Gemeni, and Mars in nipeteen degrees of the same Sign, botb being in direct motion, Mercury by having the greater appazent projectile force, would overtake, and form a. conjunction with Mars, which is termed a direct application. The second kind is formed by two retrograde Planetr ; as, supposing Mercury in eighteen degrees of Gemini, and Mars in seventeen degrees of the same sign, both retrogrades ; Mercury being the lighter Planet, applies to the body of Mars, a more ponderous Planet, by retrogradation; and this is, termed a retrograde application, The third thind is
occasioned by one Planet going direct in motion, and meeting another Planet that is retrograde ; for instance, suppose M/rcury retrograde in eighteen degrees of Gemeni, and Sathrn direct in thirteen degrees of the same sign; here Mercury boing the lighter Planet, applies to a conjunction of Saturn by 2 retrograde motion ; and these two last are deemed evil applications. Observe, the superior Planets never apply to the inferior, but by a retrograde motion; whereas the inferior Planets apply both ways.

Probibition indicates the state of two Planets that are rignificators of some event, or the bringing of some business to an issue or conclusion, and are applying to each other by conjunction; bat before such a conjunction can be formed, a third Planet, by means of a swifter motion interposes his body , and destroys the expected conjunction, by forming the aspect himself; and this indicates that the matter under contemplation will be greatly retarded, or utterly prevented. For example, suppose Mars was posited in nine degrees of Aries, Saturn in fourteen degrees, and the Sun in eight deo grees of the same sign ; Mars is the significator of the business in hand, and promises the completion of it, as soon as he comes to a conjunction with Saturn; but the San being swifter in motion than Mars, passes him, and prevents their conjunction by forming the aspect himself. This indicates that whatever was expected from the approaching conjunction of Mars and Saturn, is now prohibited by the Sun's first impediting Mars, and then Saturn ; and this is termed a cotrjunctional or bodilly prohibition. There is also a prohibitior by aspect, either sextile, quartile, trine, or opposition; and this happens when two Hlanets are going into coinjunction.

Sappese Mars to be in nine degrees of Aries, Saturn in thirlete degroes of the same Sign, and the San in seven degroes of Gemini, the Sua being swifter than Mars in his diurnal mation, will quickly owertake him, and pass by the rextile denter of Mars and forms a sexitile dexter with Saturn before Mara can reach bim ; by this means their conjunction is prohibited.
Srapiowa ey is ulderstood of a Planet when to the eye, or reases of a beholder bere on earth it appears to stand stlll, without any progressive motion in its orbft. Not that a Planet ever is, or can be natarally in this state, but is ouly rendered 20 in appearance, by the inequalitits which arise fiom the positions and motions of the earth; for, were the Planets to be viewed from the San, or ceatre of the systom, they would atways appear uniform and regular. This is the case' before andedfter retrogradation.

Retaogradation implies an apparent motion in the Planets, whereby they seem to go back wards in the ecliptic, and to move towards the antecedent signs, viz. from east to west, contrary to the succossion of Sigas and degrees of the Zodiac, as out of ten degrees into nine, eight, seven, \&c. This also is áp appe: rance produced by ine opposite motiop of the carth to that of the Planetso

- Combuation. A Planet is said to be combust when sitnated' within eight degrees, thirty minutes of the body of the Sun. ${ }^{1}$ either before or after him. Suppose Mercury in the seventhehth degree, the Sun in the twenty first degree, and Venus id the twenty third degree of Aquarieus; here Mercury and Venus would be both coubust, but Venus would be more aftected, by it thas Mercury, becaulue the Sun applies tos or
moves towards Venus, and recedes from Mercary, whenehy his rays afflict her more forcibly on his nearer approach, and become weaker upon Mercury by his recess from him.

Cazimi, is when a Planet is situated in the heart of tbe Sun, and is only seventeen minetes before or after the Sun; as if the Sun was in seventeen degrces thirty minutes of Taut rus, and Mercury in seventeen degrees twenty minutes of the same Sign, Mercury vould be then in Cazimi, or in the heart of the Sun. All Authors agree tbat $\boldsymbol{P}$ Planet in Cazimi is for tified thereby, and is of greater efficacy; whereas a Planet Combust is of a malignant nature. It sbould be carefully obsarved that all Planets may be combust of the Sun, but the San cannot be combust of any Planet, and that combustion can only be by personal conjunction in one Sign, and not by -any aspect, either sextile, guartile, trine, or opposition; the Sun's quartile, or opposite aspects are afflicting, but they do not render the Planet combust.

Sun's erams. A Planet is always considered under tid Sun-beams, until he is fully elongated seventeen degreter be fore and after his body.

Void of covese, is when a Planet is separated from the body or aspect of another Planet, and does not during its corr tinuance in that Sign form any aspect with any other. Thin most usually happens with the Moon; and in practice it it observed, that if the significator of the thing propounded be void of course, the business under contemplation will not succeed, nor be attended with any qatisfactory or pleasing consequences.

Brsiegina, signifies a Planel situated between tho bodier of
the two malevolent Planets, Saturn and Mars ; for instance if Saturn was placed in the fifteenth degree of Aries, Mars in the tenth, and Jupiter in the thirteenth degree, Jupiter would then be besieged by Saturn and Mars.

Incerising in ligut, is when a Planet is departing from the Sun, or the Sun from a Planet; thus, the Moon at ber greatest distance from the Sun appears with the greatest degree of light, baving her whole orb illaminated.

Sepaiation, is when two Planets have been lately in partile conjanetion or aspect, and are just separated from it. Thus, if we suppose Saturn in ten degrees of Sagittary, and Jupiter in eleven degrees of the same sign; Jupiter will be then sepzrated one degree from a perfect or partile conjunction with Saturn; but they would still be in a platiek conjunction, because they are within the moiets of each others radiationso which is four degrees and a balf eack, consequently these Planets would continue in platick conjunction until they were separated nine degrees, and then the aspect would entirely cease. The exact knowledge of every degree of the separations of these aspects is of the utmost consequence in giving judgment upon various important oecasions.
Frustration, is when a bwift or light Planet approaches to an aspect with one more slow and ponderous, but before they can approach near enough to form that aspect, the weighty Planet is joined to some other, by which the first aspect is frostrated. For instance, suppose Saturn posited in eighteen degrees of Gemini, Juphe in se, enteen degrees of Leo, and Mars in chirteen degrees of the same Sign; here :'ars applies to a conjunction with Jupiter, but before he can reach it,

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Jnpiter meets a sextile aspect from Satum, which frastrates the conjunction of Mars, and in practice utterly destroys whatever was promised by it.

Repranation, is when a Planet in direct motion, applies to an aspect or conjuaction with another Planet, bat before thes can meet becomes retrograde, and thns refrains to form the aspect expected. Suppose Jupiter in the eighth degree of Gemini, and Mars in the fourth; here Mars the swifter Planet, promises very soon to overtake Jupiter, and form a conjunction with him; but just at the instant, falls retrograde, and refrains from the conjanction, by raking an opporite coumb from Jupiter.
Translation of lieht and vietue, is when a lighter Planet separates from a weighty one, and joins with atrother more ponderous, and is effected in this manner ; let Saturn be placed in sixteen degrees of Arits, Jupiter in nine degress, and Mars in ten degrees of the same Sign ; here Mars separates from a conjunction with Jupiter, and translates the light and virtue of that Planet to Saturn, to whom he next applies. The effect of this in practice will be, that if a matter or thing be promised by Saturn, then whoever was represented by Mars shall procure all the assistance that the benevolent Planet Jupiter could possibly bestow, and translate it to Saturn, whereby the business in hand would be the better effected, and the more happily concluded. This is a very fortunate povition of the Planets, and thenefore very proper to be knowns since it not only promises much in nativities, but also in lawa suits, marriages, and all other quesions of the kiud, as at a future period I may present the reader with the doctrinc of Horary queations.

Receprion, is when two Planets that are significators in any question or nativity, are posited in each others dignities, as the Sun in dries, and Mars in Lee, which is a rcception by Houses, and is deemed the most powerful and officacious : of all receptions. But reception may be by exchange of exalration, riplicity, term or phase, as Jupiter ir, Alies, and - the Sun in Cancer, is a reception by extlation, so Venus in Arics, and the Sun in Taurus, is a reception by triplicity, if the question or nativity happen by day, or if Venus be in the twenty forurth degre of Aries, and Mars in the eighteenth degrec of Gemini, it is reception by terms. The use of these positions in practice is considerable; for, suppose the event of any question required, be deried by the aspects, or the significators are in no aspect with each other: or it is doubtfod what may happen from a quartile or opposition of the significators; yet, if the principat siguificators are found in mutual reception, the thing desired will shortly come to piss, and probably to the satisfaction and coutent of all the partics concerned.

Pereepine, is when a Planet is situated in a Sign, or in such certain degrees of a Sign where it has no essential dignities, either by house, exaltation, triplicity, term, or phases, as Saturn in the tenth degree of Aries, and Mers in the twelfth desree of Taurus is peregine. So also the Sun in any part of Cancer is peregrine; having no dignities whatever in that Sign. In all questions of Theft it is very material to know the peregrine Planet; for it bas been uiniformly found by every regular professor of this Sceence, that the Thief pay K

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almost constantly be discovered oy the peregrine Planet posited in an angel, or in the second House.

Oriental and occidental, A Planet when oriental rises before the Sun ; and when occidental sets after him, and is seen above the Horizon after the Sun is down; consequently when a Planet is oriental, it is posited in the east, and when occidental in the west.

Direction, is when a Planet moves according to the succession of the Signs, from west to east, or from $r$ to $\gamma$, from $\delta$ to $I$; and out of five degrees, to six, seven, eight, and so forward. Direction is also a calculus, whereby to find the time of any accident or remarkable event, that will happen to a Person who propouncs a question, or has his nativity cast. For instance, a Person enquires how long be may live, by the course of the Planets at the time of birth? having established the Sun, Moon, or A'scendant, as signifcators of life, and Mars, or Saturn, as promittars, or portentors of death, the direction is a calculation of the length of time in which the significators will be in meeting the promittor, and this resolves the question.

Suplerigrs amd inferiore, Saturn, Jupiter, and Mars are distinguished by the name of the superior, ponderous, and more weighty Planets; and Venus, Mercury, and the Moon, are called the inferior Planets. -

SWift of course, is when a Planet moves farther than his mean motion in twenty four hours, and he is slow of course when he moves less than his mean motion in the same portion of time.

Almution, is that Planet that bears principal rule in

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Sign or Figare; which Planet must consequently have 1 e most essential dignities.

Hayz, signifies a masculine diurnal Planet, to be situatel above the Horizon in the day-time, or a feminine nocturnal Planet posited below the Horizon in the night-lime; which is an accidental fortitude the Planets delight in, and gives a favourable omen wherever they are fuund.

Losgitude and Latitude. The lungitude of any Ster of Planet, is the drgree of the Ecliptic or Zodiac in which they are found, numbered from the first point of the Sign Aries, The latitude of a Star or Planet, is its distance north or south from the Sun's path or eciiplic line, mumjered by the degree, of the Meridian.

Declination, is the distance a Planet swerres either north or scuth, from the equator or equinoctial l:ne, in his circuit through the twelve Signs of the Zodiac.
Right ascenaion, is the number of degrees and minutes of the equinoctial line, reckoned from the brgmuing of Aries, and come to the meridian with the Sun, Moon, Star, or Planet or any portion of the ecliptic.
Osligue iscension, is the degree and minute of the equinoctial line, that comes to, or rises with the degree of lourgi-- ade of any Star or Planet in the Horizon; or it is the degree of the equinoctial line that comes to the Horizon with any Star or Planet in an oblique Sphere.

Obliave discibnsion, is the degree of the equinoctial line: that sets in the Horizon, with the degree of longitude of any Star or Planet in an oblique Sphere, making an oblique angle with the Horizon.

Ascensional difference, is the distiaction between the fight and oblique ascension of any Star or Planet, rechoned in the equator.

Poie of rostrion, signifies the elcvation of the poles of the World above the circle of the position of any Star or Plaset.

Circles of position, are circles passing through the common intersections of the Horizon and Meridian, and through any degrees of the ecliptic, or the centre of atiy Star or other point in the Heavens, and are used for finding the situation of position of any Star or Planet.

Horoscoie, is a figure or Scheme of the twelve houses of Heaven, wherein the llants and positions of the Heavers are collected for any given time, either for the purnose of calculating nativities, or answering horary questions. It also signifits the degree or point of the Heavens rising above the eastern point of the Horizon at any time required.

Ascendast. The Cusp of the first house.
Cusp. The begining, or first point of a bouse.
Fortunes. The two benevolent ones, $\mathcal{Y}$ and $\mathcal{F}$.
Infortunes. The two evil ones, $b$ and $d$.
Afheta. The giver of life.
Anareta. The cutter off of life. (Malefir.)
Animodar. A rectifier of nativities.
Cordinal points. First, Fourth, Seventh and Tenth angle.

Medium caili. The Tenth House or full south.
Imum caela, The Fourlh, or bottom of Heaven.

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Liget of timis, $O$ by day, and the $\subset$ by night.
Lond of the esmituke, is the Planet at birth that hath the most dignities.
Primum mobile, the Tenth Sphere.
Promittons, Planets that promise or engage to bring things to pass.
Hylbg, the girer of Life. (Significator.)
Pzogocatol of lifz, the same as Hyleg.
Dirbctions primaity, is the arch of distance between the Significator and the Promittor.
Directions sbcondary, are the Aspects of the Planets every day after the birth, first day, first year, twentieth day after twentieth year; thirtieth day atier thirtielh year, and$s 0$ on.

Transits, when any Planet passes by the point of any pare ticular place in the Zodiac, then he is said to transit the place.
Refolutions. A revolutional Figure is only to erect a Figure for the exact time of the Sun's return to bis place at birth every year, and see what is denoted by the aspect.

Explanation of the Twelve Houses of Heaven, wilh Directions for erecting the Horosccpe.

Having shewn what the essential qualities are, which tl:e Planets, and heavenly matter derive from an inherent princi? K 2

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siple of nature ; it follows that I should explaim the accidental qualities they receive by their ditferent positions in the twelve Houses of Heaven; for as the Heavens are perpetually in motion, either ascending or descending; and since it is beyond the reach of human penetration to define what Star or Planet shall ascend at the nativity of Children yet unborn, so in reference to human ideas, it is purely accidental what dignities the Planets shall acquire, of what House tley shall be posited in at the time of birth.

That the reader may form a compentent idea of what is meant by the twelve Houses of Heaven, let us suppose the whole celestial Globe, or Sphere of Heaven divided into fur equal parts, by the Horizon and Meridional line, and each of these into four quadrants, and each quadrant into three equal parts, by lines drawn from points of Sections in different parts of the Horjton and Meridian, equally distant from each other. By this operation, the whole Globe ot Sphert will be apportioned into twelve equal parts, which constiente what we call, the Twelve Houses of Heaven. And these llouses, as observation and experience abundansly shew, moke up that great wheel of nature, whereon depends the variots furtunes contingent to all sublunary matters and things.

In this division of the Heavent, the first Quadrant is described by a paralled line, drawn from the point of the east angle, to the south, or Mid-Heaven ; and contains the twelfth, eleventh, and tenth Honses, called the Oriental, Vernal, Masculin, Sanguine and Infant quarter. The Second Quadrant is described by a similar line, running from the exterior point of the Mid-Heaven to the point of the western angle,
and contains the ninth, eighith, and seventh Houses, called the a:eridian, festival, feminine, youthful, choleric quarter. The third Quadrant is formed by a paralled line, running from the extreme point of tite eighth Mouse, to the north Apgle; and contains the sixttr; fifih, and fourch Houses, called the occidental, auturnaf, marculine, melancholic, manly, cold and dry quarter. 'The fourth Quadrant is described by a line drawn from the extreme point of the north Angle, to the extremity of the line which describes the first Quadrant, Doth meeting in the east angle of the Heavens, and contains the third, secprid, and first Houses, called the norihern, winterly feminine, phlegraatic quarter, the seat of old age, decrepidnoss, and-decay. The lines thus drawn, describe the following Fj gure, or Hotoscope, into which the Signs and Planets are severady initroduced and represented, as in their true places in the Heavens, before any question can be solved, or nativity calculated. The space in the centre, were the Figure drawn circu• $j^{\text {ar may represent the vacanum in which the Earth moves; }}$ but it is getuerally used to write down the day, yoar, and hour of the day for which the Figure was ofected, with the purpose of it, whether for a Nativity, or grestion resolved.

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Figure of the Horoscope or Twelve Houses of Heaven.


These twelve Houses are each distinguished by their ro spective figures, and are either angular, succeedent, or cadent The angular Houses are four, called the Aacendant, Mid Heaven or Medium-Coeli, the seventh House, and the fourth or bottom of the Heaven; these are deemed the most power. ful, and most fortunate Houses. The succeedent Houses, are the eleventh, eighth, and fifth; and are ranked in forcs

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and virtue to the angles. The thisid class, or cadent House, are the third, tweitit, ninth, and sixth; and are convidered of the least etricacy of them all. But notwithstanding they are divided into ouly three classes, or orders, whereby their force and efincacy are estimated, yet is there a regular giadation in this respect ruoning through the whole, whereby one House is subordinate to the other, from first to last. Cono sidered in this order they stand thus.

According to this rute, if we find two Planets equally. strong, and of the same diguities, one prsited in the first House, and the orher in the tenth, we judge the Planet in tho frrst House or Aseendant, to have superiority over the Planet in the tenth House; bat both beiag so nearly equad in point of digainy, great struggles and difficulties would intervene, as the nature of the case may then happen to be. This rule bolds good from the tenth House to she seventh; the seventh to the fourth, and so on throngh the whole; but it should be atways remembered that Planets in angles, that is, those which are seated in the angular Houses, are the most forcible and potent in their operation.

## The Operation of the treclve Houses:

The first House, which is denoted by the figure 1 , is called the , Ascendant, be cause the point of its angle being level with the Horizon, whatever Planet ascends from under the Earth, rust ascend upou this line, and become visible first in this Houst: The line upon which the Planets ascend, of
move, is called the Cusp of the Houses, and that of the ascendant is generally reckoned to extend about five degrees above the Earth, and twenty five degrees beneath, ready to ascend, but if Signs of long ascension ascend. then balf five degrees above the Earth, and thirteen degrees below, are its utmost limits. If Signs of short ascensiont ascend then five degrees above the Horizon, and fifty below are usually allowed. Now the quality of whatsoever part of the Heavens occupy, or fill up the degrees of this House, carries'along with it the bealth, life, and nature of every Infant or Thing that is conceived or brought forch within its jurisdiction. And hence hath this point of the Heavens a faculty of attracting or receiving the virtues of the celestial matter, that is accidently ascending in that part of Heaven at the birth, and also of the Planets and fixed Start in their transits, and all the rays of the Pianets in their aspects and conjunctions, are attracted into this par! of Heaven in order to the formation of the shape, stature, temperature of the body, quality of the mind, and all accidents and contingencies which shall befall the Native's body, or health, of jife, unto his dying day ; such a sympathy is there between thio part of the heavenly frame, and of every aet and thing that is produced, or receives life under it. For as the seed in the ground, after it has taken root, buds forth, and appears above ground, so the Heavenly Intelligencers, afier they have framed the embryo, and the temperament thereof, under the Earth, give it life and being of its own, putting forth level with them just as they ascend. We do not however suppose, that the temperature and qualities of the Native were wholly fracied at the exact time of birth, although the situation of the

Heavens at that time never fails exactly to describe them, we have every reason to believe that the remperature and qualities of the body, and the disposition of the mind, are formed in regular gradations from the conception to the time of birth; but that the birth describes them is indisputably clear, because it cannot happen at any moment of time, in any part of the world, but it must fall even with that part of the heavenIy matter ascending from the lower unto the upper Horizon, and therefore points out those temperatures and qualities. For any Man to be satisfied in this point. let him but note what the nature of this ascending point of Heaven is, with all the Stars and Planets posited therem, or having aspect with them from other Houses, giving each of them their due weight and inflnence, according to their nature and dignity, neither strained one way nor the other ; and just as these are found at the time of birth, just so shall be found the qualities and mental endowments of that Native, with the princpial actions and events of bis life, which this point ascending takes the charge of. And in this trial will the Reader ind more suistantial proofs of the truth and existence of Astrology, than the most acute arguments can instii into his mind.

Now, since the first House or ascendant gives birth and life to the Native, it follow that thes H uses which are the attendants on, and uphoiders of life should be joined with it ; and as Children, or the Native's Offspring are the upholelers of life in this world, and religion and learning the grand means of opholding it unto eternity in the other world, so the Houses which contribute these blessings to the life alrcady given, are joincdiu an 1 : monions trine with the first House, making up that a three fold cord, which, as Solon saith, can never be

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broken ; the one is a succeedent House, called the fifth Honse, and the other a cadent House, called the nimth Honse; and to be convinced of the effects of this fifth Honse, note the heavenly matter, Planets, Stars, and aspect therein posited at the timeof bitth, according to the rules here laid down, and theyshall truly represent the number and state of the Native's Offspriug, and all other particulars relative to Children, and to breeding or barren Women. So also examine the state of the uinth House, and as that represents, so shall the Native be in respect of Religion and Sceience; for the heavenly matter, Planets, Stars, and aspects therein, shall shew what and how the man shall prove, whether wise or foolish, dewiat or schismatical, and what study or occupation he shall be inclined to follow; and these furnish matter for grace to work upori; but as for grace itself, nature can have no power over it; grace may rule nature, but nature cannot sway grace.
The second angular point of the Hoises of Heaven is called the Milideven, which is that point which culminates, being the very top or highest print of the heavenly frame. And whatever part of the Eeavens harpen to be culminating in this point at the bith of any person or thing, that it takes change of, and carries along with it ever afier the preferment, honour, profession. situation and anthority of the Native; aud as the nature of the P:ants, Siars; aspects, and heavenly matter happens to be, that are situated in this point, or' in the degrees pertaining to it, so shall the Native prove in his life-time, in point of dignity, a va cement, and reputation in this world, whether high or low, fortunate or unfortunate, fayoured or disgraced. The attendants upon, and upholders of Man's honour and dignity, as the seriptures, and every day's experience perpectually shew us, are wealin and servants.

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Thie first of thens is attached to the Mid-Heaven in a suecodent House, callod the seeond House of Heaven; and the cther in a cadent Hoare, called the sixth House of Hearen; and theae two are situated in an harmonious trine with the angular point of the Mid-Heaven. And now well observe what the Planets, Stars, aspects, and heavenly matter are in either of these Houses at the time of birth, and such shall the Native's fortune prove in respect of riehes and subordinate dependants; it the scond Heuse.for weakh, and in the sixth for servants or dependants.

The third angle of the figare of Heaven, is the acventh House, or point of the Heavens and degrees contingent, which are.always descending, or setting ont of our Horizon, and sinking under the Earth; and this point is directly opposite to the castern angle or ascendant. Now as the rising Heaves or asoemdant is the beginning and conduit of life, so this setting Heaven level with the ascendant, is the bringing all mundane aflairs level with life; such as our entrance intor the state of marriage; our contracts and enterprises in busians, war, and travel ; our connections and success therein, whether with Friends, Strangers, or Enemies; and these whether Honest men, Parasites; or Thieves. And the heaven1/ matter, Planots, Stare, and aspects, situated in this angle atia nativity, apparently shew how a man shall fare in respect of wives, more or less, any or none, good or bad; and in ratters of business or adventure, how fortunate or unfortueato be -may be likely to prove ; and with Enemies or Thiever, hoin far he is likely to be injured by them. Necossary uphold. ere of marriage, apporters in trade and trayel, and defenders

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against Thieves, Plunderers, and Enemies, are Friends, Relas tions; and Neighbors. Andihese in a trine to the seventhH'ouse are brought forth, the first out of the eleventh House of Heaven, a succedent House, and the other out of the thind House of Heaven, a cadent House. Tbis eleventh House, by the Planets, Stars, aspects, and heavenly matter therein, point out the state of aman's friepdsand hopes in this life ; and: the third House descriles by the same means, hoy happy or un1appy a man shall prove in his Relations, Connections and. Neighbours.

The last angle of Heaven, is the fourth fionse, called the bottom of Heaven, and represents that point ubich in out conception seems to hang at the very battom of the round ball of the celestial world, being diametrically opposite to the' exterior, or Myd-Heaven, And as that shews what a man in the course of nature shall rise to in the world; this, on the contrary, declares swhat and when shald be his fall, decay, aud death. This House has therefore signification of the end of every worldly concern, and amongst other ends, of the grave, which is the end of all men lixing, howtver dignified or great, And the Planets, Stars, and.aspects posited in this House at the time of birth, never fail to shew what kind of end. will most probably happen to the Native, for as the twelve Signs have each their particular and visible effects up-. on, and over every part of man's body, and as the Placets and their aspects stiew in what Sign the Natuve shall be impedited, that is, in what part of the body the root of his natuo' ral infirmity shall be placed; and what accidents shall betallhios duing life, 80 ix it an eas, process to point opt, the man-. eff of hiv death, and whether patural, honourable, or ignomi-

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mious. The upholders of this angle, are the Houses of tribullation and death; the one a succedent House, called the eighth House or Honse of death; and the other a cadent House, called the twelfh House. And now let it be care, fully observed what Plancts, Stars, aspects, and heaveni'f matter occupy these Houses at the time of birth, and they shall point out in the twelfth House, all the principal misfortunes, affictions, and tribulations of the Native's life, and in the eighth House the time and manner of his death.

Independant of the fuculties hitherto specified, each of these Houses of Heaven have other significations and effects, which they demonstrate in various other ways. For instance, the ascendant represents the Native coming into the world, and the fourth House at the same time represents the parents of the Native going out; for, " one generation goes off, and another always comes in," according to the course of nature. Of these parents the Father is more especially signified by the fourth House; and then secondarily, but not so forcibly, the Mother of the Native is slguified by the tenth House, and the grandfasher by the seventh, and uncles, aunts, and relations on the father's side by the sixth, and uncles, aunts, and relations on the mother's side, by the twelfth. Hence also it comes to pass, that by the fourth House are signified Houses and Lands, and all degrees of patrimony left by the father ; and by the eighth House are shewn all goods and le. gacies left by will of the deceased. The second and sixth House in half trine to the House of the grave, and in opposition to the eighth and twelfth, have a secondary significatid en of tickness and death.

Such are the qualities and operations of the twelfe lYousel

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of Heaven, in the common course of aature; but these quar lities are sometimes materially altered and changed for the better or worse, either by the means of the Moon being a conductor, or some other of the celestial motions or affections. It is certain that the Moon circles the Earth onee in twenty eight days; but in this perambulation she seither leeps the Sun's pathway in the ecliptic, nor contimues ber course constantly on the.same side of it; but once in every fourteen days she crosses the ecliptic, alternately to her north and south dectination; and it is found by repeated and correct observation that the point in the Heavens where ato crosses the line, is strongly affected by her motion. The Mocnis the great body of life and.growth, and when she powses the ecliptic to the north, which brings her weaver into this portben world, she then gives an oxtraordinary degree of fruitfulness, which wonderfilly strengthems with its infuence whatsoever happens within the lise of Its jurisdiction. And this point, whetever it falls, is called the Moon's nerth node, but is distinguishod in Astrologioal werks, by the name of the \& Dragou's head, as already explained. If this point happens to ascend in a nativity, it atrengthens life, with a robust and lively constitution. If it falla in the Mid-Heaven, it promises grear honour and preferment; if in the eleventh House, proaperity and riches. If Jupiter or Venus happens o be in these degrees, it makes them much stronger and mont officatious in their benevolent operations; but if Sumarn or Mars be positod there, it gives them on the contrary, a stronger inclination to prove mischievons and unfortunation When the Moon intersects the ecliptic line to ber southarg declination, the denvos that point of the Heavens where at
erosses it, which is termed the $\mathcal{F}$ Dragon's triil, as barren to all iutents and purposes, as the other was fruitful. Hence this point ascendiug at a nativity, blemishes life and leaves a stajn upon it ; impairs honour and adsancement in the MidHeaven, wastes riches, brings adversity, and false friends in the eleventh, and foreshews a most wretched marriage if it falls in the seventh Honse or western angle; and, it weakens as well the benevolent auspices of $\psi$ aud 9 , as the evil inglinations of $h$ and $\delta$. How these circumstances operate beyond the equinoctial, expericnce is yet silent; but it seems - reasonabie to suppose that the 98 Dragon's tail is there the fruit ful point, and the bead the barren point, since when the Moon is going off from us, her influence must be coming on with them.

Nixt to the Nodes the $\oplus$ part of Fortune has its operation upon these twelve celestial Houses. The point which we term the part of Fortune is only the distance of the Moon's place from the Sun's, added to the degrees of the ascendant; and the nature of it is, as constaut observation ascertains, that if this point falls among fortunate Stars, or in a forturate part of the Heavens, then it promises great success in health, wealth, bonour or offspring, or any other species of prosperity, according to it's position, either in the first, eleventh, or fifth Houses, or in any others. The reason of this appears to be, that the Sun, Moon, and ascendant, being the prime conduits through which the stream of lify flows, this seat of the $\oplus$ part of Fortune is the harmony of all three, concentring and uniting in the same acts of benevoleuce.

Now besides these, there are $y$ et other qualities accidentally.

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affectef, which concern either particalar persons of times. Thus the place of 5 , or $\delta^{\circ}$, or the $\%$ in the vernal Figure; are unfortunate in 约e bigtiest degree; for the whole of that year; or if they bappen in any of the quarter Figures, this portend affiction and misfortane for that quarter. But the places of $\psi$, and $q$ in a vernal Tigure, are 8 fortunate as the others are unfortunate for the same time. The places of at ectipse of the San of Moon, and of the Comets, art also for tuate or unfortunate, as their situatiots may be; or as Persons, Countries; or States may be concertied in thers. The place of $h$ or $\delta^{\circ}$ in a Man's fativity, prove unfortunate to him all the days of his life; and the place of eitier of them in a rerolutional Figure, is equally bad for that year. But the phace of $\psi$ or $\$$ in a Nativity, or-in a revolutiond Figare, is amyy as fortunate, either for a Man's life-time, or for the year, as the other is unfortunate. Also the places of the twelth Hoase, or eighth, or sixth, as they were in the Native schense, have always bad significations unto a Man, whensover they come up on any of his concerns. And the places of the tenth Flouse; of the eleventh, of the ascendant, and of the recoond House, generally promise as mucb grod, as the other Houses do evil; upon all the common oecasions of life.
Thus far we have seen the operations of the twelve Hones of Heaven, as they appertain to the time and circumstances of a Nativity. We shall now exp'ain their properties in that system of nature upon which the doctrine of Nativities and Horary Questions are grounded. And such bas been the industry aud indefatigable labour of our forefathers in bringing this science to maturity, and in discovering and distinguishing the particular significations and effects of all positions of
the Planets in the twelve Honses of Heaven, thet whoever takos the pains to inform bimself sufficiently of them, will not be in want of competent grounds whereon to judge, or give rational ahswets to every question on the common occurrences of life, or any contingent accidents or uadertakings, with the consequerices and saccess of them.

## The Signification of tbe Twadse Houses of Heavens

The first Hotose beams signification of the lift of Man, and of the stature, colour, complexion, form and ahape of him who propounds a question, or has his nativity east $;$ and an all the vicissitudes of natare depend upon the period of Matrie life, so all questions are reeolved by this Hoase, that relares to sickness, health, or long life; and also all wccidents by which life may be endangered, or tmpaired; what part of one's days will be the most bappy anid prouperous; wheither any absent friend or relation be living ot dead; of whether any journey, voyage, or ship at sea will be attended with succese and safety, or whether meet with any accident fatal to life, or destructive to the ship.-In short all questions redating to circomstances that affect life, are so be answered from the first Hoase. In State Astrology, and in Eclipsea, great conjunctious, appearances of Cometa, and other luminous add extraordinary Pbenomena in the Heavens; and upon the Sun's annual ingress into the equinoctial Slgn Artes, the first Howse bears signification of the community at large, or of that State, Empire, or Kingdom, where the Figure is erected. It reprerents the head and face, so that if either $h$, ơ 8 , or the of tovin

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this House, either at the time of a question, or at the time of a birth, you will observe some blemish in the faceor in that member governed by the Sign that then is upon the Cusp of the House; for inetance, if $r$ be in the ascendant, the - mark, mole, or scar is always in the head, or face, and if few degrees of the Sign ascend, the mark is in the upper part of the head ; if the middle of the Sign be on the Cusp, the mole, mark or scar is in the middle of the face, or near it; if the latter degrees ascend, the face is blemised near the chin towards the neck. This rule I have found veritied in many nativities. Of colours, the first House gives a white, froin which is to be understood, that if a Planet be posited in this House that governs a light colour, and a question be propounded from any party, relative to a person, matter, or thing where coloirs are concerned, and this Planet be significator thereof, then the person's complexion and dress, or if Cattle, then their colour shall be of a white, paile, or lightish kind; and though this may appear ridiculous and insignificant to the understanding of some Readers, yet, this rule is always fcund to be invariabie in practice. Now as every one of the twelve Houses of Heaven have their siguificators, so bave they also their consignificators, which have frequent operations, and therefore ought to be considered. A consignificator is a Plauet either fallen into conjunction, or joined in aspect with the principal significator; in which cases the Planet either assists or opposes in the matter under consideration, if it be joined with a bencvolent Planet, it imparts good; but if it happens to be the contrary, it eitber denotes destruction to the subject of inquiry, or great disturbance in the sffecting of it. The consignificators of this

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Housc are Saturn and Arien; and if 5 is noderately well dignified in this House, and in any benevolent aspect with 4 , Q, or the $\odot$, or $\mathbb{4}, i t$ promises a good sober constination of body, and generally gives long life, $\%$ also joyeth in this Honse, beause it represemts the bead, and be the tongue, fancy ant manory. When he is well dignified and positod in this Hoase, the Person shall be apowerful-and grod speaker.
From the eecond House we form jadgment tupon all questions relatimg to wealth or poverty, prosperity or adversity, and loss or gain in any undertaking that may be propounded by the Querent; and also concerning moveable goots, monef lent or employped in speculation. In suitsof law or equily. it thows a Man's friends or assistants ; in private duels, it deecribes the Querent's cocond; in Eelipres, it strewe the growing prosperity or adversity of a state or pleople; and ${ }^{(t)}$ the Sun's entrance into Aries, it expresses the strengih of the Empire where the Figure is erected, in its Internal resources; in its allies, and in all other requisites of war, or telf-defence. It gives a green colour, of which a sitpilar use is to made as is described in the first Honse; and the same observation wilh hald good in all other Houses, in any questions that felate to colourn. The cossignificators to the second House, are Jupiter and Taurus, for if $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ be placed in this House, or $\$$ dord thereof in full dignity, it implies the zoquisition of an Estate or Fotunse; but the © and $\delta$ never promise good in thin Heose; enther of them indicates dispersion of substancte accordiog to the capacity and quality of bim who proposer the question.
The third Houst having sigaification of brethren, sisters, tiadred, and meighbouns; and of all mand jomroies, and of

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removing one's manufactute or business from one place to. another; so all questious that are fornded upon any: subjects relative thereto, are answered from the Planets situatod in this Ifouse.. Its consignificators are Mars and Gemini $\{$ which is one reason why $\delta$ unless joined with $b$ is not found so generally unfortunate in this House, as in the others. If the be posited here especially in a moveable Sign, it is always an argument to the Querist of much restlessness, traveling, and change of situation. This is a cadent fouse, and gives a yellow, red, or sorrel colour.

From the fourth IHouse we resolve all questions in any way reiating to or concerning the father of the Querist. Also allenquiries relating to Land, Houses, or Estates, or to Towns, Cities. Castles, or Entrenchments besieged; of Treasures bidden in the ground, and all other questions relating to the Earth, are answered out of this House, which is called the Imum Coeli, or angle, of the Earth. . Its consignificators are the Sunand Cancer ; and therfore ir the $\odot$ bes posited in this House, it denotes the father of the Querist or Native to be of a generous and noble disposition. It governs the red colour.

By the fifth House we form all our predictions relative to Children, and to Women in the state of pregnancy, also all questions concerning the present health of absent Sous or Daughters, or the future health of those at bome; enquirit relating to the real and personal effects of one's Father, or concerning the swicess of Messengers, Ambassadors, or Plenipotentiaries; or respecting the ammunition or internal swength of a place besieged, are all answered from this House. Its consignificators are Venus and Leo. This bencfic Planet rejoiceth in this House because ite the House of pleasure and
delight, and therefore unfotunate when occupied either by: $b$ or, $\delta$ Woth of which indieite base and untowaru Chidien to the Euquirer. It gives a mixed blick and white, or 'sinuguine colour
The sixth Uouge resolves all questions that in any respect upertain to Servants or Cattle. Also enquiries concerning the state of a sick Person, whether curable or mot ; the uature of the disease, and whether of short or long duration ; partisuats relating 10 Uacles and Aunts, and all kindred on' the Pather's side; also conceining one's Tenants, Stewarils, or the lite, are rexolved by the disposition of the Stars and Pla-: nets silmuted in this House . Mars rejoiceth in this House, but ifs consigniticators are Mercury ani Virgo, and when $\delta^{*}$ and $\psi$ or $\rho$ are found in conjunction here, it is a strong argument of a good Physician, whenever it comes uport a question proponded in behalf of a Paṭic nt Who is visited by a Gentle-' man of the faculty. Tlis House havint no aspect wifh the asceudant, is al ways deemed unfortunate. It gives a black or dark colour.
By the seventh House, we are enabled to resnlve all ques-' tions in'love affairs and marriage, and to describe the Percon ${ }^{2}$ of eititer the 'Man or Woman that the Cuerist will be joined with in Marriage. It likewise auswers all enquiries of the defenders in law suits, and litigations; or concerning outr public enemies in time of war. In Antrology it represents' the Artist himself; in physic, the Physician, In Thetts, it enables us to describe the person of the Robber, by his shape, ctatne, complexion, aud condition of life. In an anuual ingress, it usually indicates whether peace or war may be ex-: pected, and prior to an engage:nent, vetukeng which side

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hall prove victoriaun; it discovers Fugitives, Out-lawed men, and Offenders csoaped from justice. The consignifican ters to this House are the Moos and Libra, and when 万f or ${ }^{\text {or }}$ are found berein, it is deemed an unfavourable omen, produc. tive of groat sorrow and wretchedness to the Querist, in any matrimonial engagement, It gives a dark blue, black, os brown colour.

From the eighth House, we solve all questions coscerning death, its time, quality, and nature, with all matters relating to legacies, wills, and last testaments; or who shall inherio the fortune and eatates of the deceased. Enquiries on tho dowry or portion of maids or widows; in duelis concerning the adversary's second; in law suits, relative to the dofendapt's, success and friends; and queations on public or privato Enemies; or concerning: the substance and security of those we conpect ourselves. with ip business, are all answered by: the situation of the Plapens in this House. It consignificators are Saturn and Scorpio; and its colours are green and black,
By the ninth House we are enabled to answer all questione op the safety and success of vopagos and travels into foreign Countries; also enquiries of the Clergy concerning Chureb: preferpents, benefices, advowsons and the like, and all guestians relative to kindred and relations on the Wife's side, add the same on the Husband's side, if the Wife be the Querist; and all matters relating to Arts and Sciences, ser likewise resolved from this Houec, Its consignificators not Jupiter and Sagittarius; for if $\psi$ be posited herein, it aneme mally indicates a Man of religious and exemplary rammeins. and of modest carriage and behaxionr ; but if $h$, $\delta$, or the ir are found herein, it indicates a Rersen of atheistical and:

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incligions principles; instances of which, frecn the nativities of many unhappy Men of chis description, are almost innu: merble. The $\bigcirc$ rejoicest in this House, and its coloars are green and white.
The tenth House being the Medium Cooli, or most eievatedprt of the whole Hearens, rewolves all questions concerning Kings, Prinees, Dukes, Earls, Marquisses, and all Noblomea, Judges, principal Officers of 8tate, Commanders in Chief, all orders of Magistrates, and all persons in power and authority. . Enquiries afier preferment, honours, digaity, offices, places, pensions, or sinecures; or concerna ing the eatate of Kingdoms, Empiers, Provinces, Common wealths, Counties, Cities, or Societies of Men, are all reolved from the Mid-Heaven. The consignificators of this Hoxs are Capricorn and Mars; and whenever $\psi$ or $O$ are pooited hercin, it gives the strongest presumptions of success in whatever pursuits the Querist may be engaged in. But if $h$ or be $\%$ afflict the significators in this House, it denies honour, success, or preferment to Persons of quality or aminence, and to common people it denotes rexation and disappointment in the common functions of their occupation or employments. The colours betokendd by this House are red and white.
By the eleventh House we answer all enquiries concerning friends and friendship hope, trust, expectance, or desire ; ato Whatever relates to the fidelity or perfidiousness of friends, or to the counsellors, advisers, associates, favourites, or serrants of Kings, Princes, or Men in power. The consignifictors of this House are the Sun and Aquarius; and $\psi$ especi-

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ally rejoicoth havein. Ha colour is. díther maffrent or deap yellow.

The twelch House baing the House of trikulation, resporean all questions of sorrow, affliction, trouble, arxiety of mind distreess, imprisonment, persstcusium, maslice, secronememica, suicide, treason, conspiracy, assoasination, and every.thiny appertainigg to the misfortumat Ind aftictionsa af mankiad Ls conciguificators aro Fienus: and Piscom; and 5 graith joyoth in this House, bering the parent of parlonolance. and malignity.

From the foregoing circumstantial survey of the Twelle Houses of fleaven according to the doctrine of Ptolomy, and my own experience for many years, I trust the Reader will be enabled to form such au idea of the nature of predicting by the Horoscope, as will enable him not only to proceed to place the Stars and Planets therein with correctness and pre-
eltion, but also to form an accurate and distinet judgment of their power and inmuence under whatever aspects and positions the may oceassionly find them; for until be can accomplish this, itwill be in vain for him to attempt any examples in the doctrine of Horary Qocstions, or Nativities.

Wrongs Nercaus, and Forcible Reasons for the Division:of the Twetce Hourses of Hearen.

Morinus, a most ingenious and sagacious Philosopher, and most macellent French Astronomer, bas defined the nature sad reason of the Twelve Houses accurately. Such a leannst and greatly osteemed Foreigner, must havo weight with those persons who zidioule this Science. For a more particnbraccount, read his Astrologia Gallioa. Lot the fallowing translation suffice.
"It is a truth, says my Author, which prepondowates in the balance of reason, and highly-claims our sober cansidersation, that the life of Man is resolyable into four distmot periods or-ages; naunely, infanoy, youth, maturity, and old age; though it may be said with surict truth, that scarce balf the human race:artain to the conclusion of only their thitd periot? In the Heavenly frame upon the construction of Man, we discpyet four affections, into which all other thinge appent to be reducible,-To their first beginning; mamesly, Lify, Actipo, Marriges, and Passion. These agree with the rike, perfeftion, declination, and termination of all. things, and comingise the whole effects and oporations of ; nature. Man
is justly said to rise into the World, the moment he receives respiration.- - $o$ be in complete perfection, when he attains manbood or maturity, in the propogation of his species.-To decline when he loves the innate radical principle of heat and moisture.-And to sustain the last passions of life, when he eeases to breath, and silently sinks into the grave. Life, Action, Marriage, and Dassions of. Men, are therefore governed by the same celestial principle, which regulates the birth, perfection declination, and dissolution of all other things. Wherefore Life, in the system of natore, is regulated by the East angle of the Heavens, called the Ascendant.-Action, by the Soath angle, or Mid.Heaven.-Marriage, by the West angle, -. And Passions by the North angle. And hence arise four triplicities of the same genus or generical nature, as heretofore described. The first Triplicity is of the Eastern angle, or Ascendant, attributed to Infancy, and called the triplicity of Life, and includes the first; ainth and fifth Houses, which behold each other by a partile or exact trine in the Equator. ' Sir C. Heydon says, and Dryden the great Poet subscribes to it, that it is an aspect of perfect love, being in exact proportion with one of the three perfect concords or harmonied of music, vix. the Diapente ; and two Stars so beholding each other do proportionably occupy, or take up the whole center of the World in the same moment, and are said to appect or behold each other by a perfect trine.

- And berein the perfection of the first trine, vis. the eter. ra Trinity of Infinite Love, is so stroig and lively skewn, by a similitude of nature, that it is called a perfect anpect of fruendship.
Man ought to live in a threc-fold respect, frst in himself,
recondly.in.Gow, and thirdiy in his postertly; the great ands frewhich be was ereated, was to worship and glorify his Maxsa, and to propagate his species. The life of Man in himself is therefore the first and prime objeet in the ordar of salure ${ }_{i}$-for without -this all other parts of the creation would be nain, ibeing made for Man's use and benefit. -For this canse; the life of Man appertains to the first and principle Howe in the division of the Heavens. But Man's life in Gob, (for in him we live, move, and have our being) colim in,the image of the Diviwity, when Man is onifightea:ed, (mote properly chaoged by divine grace, which is bis (efift) in the nemionality of his soul, and in the purity of his mavals, claims for this reason, the ninth House, according to the motion of the Equator, which we call the House of Piety and Religious. Aad as Man's life is continued in bis apsterity, accorting to orre and the same unchangeable law presiding overall nature, so the House of Infancy and Childreas, whiali is the fifth House, is appropriated for this puripase.s. Aud these three concerns being confesedy the grand -ject. of. Man's life, the three Houses of Heaven, under Which they are respectively mourished and fostered, form a trinewith each other, in a chain of mutual harmony and concord.
The second Triplicity consists of the angle of the MidHzaven, with the sixth and second Honses. This Triplicity wholly appertains to the second stage of Man's Life, bamely that of yigoor and action, and therefore comprehends all morldly :luainiments, with the advantages llowing from them; for every thing that worketh physically, iworketh for seme Phyical good; ;and as the motion of the Equator is from the


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east angle to the Mid Heaven, so is the progresc made'ir att our earthly acquisitions. The highest degree of Man's eleve tion in this world, is to that of majesty, power, honour, dignity, preferment, or magistracs, or to any of those nituations by which he acquires superiority and affluence. These consisting of immaterial matter, and forming the first order of eartbly dignity, claim the angular Hoose of this Triplicity, or the Mid-Heaven. The second degree ot wordly honour, is -conceived to arise from subjects, servants, tenants, vassals and domestics; and these being formed of matter maternad and amimatel, are placed under the sixth House. The thind advancenrent to earthly grandzur, is by matter material and animated, such as gold, jewels, and other valuable effects, accumnlated by industry and sweat of the brow; whick being under the second House : these three Houses are also joinad by sympathy in a partile trine, applyivg to tach other in concord and unanimity.
The third Triplicity comprehends worldly connections; whether by marriage, consanguinity, or friendship, and these holding on in the order of nature, even as the progrem is made from the Mid-Heaven to the western angle, apply to the progressive tendency of youth to manhood and maturity. In this stage of life, Man is joined in a three-fold tie or obligation; in body, in blood, and in. friendship. Firat, he is joined in body, by the most sacred of all eartbly ties matriurony ; sanctioned under the seal of Goo's primary command, increase and multiply." Secondly, he is joined in consans gainity, not only by the propogation of his life, but by all orm ders of his kindred in blool. Thirdy, he is joined in friet.dship under that sacred bond of benevolence and love, whict

Whe fimignty commands every-man to exercise towands his mighbour. This is the very cement of society, and moedicine oflifis; performing those good offices in civil life, which the treo of life promised in oar more perfect state; and these are the sentiments of friendahip. which alone can give a true roHortoevery enjoyment of this world; The most important of these obligations being marriage, is for that reason placed uoder sanction of the angtalar or seventh Heuse ; the second tie being that of blood, elaimss the government of the third Howe; and the eleventh House, which parfects this Triplici ty, is sacred to real friendship. These three Honses form an nnion of mature, and beholds each other in, or by, a partile trint, according to the motion of the Equator.
The fourth and last Triplicity is that of passion, which conqrehends the three classes of buman affictions. The first, or angałar Hevere of thia Triplicity, in allusion to its position in the lower Horizon, is termed the dark angle, the depth of bight, and bottom of Heaven; the den and cave of the Stars and Planets. To this House is committed the first order of our woes, agrecable to the course of nature. These are insupportable misfortinnes, and visible decline of life; the first consequences of original sin, by which-Man is devoted wo corraption and decay, and to als the infirmities of nature. The second order of human afflietions, is tribulation, sorrow, and disease; arising either from the treachery and perrecation of enemies, from the chains of servitude and bondage; or from poverty and want. These with a long train of eonsequent miseries, are appropriated to the twelfth Housc. The last shock that can be sustained by human nature is death, the final end of all Men. This is under government of the

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eighth Houme, termed on this reabuat the House deatis And these Houses jijwerwise, from thergbnformity of their nim turerand qualities, "constitute partite,trine in the Equator.

Thasithe termination: of this temporal life, is the begining ef.life etersal. For mathre tremo: ad rantihilation: All the werks of omitipotencelaro' misolvable or changeible from owe istate to another; : bubGon, haviag oreated mothing in Nain, suffers nothingito beramulled. Whamefore according to the secondimotior of the Plasets, which is froto west to east, an entrance ie made out of the eiggth, into the nint House, which is the House of.tife in Grin, :wherem Manis taught, by the rovelation of the Bupisme. WhisL, that be shall pass, by thersecond motion of the isoad, which is atimbutted to thermind or reason, , as the first ior wrapt sotul or seasitive appetice is to the bolly; from this'life of enxiety and peril, toan etermal lifei of peace and rest. (Anth thereforen 'whatever is first in dignityin theorder of nature, poosessestit first and more noble Houses in there. Triplicties, !in regula 7nubordination, according to ahe neation of the Eeliptic and - Alamets.

And now, what Man is'be, who confoding in the atreagth cof his own wiadom, will dare. 00 moasure the moxks of hin .Geratan, by the standard of his owa comprehension? er -will venture to affirm these operations and divisions of the twelte Celestial Houses, conjoined with such womderful har$\rightarrow$ meny, contrivance, and concord, are the effiects of shance 'or accident! or that will' say, such admirably coments, axcellenly formed, and mutuaty dopendent on each other, are casually found in things so complidated and abstruse? If tit abstimately pernists that thowe are allogether fetious, let bitio

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point out the thing wahting to complete the evidence in support of the natural foundation and excelletey of them? but De can do neither; and therefore, as tits division of the Heareas is founded in reason, ath obviousiy contrived by super-' natioral wisdom and prescience, it comprehends genethliaticaltyall things that in the course of nature can possibly be enquired of or concerning the works of Man. For as much as the knowledge of contratieties is universally the same, so an affirmalive, of a negative, thay be truly sought out in a nativity and found to be comprised in the twelve Houses of the Zodiac, answering to these divisions.
It now only remains for studlous application, and the like encouragement the Anclents received to know its intrinsic worth, for it is extreme folly to speak ill of what we know not -Knowledge and learning have been and I fear ever will roman always despised by the ignerant and unlearned part of mankind.
This treatise is altogether plain and easy, and intended for no other purpose than to revive the drooping head of so noble and great a Science, and I see no reason why it may not be productive of good and edyfying to others if carefully, and dis ligently studied, for, "Look through nature up ta nature'i. God."
Having fully described the nature of the twelve Houses, it it now of the utmost importance to know the planetary hour, that is, the hour in which every Planet has its particupr rule; for hereby we are enabled to determine various points; and to draw many useful conelusiona, either in ourjudgment on Nativities or Horary Question. In gatheringHerbs for molicinal purpones, the planetary hour is certainly
of conseguenoe, however modern refinement might have ox: ploded the idea. In nature the most sinmple, remedies are frequently found to produce the most saluary effects; and in carlier times, when the art of physic was less obscured, and practised more from motives of benevolence, the World was less afflicted with disease, and the period of human life lese contracted. To point out the use of the foregoing Tables let the young Learner observe the sun rises the 1 st January，1809，at 5 minutes after 8 ，distinguished 8 hours， 5 minutes，at the top of the first column，in the fotegoing table，under the title of $\odot$ rises，against the 1 st day of the month．From 5 ninutes after 8 ，till 44 minutes after 8 ，is the exact length

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of the first planetary hour that day, against which jou wilt sec 2, which shews the second hour ends at that time, and so on through the whole tweuty-four hours.-Let it be also remembered, the sixth bour ends at noon, the twelfth at sun set, the eighteenth at midnight, and the twenty-fourth at surt rising the following day.

Now suppose it was required by way of example to know what Planet rules on Sunday, the first of January, 1809 , at 15 minutes past $90^{\circ}$ clock, in the morning; I look in the first column for 923 20, against which, on the r!ght han: I find 2; this shews the second hour dues not cond tiil 23 minutes after $g$, consequently 15 minutes after 9 is in that space of time allotted to the second hour which bath yet 8 misutes to rule. I then refer to the second column in the above Table of planetary hours for every day of the week, under the title of Surnday planetary hour and look for 2 , against whicin on the left hand, I see $\mathcal{P}$, which shews $q$ rules the hour enquired after.

Again, I would know what Planet reigneth on Saturday, the seventh of January, 1809, at $\frac{1}{2}$ past 7 o'clock in the evening :-I look down the second column for 759 45, against which on the right hand I find 15 ; in the same maner this shews the fifteenth hour does not end till 59 minutes after 7 rejecting the seconds; $\frac{4}{2}$ past $7 \mathrm{o}^{\circ}$ clock that day must thereFore be the fifteenth hour; I then refel to the seventh column of the small Table under Saturday planetary hour, and guide my eye downward till I see 35, against which on the le? hand is $\boldsymbol{h}$, which shews that $\boldsymbol{b}$ rules the hour required. And |thus you may proceed withont the least trouble of calculating for any hour of the day or night thronghout the year for ever.

In the hour of $b$ take no voyage to sea, neither undertake ang long journey by land, for crosnes will assuredly attend, auci small success may be expected; take no physic, enteitain no servant, for they will prove idle careless persons, not good to pat on new garments, of cat your hair, bat this hour is gnod to hay or take leares of houses or lands, good to buy any kind of grain, or to dig in the earth, or plow, not good to borrow moneg in this hour, or to fall sick in, for it threatens a long disease, and sometimes terminates in death.
11. In the hour of $\psi$ it is good to apply to ecclesiastical persons, and all great men to obtain their favour, the same from all grave senators, jadges, lawyers, \&c. In this bour it is good to take a journey in, or to go out of the house with saccess, good to sow all kind of seeds, or to plant, not good to be let blood, he that falls sick in this hour will soon recover, good also to lend or borrow monies, not good to enter a ship, not good to buy beasts, to conclude, tbig hour is good to contract matrimony in, \&c.
III. In the hour of $\bar{\delta}$ begin no worthy action or enterprize, for it is a very anfortunate hour in all things, and therefore ought as much as possible to be avoided; 'tis ill to take a journey, for you shall be in danger of thieves, very ill to take a voyage to sca and generally in all things.
IV. The hour of the $\mathcal{O}$ is not to be chosen, as being generally unfortunate, uneis to make application to great persons, not good to begin a building, or put on wew garments, not good to enter a man's own house, for discontent and brawling may then be expected to follow ; this hour is good
for a man toweive preferment in ; not good to court the female sex, or to lay down monies on any account; it is also very dangerous for a person to fall sick in.
V. in the hour of $\%$ it is good to court women or to be-. gin a iourney, but not a vogage, good to enter on any play, sport, or pastime, not good to be let blood in, good to go out of \# man's house with success, but not so good to return again; good to take physic in ; but if a man falls sick in that hour, the disease proceeds from some venereal distemper; this hour is genorally good to undertake any business relating to womens concerns, or asy delightful actions, not good to begin a new garment, but simgular good for marriage and contracting in matrimony, \&xc.
VI. The hour of $\psi$ is very good to merchandise in, viz. buy or sell, or te write letters, or to send messengers, to take physic in, to sead children to school, to begin a journey, to kend or borrow monies in, to put forth apprentices, to begin any building; but not good to contract marriage, or to buy houses or lands, or to re-enter your house being abroad, least discontent or bjawling arise, not good to take a servant to hire, or reedeem a prisoner, but good to plant or graft in, and finally to make suit to great persons.

V1I. The hour of the is not accounted good to buy cattle in, especially of the smaller sorts, nor to take physic iv, or begin any building, not good to lend money in, or to make new cloathes; it is good to court the female sex in, or send children to school, and in some cases to take a journey, or to pursue an enemy; and to conclude you may make choice of this hour to leave your native country in, (if designed to travel,) but choose another hour when you return; and are to enter into your owtl country agnin.

To figd the true place of each Planet at any hour when we have occasion to erect a figure, it only reguires to turn to the Ephemeris for the Planets places at noon; whicly being foumd, note how many degrees or minutes they mave in the Zodiac, by tweive oclock the next da., or from noon the preceding diy, and then by the he:'p of the above table, it will be seen how

how many degrees, minates, or seconds they move in an hour. For example, suppose a planet moves 1 degree in 24 hours, ow far does it move in 1 hivur? At the top of the first column is the figure 1, and in the same line of the second column, is 2 minutes and 30 secouds; which shews, that if a planet be 24 hours in moving 1 degree, it then moves 2 minutes and 30 seconde in an hour. Or suppose a planet only moves 2 mainates in 24 hours, look into the firat coloran of the Table for the figure 2, opponite, in the second colemn, stassde 5 seconds, which shews, that if a planot moves 2 minates in 24 hours, it then oaly moves 5 seconds in an bour, Aggain, if a plapet's diarnal motion be 11 minutes what is its bourly motion' Look into the first column for 11 , and opposite is 27,30 ; which indicates, that if a planet mores 11 minutes in 24 hours. It moves 24 seconds and 30 thirds iu an hour. The same rules are to be observed in the motions of all the planets; but let it be carefully remembered, that if the diurnal motion of any planet be in degrees, then you must enter the first column of the table under the denomination of degrees, and the second colvmn with minutes and seconds; but if the diurnal motion of the planet be only in minutes, then you must begin to reckon in the first column only with minutes, and in the second column with reconds and thirds. This is indicated by the initial letters placed over each column, which signify degrees or minutea in the first column; and in the second, degrees and minutes, minutes and seconds, seconds and thirds. Then suppose a planet moves 1 degree and 11 minutes in 24 hours, how far does it move in an hour? Refer to the Table and say,

1 Degree in 24 hours is 2 min . 30 sec .0 thirds per hour. 11 minutes in 24 hoursis 0 min . 27 sec . 30 thirds.

And thus any quantity of a planet's diurnal motion, may be reduced to time in the same manner.

But as no figure can be erected without the belp of an Ephemeris, and Tables to shew the Sun's place in each of the Twelve Signs, unless by entering info long and tedious calculations, I shall therefore insert, in this place, the right-band page of an Ephemeris, for February, 1809, and be Tables above-mentioned, with an explanation of the whole.

## Directions for erecting the Figure of Henren, and

 placing the Planets in the -Horoscope.$\$$
Without being expert at finding the true places of the Planots and Stars, at any hour or minute required, either by day or pightr; and without knowing how to dispose of. them in the Horopcope, sp as to represent their exact situations in the Heaveng apthing can possibly be knowp or predicted by Aitrology. IThas acquisition therefore, is the next step to be attainech, and itrough it may at first appear a task of some dif fipgity and labpur, yet by the belp of a common Ephemesis whith is publidted annually, and the forcgoing Tables, (together with ad set of Astronomical Tables I intend shotly to puhlis..) the reader may in a few bours bechme perfect mastef of this very essential part of the science. :
It is no uncommon thing with many readers to pass over an tables, ás dipfictalt 'to understand; but sitice n n information cma boobtained in the practical part of this science without the:Tshe of Houses calculated for the latitude of Londoh, st degrees, 32 minutes, which wiH setrve for any part of the Kiagdom, without making any material difference in the axpecte of the Planets, we can only say, that after a liute stady they, will be found as easy to understand, as the Ready Heckoner, or \$'Trader's Suré Guide.
White's Sphemeris is certainly beat calcusated to shew the exact places of the Sim, Moon and Planes, every day at twelve oo'clock; consequeully by refering to it, a Plgure may be agcoratety, met to that exact time : but it may, seldom or ever happen, that a Figure is wanted precisely at that howr,

and therefore it is necessary the young practitioner should snow how to rectify the daily motions of the Planets, by the number of degrees they move every twenty-four hours, so as to erect the ligure and introduce the true places of the Signs and Planets whenever required. 'This, by refering' to the Ephemeris for the stations of the Planets at Noon, may be done extremely easy, by the common process of figures, but that every reader may be enabled to do it without trouble, I have inserted an easy Table, whereby the Planetary motions are redaced to hours and minutes, and may be found for either day or night.
The use of the Ephemeris in setting a Figure, is to point out the places of the Planets at Noon whenever required, Por this purpose we refer to the given day of the month, in the first column of the right-hand page, and opposite to it in the second column, is the Sun's place or longitude that day at noon. So also in the same line of the succoeding columus through the whole Table, are the places of the Moon, Saturn, Jupiter, Mars, Venus, and Mercury, as specified at the top of each distinct column, and these are the frue places of the Sun, Moon and Planets, every day throughout the jear, precisely at twelve o'clock at noon. Therefore if the Figure be erected before that time, the diurnal motion of the Manets must be deducted in degrees and minutes, in propor: tion to the rate they move at per liour ; but if it be erected after noon, then so many degrees or minutes must be alded, as will bring them to the precise time of erecting the Figure.
The twelve Tables of Houses, are next to be'refered to; and these are calculated to shew what cegrees of each Sign possess the Cusps of the twelve Heuses of Heaven, when the

Figure is erected. They begin with the Sun's entrance inlo the Sign Arien, and thews his progreas through each degret of the twelve Signs of the Zodiac.

Now let it be required by way of example, to erect a Fi gure for a child, born, on Wedneslay, the first day of Feb. puary, 1809 , at ' 11 h .1 im . A.M. that is at eleven minutes past eleven o'clock in the morning. To do this, I refer to the first columin of the right-band page of the Ephemeris for Febraary, and opposite the first day of the month, in the e. cond column, which has on's longitude printed at the top, is 121825 with the Sign $=$ prefixed at the side of the firt range of figures. This indicates, that the Sun at wedre o'clock that day, is in twelve degrees, eighteen minutes, and twent $f$-five seconds of Aquarius; but the minutes and neconds when less than thirty, are.rejected, withont ensible error ; and when more than thiry, bave as many added m will make them up even degrees. I then turn to the Tables of Houses, and in the page entited Sun in Aquarius, I look for the column that hat the Sign at the top, which is the third; I seek for twelve degrees, and in the column on the left side of it, entitled time trom noon, I find even wilh tweive degre as, 20 h .58 m . The hours and ninutes thas found, are uniformly to be added to the time and hoor of the day when the Figure is erected, unless it be precisely at noon, in that case; as before observed, the places of the Sun, Plonets and Signs are to be set down exactly as they are found in the Eiphemetis and Tables of Houses. But the present F gure, being erected just forty nine minutes before twade o'clock, I amo to add this time, reckoning from noon the pro ceding day, to the above 2 ch .58 mn . and from these two sums added together, I subbract twenty-four hours, and the remaio-

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grees, sminutes of $=$, on the Cusp of the 3rd. House. I then plase the opposite 8igns and degrees, on the Cuaps of the opposite Houses, as before taught, namely, 28 degrees of $x$, on the Cusp of the 4 th; 25 degrecs, 48 minutet of $r$, on the Cusp of the 5th; 15 degrees, 54 minutes of $\gamma$, on the Cusp of the 6th; 2 degrees, 2 minutes of 11 , on the Cusp, of the-7th ; 5 degrees, 44 minutes of $\mathbb{I}$, on the Cusp of the 8 th ; 200d 19 degrees, 8 minates of $\Omega$, on the Cusp of the 9 th. House: and thas the twelve Houses are compleat. ly occupied, with the twelve Signs of the Zodiac, and the degrees ascending at the precise time of erecting the Figure.

I then refer to the Ephemeris for the 30th. day of April, and opposte to it, in the column of the $\mathcal{O}$ 's longinde; I find him in, 9 degrees, 41 minures and 4 seconds. of $\gamma$, that day at noon : but as the Figure is erected for 24 minutes ofter 9 , in the evening, 4 place the $\mathcal{O}$ in 10 degrees, 3 minutes of $ర$; the $\mathbb{C}$, by adding 5 degrees, 52 minates, to her place at noon, (going at the rate of 37 minures per hour) in 22 degrees, 12 minutes of $m+h$ in 2 degrecs, 8 minutes of $f$ with an $R$ prefixed to him, to denote he is retrograde; $\psi$ in 10 degrees, 27 minutes of $r$; $\delta$ retrograde in 11 degees, 21 minutes of $2 ; 9$ in 10 degrees, 50 minutes of 1 I ; the place of $\delta$, the 13t. of May (allowing for its moving backwards about 3 minutes per day,) in 2 degrees, 51 minutes of $\delta$; consequently I place $\%$, in 2 degrees, 51 m nutes' of ' $m$, and lastly the Part of Fortune $\oplus$, to compleat it agreable to the foregoing rule, in 14 degrees, 11 minutes of II; in the 7 th. House, as exhibited in the following Pigure.

## Another Celestial Figure,

Erected 24 Minutes after 9 in the Evening.


This and the foregoing Figure inciudes all that is required for the purpose of giving judgement upon the Natives' future rise or fall in the world, and discovering by directions, the priacipal occurrences in human life; but in the more immediate concern of life and death, and in order to know u 2

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whether the child born will live to years of maturity ; we must particularly regard the fixed Stars, according to their magnitude, influence, and positions near the Ascendant, or jts Iond, or near the Mroon, or the other Significators. And because it is of importance to know their natures, qualitios and significations, I shall subjoin a table of the most considerable fixed Stara, in the northern Hemisphere; and then shew how to collect such of them into the Horoscope, as may relate to the subject at any time under consideration.

A Table of the principal fixed Stars near the Ecliptic, shewing their Longitude, Latitude, Maguilude and Nature.

The frst column contains the names of the Stars ; the second eolumn shews their longitude, or in what degree and minute of the twelve Signs they are situated; the third con lumn shews the degree and minute of their latitude, either north or soruh, which is denoted by the letter N S ; the fourth column denotes their magnitude, and the fifth ahews their natural quality; for example, the Star in the wing of Pegasus is in 6 degrees, 29 miantes of $r$, has 12 degrees, 35 minutes north latitude, is of the 2nd magnitude and participates of the nature and quality of $\delta \boldsymbol{\delta}$ and $\%$.
The fixed Stars may be found and distinguished in the Hearens, by their conjunctions with the Moon, or by observing.

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their order from any given point in the Heavens; thas, begin with the Pleiades, valgarly called the seven Stars, and next to them in order, but somewhat lower, is a large, red' Star, called Aldebaran or the south eye of the Bull ; next. follows Orion's Belt or Girdle, which are three Stars in a rank, thus, *** and are valgarly called the Yard or Ell; next follows a Star, called the Great Dog, which is a large bright 8tar, somewhat lower than the Girdle of Orion; thenext is called the head of Gemini, and is about the heigth of the seven Stars; there are two together appear thus $*^{*}$, the largest of the two is the Star here nominated; the next which follows in order, is called south Aseellus, no great Star, but: of a red colour; there are two of them near togetber and alike, and stand or appear thus * *, the lower of the two is the Star here meant; next in order, follows a Star called the Head of Hydra, lower than Assellus, and of a bright white colour'; then follows a Stär in the flank of the Lion, very bright, and about the height of the seven Stars; next to that, the Virgin's Girdle, a bright Star, and lower than the flank of the Lion; and nest follows a curious Star, called the Virgin's Spike, very large and bright; it is a Star of the 1st. magnitude, and appears a little lower, or mere southerly, than the Virgin's Girdle; next in order followe the Star called Arcturus, a very remarkable, bright, red 000 loured Star, about the altitude of the Pleiades; then followe the Star of the Crown, large and bright, and higher than Arcturus; then the right Shoulder of Hercules, of a pale white colour, near the altitude of the sevan Stars; then follows the Head of Ophinchus, of a pale white colour, and comowhat southward of Hercules; then appears a Star under the armpit of Sagittaty, a bright Star, bat very low; next the brigho

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Star of the Volture, large, and lower than the seven Stars ; the next Star is called the left shoulder of the Water-bearer; abont the altitude of Orion's Girdle, of a pale white colour; the next in order, is the Star called Marchab, being a Star of a bright colour, a little lower than the reven Stars, but much bigger; then follows the southern Star of the Whale's Tail; this Star is of a pale colour, and about the heigth of the Sun the shortest day ; then follows a Star called the Girdle of Andromeda, a bright glittering Star, and much higher than the Pkiades; Jastly there is the bright Star of the Ram, of a red colour, and lower than the seven Stars. Those that would be curious in these specalations, should study the Celestial Globe, and learn to be very expert in the use of it, which is most easily acquired and also very entertaining.
Now to know whether any of the fixed Stars fall intd the Figure erected. I note the Sign and degree upon the Cusps of the Houses, and then examine the 2nd. column of the foregoing table of fixed Stars, and if I find either of them ascending, or descending, within 5 degrees of the Signs upon the Casps of the several Houses, they are then to be entered in the same manner as the Planets, and their qualities and influences are to be duly weighed, according to the nature of whatever Planet they correspond with, which is shewn in the last column of the table. In the foregoing Figure of the Heavens, I observe 2 degrees, 2 minutes of $\ddagger$ upon the Ascendant, then looking down the twelve Signs in order, in the 2nd. column of fixed Stars, I find $\ddagger \mathbf{6 1 5}$, and even with it, in the 18t. column, Cor Scorpio, which shews that this Star is alno ancending, within 5 degreés of the Cusp of the 1sth House or Ascendant ; and therefore I place it in the ist. House of the Pigure under the Sign $f$; I then examine the other Cuspi

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according to their rotation, and on the Cusp of the third House, I find $=198$, and in the table of fixed Stars, I find am 20 46, and even with it the Tail of the Goat, which shews that this Star is within 2 degrees of the Cusp of the 3rd. House, in which I accordingly. place it. On the Cuap of the 4th. House, I find $\boldsymbol{*}$ 28, and in the table of fixed Stars, I find Scheat Pegasi in $\boldsymbol{*} \mathbf{2 6 0}$, I therefore place it under the Sign $\boldsymbol{X}$ in the 4 th. House of the Figure. On the Cusp of the 5 th. House, I see $\mathbf{r} 25$ 48, and in the table of fixed Stars 1 find the Girdle of Andromeda in $\gamma 27$ 40, I therefore place it below the Sign $r$ in the 5 th . House. On the Cusp of the 6ith. Hoase, I find $\delta 15 \mathbf{5 4}$, and in the table of fixed Stars, I find the bright Star in the Jaw of the Whale, in $\gamma 1147$, I therefore place it under the Sign $\gamma$, in the Gib. House. Upon the Cusp of the 7th. House of the Figare, is II 2 2, and in the table of fixed Stars, I find Aldebaran in 1173 , 1 therefore place it above the Cusp of the 7th. House. Upon the Cusp of the 8th. House is $\$ 5$ 44, and in the table of fixed Stars I find the bright Foot of Gemini, in $\sigma 618$, I therefore place it just within the Cusp of the 81h. House. Upon the Cusp of the 11th. stands $\simeq 2548$, and in the table I find that eminent fixed Star, the Vinginis Spike, of the 1st. maguitude, in $\bumpeq 213$, which I enter near the Cusp of the 11 th. House, but not within the Hoose as before taught. Upon the Cusp of the 12th. is $M$ 15.54, and in the table, I find the Star, North Ballance in $M 16$ 35, and therefore 5 enter him in 16 degrees, 35 minutes of m, in the J2th. House; and thas I have collected the posivions of all the Planets and eminent fixed Stars, as they stood in the Heavens at 24 minutes past $9 o^{\circ}$ clock, on Sundayp the 3cth. of April, 1809.

But since the Aspects of the Planets at the time of erecting the Figure, consitute the principal index of our judgment, I examine their position in this respect, and note them down under the title of the Figure, where they stand as a consiant guide to our judgment on Nativities, or the matter under consideration : for instance, I examine the Figure before projected, and in the 9 th. House I find 9 in 10 degrees, $50 \mathrm{mi}-$ nutes of $I I$; and $\psi$ in the 4 th. in 10 degrees, 27 minutes of $r$; 1 then reckon from 10 degrees of $r$ to 10 degrees of $~ B$, is 30 degrees; and from 10 degrees of $\gamma$, to 10 degrees of $I I$, is 30 degrees more ; these amounting to 60 degrees constitute a partile sextile aspect, which I note thus $* \%$. Then I observe $\delta$ retrograde, in 11 degrees, 21 minutes of $\bumpeq$, and $q$ in 10 degrees, 50 minutes of $I I$, and their distance from each other being reckoned as before, are found to be near 120 degrees apart, which making a trine, they are now within each others orbs, and are consequently in a platic trine, applying to a partile trine aspect, because $q$ is a swifter Planet than $\delta$, and $\delta$ by retrogradation applies to $Q$, which I note thus, $\triangle 9 \sigma^{\circ}$. Then I observe 4 a lighter Planet, separating from a trine of $h$, yet still within each others orbs, which I note thus, $\Delta \psi \mathrm{h}$. Then I find $\delta$, as before observed in 11 degrees, 21 minutes of $\bumpeq$, and $\psi$ in 10 degrees, 27 minutes of $r$, which being opposite Signs, and the Planets degrees within each others orbs, constitute a platic opposition, wherefore I note down this aspect $84 \delta^{\circ}$. Lastly I find the in 22 degrees, 12 minutes of $m$, and the $O$ in 10 degrees, 3 minutes of $\varnothing$; here the $\mathbb{Q}$ is separating from an opposition of the $\odot$. These being all the aspects, I range them together under the title of the Figure, thus,


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in the hour of the Sun, as may be seen by refering to the table of Planetary, I therefore signify it thus, $\mathcal{O}$ hor, and the latitude under which the Figure is erected, being that of Bath, I have allowed 10 minutes for the difference of time, and enter $51^{\circ} 22^{\prime}$, that is fifty-one degrees, twenty-twominutes north latitude. These aspects are not always arranged in this manner, under the Scheme or Figure of birth; I have only given this example by way of conveying instruction to the young learner, as the only true and exact method of proo jecting the Horoscope.

It is here necessary to explain what is meant by the poles positions, and the equations of time. Suppose twelve great circles, one of which is the meridian of any given place, to intersect each other in the two poles of the Earth, and to cut the Equator in every fifteenth degree, they will be divided by the poles, into twenty-four semicircles, which divide the Equator into iwenty-four equal parts ; and as the Rarth turns on its axis, the plans of these semicircles come successively after one another, every hour to the Sun: and as in an hour of time, there is a revolution of fifteen degrees of the Equator, in a minute of time there will be a revolution of fifteen minutes in the Equator, and in a second of time, a revolution of Gifteen seconds; therefore to every place fifteen degrees eastward from any given meridian, it is noon an hour sooner, than on that meridian, because their meridian comes to the Sun an hour sooner, and to all places fifteen degrees westward, it is an hour later, because their meridian comes an hour later to the Sun; and so on, every fifteen degrees of motion, causing an hours difference of time, therefore they who have noon an hour later than we, have their meridian, that is, their longitude, fifteen degrees westward from us;

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and they who bave noon an honr sooner than we, have their meridian or longitude, fifteen degrees eastward from ours; and to for every hours difference of time, fifteen degrees dif. ference of longitude.

Tables for converting mean solar Time into Degrees and Parts of the terrestrial Equator; and also for converting Degrees and Parts of the Equator into means solar Time.


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If the Reader in Table I. reckons the columns marked with Asterisks, to be minutes of time, the other columns give the equatoreal parts or motion, in degrees and minutes if he reckons the Asteridk columns to be seconds, the other gives the motion in minures and seconds of the Equator; if if thirds, in seconds and thirds. And if in Table II. he reck. ons the Asterisk columns to be degrees of motion, the other gives the time answering thereto in hours and minutes; if minutes of motion, the time is minutes and seconds; if sem conds of motion, the time is given in seconds and thirds.

I bave introduced the foregoing Table of the Latitude and Longitude of the most considerable Towns in England, (which will answer for any other places of birth that happen pear them,) for the conveniency of Persons who may want to calculate their own Nativity.

I shall now proceed to shew how a Planet in one Meridian may be reduced to that of another.
Yor example, suppose it were required to know the difference between the Meridians of London and Bath; refer to the Ephemeris in this Work, page 149, and ou the 1st of Fcbruary, at twelve o'Clock at noon Luna is in 23 degrees, 26 minutes of Leo, under the Meridian of London; but to reduce $f$ to the Meridian of Bath, parsue the fellowing method. 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to 23 degrees, 26 minates, make 23 degrees, 31 minutes and $30^{\circ}$ seconds of Luna in Leo, at twelve o'clock at Bath. and thus by proper attention to the preceding rules and direcfions, may any person, though of snsall abilities, erect the 1ioroscope, and introduce the Signs; Planets and Stars, therein, at any given time required, but without the Reader bas ability to define from the aspects and positions of the Planets, under whatever situations they may be found, it will not be of any real utility to him; let bin therefore turn to the foregoing Figure of the Heavens, exected for the 30th. of April, 1809, and endeavour to discover the canse and manner of a Child's approaching dissolution, who from present appearance, under the influx of such destructive rays, will no doubs die in is infant dtate.

1 have here thought proper to introduce the Tables of the semidiurnal and seminociurnal Arches for every degree of the Heliptic, for the Latitude of London, which being mostly , wanted, will of course save the practitioner some trouble.

1 have also added a Table of Ascensional Differences under the Poles of the respective Houses, all which will be found exceeding usefiul in ascertaining the true time of birth, and bringing up muidane Directions, as will be explained hereafter.

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## The Use of the foregoing Tables of Semidiurnal and Seminnocturnal Arches.

If you would find the Semidiurnal Arch of any Planet above the Earth, refer to the Table of Semidiurnal Arches; for example, suppose it was required to find the Semidiurnal Arch of Saturn in 9 degrees of Taurus, and Tanrus on the Cusp of the 121h. House; look down the first column for 9 , against which in a right line under $8 \mathrm{a} \times$, is 7 17 , which ahews the Semidiurnal Arch of Saturn in 9 degrees of Taurus is 7 hours, 17 minutes; in the same manner you may proceed for any other Planet : but if the Planet is under the Earth you must take his Seminocturnal Arch, which is the space of three Houses, and if required is to be turned inte degrees of the Equator, by the Table in page 184, where you will find in the two last columns, under Hours and Minutos 7 20, whicb is the nearest; (but the Learner must calculate if he wants it exact,) against which on the left hand, under degrees is 110 , which shew that 110 degrees will give the true distance of three Houser, and if divided by three, it will give the proper distance of one House, by which method the true division of all the Houses may be obtained, according to the rules of Ptolomy; two of which parts make arextile, this whofe Arch a quartile, and four parte conotitute a!triné, fur these are all aspects arade in the Wu:bi.

## The Use of the Table of Ascensional Differencos of the P!anets.

The Ascensiomal Difference, is a certain arch of distance, between the right and oblique ascensions of any Star or Planet ir any degree of the Ecliptic, and to find it by the forogoing table of differences, observe the following rules. Enter with the degrees of declination on the left hand of the table, and under the Pole of the House (as in the head,) in the common angle of meeting, with equation, will be found the ascensional difference required. Example, suppose a Planet to have 12 degrees of declination, and is required to be brought to the eleventh House, under the Pole of 23 degrees, 27 minutes; I enter with 12 degrees on the left hand, under the pole of 23 degrees, and there 1 find 5 degrees, eleven miputes, but having 27 miputes more, I take the part propor: tonal, between 23 degrees and 24 degrees, viz.

then I say by the rule of proportion, if 60 give 15 , what shall 27, the odd minutes of the Pole of the i1th. House give? It gives 7 nearly, which added to 5 degrees, 11 minutes, gives the rrue ascensional difference, 5 degrees, 18 minutes of the point sought.

Having obtained the ascensional difference, the use of it in the art of directions, is as follows. First, if the declination be north, uubtract the ascensional difference from the right ascension, and the remainder will be the oblique ascension; but if you add it to the right ascension, the sum will

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be the oblique descension. Secondly, when the declination is south, add the ascensional difference to the right asconsion, and the sum will be the oblique ascension; but if you subtract it from the right ascension, the remainder will be the oblique descension.

Having found by practice atid experience, that mandane Parallels, from their wonderful operation, constifute the most copsiderable directions in human life, I would therefore refommend them, for they will amply retward the young learn. er for all his trouble in memtaining a perfect knowledge of. them.

Before any judgment can be given on nativity, it is requisite to be knowny whether the Native is of a long or shart life, I have therefore selected the following general rules.

## gIGNS OF DEATH IN INPANCY.

1. If the birth be precisely on: N New or Full Moon,
II. If the Moon be in conjunction of Saturn and Mars, ia the 6th. 8th. or 12th. House of the Yigure.
III. If the Moon be in quarile or opposition of Gaturn or Mars in the 4 th. House.
IV. If the Moon be beseiged by the Sun and Mars.
V. If an Eclipse impede the Light of Tine in the hour of birth.
VI. If all the Planets be sabterrancan, and neither the Gun, Moon, nor Lord' of the Ascendant essentially fortified.
VII. If the two Malefics are conjoined in the Ascendant.

YIII. If an Infortuane in the Ascendant vitiate the degrees thereof, op by quartile or opposition,
IX. If the Lord of the Ascendant be combust of the Sun and at the same time Cadent and Retrograde.
X. If the Dragon's Head or Tail, be in conjunction of Saturn or Mars in the 4 ll .

These configurations, by long and invariable experience, are found to destroy Life in Infancy, except the bencfic rays of Jupiter or Ventus interpose, and by joining in the asplects; modify and remit their malignant effect.

Observe that Mars bath greater power of destroying 'Tife then posited in Aries and above the Earth, in a diurnal Na: tivity; and Satarn, when posited in Capricorn and above the Earth, in a nocturnal Nativíy.

## SIGNS OF SIIORT LIFG.

If the degree Ascending Sol or Luna are extremely afflicted, or either of them, it is an argument of short life, and therefore it will be in vain to form long directions for such a nätivity. These points are said to be affliced or unfortunate, when either the conjunction, quartile or opposition of the Infortunes viliate their places, or when many violent fixed Stars of the nature of the Lord of the 8ih. ascend with the degree ascending, or with the Luminaries.

The $\mathbb{C}$ besieged between $b$ and $\not \subset$ argues Short Life.

## aIGNS OP LONE LIFR.

If the Lord of the Ascendant be essentially strong, free, from the affiction of the Infortunes, not combust, nor retrogade, nor impeded by the Lord of the 4th, 6th, 8th, or 12th Houses, but encreasing in number, light, and motion, it shews Jon $_{j}$ Lie.

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If the $\odot$ in a Birth by day, or the $\mathbb{C}$ in a Birth by night, be strong, free from affliction, and assisted by the Fortunet, it shews long Life.

You must first consider the $\odot$ and ( $\mathbb{C}$, secondly $b$ and $\mathcal{X}_{1}$ and their signs, which are called violent, vir. $r m$ vis $\approx$, wherein $b$ hath more'signification unto Death, ot to the kinid thereof: thirdly, the stb House and Lord thereof; fourthly, the Lord of the Asceudant ; fifthly, the Fixed Stari of the nature of $b$ and $\delta$, the principal whereof are Capat Algol in $23,27^{\prime}$, Oculus $\zeta$ in $5,43^{\prime}$ II, Hercules $20,30^{\circ} \Phi$, Right Shoulder of Orion in $25,59^{\prime}$ II, Cor $\mathfrak{m}$ in $6,15^{\prime} \ddagger$, Chayla in $11,15^{\prime} \mathrm{m}$.

First, both the Luminaries in violent Signs, not both in one Sign, but in divers which behold not one another, portend a violent Death.
The Lights are said to be in contiguous Signs when the ( is in $r$, and the $\odot$ in $M$, or the $\subset$ in $w^{\prime \prime}$, and the $\odot$ in $v$, and so in the others.

Both the Luminaries with violent fixed Stars, and wibin the defiance of five degrees, threaten a violeut Death : the $\varangle$ with Cor $\mathfrak{M}$, and the $\odot$ with Oculus $\gamma$, without doubt declares a violent Death; and then most certainly when the Lord of the Ascendant and of the eighth is in $\delta$ with either of the Lights

These Ruler then hoid good, and take effert, when the Lord of th Ascendant or of the eighth House is in $\sigma$ with one of the Lights; or when either the Sun or Moon hare dominion in the first or eighth Hoase.

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If either the $\mathcal{O}$ or $\mathbb{C}$ be in violent Signs, and the other of the Lights with a violent fixed Star, it prenotes a violent Death : but in this case it is necessary, that together with this configuration, one of the Infortunes afflict either $\mathcal{O}$ or 8, or the Lord of the eighth.
Secondly, both the Luminaries unfortunated by $h$ and ${ }^{\circ}$. so that one of the Lights, and one of the Infortunes be in a violent Sign, or with a violent fixed Star, portend a violent Death.

If both the Luminaries be afflicted only of one of the Infortunes, the other Infortune being impedited or posited in a violent Sign, and having dignities in the eighth, it threatens violent Death.

The $\delta$ of $h$ and $\delta^{2}$ in an angle, especially in the Midbeaven in a violent Sign, infesting only one of the Lights, threatens a violent Death.

The $\delta \mathbf{I I} 8$ or mutual aspect of the Infortunes in other Signs as well as in the violent, but in Angles, one of them challenging power in the eighth, portend a violent Death.

A malevolent Planet in the eighth, and the Lord of the eighth afflicted of an unfortunate Planet by nature, Wida is in a violent Sign, both the Lightu or either of them afflicterd in a piolent Sign, portends violent Death.

The Lord of the eighth in the Ascendant, and in his detriment or fall, or in a violent Sign, or with a violent fixed Star, and one of the Lights infested of either of the malignant Plahets denotes a violent Death.

The Lord of the eighth in his detriment or fall, afflicted by one of the Infortunes, and together with this, either of

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the Luminaries, or the other Infortune in a violent Sign, demonstrate violent Death.

The Lord of the first in a violent Sign, or infested of the malevolents, and the dispositer of the Light of Tinc being also in a violent Sign and afflicted, portends violent Death.

The Lord of the first in the eighth, being naturally an Infortune and afflicted besides, 8 cc . shews a violent Death. But if he be not naturally a malevolent Planet; but is in a violent Sign, and impedited by the $\square$ or $\&$ of the Malefics, it portends the same.

The Lords of the eighth and first House, being the dispo. sitors of either Light, and either of them in detriment and fall, and one of the Infortunes afflicting the other Light in a violent Sign, these shew a violent Death.

The © in the 7th, in Signs where fixed Stars of a violent nature are placed, viz. $\boldsymbol{\sigma}$ II $\boldsymbol{\sigma} \ddagger$, and in $\square$ or $\&$ of $\varphi$, or an evil Planet posited in the eighth, or having dominion therein, and both being in Signs violent, these are arguments of a violent Death.

But notwithstanding all the preceedent Rulos is to be ad. mitted, and you have a full signification of a violent Death, yet Lilly saith if one of the Fortunes be in the Ascendant, and the other in the eighth, all fear of a sudden or violent Death is taken 2 way.

The Signification hereof, is taken from that significate who doth most heavily afflict the significatore of Death, or
hath principal authority and force in the places of the significators or Death, yiz. of the Luminarles, the Lord of the Ascendant, Lord of the eighth, or of these Houses, commixing with him the nature of the Sign, and sometimes of the House of Heaven in which he is posited.

Saturn properly according to his own nature, denotes Death by drowaing, Shipwreck, rain of otd Buildings, and Poison.

Mars, by Fire, Jron, Thunder or Lightning, shot of Guns, atroke of Horses, both of them by some Fall from on high, or strangling.

Where two, thiee or more testimonies concur, be more conifident, as ${ }^{\circ}$ author of Death, in a fiery Sign, the Death will be by Fire, Sword, \&e.

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But for the more perfect judging of the quality, and by what means a violent Death shall come, I have collected out of eminent Authors, together with my own judgment such Aphorisms, as they and myself have found true by experience.

## RULES OF BATONN AND MARE.

Saturn in $\boldsymbol{H}$ and the $\mathbb{C}$ in 吹, or $b$ in a watery Sign, and the ( in 8 to him, shews the Native will die by Water, viz: be Drowned, or else die by Drinking too much Wine.

Saturn in $m_{1}$, in $\sigma$ with $\sigma^{\sigma}$, and the $\delta$ in making application to them, declare the Native will be suffocated or drowned.

Saturn in the watery triplicity, and the $\mathcal{O}$ conjoined with him, either by $\sigma, \square$, or 8 , are great arguments of Drowning, more especially in the eighth.
'Saturn in the seventh, in 8 to the $\mathcal{O}$, or $\mathbb{C}$, shews death by Imprisonment, Sluttimhess, Poison, Poverty, Fear, torments in a Dungeon, or by some violent Fall, or in exile, \&e.

Saturn in the tenth House, in 8 to the Light of Time, declares death by the fall of Houses, but if a watery Sign be on the fourth, by Water.

Saturn and $\delta$ in the twelfth, imports death or danger.by great Bearts.

Leo, or $\ddagger$ on the Cusp of the twefth; and a Planet unfortunate therein, signity the Native will receive a fall from an Horse and so die.

Saturn in $\ddagger$ in the eighth imports the same.
Saturn and $\delta^{6}$ in the seventh in a common Sign, and the ( in 8 to them, declares death by a sudden fail.

Saturn in the seventh with the 8 . declares hanging. Observe, a benevolent Pranet mitigates these judgments.

Mars in ihe seventh in $\boldsymbol{r}$, $\Omega$, or $f$, imports burning alive.

Mars in the seventh in feral Signs, such as $\Omega$ and the last past of $\ddagger$, declares death by ruins, or fall of Timber, or Houses, or from falls by Beasis, or Horses.
Mhars id fitry Signs in $\boldsymbol{n}$ to $h$ in $\$, M$, or $\operatorname{*}$, denotes death by sealding, or hot water.

In each of these tignifications, you must have one, or both of the Liuminaries, in evil configuration, with lizm, or otherwise the judgment is but of small import.
Again, if the Lord of the Ascendant, or eighth be in 8 to the Ascendant the Native will die violently.

If the Lord of the seventh, or eighth be in the ninth in an earthy Stgn, and unfortunate therein the Native will die by come sudden misfortunc.

If the $\odot$ is joined to the Lord of the Arcendant in $\Omega$, and T hath no dominion in the Ascendant, or any good Planet, posited in the eighth, the Native dies by Fire.

The same if the $\mathcal{O}$ be posited in the fourth, in a fiery Sign in $\phi$ with the Lord of the Ascendant, or eighth House, and afficted of the Infortunes.
If the Lord of Death be joined by body to the significator of Life, or to the Lord of the Ascendant; or the $\mathbb{C}$ joined to the $\odot$ in $\Omega$, or $f$, with $\delta$ aspecting them; or the $\odot$ or © joined with a fixed Star of the nature of $\delta$, the Native will be in danger of Death by Fire ; if $b$ instead of $\delta$ be bolds the Luminaries, the Native will be suffocated with Smoak.
If the lord of the Ascendant be unfortanated by the 0 or $\delta$, and Lord of the eighth, it declares Death by Fire.

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All these I bave found verified in manay Nativiries; but when none of these testimonies occur, the Native will die a netural Death.

If all the significators of substance, namely the lord of the 2nd, Planet in the 2 nd if any, $\boldsymbol{\psi}$, the $\oplus$, and its diaporiter, be placed in angles, or the greater part of them, and beielwo essentially dignified, it is an argument the Native ahall attain a very great Istate, have plenty of all things, and be necesitated in nothing; and the more testimonice you find of fortitudes or debilities, the more judgment mant begiand of the greatness or weakness of the Bstate of the Native.
If moderately fortified, the Native shall not exceed or want, or with Regulous, or Spica a ; or the Fortunes in good Houses of Reaven:

In this manner of judgment it's no matter whether the Significators of Wealth and Riches be Portunes or Infortuncs.

The © fortunate in the Accendant gives wealth and estimation all the life long.

The $\odot$ and in $\Delta, \odot$ then in his exaltation, neither of them afflicted by $h$, or $\delta$, gives ample testimonies of a large fortune.
The same if both the Luminaries are in $\Delta$ to each other from masculine Signs, and both in $\Delta$ to the $\oplus$ likewise.
Jupiter in the 2nd, and the' $\mathbb{Q}$ in the 1st, or $\psi$ in the Ascendant in his own dignities, and the $\mathbb{C}$ in the 2nd in her dignities, promises wealth.
The $\oplus$ conjoined with the $\&$ or $\psi$, predicts an increase of wealth.

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Saturn dignified in a diurnal geniture in the oth, in good appoct with either of the Fortunes, gives an encrease of substance by the death of relatives or friends.
So also if the lord of the 8th is fortunate in come of his easential dignitios, and is placed in the 10th House, the Native will bave good fortune, and acquire an estate by the deceased.

If the dispositor of the $\oplus$ is in the 8 th and the lord of the Acendant aspects him, wealth comes by deceased persons.
If $b$ is well posited, and essentially strong, and aepect the ascendant with a $\Delta$, the Native becomes rich by lands, orchards, fields and pastures.
If $b$ is lord of the 4th House, or posited in the 4th House, either in his House or exaltation, and is direct swift in motion, and in good aspect with the Fortunes, it foreshews the Native shall acquire an ample fortune by managing quarries and mines where metals, coals, stones, or minerals are to be obtained; the more potent he is, the more gain may be expected, and more evidently the effects will appear.

The lord of the 4th House received by either of the luminaries, or the Planet that disposeth of either of the Lights, with mutual reception, importsabundance of wealth, by meane of mines, whether coal mines, quarries, lead mines, ikc. ironmines, or the like.

Jupiter in the 4th in $\bumpeq$, promiseth the Native much wealth out of the bowels of the earth, by tin especially, and argues a good inheritance, or personal estate from the Father: without doubt in this judgement $b$ is most to be prefered when he happens to be in the 4 th House in $m$, and 2 shall then ${ }^{2}$ be祖 $\xlongequal{2}$ 。

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Mars in the ith Notre in $\Omega$, and the 0 in $r$, is absolate1y very promising for the Native to deal in iton mines, silver- . mines, or gold mines.

For to be fortunate in coal mines, or ledid ore, it is requisite that h bhould be in an earthy Stign, in some good aspect with the © $\mathcal{O}, \delta^{*}$ and $\%$, and he eitber in the 4th, or liaving a good aspect to those Planets posited in the 4th.

The time when the Native may expect an efrereace of - wealth or the goodi of fortune, is best discovered by the significators, and $\Theta$, directed to benefic promittors, untò the $\delta, *$, or $\Delta$ of the lord of the $2 n$, ordispositor of the ©, or Planet in the 2nd, ànd their several aspects; yet if any desire to know in a general way, fet him consider in what quatter of Heaven he finds any of the aforesaid significators of riches, als especially him that is most fortified; for if he, or they are placed, or the greater part of them between the ascendant and 10th House, then the Native shall have an Estate, or augmentation of riches in his youth; if they are posited in the gth, 8th, or 7th, in his manhood, or at those years when he is of full age, or from twenty-five, to thirth-five or forty ; if they are in the 6ih, 5th, or 4th, then nearer to old age, or after forty, and before fifty-five; if they are in the $3 \mathrm{rd}, \mathbf{2 n d}$, or 1 st, then towards the latter end.

In this judgement you ought well to consider whether the Native may probably live many or few years, and according.: ly to divide that time, and thereby point out the time of access to riches.

The significators oriental of the © import quickness, and the time cooner ; but occidental of the $\mathcal{O}$, nearer old age;

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retrograde Planets signify the same thing, viz. they retard; the Planets direct and swift in motion hasten the time.

All the significators of substance weak declare poverty.
The $\mathbb{d}$ in $\delta$ with $h$ in an angle, though the Native were ever so rich, yet shall he be reduced to poverty.

The $n$ or 8 of $h$ and the destroys the substance.
The $\mathcal{F}$ in the 2nd destroys the Natives estate and fortun be it ever so great, and he will be driven to many exigences and wants ; and $b$ or $\delta$ retrograde, peregrine and cadent, being in $\pi$, or 8 to the 2nd House or its lord, makes the Native perpetually poor.

The combust and her dispositer unfortunate, or the place of the $\delta$, or 8 oppressed of the infortunes, and they cadent, the lord thereof being an infortane, and strong ; or, \% cadent, and his dispositer not potent foreshews, the Native from a vast estate shall come to great want.

Again, the lord of the 2nd combust and $\oplus$ unfortunate, tisualliy portends confiscation of property, bankruptcy, and ruin.

Oculus Taurus, Cor Scorpio, or Capat Algol with the $\oplus$, or jointed to his lond, expresses losis of riches, and threatens pioverty:
$\therefore$ Observe if the two malefic Planet $万$ and $\delta$, occupy anites in the' Figure and the benefics are posited in succedent . Foomis,", the Native will experience adversity in the early part of his life, but prospority in the end.

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## Elpcellent Aphorisms fit to be comsidered by those that practice the Genethliacel part of:'Astrology.

1. Of all the parte of Astrology, the Genethliacal is the cheif for therein is consulted the whole progress of Man from his, birth to kis death, and by that alone we are enabled to discover the time of his happy and inauspicious fortunes.
2. Those that are born under such a position wherein $h$ beareth the chiefest rule; or if he be in the ascendant, are melancholy, envious, yet timorous persons: if $\bar{\delta}$ or $\%$ be if II or 8 to $h$, they torn enthusiasts or mad men.

Those born under the aominion of $\psi$ when lond of the Geniture or in the Ascendant are of a noble and brave spirit, aiming at good and honest things, without the least imagination of evil; but if either of the luminaries shall be in In or 8 of $\psi$, or $b$ and $\delta$ in the Ascendant, or in 8 thereunto, the Native will be vidlanously minded, rash, head-strong, and rebellions; treacherous to all ; a friend to nune, but from the teeth qutward.
4. If under $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{2}$ and he lord of the geniture, or in the ascendant essentially powerful, the Native is full of courage, proves a good soldier, attaing to great honour therebys $\delta^{2}$ also maketh good surgeons, physicians, apothocarijes, $\& c_{\text {. }}$
5. He that is born under the rule of the $\odot$, the $Q$ being Jord of the geniture, qr stropg in the accendant, will be altogether aiping at sovereignty, rule and dominịn, and guod Capax will be very famous: the same if $r, \Omega$, or if aceati, and the $\odot$ be strong and in $\Delta$ of $\psi$
6. Venus lady of the geniture, or strong in the Ascendant, makes the Native a great lover of pleasares 3nd delighta,

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of an tupright, juit, honest heart, but if the be weak or ill placed in the Figure, and in bad aspect with h, he follows sensuality and beastial pleasures; if afflicted of $\delta^{\circ}$, he is subject to much notorious scandal and diagrace, seldom free from venereal diseates.
7. Mereury lord of the geniture, or strong in the ascendant, gives the Native a most sdmirable fancy, and great elocution : $\%$ makes famous orators, by being in good aspect of (, or $Q$, or in reception with either of them; if he be in good aspect or reception with $b$ or $\psi$, he makes an excellent philosopher or divine; if with $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{*}$, a good physician, sur. geon, and the best mathematician, \&cc.
8. When the governs the horoscope, and in well placed in the geniture, the Native is a great lover of novelties, subject to mutations, of a gentle nature and disposition, timorous, often desirous to travel and see strange countries, if in. aspect with of, be will be apt to learn many languages.
9. Mars strong in a Nativity and lord of the 7th, and in. no good aspect of the luminaries or ascendant, the Native is subject to misfortunes in war, or in any thing of controveray ; for the 7th House signifieth his adversaries ; and in this respect they will be too powerful for him to contend with.
10. All the Planets, or the most of them, above the earth, be the Native of what capacity he will, it makes him eminent and famous beyond it; but if they shall be thus posited in their dignities, the Native like a Comet shall out-shine all others in that place or part of the world where be shall be: born.
XI. The infortunes afflicting the luminaries or the Horoscope by body or partile aspect, declares him that is then bora to be of very short and sickly life.

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12. Sol in the ascendant makes eminentboasters and very proud persons: $\delta$ there makes notorious liars, inventors of fables, and great contrivers of mischief, purjured turbalent, and cruel minded men,
13. Eminent fixed Stars upon the angles of a mativity, give the Native eminent honour and fame.
14. Mercury in cazimi, and in his own dignities, makes the Native not only a famous orator, but an excellent counsellor; and will be admired and much esteemed for his ingenutity and abilities.
15. Saturn in the 10th House of a nativity, destroys the Natives honour and fame, let it be never so great and he ever so deserving; if $\psi$ be there, under good directions he may preserve it; cum difficultate; but in the end, it will be abrolutely shipwrecked.
16. If $b$ in the nativity of a King, or other less famous person, shall be in 8 to the'Medium Cceli, although the geniture be otherwise fortunate, yet the Natives end will be most inauspicious and cruel.
: 17. All the Planets in a nativity retrograde and under the earth; though the Native be of illustrious birth, denote him to be of a falling fame or fortune.
17. Cardinal Signs possessing the anglea of a nativity, makes the native (of any condition or capacity) moat eminent and famous in his generation; and to do such acts that after ages shall admire him.
18. Mars in the 10th House bringe scandal and dishonour to the Native in many things, whether deserving it or not.
19. The $\odot$ or in $\square$ or 8 of $\sigma^{t}$ from angles, cheity the ioth and 4th declare a violent death; if it be to. $\sigma^{\circ}$ only,

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they should be so posited in violent Signs, though not in angles the same.
23. Mercury in $\square$, or 8 of $\delta^{2}$, gives a sharp, but a most troublesome wit and understanding, one never content, but always seeking out new things and strange inventions.
29. Eminent fixed Stars upon the angles of a nativity, chiefly the Medium Cœeli and Horoscope, declares eminent and prodigious persons; such that shall make the world admire them, if the Planets therein shall but moderately assist.
30. Mercury in $\boldsymbol{f}$ in an angle afflicted of $\delta$ or the $\mathcal{O}$. and © in an angle aflicted of 5 , makes an idiot, fanatic, or frenetic fellow ; for his brain like a cracked looking glass, will represent a thousand different fancies.
31. Both the luminaries afflicted in watery or airy Signs bring to the Native an unremeable gout.
The $\mathbb{C}$ in $\delta$ of the Pleiades and a of $\delta^{7}$ from an angle, denotes great defects in the eyes, if not blindness; the same if the lyminaries are afflicted of the infortunes, or in 8 from angles.
33. He that hath any of the fiery Signs accending, and the Lord of the ascendant in the 10 h House, will be always aiming at things beyond the capacity of his birth or present fortune let it be what it will.
3.4. He that is born exactly upon a new or full Moon, lives but a short time, if at all, unless the $\mathbb{C}$ have great latitude; for that may sometimes make the $\sigma$ or 88 or 9 degrees distant.
35. Sometimes the inferior Planets shall denote greater honour and fame to the Native than the superiors; but then it shall not be of so long continuance.

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36. Virgo ascepding generally makes ingenions persons, unless $\succcurlyeq$ who is Lord thereof be in $\neq$ or $f$; then the Native is confident without reason, and will pretend to things be understauds not.
37. Fortunate Planets in the gth House makes famous churchmen and lawyers, the same if the bencvolents $\Delta$ the Lord of the 9 th.
38. Saturn in an airy Sign in the ascendant, in good aspect of the or $\boldsymbol{\gamma}$, makes learned and-famous divines, sucis that will acquaint themselves with many languages.
39. He that hath $b$ or $\sigma^{\circ}$ in the 9 th and the 8 in the ascendant, will prove a mad fellow either to make a Pope or parish priest of:
40. Mercury and $q$ in $\delta$, in an aërial Sign in the ascendant, in $\Delta$ to $\psi$ in the 9 th, makes the greatest acholars and the most learned critics.
41. Those divines are the very top and authority of their profeasion that have many Planete in the 9 th House.
42. The Lord of the 10th in the 12 tb , and lord of the 121 l in the ascendant, are certain arguments of imprisonment and restraint ; the same if the lord of the ascendant is in the 12 th.
43. If $\not \subset$ be Lord of the 6 th , and aflicted of the infortutges or combust of the $\mathcal{O}$, the Native has some defect in his speech, if $\zeta$ has dignities in the 12 th and is thus afficted he has some defects in the ears.
44. Mercury in $\Phi$, retrograde, in $\square$ to $\delta$ and $\psi$, and they in 8 to each other in the nativity of a divine, makes a great enthusiast.
45. Jupiter or $q$ in the ascendant or the 10th House,

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free from affliction of the infortunos, maker-just and upright persons.
46. Those persons that have $\mathcal{B}, M$, or $\mathcal{X}$ 'asconding is their nativities, and $\gamma$ afflicted by $\zeta$ or $9 \%$, they elther apenk not at all, or else have very great impediment in their spoech; if $\delta^{\circ}$ afflicts $\not \subset$ in such a geniture, the Native stmamerevery much.
47. If Signs of voice ascend in a Nativity as II, 呗, $\bumpeq$, $\ddagger$, or $\approx$, and $¥$ be free from affliction, the Native is of excellent speech, and of a graceful clocution.
48. The $\odot$ or $\mathbb{C}$ in via lactea, afflicted with the ${ }^{-} d, \square$, or 8 of $b$ aud $\delta$, or with nebulous Stars, portende blinat ness, if both luminaries be afflicted; if the $O$ only be' afflicted, it is the right eje; if the $\mathbb{A}$, the left ; the same if the ( be in $\delta, \mathrm{n}$, or 8 with 0 or $b$ and with nebulous Stars, or if $O$ be in $\delta$ with $\sigma^{t}$ in the 8th.
49. The (in $\delta$ of $h$, in an earthy Sign, and an oarthy Sign asceading, makes excoeding melascholy persons amd such as believe they see visions.
30. Ho that hath the in $r$, it 8 to $\%$, and the $\%$ upon the ascendant, will be a promoter of lies and dexcits.
51. If $h, \delta^{\prime}$, or the 8 , be in the third Hense; or in $\delta$,口, or 8 of the Lord of the 3rd, the Native losesby travel, and will always be in danger of thieves or robbers upon the highway; and have many evil neighbours.
52. The $\mathcal{O}$ and $\delta$ in the 2nd, in their digrities, give the Native an estate; but procure him ways to waste it : unfortunate there, he will not have much to be prodigal of, without other very remarkable assintance.
53. An Infortune in the. 2 nd , strong, an estate may con-

tinue, but with great difficulty; if weak, it will come to nothing : but if a Fortune be there, the Native's estate will be firma.
54. If many Planets be strong, and essentially fortified, especially $h, 4$, and $\delta$, or $\mathcal{O}$, the Native will crijoy a manifest and ample fortune, live nobly, and in great esteem, above the ordinar; quality of his birth, managing the actions of bis whole life with glory and success; and this judgment will be more confirmed. if more or all the Planets be essentially fortified at the same time.
55. If most of the Planets are in their detriment or fall, peregrine, cadent, retrograde, afflicted, or combust, the Native is then continually involved in a thousand misfortunes, one upon the beels of another, and his whole life is nothing bu: a vale of misery. But a mediocrity of testimonies shew a various inconstant fortune, sometimes miserable, sometimes extremely happy, according to the times of evil or good directions.
56. The greater are the dignities of the Planets in any Nativity, the more splendid and glorious is the Native's honour and fortune; the greater their debilities, the more obscure will be his.
57. A continued series of good directions, makes a bad Nativity sometimes very good, but they will not continue it so to the end.
58. A grand configuration of the Planets in the sth House upon good directions unto them, the Native gains much by the wills and legacies of deceased persons.
59. Fortunate Planets dignified in the lith House, denotes many great and poserfal friends; unfortunate ones there debilitated, declare few and failbless.

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60. Venus and posited in the roth Honse, either in the House of $\delta$ or $\wp$, makes the Native exceedingly emiuent in arts and sciences.
61. The © in reception and $\Delta$ of $\%$, gives 8 giod understanding, and makes the Native able to overturn the argaments of most men.
62. Saturn and ${ }^{t}$ in 8 from the equinoctial Signe makes a great Tyrant ; and if they shall be in $\square$ of $\%$, he will be an observer of law and religion for his own ends.
63. The lord of the 11th stronger than the lord of the 7 th, denotes the friends and assistants of the Native to be nore consilerable and powerful than his adversaries.
64. The Lord of the Ascendant and 3rd House, in good aspect, or mutual reception, shews concord among bretbren, kiidred and neighbours, but if in evil aspect the contrary.
65. The returns of the superior Planets to their radical places in any revolution, portend a fatal year ; chiefly if attended by an evil direction.
66. The Lord of the Ascendant of the radix in of with the Lord of the 8th of the revolution, in the 8th, is very dangerous to the life of the Native.
67. When the sign of the 6th House of the radix ascends in a revolution, and the Lord of the 6 th is posited in the 4 th, it is a dangerous year to the life of the Native, especislly if an ill direction be operating.
68. Some persons attain to great honour and dignity who have had bad Genitures, but then they must sympathize with the nativities of their raisers.
69. The greatest sympathy that can be in any two Nativi-

77. Saturn in one man's Nativity upon the Ascesdank of another's, is an abeolute teken of hatred, and the latter ahall be the injured persocm
72. The $\odot$ and $\mathbb{C}$ in $\delta$ of $\zeta$ in a tropical Sign; gives the Native large intalloctual abilition
73. in cither of the Hounes of $\mathbf{b}$, gives a mon excelleat undomanding: and if he shall bein $\psi$ or $\Delta$, or peecption of $h_{h}$, the Native will be admeived for his ingonnity.
24. The Head of Algot in tho M6idHeoven, and the $\mathbb{C}$ in the 12 th in I therennto, portends lows of honour and nonown, if net (at hact) doenth in prison.
75. All the Phmets in o Nativity out of their cosemtind dignities, dechere obecure persons ; which if thoy happeat to attain to any degree of preferment they mover long onjoy it.
76. Violent fived Stars upon the caspe of the MidHearen and the Lord thereof poited mang rock, denceres a viokeat catrarrephy of the Native's hosous and fame.
77. Directions to the bodise, or aspecta of Plisetia in the doncoeding part of Heaven, although they denote the greaten happipens imuginable, yet it in not lowg darable.
79. Those persons that bave crowde of Phwets in angles, have at some time or other of their lives, prodigious seccess

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or detriment, according to the nature of the directions that shall occur.
79. He who hath $b$ Lord of the 7 th in his Nativity, never marrieth until he is past the 30th year of his age, unless it so happen that $\psi$ or 9 be upon the Horescope, or in good aspect of the $\mathbb{C}$ in his Nativity.
80. A fortunate Planet in the 8th House, always portend a natural Death.
81. The Lord of the 8th posited in the 10th House declares death to the Native by sentence of a Judge, particulariy if unfortunate therein.
82. The $\mathcal{O}$, , or Mediam Cali directed to the $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\psi$ or 9 , the Native if capable generally marries.
-83 The $d$ in via Combusta, and the $\mathcal{O}$ in via Lactea, denotes great danger to the eyes; if the unfortunate Planets shall be in the Ascendant or in 8 thereunto, it presageth blindness.
84. In the Nativities of Children, (I mean in such as are vital) the Asc. or $\odot$ to the body of $\sigma$, produces the smallpox and measles; in grown Men, the plague or pestilential fever; and in elderly persons, Death.
85. Mercury in the House of $\delta^{\circ}$ in good aspect of the $\mathbb{C}$, and the Lord of the Ascendant gives a good understanding.
86. The Ascendant or either of the Luminaries (as either shall be Hyleg) directed to the $\delta, \square$ or 8 of $h$, and the direction falling in $\gamma$, $\boldsymbol{\sigma}$, or $\Omega$, the Native seldom escapes death ; because those Sigus represent the most vital part in a Man's body ; and 3 in the opposite Signs, hath most power to do mischief.
87. In a Woman's Nativity, the Lord of the 7th being

90. The $\odot$ and $\delta$ in the A scendant in aërial or fiery Signs makes proud and prodigal persons; and suef as conceit themselven to be more than they are.
91. Mars in 8 to the Ascendant, and $b$ in the same aspect of the $\mathbb{O}$, makes an absolute knave and treacherous person.
92. If $h$ or $\delta$ be peregrine in the 3rd, or 80 be there, the Native and his kindred will be at perpetual variance, and by them he will receive many crosect and losecs.
93. The © ingood aspeet of the Lord of the Mid-Heaven, and the Lord of the Ascendent, makes the Native eminently honoured and esteemed.
94. $\&$ in the Ascendent and $\$$ Lond thareof in reception of her, demotes aj just, honent, and fair conditioned persodr
94. Planete squaring and opposing each other from angles and cardinal Sigme, dealare great misfortunes to the persons theniborm, in their life time; andat last die a violent Death.
96. In a Geniture of short life the Acceadent, $\odot$, of C directed to the 99 , is killing.

97 If in moctarnal Nativity, 3 . chall be posited: in the 8th House; it betokensa wiolent denth.
90. Dircetiens of the Mid- Heaver to promitton nower hill, but in that nativity which portaridma miolent death.

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99. The $\odot$ or $\mathbb{C}$ in $\cap$ or 8 of $h$ or $\delta^{\top}$ from: angles, portend a prejudice to the Native's sight.
100. 4,9 , or 8 in the 5 th, in a fruitful Sign, declares many children to the Native; if the $\mathbb{C}$ be in a good aspect with them there, she increases the number.
101. Saturn in 8 to 4 or 9 , deatroys the children or issue of the Native; let them be never so numerons.
102. The aspects of the fixed Stars are to be considered in general positions or directions, as wefl as the afpects of the Planets.

103 Professors may easily miss of the measure of time in directions, if they shall omit the consideration of eminent transits; for good and bad directions may be both antucipated and continued, as happy or unfortunate tranats oecur.

Excellent Aphorisms for guiding the Judgment on Marriage.

1 You are to consider with judgment all the Significators of marriage, namely, the 7 th house, its Lord, and Planet posited in the 7 th, how they are affected, principally the and $\mathcal{Q}$, if both these Planets be in barren Signs, viz. II $\Omega$ m, and also in cadent Houses, viz. 6th, 9th, 12th, or even in the 8th, these testimonies import either a aingle life, or an averseness to marriage.

If the Significators, but especially the © and 9 ; are not so constituted; see then, if either of them is weak or little fortified, conjoined to $h$. he being very potent, $\&$ herself alone, not having the support of any Planet by a good an-
pect, and if you find the $\mathbb{C}$ posited in a barren Sign, or cadent House, or extremely afflicted; these are arguments of no marriage, nor any deaire thereto. But in this judgment you must always understand ${ }^{\text {t }}$ hat $b$ ought to be very strong; for if $q$ and the $\mathbb{C}$ be more fortified than $h$, then the preceding judgment holds not true.

So when in a nativity you find $\cdot \mathrm{h}$ more elevated than either the $\mathbb{C}$ or $\mathcal{Q}$, and no Planet astiating either of them, you may judge the Native's inclination for a single Life.
$\bar{Y}$ ou must remember that the other significators of marriage are also to be examined, viz. whether they be in barren Signs, or cadent Houses, or much afflicted, and in $\delta$ with $\boldsymbol{h}$, and he well fortified; for if the testimonies of these significaters agree with the affliction of the © and $\%$, without doubt the Native will then never marry.

The $\mathbb{C}$ in $m$, in $a$ of $h$, he in $\Omega$ or $ర$; $\mathbb{C}$ comburt of the $\mathcal{O}$, and in $\square$ or 8 to $h$, if she is in $v f, \ldots$, or $\bumpeq$, the Native never marries.

The $\square$ or 8 of 9 . and $h$ helps much to a single life; the © as well as $q$ being in a barren Sign, and cadent House, and some of the other Significators either unhappily placed in bad Houses or unfruitful Sigab.

## TEE TEBTIMONIBS OR MARRIAGE ARE THESE.

The Sign of the 7 th. a prolific Sign
The Lerd-thereof fortunate, or a benevolent Planet in the 7 th.

The $\mathbb{C}$ and $Q$ in fruifful Signs, and in the 1st, 5th, 10th, or 11 th Houses.
The Lord of the ascendant applying to the Lord of the 7 th,

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-there being also equal reception between them, the Natire ,will denire marriage, and when you find these configurations or the greater part concurring, they are sufficient arguments the Native will marry, \&c.

To know whether the Native will obtain his Wife with ease, or'much difficulty, you mast consider all the qualities of the Gignificators of marriage, wherein if gou find the greater part of them fortunate Planets, or well fortified, be shall then easily obtain his Wife ; if they be weak, and are signified by the Infortunes, then not. withont labour and dif ficulty : but if they be all imbecile and ill affected, then sall he make love unto many, and be as of deluded, and in conclusion have much difficulty in procuring a Wife : in whove nativity 8 is not in some good appect with $\delta^{7}$, that party shall suffer many inconveniences in his loves or affectione

Again, the nature of the Siguificators is to be comsidered, for the benevolent Planets do promise happy aucoess ; the greater happiness the atronger they are. The malevolent, usually much labour, although they are very powefful. I have over observed, that when'h and 8 are in 8 out of the 1st. and 7th. Houses, or when $b$ slone hath been near the Cusp of the 7 th, or when $q$ hath betn in $\Omega$ or $m$, and not in aspect of $\delta$, or when $\delta$ hath been in $\gamma$. 呗 o: vp in the 7 th, whether in appectito $q$ on, not, that the Native had entraordinary dificiculty to procure 2 Wife, and mapried at fat upon a sudden, but yet prone to Women.

## THE TIME OP MARRIAGE:

If all the Significators of Marriage, or the greater part, and amongst there the $\mathbb{d}$ is oriental of the $\mathcal{O}$, and in oriental quarters of Heaven, viz. 10th, 11 th, 12th, 4 th, 5th and 6 th Houses, then the Native shall marry in youth, or after his more mature years shall espouse a young Woman.
It the Significators be occidental of the $\mathcal{O}$, and in occidental quarters of Heaven, viz. 9th, $8 \mathrm{th}, 7 \mathrm{th}, 1 \mathrm{st}$, 2nd, and 3ril, he shall either then very late contract matrimony, or else in his youth marry a Widow, or one very aged.
Besides this, observe the motion of the Significators, for if thry be direct and swift in motion, they declare marriags in youth : but if they be retrograde, slow in motion, or stationary, they prolong the time.
The more special time is best adjudged from the directions of the degree of the 7th House, or Lord thereof, or of the ( or $q$ to the degree, or to the Lond of the Ascendant : the time of marriage is better discovened in my judgment, by directions of the Mid heaven to the $\delta, *, \square$, or $\Delta$ of 9 , if she was etrong in- ue Radix, or to the anme aspects with the $\mathbb{Q}$; or by directigin of the $\odot$. direct and converse to the bo$\mathrm{dy}, *, \square$, or $\Delta$ of $\mathbb{Q}$ or $q$; or by direction of $\mathbb{Q}$ to any of the premised aspects of the $\mathcal{O}_{\mathrm{o}}$ or $\boldsymbol{\delta}^{*}$ : if the $\mathbb{C}$ is directed to a $\square$ or 8 of the $\odot$ or $\delta$, see if it does not fall in the terms of a fortune, for if not, the direction will be of:ng farce; also either the Mil hearen, or $\Theta$, or © directed to 恠 $*$, or $\triangle$ of the Lord of the 7 th, or a fortunate Planet in $t \mathrm{~h} \boldsymbol{7} \mathrm{th}$, d notes the time of Marriage.

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## testimonies op the núgber of wives.

If all the Significators of marriage be in watery Signs, which we usually term fruifful, for the most part they note many Wives, or more than one ; the contrary, if posited in II. $\Omega$, or 吸.
Among all the Significators the © and 9 give the most evident testimonies, as having most power in Men's marriages; so that either the © in the 7 th , in any Sign whatever, gives more than ove Wife, unless she is extremely afflicted of h or the $\mathcal{\odot}$ : I must confess I never knew that the Native failed of having a plurality of female friends, (alias; a cuacobine, or two) when the $\mathbb{C}$ was in the $\overline{7}$ th, but not always two Wives except'she was potent.

The © coryoined to one Plarret only, whether by platick or partile aspect, denotes only one wife: where observe, when she is thas joined to only one Planet, andis more strony than the Planet wittr whom she is in aspect, the man outlives his Wife; but if the Planet to whom the © is joined is more powerful than the $\mathbb{C}$, the Fíusband dies before the Wife.

If the $\mathbb{}$ © is bodily joined to no Planet, consider how many Plavets, and they direct and free from combestion, and not in their detriment or fall, do behold her with a partile aspect, but so as $\mathbb{C}$ apply to them, and not they to her, (the © bere is not considerable) from thence you may conjecture of the number of Wives; you must consider the quality of the Signs wherein the Planets are that aspect the d, for fruitful. Signs double the number.
If no such things appear as before-mentioned, consider how manyPlanets, direct and free from combustion, or the $\boldsymbol{\mathcal { O }}$.

beaps, are constituted between the Mid-heaven and ?, making progress tron the Mid-heaven towards the Ascenlant, and so many Wives shall the Native have.

If those Planets so posited between the Mid-heaven and $P$ shall suffer by retrogradation or combustion, and yet be in their easential dignities, viz. cither House or exaltation, or in mutual reception of such dignities, then you may account those Pianets in the number, for Significators of a Wife or Wives.

When these rules hold not, or use cannot be made of them, observe how many Planets behold the Lord of the 7 th, with ${ }^{\text {. }}$ a partile aspect, whether they be retrograde or combust, and from thence determine the number of Wives.

The best approved method I have hitherto found by experience is this; consider how many Planets there are in the Sign the ( is in, she applying to them, and not separated, so many Wives the Native may expect; if no such bodily pren sence be, observe how many Planets, having dignities in the Sign she is in, do behold her with a partile aspect, so many Wives may be hoped for, \&c.

Observe this general rule about Wives, if the Significators be weak, they argue Sweet-hearts and Wenches, or such as he miy woo for Wives, rather than marriage itself: again, if the $\mathbb{C}$ apply to a Planet in a common Sign, it argues two Wives : If she be in a fruitful S:gn, and apply to a Planet in a fruitful or bicorporal Sign, it argues three Wives: if together with this aphorism, the Sign of the 7 th be prolific, and the Lord of the 7 th in a common or fruitful Sign, it is then without dispute the Native will have three Wives.

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> To know from zobence or what Quarter the Nutive shall bave bis Wiff, observe lbe following Rules.

The Significators of Marriage in the gih or 3rd House, or else peregrine, having no essential dignities, portend the Native shall marry a stranger, and not one born in the same county or country he himself was born in.

The Lord of the 7 th in the 9 h, or Lord of the ght in the 7 h , intimates he marries one not born near his own country or place where his own birch was: yet she will prove a reigious, rich and virtuous wife, especially if the significator be benevolent and well forified: $q$ Lady of the $9 t h$, in the 1st or 10h, gives a wife born in another country.

b mixing his aspect with 9 , increases Jicentiousness, filthiness, immodesty; $\psi$ fairness, cleanliness, modesty; $\underset{\text { b }}{ }$ varies many times for good on evil, as digalfied or unfortunate.

The richos attending the wife, or accruing by her portion mast be considered from those Planets whon I specified before, viz. who did behold the © by any good aspect, or were in $\delta$ with her ; for if those Planets be benovelent, and es* sentially fortified, they declare: a rich and wealthy'wife, well descended, \&sc.; if they be : mulevolent Planets and ill dignified, they argue the contrary.

But I must here oive you this general cantion, viz. that you consider the quality and birth of the Native, before you

rachly pronownas a noiste wife, or one well desceaded, for lot us admit I have abeggar's Nutivity to calculate, and that he bath $\psi$ in $\boldsymbol{j}$; free from all manner of impediment, to aigaify the wife be shall marry, I shall then describe the person of $\psi$ and his conditions, but I wiil not say she shaH be npble or gloriously born', but will frame this jadgment, that be shall marry a Wife so qualificd, sc. but one well doscended, as unto his condition, perraps she may be daughter of songe trodesman or farmer, 8 sc . and this unto bim, is as if sie was nobly bivi, considering the difference between a beggar and a farmer, and as whereas being signified by 2 , che ought to be rich, \&e. without doubt a Wife so signified, shall liave some pretty portios from her parents and friends, and shall raise this poor man aud beggar by this her marriage, to a better kind of living or subsistence, for the artist must not prediet impossibilities, but to every one Quad cupax, Efc.

It must be reraembered that this judgment of Lilly's in the description of the Wife will only, hold good in some cases, for sometimes I have found that neitler the Sign on the Gusp of the 7 th House, it's Lord, or Planet posited herein, will describe the person of the Wife, but have prefered bat Planet who dispoies of the Lord of the 7 th, eapecially if it happens to be the $\mathbb{C}$ or $Q$, all which must be considered, and guide every judicious artist in his judgment.

But to return.-Generally, the Fortunes, or either of them in the 7 ih , especially if strong, argue a wealiby Wife and well descented : aalevolent Planets in that House denote much trouble, if they be potent, perhaps the Wife may be rich, but withall ill couditionce.

The Lord of the $12 t h$ in the 7th, or Lord of the 7th in the 12th usually predicts a poor Wifc, ill-bred and of obscure parents.

The Lord of the 7th in the 10th, or the Lord of the 10th in the 7th, promises a goad Wife.

Tbe Lord of the 2nd in the 7th, or Loord of the 7th in the 2nd, promises the same.

## sians of a good wiff.

The happy aspect of $\psi$ to 9 or (, with reception, in dignities equivalent, shews a wealthy Wife, and marriagt with a person of great birth.

The Lord of the 7th in the 7 th, gives an honest simple Wife.

The Lord of the 7 th in the 8th if he be a fortune, argues a rich Wife, and born to have an inheritance very ample.

Royal fixed Starn of first magnitude, near the Cusp of the 7 th, if the Cusp thereof be also fortunate, these teatimonies argue a rich and good dispocitioned Wife.

## AIGNS OF ILL FORTUNE EY A WIFE.

Malignant Planeis in the 7th very itrong, denotes riches with a wife, but not attainable witboet some scandal or trouble.
The Infortunes much debilitated in the 7th, denotes Wives, or a Wife very poor, of an abject and sordid condition and birth.

The Lord of the 7th in the 6th or 12th, or on the contrary, the Lord of the 6 th or 12 th in the 7 th, shews the Wife to be either a servant, or very poorly born.

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It's not good for the Native that either hor or be in the 7 th unleas the Eortunea aspect them, and be not cadent from the House, for 5 causes sorrow and travel in the matter of nearriage, and $\delta^{\prime}$ shows their death and desiruction before the Native:
Venus in $口$ or $\&$ of. esignifies prejndice by manriage.
Venus in the 2nd, in an evil aspeet of the malemolent Planets declares detriment by reason of the Wife.

The © Lady of the 7th and posited in the 8th, decreasing in light denies any great felicity ian marriage.

## CONCORD AND DISAGREEMENT.

To kuow the matagl loye and concord between Mun and Wife you must consider the Planet or Planets shewing. the number of Wives, whether they be Fortupes, and behold the ( with a friendly aspoct ; if $\mathbf{3 0}$, thay do doclare much love, sweet seciety, and that perpetual : good-will shallicontinually be between. them. But if they be malevolent by, nature, and have a $\square$ or 8 to $\mathbb{C}$, theag will fall out upon every, slight $\mathcal{O C}_{\boldsymbol{c}}$ casion, nor will there be ever any perfect unity between them.

If a benevolent planet aspect the © with an evil aspect, the Native, and hise Wifo shall ther aeree, bat modenately, yet in mpre, thipge thers will taccorid

If a malevolent Planet have a frienily aspect to the (s, they will agree but indifferent)fy, and will be subject to dise agree in most, things, for arp, the eqid aupept of, the Fortance hurt but little, so the benevolent aspect of the Infortupen: tende to ill.

What I have asid of the gopd ofy evil appoderint this matter
 to any of the other Significatars.

The most assured means to know the agreement or disagreement of Man and Wife is, by comparing their Genitures logether, if they can be procured; wherin if you find the $\odot$ in the Wite's Geniture, to be the Sign and degree the (was in, in the Man's; or if the $\mathbb{d}$ in the Wife's is the place of the © in the Man's, it is a very good Sign of unity and concord.
Or if the Significators of marriage are in $*$ or $\Delta$, they shew unity and affection: and so contrary aspects, contrary affections.

Grod Planets beholding the or Lord of the 7th with a $\Delta$, argues concord.

9 with $h$ beholding $\delta$, there will arise jealousies between the Nitive and his wife.

8 in the 12 th, designs but ill-marriage; if $\%$ be also in the 12th the wife brings but little fortune.

8 when she is in ill arpect with the $\mathbb{C}$ or the infortanes, shews dimention between man and wife by reason of lasciviousness, \&c.
The significators of marriage in moreable Signs, argues instability in mariage, por doth any great content arise from thence.
$\hat{f}$ in a moveable sign, argues an inconstant man in affection, nor will he be content with one woman, especially if the $\mathbb{C}$ or she be in of or $v$ : $q$ in a common Sign, argues delight in Marriage.
If the Lord of the Ascendant be in a common Sign, and $\$$ unfortunate, the Native will not be content with one Woman. If the $($ beholds the $\mathcal{O}$ with a gond aspect, toth of them :n humane Signs, and one of the Fortune's aspect einher

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er or both of them, the Native and his Wife will agree well; if the aspects betweep the $\odot$ and $\mathbb{C}$ be evil, and an Infortune have a $\square$ or 8 to one or both they perpexually disagree. The $\$$ decreasing in light, and ip $\phi$ of $\sigma^{2}$ in a moveable Sign, tho Native's Wife never truly loved himo, but same other Man.

Or if the \& be Lady of the 7 th, and decreasing in light and be plaped in the eighth, the Native will receive no feticity in matriwony.

Whethen a man or mis wife shall die finst.
$\mathrm{I}_{\mathrm{t}}$ is of the utmpbst importance, to know whether the Native or his Wife shall die first, and in this judgment you must llave respect to the significalors of the Wife or Lord of the $\bar{z}$ th, House, if these be afficted by the Infortunes, or posited in cadent Houses, especially in the socond, which is spposite io the eighth, it denates the. desth of the Wife, or long aud tedious Infirmities.

The 8 onif conjoiped to one Plaket, and so signifying put.pae, Wife, if she be more fortificed than the: Planst she is with, the Wife dies first; if the Planet be better fortified than the $\mathbb{K}$, the Man dies first.

The $\mathbb{C}$ in the fourth, the Native's Wife or Wivo's dies first.

When the $\mathbb{C}$ is separated from $\delta$, and applies to $q$ in the west, or occidental part of Heaven, the Nat ive shall have many Wives, bat they shaill die before him. .

The © and $P$ in $\delta$ with $b$ in the neventh, argue the death of the Wife, and much ado to obtain ones.

$q$ in the fourth, in evil aspect of $h$ and $\delta$, argue the death of the Wifto: if therein she be in a moveable Sign, the Native will have many Wives, but they will die before him.

The $\mathbb{d}$ in the seventh, in ill aspect of the Lnfortunes, without he assistance of $\Psi$ or $\mathcal{F}$, the Wife dieth iirst.
$\rho$ being oceidental of the $\odot$, peregrine, conjunct to the Infortunes, or in $\square 1$ or $\&$ of thein, signify the Wife will live but a short space. 8 in $\delta$ with $\delta$, in the 12th, denotes the Native will be a knave to his Wife, and use her hasely.

One of the Infortunes in the seventh or fourth, the Native shall bury his Wife,

The Infortunes peregrine in the serenth, baving dominion therein, declares the Native shall see the death of his Ene mies and Wiver.

The Lord of the fourth combust or cadent, the Native's Wives dies before him.

The Lord of the 7 th unfortunate in the sth, denotes the same.

Marriages of Women are materially different to those of Men's, for their Significator's are the $\odot$ and $\delta^{\circ}$, the 7 th House and Lord thrreof, and the Planet or Planets in the 7th.

From the disposition of these Significators, their quality and prosition, we judge in the same mamer as Men's Nativities; accepting herein the © in the place of the $\mathbb{C}$, and $\$$ in the place of $Q$; and here we raust consider whether the Significators be barren or prolific, or are in double-bedied or fruitful signs;: whether the Significators be Fortunes or Infortaues, strong or weak.

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## THE TCETIMONIES OF MARAIAGE ARE THEBB.

If the Significator in a Woman's Nativity be fruiffol, atrong in fortunate Houses, and in good aspect of the Fortunes, they then promise Marriage : But if the Significator's be barren, placed in unfortunate Houses, weak and afficted of the malevalents, they argue no marriage: $\rho$ being occidental in the 7th House and $b$ in the 4 th in a Woman's Geniture, argue the Woman hath no great desire to marry, and that she is nothing delighted in venereous sports.
If the $\mathcal{O}$ and be in, masculine Signs, or in the same masculine quarter of Heaven, or in one and the same Sign, it being masculine, the Woman will be a Virago, will not care for Men, and if she chance to marry, will prove a re. fractory Wife.

The Significators applying to each other by benerolent ab pects, or being of themselves Fortuues, argues she marrict without difficulty, centrary aspects and Significators the contrary.

The Special time of Marriage is discerned by direction of the Mid heaven or $\odot$; the grueral time by the $\odot$, for if he be in oriental Quadrants, he denotes marriage in jouth cither to a young or old Man, or after their full age with a young Man: if the $\mathcal{C}$ be in an occidental Quarter, be notes it will be long tefore she marries, and then with an old Man.
The nember of husbands is taken from the pesition of the ©, who in a sign of one form, or in aspect with cre oriten tal Planet notes she will marry but one: The $\mathcal{C}$ in a sign of many forms or in aspect to many oritntal Planets, she" she will marry more than once.

The Sign of the 7 th, the Lord thereof and the $\mathcal{O}$ in $n$ common Sign, signify the woman shall bave two Hurbands; cither $\mathcal{\odot}$ or $\delta^{\top}$ in a double bodied Sign, signifies two Husbands: $Q$ in a common or tropical Sign, and her Dispositer also in such Signs, denotes more Husbands.

Again, look to how many Planets the $\mathcal{C}$ is joined corporally, in the Sign he is in at birth, partilly or platick, so many Husbands she will have. If the $\mathcal{\odot}$ is joined to no Planet by body, see how many Planets that have dignites in the Sign the $\odot$ is in, do behold the $\odot$, the $\odot$ applying to them, they not to him, so many Husbands the woman shall have.

## FROM WHENCE MAERY。

If the Significators be peregrine, the Husband will be a stranger ; or $\Phi$, in a woman's nativity, be in the 3rd, it denotes the zame.

## TO ENOW WHAT MAN上TE OF HU8BAND.

Take the Sign of the 7th to signify the shape of bis body, the Lord thereof his conditions ; with reference to the aspects the Lord of the 7th and the $O$ bave to the other Planete, and this $I$ ever found the most certain way; if the Husband is tobe Saturnine, describe, $b$, Bce. if $\psi$, then do so for bith, and $s 0$ in the rest.

But it must be remembered, in some cases I have found that neither the Sign of the 7th, its Lord or Planet positeal therein, will describe the Husband, but the Planet configurated with the Sun, or to which he applien, according to the Sign in which he is posited.

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If Rich, contrary to the rules of the Ancients I constantly observe this way, to examine the strength of the eighth House, the Lord thereof, and Planet or Planets posited therein, and according to their position and fortitade, so I judge; for if these Significators be strong, and free from malevolent aspects, they argue a rich Husband, and so on the contrary. If the Lord of the eighth be in his own House, and angular, I never fear the Husband's estate.

The agreement is discerned from the Significators of Marriage being in mutual reception, or in $*$ or $\Delta$ to one onother, or in good aspect with the Fortunes, they thes shew unity: contrary aspects, and the Significators in the 12th, 6th or sth, portend no concord.

## Apkorisms for determining Issue.

The © and $\underset{y}{ }$ in the 5th, and the Lord of the Sign and Signs wherein they are, free from all manner of impediment, denotes many Children.

Mercury being oriental, in goed aspect with the Fortunes, for then he participates of their nature, shews many Chrildren; but if occidental, and in configuration with the Infortndes, he then denotes Barrenness.

Luna in the 5th promises Chikfren, but if $万$ be therein in the same House, they will prove ill-conditioned.

If the Sign of the 5 th, sign wherein the Lord of the 5 th is, and sign ascending be prolifie, many Childrem are promised.

Venus in the ascendant, and $\psi$ in the 7 th; shews insure, and from them much good te the Parents.

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Jupiter in $\Delta$ to $\mathbb{\mathbb { C }}$, in humane or moist Signs, given Childrea.

Moon and $Q$ with $\psi$ in an angle, or in aapect from angles, signify many Calldren.

Venus and din the 5th House, especially in a fruitful Sign, give much Lssue, and declares the Children to prove well.
All the Planets in fruilful Signs, give abundance of Children.

Infortunes in the house of Children, therein unfortanate, if they be a little weak, the Native may have Children; if they be much afflicted or debilitatod they will not live; if greatly they foreshew sterility.
Venus in the ist or 7 th, in $\delta$ or 8 to $h$, or in any communicative dignities, i. e. he in her term, and she in his, or if $\zeta$ be in $\gamma$ and $q$ in vp, it argues Barrenness to men, and Abortion to women; or that what is produced, shall dic ere it has seen the light.

Saturn in the 5 th, and the $\odot$ in $\square$ to $\psi$, denies Issue.
If Sol, h, or $\delta$ rule the Ascendant, 5th and 11th; without some good aspect of the Fortunes, or if they are in the house of Children, and no Planet occupy that house, simply. they deny Children.

Sol with $\zeta$ and $\ddagger$ in the 11th or 5th, aspecting the $\mathbb{C}$, shew the Native will die without having Children, or if any be born they die suddenly.

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## Aphorisms shewing lhe Death of Issue.

Saturn and $\delta$ in the 5 th and 11 th, are arguments the Children of the Native shall not live long.

Sol having dominion in the 5th, joined to an Infortane, leaves not one Child alive.
Sol, h, snd ©, kills the Children.

Mars in 8 to 4 , either kills the children, or denotes an ill-death to them; so also doth 4 when in 8 to $h$, he then kills the greater part of them.

Mereury in the Ascendant, and $\zeta$ in the west, declares the Children will live but a short time.
The Lord of the 5th in the 8th, shews the Children will die before the Father.

The Lord of the 5th in $\delta$ with Infortunes, or with the Lord of the sth, or in evil aspect of the Infortunes, tills the Children, \&c.

Some short Rules for the making of Elections, upon several oecasions.

An Election is the choosing of a fit and proper time for the obtaining a thing promised, or for the beginning of any enterprize. In the performance of which we ought to consider the Party's Nativity, if it can be possibly obtained; for without it (as Mr. Coley saith, in his Clavis Astrologess Elimata, page 276) it is in vain for any person to constitute an Election; for in an ill Geniture no good Election can

be expected; for if the House from which the Election is reguired in the Person's Nativity, be unfortanated by the malevolent Planets, or the Lord thereof be weali or afflicted, although the Significators of the Figure in the Election be well posited, yet there is little hopes of good success in that Election.

As for example; we see that two Persons setling forward in a long Journey, or Sea Voyage, both at one and the same time, and consequently under the same position of the Heavens, and yet one hath good Success and a happy Journey or Voyage, the other an unfortunate one, or perhaps dies by the way. This must certainly be predicted from their Nativities, and not from the elected time of the undertaking their Voyages. These things teing considered, I proceed to that which I intend to write of Elections.

In the beginning of any enterprize, be sure to fortify the Moon, and that Planet which was Lord of the Ascendant and, if possibie, let either the Moon or Lord of the Ascendant, be posited in the Ascendant, in your Electional Figure. That is accounted a good Election, when that Sigo ascends which was posited on the Cusp of the Ascendant in the Person's Nativity ; provided it be not unfortunated by the prosence of molevolent Planets, or fixed Stars of their nature, or by the Dragon's Tail. If you would Elect a time for any thing of long continuauce, place a fixed Sign upon the Arcendant, provided that it was not. afflicted in the Person's Nativity, nor upon the Cusp of the 8th or 12th Houses. Be careful that you place not fixed Stars of a malevolent nature

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upon the Cusp of that House from which you intend to make your Election.
2. When you make an Election for receiving of Money, or any thing relating to the second House, fortify that Planet which was Lord of the Ascendant in the Nativity, and also Jupiter who is a natural Significator of Riches, \&c. and if possible, let either of them be placed in the 2nd, or in a good place of the Figure, free from combustion, or other afflictions, and in good aspect to the Fortunes that beheld the 2nd House or Lord thereof, by any good aspect in the Nativity.
3. In all things relating to the third House, especially for short Journies, fortify the Ascendant and its Lord, and the Moon and her Dispositor ; and also the Part of Fortune, and the third House, and the Lord thereof; and let Planets be placed in the third which were fortunate in the Nativity, or ingood aspect to-the Lord of the third in the Radix; and be careful that you place not those Plapets in the third which were Lord's of the 12th, 8th, or 7th, Houses in the Party's Nativity. Then you ought to consider what the Journey is intended for, whether to receive Money, to seek for some place of preferment, \&c. and fortify that House and Lord thereof, which is the Significator of the Business you go about.

When you make an Election concerning friendship between brothers, kindred, or neigbbours, \&c. let the Lord of the Ascendant in the Nativity be well fortified in the Election, and if you can, let him apply to some good aspect of the Lord of the third; or if the Lord of the Ascendant and Lord of the 3rd be in reception and well posited, it shews a good Election.

4. In Elections belonging to the 4th House, as concerning the buying or taking of a House, Lands, or Tenements, \&cyou are to fortify that Planet which was Lord of the th in the Geniture, and also the 4th House itself, together with the ©, and let her apply to a good aspect of the Significators.

If you constitute an election concerning hidden treasure, you ought first to view the Party's nativity, and consider if there be any probability of the Native being fortunate in finding bidden treasure; and if you find the Lord of the ascendant and Lord of the 41 h well posited in the Radix, and in good aspect to each other, it is an argument that the Native will be fortunate in finding hidden treasure ; and when you intend to search for it, fortify the Lord of the Ascendant and the $\mathbb{C}$, and the 4 th House and Lord thereof, and let them apply to some benevolent aspect ; also let the Infortunes be cadent, and the benevolent Planets posited in angles.
5. In Electons appertaining to the 5th House, viz. gam. ing, or speculating in the lottery, you are to fortify the Lord of the 5th in the Radix, and if you can, place the Sign of the 5th in the nativity upon the Cusp of the 2nd in the election; let $\psi$ or 9 behold the Cusp thereof, or be posited therein. Be careful that the ascendant and its Lord be no ways afflicted; and debilitate the 7 th House and its Lord, so much as you can.
6. In making Elections for taking of servants; fortify the (1, and let her be free from all aflictions, and let the Lord of the ascendant, or Lord of the 2nd in the Radix be in good as'pect to the Lord of the 6th; or let the fortunate Planets be posited in the 6th, provided they were Lords of good House ${ }^{5}$

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in the Genitare, or in good aspect to the Lord of the ascendand ; and let the $\mathbb{C}$ be posited in $ర, I I$, or .
7. In making Elections for marriages, fortify the ascendant the Lord therof, and the $\mathbb{C}$, and her Dispositer; and if you can, ket any fixed Sign ascend except $m$; place the $C$ in a fized Bign, and let her be in good aspect to $O$; but beware that the $\mathbb{C}$ be not afflicted by $\zeta$ or $\delta$, for that shews there will be bat litte love between them. If the $\mathbb{C}$ be in a fruitful bign it is an argument of many obidren; but in all marriages let the $\mathbb{C}$ be increasing in light, and free from combustion.
8. In Elections for receiving your Wife's portion, fortify the ascendant and Lord thersof, and let the Lord of the 8 th apply to any good aspect of the Lord of the ascendant, or Lord of the 2nd; and if they do not behold each other, let them be in mutual reception. But for settling an estate, or making of wills and testaments that they may continue long, let the $\mathbb{\&}$ be increasing in light, and slow in motion, and let the Lord of the ascendant and the $\mathbb{C}$ apply to $a *$ or $\Delta$ of $h$.
9. In Elections for taking long journies, concider if the gth House or Lord thereof were not afflicted in the Radiz; and let him be well fortified in the election, and froe from the malovolent beams of the Infortunes; and let the Lord of the 9th be in good aspect to the Lord of the ascendant, or posited in the ascendant in good aspect of the Fortunes.
10. In Elections appertaining to the 10th House, for sotting up any trade or profession, let the Cusp of the 10th House in the nativity be the ascendant in the election; fortify the Lord of the ascendant and the $\mathbb{Q}$, and be carcful that they be not afflicted by the Infortunes.

11. In Elections appertaining to the 1ith House, in enter ing into leagues of friendship, let the Lord of the 11th in the Radix be well posited in the electional Figure, and free from all afflictions; also fortify the $\mathbb{C}$, let her be strong in her essential dignities, and in good aspect to the fortunes.
12. In Elections for baying horses; or great cattle, let the Lord of the ascendant, and © be free from affictions, and in some of their essential dignities, and in good aspect to the Lord of the 12th in the Radix; also let him be fortified and free from afflictions.

Thescic rules being but rigbtly understood, theingenious Artist may from hence constitute an Election upon any occasion, and by these short rules discover many more.

Before I enter upon the management of Nativities, it will not be improper in this place, to give the rules, by which the Reader may be enabled to ascertain the kind of Person each Planet represents when significator in all or any of the twelve signs of the Zodiac. By the help of these, it is easy to determine what kind of person the new born babe will be when it arrives to the years of maturity; and we can also by the same means, as truly describe the stature, complexion, make, and disposition of a person we never saw, provided the true time of birth be previously known. These rules are therefore absolutely necessary to be well understood by every person who is desirous of calculating a Nativity.

## Brief Observations in forming Judgment from the Planet that is Lord of the Ascendant.

1. If no Planet aspect the Lord of the Ascendant, then judge by him, not considering the Sign he is in.
2. But if he be retrograde, or in his detriment, or fall, judge by the Sign he is in.
3. If the Lord of the Ascendant behold the Ascendant, judge by the Sign ascending.
4. Lastly, if two Planets aspect the Ascendant, take him that beholds it most partile, or he that is in bis own House before a Planet in his exaltation,

Note. These things are to be considered as well in the conditions and quatities of the mind, as in the description and make of the body.

It might here not be unentertaining to give the young Student an example whereby the Name of the Man or Wife may be found, to whom the Nutive shall be joined zilh in Marriage.

Some Profestors', have endeavoared to give a probable comjecture what Christian Name the Party enquired of is, whether man or woman. First they consider the Planet who is principal Significator of the Party enquired of, whether he be angular or no, and then whether he be in aspect (it matters not what aspect, good or evil) with any Planet or Planets; if he be in no aspect, then in whose Dignities he is, and from hence they make their mixture; for example, let us admit $\$$ to be Lord of the 7th, and Significator of a Maid's Lover, and be in aspect, or in the dignities of $\delta$, I shall then have recourse to the Table before, and there I find in the first line over against $\S$ and $\delta$ Matthew, I shall then say the Man's name is Matthew, or of a name equivalent in length, or the same number of letters: for my part I never use this way, nor yet have much credited it ; yet I believe, were it well practised, we might find out very pretty conclusions, and go near to find the very name, or somewhat near it,

Having given the young Learner the true description of the Ptanots in each of the twelve Signs, wogether with the Names, \&ec. it is trere tequisite he should well understand the nature and quality of the Signs and Planets, before any correet judgment can be given on a nativity, 1 have therefore introduced the following rules.

## The Nature and Quality of the Signs. PIERY 6RGNS.

Incline Men to be choleric, hasty, furious, quarrelsome, revengeful, proud, ambitious, importunate, hardy and rash;
involving themselves in many troubles and mistortabes；jet they are montly ingenious，but often．changing their．opinions ，and purnuits．

－Make men cowardly，lexurious，wanton，mantables，dubl and stuggish；with low，effeminate，whining roices，very timocous and fearful，having much deceit in them；they are noually pretty much given to the achoola and nurseries of Ve． nus，which often prove a great injury to them，and nomo times their total ruin．

## The Nature and Quality of the Planets．

The Luminaries are to be considered as more powerful and signifieant than the rest of the Planets；and therefore any of

the superiors in $\delta$ with the $O$ in $\Omega$, influences much power and hotrour to the Native by virtue of the 0, \&ce. So if $\overline{\mathrm{b}}$ be in $\sigma$ with 4 in $f$, the Honse of 4 , then $\xi$ acts in dependence to his diapositer. Any Planat strong in a good Houre, in of good signification, but much better if the Planet be a fertunate one by nature.

A malefic Planet wak in the 10th House, denies honour; if he beboods either the Cusp or the Lord thereof by any malevolent aspect, then many impediments or obstructions prejudice or hinder the Native's advancement. ठ' strong in the Mid-heaven, usually portends military preferment, digity, or profeaion.

- . $h_{i}$ or $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{\text {o }}$ strong in. a good Hoase of a Figure, are as discords in music, corrected to effect a concord or harmony in sounds; for being well affected, they cause a perfect good; though it be attended with difficult means or methods to accompany it.

An Infortune in $\delta$ with a fortunate Planet is either impeded or deprive 1 of the good signified ; for though the fortunate Planet be in his own House, yet he partakes something of the nature of the Malefic, with whom be is conjoined.

Three Planets or more in $\delta$, act jointly and severally according to their respective natures, and to their heavenly states, but principally according to the nature and state of the most strong and ruling Planet. If an Infortune, (especially $h$,) be placed between two Planets which are in $\sigma$, he prevents or retards the good promised by the other two Planets; the nature or kind thereof is discovered by the House of Heaven wherein such a congress is made.

Two Planets in reception, especially the Fortunes (as $\psi$ in $\approx$ the House of $q$, and 8 in $\ddagger$ the House of $\psi$ ) act or disperse their influence in a most amicable method, which being benevolent by nature, their virtues are the more powerful.

Many Planets in cardinal Signs in any Geniture, always effect some great things; if in one Honse, the Native receives or suffers an excess of good or evil, according to the nature of that House. The benevolent Planets $\psi, q$ and $y$ also, retrograde in any Nativity, is of eminent import, adding to the felicity of a Native, and this is the more powerful if they are applying to the $\delta$ of the Earth; but the retrogradation of $h$ or $\delta^{i}$ in angles, is ever attended with difficulties and unhappinesses, from which ponitions I shall always pray, libera nos Domine.

## The Art of Calculating Nativities in a plain and easy manner.

## what is a nativity ?

'A Nativity or Geniture is the exact moment of birth, or time of a Child's coming into the world: at this moment the Stars begin to act and operate in their iufluence upon their new born infant, by the power or intervention of those Angels who rule and govern the constellations then level with the Horizon, or that ascends upon the horoscope. St. Jerome in his comment upon the xuiiith Chapter of St. Mattiew, says, great is the dignity of souls, for ceery man from his first rising and appearing under the: Sires is his Nativity, hath 2n Angel delegated to him tor his Custody or Safety.

From these configurations we are ciibled to point ont the incidents of the Natives future dife, but it is necessary

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that the exact time of birth should be well ascertained, in order to be correct and certain in these speculations. It is well known that the celestial bodies are in perpetual motion, and therefore every quarter of an hour must considerably vary their position; as does also different parallels from any one given point of the Heavens; and tence it is that the latitude, as well as the true time of birth is absolutely necessary in calculating or bringing up the directions of a Nativity.

> Howo to rectify a Nativity ly the Animoder of Piolomy.

To rectify by the Animoder of Ptolons, erect the figure as near as possible to the estimate time of birth, and consider in what Sign, and in what degree of that Sign, the new Moon happened that last preceded the birth; or if a full Moon more nearly preceded the time of birth thein a naw one, then note the degree of the Sign whercin either of the Luminasies were posited, that were above the earth, but if one of the Luminaries be exactly rising and the other setting, prefer that which is rising. Then observe which of the Planets hath most dignities by House, exaltation, triplicity, term, or configuration, in the degree of such preceding new Moon, or in the degree of the Luminary above the earth, or that ascends at such preceding full Moon; and also what Sign and degree then ascends upon the Horizon, or that culminates or possesses the Cusp of the 10th House; and if the dogree of the Planet, dignified as above, be situated nearer the degree ascending, than to the degree culminating, place the same degree in number of the Sign ascending, up-

on the Cusp of the Ascendant, that such ruling Planet possessed of the Sign he was in. But on the contrary, if the Planet be nearer the degrees on the cusp of the 10th House or Medinm-coeli, than to the Ascendant, then the degree culminating, or posseasing the cusp of the mid-heaven, must be made the same with the degree the said Planet was in, and so according to the Sign and degree thus ascertained, mnst the other Houses of the figure be varied, and this will be the true time of the Native's birth. But if it should bappen that two Planets have equal dignities in the degrees aforesaid, prefer that which is posited nearest to the Ascendant. Dtolomy further observes that what Sign the Moon is in at the time of birth, is the very Sign which ascended at the conception; and again whatever Sign the Moon is in at conception, that or the opposite, will be the Sign ascending at birth.

> To rectify a Nativity by Mundane Parallels and Transits of the Planets on the Cusp of cilher of the Three Prime Angles.

The shortest, easiest and most simple way of rectifying a sativity, provided the estimate does not exceed two hours of the real, is as follows.

Having erected the figure to the estimate time, observe whether either of the Luminaries be posited in the centre of any one of either of the three prime angles, namely, the Ascendant, Medium-coeli, or 7 th House, or ncar them, and if so bring either of them to the cusp of the angle, and the degree and minute they were in, is the true time of birth;

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but if neither of these are found thus centrically posited, nor near the cusps of either of those angles, then bring them to a right parallel from anglas, and that will be the true time; ${ }^{1} f$ their positions will not admit of this, observe the two bene. fic Planets $\boldsymbol{\gamma}$ and $\hat{x}$, and note whether either of them are situated as above specified, namely in the centre of the angles or near them, or in a right parallel with either of the Luminaries, that is to say, with the $\odot$ by day, or the ( by night; and either of these brought to the cups as before, will give the true time of birth. So likewise either of the malefic Planets $h$ and $\delta$, if found posited in the centre of the angles or near their cusps, or in parallel to either of the Luminaries as above, will be the prorogator of life, and likewise shew the true time of birth by bringing either of them to the cusp of the angle as before mentioned, but these last positions are rarely if ever found in the schemes of grown persons nativilies, because their influences if not correcied by the rays of benevolent Planets, are of so destructive, tendency that they generally cut off life in a short time, either in infancy, or at least in the first stage of life, an example of this method of rectification may be seen in the following figure.

## General Effects produced by the Conjuntion of the

## Planets.

The $\delta$ of $\boldsymbol{\eta}$ and $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ shews inheritances of bouses and lands, possessions, and many wordly profits arising from cultivating the earth and tillage; if $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{\top}$ afflict not, nor the cvil beams of O. If $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ is significator the Native is mistrustful.

The $\delta$ of $h$ and $\delta$ foreshews much evil, the Natire will be afflicted and vezed, shall undergo many troubles, and go through great difficulties. If you would know the cause of the good or evil, you must consider the riouse in which the configuration happens, and what House the configurated $\mathrm{Pla}-$ nets are Lords of, and accordingly judge of the particular marter or accident, be it good or evil ; for things are much varied according to the various position and domination of the Planets, by which you must necessarily vary those judg. ments.

The $\sigma$ of $b$ and the $(\boldsymbol{\sigma}$ shews the loss of inheritance danger of houses being burnt, the Native likely to be cheated, to receive much detriment, and it may be, loose all and become poor; except a fortunate Planet be located in the 2nd House.

The $d$ of $b$ and 9 shews one libidinous, and that he shal ${ }_{!}$ narry a woman entirely of an opposite temper and disposi-

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tion to himself, get dishonour among women-kind, be unhappy in marriage, and lead by reason of his wife a very disconsolate life. If $q$ be significatrix she is much afflicted; but if $h$, than the conjunction is advantageous; and this is to be observed in all similar cases.

The $\delta$ of $\zeta$ and $\bar{\zeta}$, shews craft, subtilty and policy, that the Native will dive into many secret, deep and occult things, find out mysteries, be covetous and proud, mixed with a certain kind of gravity. If $b$ be significator the Native has a good elocution; but if $\underset{\text { g }}{ }$, he has a great impediment in his speech.

The $d$ of $h$ and shews one poor and obsure. If $\ddagger$ be significator, the man is changeable, seldom an hour in one mind, often doing things and then repenting of them again; but if $\mathbb{a}$ be significatrix, he is grave; cautious, malepart, ever wise and conceited, and for the most part wilful in all things.

The $\delta$ of $\psi$ and $\delta$, if $\psi$ be significator, makes the Native choleric, hasty, angry, proud, bold, presumptious and daring, gives him some martial command, and glory and re. nown in warlike undertakings; but if $\delta$ be significator it makes him milder, religious, good, just, gives him preferment in the law, or he becomes a priest, deacon, bishop, or other dignitary in the church. -

The $d$ of $\psi$ and $\mathcal{\odot}$, if $\psi$ be significator, he afflicts the Native severely, casts him into a deep melancholy or dispair, seizes him with a fever or frenzy, brings the body to a consumption, and afflicts the estate with considerable loss, even to his utter ruin and destruction ; yet when by direction $\boldsymbol{q}$

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frecs bimself from the $\odot$ 's beams; these evils will cease; but if the $\odot$ be significator, he so debilitates $\psi$ that the configuration can promise nothing ; yet it makes the Native religious.

The $\delta$ of $\psi$ and $q$, if $\psi$ be significator, the Native is superlatively happy (more especially if the $\sigma$ bappens in $\mathcal{H}$ the House of $\psi$ and exaltation of 9 ) he increases in wealth and substance, houour and glory, health of bedy and tranquility of mind, laving in general the love of women-kind; but if $q$ be significatrix, the Native has health, beauty and riches, attains to great honour aud renown, is truly virtuous, piops, and religious, and has generally ecclesiastical or jurisprudential preferment. This is one of the most happy, fortunate configurations that can be.
The $\delta$ of $\psi$ and $\forall$, if $\psi$ be significator, makes the Native virtuous, wise, religious, of great knowledge and of good elocution, makes a general scholar, and gives him the knowledge of most arts and sciences; he may prove to be the ambassador of a Prince, or sucb like ; but if $¥$ be significator, the Native is solid, serious, well disposed, and grave, pious, and religious, and probably may acquire a good estate by merchandise, or some ecclesiastical promotion.
The $\delta$ of $\psi$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $\psi$ be significator, the Native proves a traveller, probably beyond sea, he is generally of a changeable and mutable mind, and although naturally of a very good humour and condition, yet somtimes froward, pettish and peevish : if © be significatrix, it gives great riches and treasures, according to the Native's capacity or birth, makes him wise, prudent, religiene, and honourable; gives Lim the

The $\delta$ of $\delta$ and $\odot$ shews a hot and dry constitution, danger of short life, and death by hectic fevers, marasmus, or by fire or lightening, if $\partial$ be significator, the Native has the favour of Kings and Princes, and it may be their frowns too, to his utter undoing; be may rise hastily, but perhaps to a precipice: if the $\mathcal{O}$.be significator the Native proves valiant and warlike, attains some martial command or preferment, but if he goes into war he is killed in the battle, or at best comes of wounded, or with the loss of a limb.

The $\delta$ of $\delta$ and $?$, if $\delta$ be significator, the Native is given up to women, and retains the acquaintance of such as have an infamous life and conversation; he is gentle kind and courteous, and though sometimes hasty, yet of a good humour and disposition, so that his kindness is oftentimes his undoing; but if 9 be significatrix, the Native is lustful, lascivious, a fornicator, adulterer, given over to wicked and lewd courses, hasty, rash, prood, inconsiderate, quarrelsome, and running himself into many hazards, dangers, troubles and losses.

The $\delta$ of $\delta$ and $\psi$, if $\sigma$ is significator he makes the Na tive talkative, pragmatical, a smatterer in learning, a babbler and deceiver, yet industrious for the promotion of his own ends and designs, it gives no great preferment, he may be a knavish apparator, cheating pelty fogger, or pedantic pedagogue; but if $y$ be significator, the Native proves one of harsh manmers and conversation, of an ill life, a thief, felon, bighwayman, murderer, traitor, \&c.

The $\delta$ of $\delta$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $\sigma$ be significator, the Native is
of evil manners and infamous conversation; rises to no great preferment; but if it should so happen that the scale should turn, bis advance may be by means of some great lady ; but if the be significatrix, the Native is bold, rash, furious, edrenturous; quarrelsome, given to cruelty and base actions, may prove a thief, murderer or traitor; seldom lives long, for this position declares a short life, and that the Native may die a violent death by the means of fire, iron, a fall, blow, wound, or by the hands of the executioner.

The $\delta$ of $\odot$ and 9 , if $\odot$ be significator, it makes the manners of the Native soft and effeminate, yet he is born to glory, and to do and perform great actions; he obtains the loye. of women, but associates himself with such as are base, obscure, infamous and much below his rank and quality : if 9 is significatrix, it shews a short life, one viming at glory, but not attaining it ; the Native is hectic or consumptive, melancholy, meets with mauy crosses, losses and rexations, lives not out half his days.

The $\delta$ of $\odot$ and $\forall$, if $\odot$ be significator, the Native is endowed with wit, ingenuity, arts and sciences, understands haguages, and the power of words; and because $\%$ delights to be under the $\odot$ beams, not being thereby hurt as the other Planets, the Native has excellent elocution and proves a good. rbetorician and logician: if $\not \subset$ is significator, he exercises all his wit, craft and policy for the accomplishing of high matters and the attaining of great thingsy he becomes the favourite of a Kiug, Prince, or great man.

The $\delta$ of $\odot$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $\odot$ be significator, though he generally gives a great spirit, and aiming at magnificient things.

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yet this configuration gives only mean acquaintance, and the society of common people, makes him mutable and changeable, and his fortunes as unstable: if © be significatrix, the Native shall aim at noble things but not attain them, many crosses shall befall him, and his life shall be short.

The $\delta$ of $q$ and $\gamma$, if $q$ be significatrix, it gives a delicate beautiful boly, endowed with wit, ingenuity and elo--quence, makes the Native courteous, and complaisant, furnishes him with variety of arts and learning, and is a configuration of very good import; if $q$ be Lady of the 2nd it gives a good increase of fortune through merchandise, or the study $o^{c}$ arts and sciences : if $\not \subset$ be significator, it makes the Native an orator, furnishes him with courtship, soft and effeminate words, makes him pleasant in all company, gives him the society and love of women; and if $q$ be strong, of great ladies, in short it makes him exceedingly happy.

The $\delta$ of $q$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $\ell$ be significatrix, makes the $N_{2}-$ tive mutable and changeable, a mere Proteus, yet with a deal of p'easantness and satisfaction to others, it makes him of many' kords, a great promiser, but no performer; lofty, proud, conceited, and gives him profit by the sea, and all lunar and moist comodities : if the © be significatrix the Native is very effiminate and courtly, haviug a voluble tongue, free language and excellent discourse, inclined to the love of women, which if $I$ be strong, is only to such as are virtuous; delights in music, dancing and merry company, never thinking of sorrow, or laying any thing to heart.

The $\delta$ of $\Varangle$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $\not \subset$ is significator makes the Native travel into foreign countries, desirous to see new things, fashions and places; gives him favour and esteem among the

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ladies, and to bo in greít estimatation among the popularity, by means of whom herises to a good fortune and great prosperity in the world : if the $\mathbb{C}$ is significatrix, it makes the Native ingenious and-a lover of learning, seeking after the knowledge of most arts and sciences, chiefly the mathematics, geography' and navigation, by which be attains credit and repatation; he delights in journites and embassies, being of a mutable and ineonstant humour and disposition.

Gemeral Effects produced by the Sextile and Trine of the Plancls.

The $* \operatorname{and}^{\prime} \Delta$ of $b$ and $\psi$, if $h$ be significator, makes the Native wise, grave, sober, religious, and endows him with riches and treasures of this life, gives him the favour and acquaintance of the rich and great, or the Native becomes a merchant and gains considerably by it : if $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ is siguificator, the Native is more propense to melancholy, is inclined to dig and delight in the earth and follow lusbandry ; some estate, inheritance or houses may fall to him; and he may be pro. moted to some ecclesiastical dignity for his worth, learning, and virtue, bowever $\zeta$ shews cowardice.

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $h$ and $\delta^{*}$, if $h$ is significator, his natural slowness and wariness turns into rashness and boldness, yet with a kind of temerity, he runs into precipiate actions, and adventures ; it commonly gives martial preferment: if $\boldsymbol{\sigma}^{7}$ significator the rashness and daringness of disposition is much abated and the Native is guided by very deliberate councils; if be proves religious, (as such seldom do) he is an absolute Ge 3

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sectarian, following pertinaciously the sentiments of bis own mind; it shews an estate in land or legacies.

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $b$ and the $\odot$, if $b$ is significator, the Naive, has an austere countenance, light brown hair, large bones, not very fleshy, stoops a little in going, has a show of generosily and nobleness in his actions, but passionate and recking revenge, yet widiout any great courage or valour if put to the trial, he probably may attain preferment at court: if the $\odot$ is significator, the man is more corpulent, yet with a very decent body, and a full round face; given to boasting and ostentation, willful and conceited, yet without any kind of malice, scarcely injuring any but himself, by too much extravagant expence and prodigality.

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\zeta$ and $\xi$, if. $\zeta$ is significator the Native is comely, having brown hair, a delighter in women's company, wasting his patrimony upon the female sex, scarcely leaving any estate behind for his successors, given over to pleasure and voluptuousness : if $\rho$ is significatrix, the Na tive is modest, shamefaced, yet loving his belly well, very affable and courteous, and inclined to few vicious actions; gains by the dead, from ancient people, and from the fruits and profits of the earth; he has a good repute and conversation, and scarcely marries till after thirty years of age.
${ }^{-}$The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $b$ and $\not \subset$, if $\zeta$ is significator, the Native is conceited, full of whims, plots and contrivances, yet not often with effect, though carried on with a great deal of ingenuity; he loves curiosities, and is studious, subtil and reserved: if $\vartheta$ is significator the Native is peevish, discontented and dejected in his own mind, has strange fancies, and is very wilful, even sometimes to his own ruin; given to study

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arts and sciences and finding out many curious inventions.
The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $h$ and $\varangle$, if $h$ is significator the Native is wilful, very changeable of disposition, subject to jealousy and mistrust, if $h$ be well fortified the Native becomes popu$l_{a r}$ and gains much wealth and esumation by the commón people; he also gains the favour of some eminent lady, and becomes famous in his generation : if the \$ is significatrix, the Native is cold by nature, and of an ill complexion, inclinable to sordid and mean actions, yet deliberate, and if he does ill, does it with preconsideration; apt for invention, but very wilful in all things, conceited so that he thinks nothing well done but what he does himself.

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\psi$ and $\delta$, if $\psi$ is significator it shews one of a noble and free disposition, bold, valiant and honourable, attempting and attaining brave and honourable exploits, generous to his friends, obliging to his enemies, yet desiring and endeavouring to rule, he is also resolute and subtle: if d is significator, the Native is of large soul, chearful and merry, of a jovial disposition, active, courageous, pious and very just, enobled with valour, victory and virtue, one of good fame, obtaining the favour and good will of great and worthy persons.

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\psi$ and $\odot$, if $\psi$ is significator it shews a strong, tall, well proportioned body, of a fresh, ruddy coma plexion, a noble, generous, courageous soul, and of a magnanimous mind, attempting and atchieving great and honourable things; or becomes the favourite of some King, Prince, or great person, and rises to the top of preferment: if the © is siguificator the Native is born to honour and glory, and quod capax, arrives to the highest of all worldly felicities;

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he is a man of great spirit, performing beneficent and honourable actiont; as 4 endows him with a fund of treanure, so the liberab apirit of $O$ pakes him waste ir by his too greal generosity.

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ and $\mathcal{Y}$, if $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ is significator, gives a tall and compleat person, of a loving, pleasant, courteons disposition, kind to the female sex, of an exceeding good nature, and the patron of hospitality; it is the aspect of love, concoud, agreement, good fortune and riches, the Native is prefered and rises to honour : if $q$ be significatrix, the person is comely and lovely, one generously diaposed, aiming only: at things brave, honourabe, virtuous and good; it is the aspect of virtue and piety, of honour, preferment and vast fortune in the world, the Native has the acquaintarice of persons of the highest ecclesiastic order and probably attains the like preferment himself.

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\psi$ and $\psi$, if $\psi$ is significator, it shews a just, virtuous man, ingenious, and of a very sabtlo wit ; it is the aspect of eloquence, ingenuity and learning; the $\mathrm{Na}-$ tive is affable, courteons, kind, mikd, and a generat lever of learning, one who by his worth and virtua may be the secretary or ambassador to some King or Prince : if $\ddagger$ is significator, it shews one very ingenions, and whose wit is mixt with virtue and honesty, of a deep understanding, profound wisdam, sound judgment, and successful in any enterprise; a person fil to be the counsellor of a King, or managor of the affairs of a Kingdom or common-wealth, generons, free spirited and perfectly trusty.

The $\boldsymbol{*}$ or $\boldsymbol{\Delta}$ of $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ and ; if $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ is significator the Native is naturally good, jnst and virtuous, but of a very mutable

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mind, changing his opinion with the least persuasion ; it is the aspect of popularity and general applause, and he becomes famous in his generation, and draws after bim the love of the common people; he is loquacious, highly conceited of himself, fortunate by water, and women : if the $\mathbb{C}$ is significatrix it shews one of a generous, noble, just mind, aiming at high and honourable things; he gains by the cluarch and churchmen, and is an exact observer of justice and truth, and a person who by his good nature would oblige the whole world.
The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\delta$ and $\odot$, if $\delta$ is significator, the Native bas rising fortune, proves great and eminent in the world, meets with preferment at court, or bas the favour of some King or Prince; it is the aspect of honour and action, he is witty, ingenious and trusty ; faithful even to his enemies, of a nimble wit, quick fancy, courteous and friendly, he may prove a General or Conmander of an army : if the $\odot$ is significator it is the aspect of valour and victory, the Native is of a great spirit and courageous, attains military honour and preferment, loves warlike exercises, appears a terror to his enemies, and rises far superior to his birth.
The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\delta$ and $q$, if $\delta$ is significator it is the aspect of liberty and love, if $\delta$ is out of his dignities, the Native is vicious above measure, loves gaming, women, and all manner of debauchery, he is ill-natured unless among his own party, and spends lis fortune upon women, bat if $\delta$ is in his dignities it shews one witty, ingenious, a searcher out of mysteries, and one who shall gain a considerable fortune in the world : if $Q$ is significatrix, it is the aspect of pride, vanity and vain glory, the Native is comely, bold, rash, fear-
ing nothing, aiming at great things and promising himself mountains, but perfecting little, and if $Q$ is weak, the person is debauched, and guilty of many lew'd actions.

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\delta$ and $\psi$, if $\delta$ is significator, it is the aspect of confidence and craft, the Native has a pregnant fancy, capable of any thing, prudent, bold, subtle, very ingenious, eloquent, and studious in arts and sciences, yet somothing hasty and subject to passion, which being over he is good humoured again : if $\ddagger$ is significator, the Native is valiant, courageous, ingenious, a lover of militaty exercises, physic, surgery and chemistry, and may probably obtain a fortune by the fire, or dealing in martial commoditie, the Native has generally a good opinion of himself,

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\bar{\sigma}$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $\delta$ is significator it is the aspect of loquacity and mutability, the Native gets by the common people, or by travel, often changing his residence, he is furiqus and rash, but as easily persuaded again to a complacent humour: if the $\mathbb{Q}$ is significatrix the Native is passionate, ambitiaps of honour, aspiring to great things, and persuing them even to a precipice, and when attained they seldom continue with him, and the reason is because of the mutability and chaugeableness of his own nature and disposition. which beget a change of his fortupes,

The $*$ or $\triangle$ of $\odot$ and $\mathcal{Y}$, if $\odot$ is sign:ificator, it is the aspect of candour and generasity, the Native is exceedingly good-natured, of an heroic disposition, baving nothing but gallantry in all his actions, he gets by women and has the fasour of some rich lady, hy whom he meets either with a good fortune or promotion, lie is witty, ingenious and of an active fancy: if $q$ is significatrix, it is the aspect of grandeur

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and magnificence ; the Native meets with preferment at court or has the favour of some Prince, rises to great honour and glory in the world, of a good disposition, yet a little passionate, soon angry and quickly appeased again, of a free dispon sition, lofty, and a little given to pride and vain-glory, but a merry, sociable, good-humoured person.
The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\odot$ and $\wp$, if $\mathcal{\odot}$ is significator the Native is prond, ambitious, conceited, jet very courteoas, and without any seeming reseutment, passes over slight abuses, lest the taking notice of them, shoald be any prejudice to his granduer, he is nimble, witted, loquacious, and very good at invention : if $\forall$ is significator, the Native seems to rise in the world, entirely by his own wit and ingenaity, anid no doubt will attain to a degree of houour above that of his birth and quality of his ancestors.

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\odot$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $\odot$ is significator, it is the anpect of credit and fame, makes the Native eminent in tho world, born to great actions, and to perform extraordinary undertakings amongst the common people, he is cried up for a god among the multitude; if he be a priest or a physicime: he has a vast number of followers, he is pleasant, chearful and good-natured: if the $\mathbb{C}$ is significatrix the Native is proud, ambitious, coveting after honour and glory, and generally born to enjoy a great measure thereof, but of a changeable disposition, and if the © be weak he falls into dishenour again.

The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $q$ and $\psi$, if $q$ is significatrix the Native is very comely, witty, ingenious, subtle and of good nature, seldom guilty of any dishonourabte action, a good orator, gnd of an aspiring fancy, yet seldom bringing things to per-

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fection: if $\neq$ is significator, the Native is of an exceeding courteous nature, amorous, delighting in women's company, by whom he meets either with fortune or preferment, he is wise, prudent, just, a lover of learning, and endowed with many excellent parts, both natural and acquired, but if $\succcurlyeq$ is weak and out of his dignities, the Native proves vicious instead of virtuous.
The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $q$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $q$ is significatrix, the Native will certainly arrive to honour, and be made great or rich by means of some eminent lady, he also has the estimation of the common people, and becomes very popalar; but is of ap inconstant mind, by reason of which he performs no great things, he is a comely, engaging person, neat and genteel, and very apt to be taken with courtship: It the © is significatrix, the Native is sery effeminate and amorous, of a gentle, obliging disposition, sober, just, and having the love of most women he converses with; but if the $\mathbb{C}$ is weak and otherwise unfortunate the Native inclines to vice.
The $*$ or $\Delta$ of $\psi$ and $\mathbb{G}$, if $\psi$ is significator, the Native is witty and ingenious, a lover of novelties and all manner of new fancies and inventions, and mutable and changeable in his mind, resolution, and all undertakings, a man purely given to the art of dissimulation, though a pleasant companion: if the $\mathbb{C}$ is significatrix, the Native dives into arts and sciences, is subtle, crafty, covetous, a lover of himself, reserved and a little melancholy, if the $\mathbb{d}$ is strong he makes an excellent orator, a good advocate, and may be a secretary to some Prince or nobleman; if the $\mathbb{C}$ is weak, the Native is a compleat master of the art of deceiving.

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## General Effects produced by the Quartile and Opposition of the Planets.

The $\mathbf{n}$ or 8 of $h$ and 4 , if $h$ is significator, shews trouble and vexation, if the man be a sectarian he is persecuted by the clergy, molested and tormented, if $h$ falls in the Asc. 12th, 11th, 10th, or 9th Hooses the mischief falls in the forepart of life, and the Native through his own folly loses a great part of his fortune or estate: if $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ is significator, it is the aspect of unceasing troubles and miseries, the Native is a continual loser, has great crosses, meets with contempt and disgrace, and was he born to a Princes estate, would be in danger of becoming a beggar ; the Native is of a poor low spirit, cross, peevish, inactive, miserable and unfortunate in the world.

The $\square$ or $\delta$ of $b$ and $\delta^{*}$, if $b$ is significator, it is the aspect of cruelty and murder, the Native is base, treatherous, envious, quarrelsome, rash, proud, scornful, unsociable, angrateful, and a very ill-natured person, he has good store of wit, but'tis only to do mischief with, and he himself meets with many troubles by war : if $\sigma^{\circ}$ is significator, it is the aspect of treason and rebellion, the Native is willful, melancholy, subject to many lingering diseases, and will be in danger of an untimely death by falls, blows, treachery or poison; the Native also has an unhappy father, from whom he in part derives his turbulent spirit which extremely hurts both himself and others.
. The $\mathrm{C}^{\prime}$ or 8 of $h$ and $\odot$, if $h$ is significator, it is the aspect of contempt and infamy, it shews danger of a violeat

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death, and probably by the hand of juatice, the Native : mims at high and great things, but always.miseres his expectations, for his very attempts are only his ruin both of goods and estate and may sómetimes cost his life; the Natife has a shew of boldness, courage and rèvenge, but his valour is but a vapour : if the $\mathcal{O}$ is significalor, it is the aspect of treason and cowardice, the Native is inwardly very spiteful and malicious, false even to his dearest friend, studying revenge only by ways occult and cowardly; he is whilful, 'fearful and timorous, yet impudently boasting of great things far above hin sphere, capacity, understanding, or undertaking.
The $\square$ or 8 of $b$ and 9 , if $b$ is significator, it is the aspect of infamy and vice, the Native tores wonnen, desires unlaw ful things, his carriage is rude, his condition base, given over to lusts and pleasures of the flesh, inclinable to nothing but vicious and sordid actlons; prodigal in his experces, Wasteful to the consumption of his fortures: if $q$ is stgriticatrix, it is the aspect of deformatity and baseaess, the Native is of a poor, base, law, timorous spirit, afflicted with the greatest of all-misfortuues and catastrophes, loses by the fruits and products of the earth, and is indeed a gainer by nothing, it is the destruction of the significatrix.

The $a$ or 8 of $h$ and $\psi$, if $h$ is significator ltbrings mnny evils from mercurial men and things, and froth prosecution and law-suits, gives the Native an impediment in bis speech and makes him stutter or sfammer, dalls the fancy, spoits the ingenuity, and makes the Native wholly bent upon mischief, wickedness, deceit, cheating and theiving; if $\ddagger$ is significa(or the Native is unfortunate in all his actions, and perpetaally

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poor, of an exil, perverse, self $f_{\top}$ willed, envious, malicious, trem cherous diaposition, and it may be a murderer, for $h$ stirs ul mercurial men to all manner of wickedness, he will be decoitful aboye measure; revengeful, of a dejected mind and bringing nothing to perfection.

The $\square$ or 8 of $h$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $h$ issignificator, it is the atar pect of travel and discontent; tha Native is. of an indifferent atature, dark or black hair, a disproportio:ied body, sometimos crooked, a traveller, wanderer, or vagabond, pne having the ijl-will and reproach of all people, and not underservedly; a mere deceiver, and subject to great and manifold misfortunea from the volgar : if the < is significatrix, it is the aspect of jealousy, suspicion and mistrust, the Native is, crooked beth in persen and mind, deceitful, malicious, strongly vicioas, scandalous, and debauched, he is afflicted all the days of his life with innumerable troubles; crosses from adversarieh, Writ of health, wasting of his estate, poverty, dealh of his mother, a short life and danger of a violent death.

The $\square$ or \& of $\psi$ and $\delta$, if $\psi$ be significasor, it is the aspect of fury and ingratitude; the Native is furious, rash, aduenturesome, quarielsomo, and sometimes is vexed with malignant fevers, is in danger of a violent death by a wound or blow; a destroyer of himself, running headlong into precipices, desirous of rule, resolute, suidte, ill-natured, and perpetually ungraueful to all bis friends, forgetting all their kindnesses : if $\delta^{*}$ is significator, it is tho aspect of atheism and inficteliny, the Native wastes and destroys his substance and fortuac, he is bold impudent and audacious, of a proud,

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ecornful, haughty, insolent humour, a despiser of piety, religion and moral honesty, and is the abomination of all good good men.

The $\square$ or 8 of $\psi$ and $\odot$, if $\mathcal{\psi}$ is significator, it is the aspect of arrogance and vain glory, the Native is riotons and profuse, given to all sorts of excess and prodigality, and loses his expectations ; this configuration deprives him of all maniner of bowour and preferment, he is noble, lofty and brave but only in outward appearance, and does nothing but to be seen; of men : if the $\mathcal{\odot}$ is significator the Native wastes bis patrimony, is lofty proud and pragmatical, a despiser of the church and religion, and a great lover of pieasure and dissipation to his own infamy and ruin.
The $\square$ or 8 of $\psi$ and $q$, if $\mathcal{Y}$ is signinicator, it is the am pect of lust and fornication, the Native is given over to debauchery, more especially if $q$ disposes of $\psi$; if $q$ is lady of the 2nd, the Native wastes his estate and fortune, and will become indigent and poor, he follows base and lewd women, and gets an infamous name in the world : if $Q$ is significatrix the Native is proud, pragmatical, conceited, given over to carnal pleasures, a despiser of piety, virtue, houesty and religion, one having a mere outside, a flatterer, deceiser, a waster of his own fortunes and patrimony; he will have many enemies in consequence of his own evil ways, chiefly amons those of the church and people of an honest conversation.

The $\square$ or $\mathcal{E}$ of $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ and $\boldsymbol{\psi}$, if $\psi$ is significator, it is the aspect of strife and contention, the Native will be involved in mayytroubles, perplexities and controversies, have many law suits and incumbrances to his rery great prejudice, and to the

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injury of tris health as well as of hisestate; he will be rath, hnmoursome, and very uustable in all his ways, being gene$r_{\text {ally }}$ deceived in all his expectations: for $\%$ thus afflicted, re. presents things wrong to the imagination ; if $\psi$ is significaLor, it is the asprect of impudence and folly, the Native is overseen in all he undertakes, makea silly resolves and as foolishly repents of them to his prejudice, a repining simple person, given over to simplicity and absurdity, to his own utter undoing.

The $I$ or 8 of $\mathcal{\psi}$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $\mathcal{\psi}$ is significator, it shewsa wasting and loss of substance by many ordinary people, makes the Native mutable, foolish, without resolution, and one full of whords, without any depth or reason in them, it shews also loss of credit and estimation, and brings many popalar evils on bim : if the $\mathbb{C}$ is significatrix, the Native is perplexed with unequal fortunes in the world, many crosses and affictions befall him, false friends and deceitful confederates ensnare bin, bis substance is made a prey to merciless enemies, and himself the object of their cruelty.

The $\square$ or $\delta$ of $\sigma$ and $\odot$, if $\delta^{*}$ is significatur, it is the aspect of confusion and ruin, the Native aims at great and high things, but falls at last into an abyss of trouble and misery; be miscarries in all his undertakings, heaps upon himself torrents of sorrow, and farebodes a violent death, which if the © is Lord of the 6th, 7th, or 8th Houses, will be by means of a fall, or wound with a weapon, bat if Lord of the loth, by sentence of a judge ; if the © is significator it is the aspeat of vanity, fury and madness, it shew danger of the

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loss of an eye, violent death, or death by a malignant fever, the Native is rash in all his nctions, squanders away his substance, and makes his life and fortanes miserable and desperate.

The $\square$ or $\delta$ of $\delta$ and $Q$, if $\delta$ is significator, the Native is given to vanity, lustful pleasures, and all manner of abominations of the flesh, gluttony, gaming and drinking, he is treacherous, ill-natured, and very unfortunate, when he marsies, he commonly marries a woman of ill-fame, and is much given to boasting and ostentation: if $\hat{\mathfrak{f}}$ is significatrix, the , Native is infinitely wicked, a thief, highwayman, or marderer, takes to all manner of vice and mischief, unfortunate both to himself aud others, given to contention, and every kind of debauchery and wickedness.

The $\square$ or 8 of $\delta$ and $\psi$, if $\delta{ }^{*}$ is significator, the Native is bold, impudent, base, treacherous, deceilful above measure, even to his most dearest frlend, a despiser of God and all gocdness, an unsettled, wretched creature, a shifter up and down, a thief, and one that lives by dangerous courses, one long retaining the sense of an injury, conceited, humoursonre, difficult to be pleased, and unfortunate in all things; if $\gamma$ is significator, the Native is guilty of many crimes, is of a very wicked and evil nature, likely to be guilty of marder or robbery, a breeder of contention and mischief, and a follower of almost every dishonourable practice.

The $\square$ or, 8 of $\delta$ and $\mathbb{\mathbb { C }}$, if $\delta$ is significator, the Native is a perfect scold, given to railing and base language in almost ail his discourse, is ungrateful and a fargeter of kindnesses, a wanderer, vagabond, detacter from other men's worth, stu-

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pid, and of à servile life, unfortunate in all his undertakinga : if the $\mathbb{C}$ is significatrix, the Native will be in danger of losing one of his eyes, die a violent death, or be subject to mamy troubles, crosses and afflictions of fortune and justice, he is subject to hurts, woands and other mischiefs, and is mutnble, rash, passionate, prodigal, ambitious, malicious, treachcrous and subject to innumerable miseries.

The $\square$ of $\odot$ and $\rho$, if $\mathcal{O}$ is significator, the Native lives in a dishonourable repute, receives many great troubles and misfortunes by means of women, he is bold, confident, proud, delighting in strife and opposition, anfortunate in most of his actions, and coming off in most of his undertakings with dishonour : if $Q$ is significatrix, the Native deludes himself with vanities and expectations of things which will never be, he is angry, passionate, and given up to pride, boasting and vainglory, receives much hurt by great men, and sometimes may be in danger of his death by sentence of the judge.

The n of $\mathcal{O}$ and $\emptyset$, if $\mathcal{O}$ be significator, the Native is subject to many losses and vexations by the law, or receives hurt by mercurial men and things, is unfortunate and has an impediment in his speech, deceifful, and not to be trusted: if $¥$ is significator, the Native is of a middle stature, dall, swarthy complexion, tanned or sun-burnt, with light brown hair, full face and eye, high nose, choleric, proud and insolent, a boaster, ambitious, highly conceited of himself, and subject to the frowns of Princes and great men.

The n or 8 of $\mathcal{O}$ and $\mathbb{C}$, if $(\mathcal{O}$ is significator, the Native's fortune is mutable and unstable, he falls into contempt and reproach among the common people, and merits the hated

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or displeasure of some geeat lady or person, he is a deceiver cheat, or imposter: if the is sigaificatrix, the Native is fall faced, of a clear visage and light coloured hair, very ambitious of honour, which fices from him like a shadow persued, one aiming at, and atterapting many great things without puccess, but meets with marry losses, croses and obstmestions in his way to preferment.

The $I$ or 8 of $q$ and $\psi$, if $Q$ is significatsix, the $M$ tive is subtle, crafiy, deceitful, and given to thievery, be has $2 n$ impediment in his speech, is of dall understanding, selfwilled, cross, and indeed a perfect knave, one whose ill comditions and base mind, always keeps him poor: if \% is aigmificator, the Nativo is disbonest, deceitful, slothful, given to indalence and ease, and delights in the company of bewed momen, a mere disserabler, and one that spende his fortwae in debanchery.

The $\square$ or 8 of 9 and $\mathbb{C}$, if $Q$ is significatrin, it shews mutablity; strife, debate, quarreling, one of an ill tongue and a worse life, unfortunate in marriage and chiddren, one indolent and lazy, subject to poverty and beggary ; if the ( it significatrix, the person io of an impudent, bold disposition, given up to lewdness, a mere vilgar, sordid ceeature, a wano derer and vagabond, deceitful, and subject to a mouktitede of misformunet eapecially from and among women.

The $\Pi$ or 8 of $\not \underset{\text { gad }}{\mathbb{C}}$, if $\forall$ is significater, the Native is mutable, in all his ways, foolist, arrogant, woid of reason and good matners, loquacious and very mach conceited of himself, be aball meet with many trouble and opposition, and that from the cornmon people, lose the favera of some
noble woman, and be reduced to an abject state of poverty, the frowns of a Prince are not so formidable as the hatred of the common people, for that so precipitates a man into distress that-it prevents him for ever from rising agaia without some extraordinary assistance; if the d is significa. trix, let the Native take what care and pains he will, he shall qever do any thing commendable, it signifies a defect in the tongue, and makes the Native in every undertaking unfortanate, and for the most part exposed to contempt and infamy:

## Of the measure of. Time in Directions.

There are sereral opinions respecting the masare of time in directions, but the opinion of Ptolomy hath continued since bis time antil this last age without any contradiction; - and it was thus: If you would direct the Ascendant in any Nativity, you mut perform it bs the obligue Ascensions, for the latitude of the place of birth : the words of Ptolomy lib. 4 capt. ult. are these, Cum̈ autem prorogatio sumitur ab Horoscopo, deniur anni Agradibus longitudmis aquales scencionibus cujueque Climatis: sin autam sumitur prorogatio à Medio-cali, dentur anni aquales ascencionibus medii-cceli: Aisqque ad Cerdinem simili modo dentur anni aequales proportione collafi ad Ascentiones aut Descentiones, aut transitum in Medio-creli, Oc. And a little after he saith, possingulis gradibus annume tribuentes, Efic. He means no more, but the Ascendant in every Nativity is to be directed by the oblique ascentions of the Climate ; the Mid-hearen by the right ascentions; the measure of time is by allowing for every degree of the Equator one year, and for every minute thereof six days, \&cc.

Now suppose it was required by way of example to direct the Ascendant to the opposition of the Sun in the following Nativity of W. C. it is done thus.

According to the measure of time by Ptolony twenty degrees gives twenty years. 41 mintutes, give eight months and six days, for every five minutes give one month; so then in the latter end of the 21 st year this Natives Ascendadt comes to the 8 of the $O$ you may see what it signifies if yoa look into the Significetion of Directions what the Aacemdmatito he 8 of $\odot$ prenotes

Again suppose it was required in the common wayta direct the $\mathcal{O}$ to the $*$ of $\mathcal{F}$ in the Zodiacin the anmo Nativity, pursue the following methods.

Which by allowing one Sign thirty degrees, gives 33 degrees 42 minutes, so that $\odot$ comes to the $*$ of 4 at 33 yems 8 months and 12 days, but if the true arch of direction namely 35 degrees 8 minutes be obtained under the Pole of (2) $33^{\circ}, 20^{\prime}$, and turned into time by the following rules it doclares the Native to be 33 years, 6 months and 21 days old When $\odot$ comes to the $\mathbb{K}$ of $\psi$ in the Zodiac. But the exact

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method by which the Directions in the Zodiac with their effects are brought up will in this treatise exceed my limits, I must therefore for the sake of brevity omit them.

How to Equate the Arches of Direction, wherehy to ascertain the length of Time in which the Events denoted by them, raill be in coming to pass.

The art of bringing up the Directions of a Nativity, from the difuse which this science has for some years past fallen in.to, is a matter that has puzzled most of its present followers; and the method of equating these directions when found, by $a$ measure that shall in all cases correspond to truth and nature, has been the subject of many controversies and disputes among modern Authors, arising I conceive, from their ignorance of the plain and genuine system handed to us by the immortal Ptolomy, and from a want of reflecting that the revolutions of all the Heavenly Bodies, as well as the periods of all earthly events, are only reducible to one universal standard measure of time, viz $\odot$ 's geocentric motion in the Ecliptic. It is therefore surprizing that so many inventions should have arisen, and so many errors in consequence adopted, in equating directions, since it must be evident to the most unlettered mind, and a fact beyond the reach of contradiction, that the same rule which estimates the days, months, and years of a Man's life, from the moraent of his birth, likewise estimates the progressive motion, in daya, months, and years, of every Luminary within our cognizance, in the vast extent of space. This rule is nothing more than the Sun's

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apparent progress through every degree and minute of the Ecliptic, measured by the degrees of the Equator; to which unerring standard every matter that refers to any description or portion of time, must be ultimately brought, or all our labour and accuracy will prove abortive.
Now when the true arch of direction is found by the fallowing rules in the Nativity of W. C. and is to be equated, take the right ascension of the $O^{\prime}$ 's place at the time of birth, which may be found in the 1st column of the table of Houses answerable to the $\mathrm{O}^{\prime}$ 's place, and add the arch of direction to the $\mathcal{O}^{\circ}$ 's right ascension; with this sum enter the Tables of right ascension; and find what degree and minute of the Ecliptic in the 3rd column answers thereto; then take the Ephemeris for the year of birth, and note how many days and hours the $\odot$ will be, from the time of birth, in coming to that degree and minute of the Ecliptic; and for every perfect day, which is twenty-four hours, account a year, and for every two hours over and above the even days a month, and $s o$ in proportion for minates, and seconds of time, and the arch of direction will be truly equated, as will be shewn by some examples, in equating the directions of the following Nativity.
And though it be admitted that a student may make great advances in the knowledge of futurity, by acquiring an adequate comprehension of the nature and effects of the various configurations of the Celestial Bodies, and of their partictlar influences both benefic and malefic upon the human race, and though we may by this means attain to know that such and such events will certainly come to past ; yet eren this ace
quisiton in the science must be considered very incomplete, withont the ability of pointing out, by some fixed and certain rule, the precise time when these events shall happen.

This grand acquisition is therefore not obtained by any other mode, than by bringing up the arch of direction of each respective Significator in the Natives figure of birth, to the aspect. which denotes each. respective event; and this arch of direction is nothing more than the track or circle in the Heavens formed by the Significator, in moving from that particular point in the Heavens where found at birth, to the precise puint where he furms the aspect with the promittor that indicates the event, which, upon his arrival there, is to bappen. It is consequently apparent that if this track or circle can be found, and its degrees and minutes accurately taken. and reduced into common time according to the motion of the $\odot$, which regulates all our accounts of time, it will shew us at one view the exact time when the event according to the common course of nature, shall intullibly come to pass.

## The Significntion of Directions.

Ascendant to the of $\square$ or 8 of $弓$, these are very bad directions, producing many obstrictions, as tedious lingering cousumptions, greeir sickness, agues, rheums, coughs, if not death itself, a general dulness or stupidi'y possesses the whole borly, with vexations, mischief by old people, loss of reputation and estate.

Asc. to the $*$ or $\triangle$ of $h$, whenever these directions occur in any Geniture the Native becone more solid and sober than formerly, he grows acquainted with elderly people, and

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proves advantageous to him in commerce; or otherwise he is concerned in bnildings, husbandry, wills, or legaciex of some deceased person; it denotes gain advantage, \&ec.

Asc. to the $\sigma *$ or $\Delta$ of $\psi$, either of these directions indicate extraordifary respect, wealth and prosperity, it raiset credit, esteem and riches, prosperity -in all his affairs, and brings him into reputation with most edifnent persons whert he lives.-To a scholar it denotes some degree of preferment, or some valuable benefice; and if capable may marry.-If $\boldsymbol{7}$ fs strong in the radix it is more beneficial.

Asc. the $\square$ or 8 of 4 , if either operates, it denotes a diai tempered body, blood corrupt ; a pleurisy, small pox or measles, it is attended with quarrels and contentions, sometinad with'Clergymen to his prejurdice and estate.
Asc. to the $\delta \square$ or $\delta$ 'ot ${ }^{\prime}$, these are very evil directions, and indicate many miseries of body, someltures death, plague, boils, small-pox, bloody-flux, giddiness, madness, jublic accusations, and sometimes sentenced to death; makes hin quarrelsome; he must not undertake duels; it is attcuded with hurts from horses, iron, stone, gun-shot, sword or foll; if Mars is Lord of the Medium coeli it is attended with abundance of infamy; and if lord of the $2 n d$. be wastes his substance in a strange manner.

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tunes, both in body, mind, and estate, he is engaged in quarrels, tumulis and uproar; if an highwaymam he is hangedifor thieviug; it a tradesman he becones a bankrupe, and and if a Courtier he loses bis place and honour.

The Mid-heaven to Pollux promiser good success in all martial affairs, be gains hobour, or ampng, soldiers, he is ambitious, imperious and addicted to guarrelling.

The Mid-heaven to the two Asyellus promises adyancement to a military enuployment, the Native is highly eateemed. and respected, and gains honour by what he undertakes.
The Mid-heaven to Cor Scorpio, or Cor Leonis advances the Native to power, and promotion by means of some eminent person, it is probable he increaseth his estate and promptes his reputation.

- The Mid-heaven to Spica Virginis, produces a time of felicity, with some advancement in the Church; if a trader


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man, success in his employ, unexpected honoirs and preferment are confered upon thim

The Mid-heaven to the South Ballance, denntes trouble and ioss of reputation ou a sudden; if this Star bappenz to be in the 11th, an acquaintance deserts him; if in the 12th, he is antested and villified.

The © to the $\delta \mathrm{C}$ or 8 of 5 shews many sorrows, troubles and contentions chiefly by the means of edderly perous, his health is ob-tructed with melancholy agues, black choter, \&ec. he is subject io falls from borses, oi high places; pestered with thieves, or thievish servants, and a general disturbance both in bociy and mind.

The $\odot$ to the $*$ or $\Delta$ of $b$ signnifies felicity, and advantage to attend the Natne in husbandry, bundings, or by conversation with elderly persons, it inclines hun oo sobri, ay and gravity, he ineets with success in his undertakings, and obtains wealth.

The © to the $\delta *$.or $\Delta$ of $\psi$, denotes abandance of comfort and felicity, with healin of body, quietuess of mind, and an abundant merease of substauce, even as it were mitaculuas, it gives hathour, oficice, or sume picterment according to his capacity; if a Clergyman, soner digmty in the Chuch; it frequently produces marriage; sone timer if capable it bleszeth the $\mathbf{N a}$ ive wih a son or much consort trom hum, in short it rases the Native in an emnent manuer.

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The $\bigcirc$ to the $d \square$ or 8 of $\delta$ is a malevolent direction, it shews misery and vexation, sickness invades the body with acute diseases, as strong fevers, small pox, measies, pestilential diseases in the head and eyes, pleurisies, wounds, scalding, burning by fire, lightning, gun shot, \&c. in: danger of a stab, or poison, and deprived of his senses; if $\sigma$ is Lord of the 4 th, 6th, or 8th Houseq and also afflicted it imports death by wicked persons, as robbers, thieves and talse informations.

Th to the $\square$ or 8 of $\psi$, denotes vexations and cros. ses to overtake him, he is contentious with Ciergymen, or veligious pretenders, or perhaps may imbibe some strange beteredox pripciples in religion, which may occasion it.; he is degraded and suffers in his fame and reputation, neilher does materess sueceed to his expectations.

To the 12 h , denotes sorrow and a discontented face; be is in fear of a person, or is abused by malicious persons, who proves prejudicial to him.

## - Juigments to le Tiferred from Transits.

Transits of good Planets by good places or fromissors, signify good, but by evil places, evil; an I so contrariwise: and whatsoever we havt bsfore said of Directions, the same things in an inferior degree, are to be understood of Tran* sits, with this difference, that whereas Directions signify the grod or evil to be eminent, Trancits sigtify much smaller matters of the $s$ me kionl; and whereas the furce or effects
of a Direction lasts long, the effects of a Transit is generalIy oetr as soon as the Transit, the one oftentimes lasting years, the other but days or weeks at most.

But the Transits of the superiors, as $h$, and $\delta$ ought well to be considered, for they never pass without obvious effects, which often lasts a whole year, let them be good or evil; for if they be Lords of an evil House, or ill-posited in the Radix, if they'they Transit the Asc. the $\delta, \square$, or 8 of its Lord, they threaten life; if the 2nd, or its Lord, the substance; if the 3 rd, or its Lord, journies ; If the 4th, or its Lord danger to the father, or loss of inheritance ; if the 5 th, or its Lord, loss by gaming, and denth, of children ; if the bth, or its Lord, sickness or death of the wife; if the 8th, or its Lord, los; of substance, because they cast their 8 unto the 2 nd ; if the 9 th, or its Lord, lois at sea, robbing by land, envy of Churchmen; if the 10th, or its Lord, the Kings displeasure if a Courtier, but loss of trade if a tradesman; if the 11 th, or its Lord, evil friends, or their affiction, the losa of hopes; if the 12 d , or it; Lord, death, and loss by catile.

Observe also in the Ephemeris what day of every month any of the Planets by their bodies pass by any of the Cusps of the Houses of the Radical figure, or that degree wherein any of the seven Planets, the $\delta, \vartheta \rho$, or $\oplus$ was in at the birth; you must also observe when they behold any of those Cusps, or the degrees wherein the Planets were, either with a $*, \square$, or $\triangle$ dexter or sinister, or $8, \& c$. The Transit of $\not \ddagger$ or $q$ by the degree ascending of the Radix, imports the Native to be that day healthful, chearful, very successful K K 3

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in his affairs and well disposed, for the Asc. signifies the actions of the body, \&c. if $\psi$ or $\mp$ transit the Cusp of the 2nd, House, that day is intimated an apt day to procure in monies, or to purchase any commodity. If they or either of them Transit the Cusp of the 3rd Heuae, or behold it with a good Aspect, they promise felicity that day from kindred or good neighbours; it alsn shews a favourable time to begin any journey. The same must be understood of the other Houses.

If ${ }^{7}$ Trangit the degree ascending, he mores the Native to choler or passion for two or three days, or gives the orcasion wherchy he is stirred up to wrath, 8rc.

If $\boldsymbol{b}$ Trassit the degree Ascending, he excites the Native to gravity, soberness, melancholy, \&x.; and those days of the year are generally reputed fortunate, when tither $\boldsymbol{f f}$, or $q$. or $\mathcal{O}$, or are in $*$, or $\Delta$ to the degree Ascending or culosinating, or to their own places in the Radix, and those days are said to be unsuccessful, when either $\zeta$ or $\boldsymbol{O}^{\top}$ Transit the degrees Ascending or Culminating, or the places of $\mathfrak{\ddagger}, \mathcal{Q}, \mathcal{O}$, or $\Omega$, or beholds them by $a \operatorname{II}$ or 8 aspect.

Tne Transits of $\mathbb{C}$, discover all things whether good or evil, which happen to a man daily, through the course of his life ; her application to, or transits of $*$ 's and $\Delta$ 's, shew good; of $I 1$ 's and 8 's, evil, concerning all those things signified by that House in which the Transit is made; where if she be significatrix, the good or evil will partly fall upon the things signified by her, according to the House she was Lady of, or posited in the Radix ; but if not, the good ar evil will fall upon those things signified by the significator which is Transited

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## Judgments to be inferred from Revolutions.

The judgments of a Revolution are easy to be determined, by considering in what House and Sigo in the Revolution the Radical Significators are posited; for according to those Revolutional positions and configurations we are to judge. So that if the Lord of the 2nd House be in the 3rd, it shews gain to come either by travel, kindred or neighbours ; and if it be also in $*$ or $\Delta$ with the Lord of the 3rd, in the Radix the same; if with the Lord of the 4 th, by the father; if in the Medium-coeli, or in $\delta, *$, or $\Delta$ with his Radical Lord, gain by trade, office, preferment, Noblemen, or eminent persons. Hence it appears, that the significator of substanc in a Revolution, is not Lord of the 2nd, in a Revolation, but the Lord of the 2nd, in the Radix ; the significator of lands is not the Lord of the 4 th, in a Revolution, bue the Lord of the 4th, in the Radix ; the same is to be understood of the rest; but if the same Sign which Ascended Radically, Ascends in a Revolution, its effects will be the more firm, because the Significators are the same; the like, if the same Planets which were Lords of the several Henses in the Radix, be Lords of the same in the Revolation, though they possess not the same Sign.

Whatsoever good or evil is presaged unto the Native, either by Direction, Transif or Revolution, we are to measure the greatness thereof, according to the Radical strength of the Significators, compared with their atrength or fortitude at the time of Direction; where if they are Radically strong, the good or evil will be great and permanent, and this is
more eonfirmed if they be also strong at the time of Direction or 'ransit ; if Radically weak, the good or evil wiil but mean!y manifest itself; and scarcely at all, if weak at the time of the Direction or Transit; but if Radically weak; and strong at the time of the Direction or Transit, the eifects thereof may appear much beyond the expectations of the Native, but will not be very durable.

## PTOLOMY'S SLSTEM.

Having now introduced the Argnlian system and briefly explained the signification of directions, 'evolutions and transits, it might here be of the greatest utility, to give the young learner the rules laid down by the great Ptolomy.

## OF THE SPACE OF LIFE

Of the events which happen after birth, the chiefest is about the space of life: for how shall any other event which befals after the birth, be considered in him that doth not at all arrive to that age of life ? therefore the doctrine concern$i^{\mathrm{ng}}$ the space of life is chief of all : and this is not simple nor easy, but is diversely taken from the dominion of the principal places : and the manner which chiefly pleaseth us, is thus. That the whole concerning the space of life, depends on the aphetic places,* rulers thereof and disposition of Anaretic places.

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## of the pronncatory placeb.

First, the Prorogatory placee are to be supposed those in which the Star is that must assume the Dominion of Prorogation, both the Sign which is about the Horoscope from five degrees ascending above the Horizon, unto the twenty-five remaining degrees, which being angular succeed, and also the $*$ Dexter of those thirty degrees which are of the good Demon, and the $\square$ of the Mid-heaven above the earth, and the $\Delta$, which is called God, and the opposite of the westAvd among these again are prefered as stronger and more powerful, first they which are in the Mid-heaven above the earth, then they in the east, next to those they in the Succedant to the Mid-heaven, then the west, and lastly, they which precede the Mid-heaven. For whatsoever is under the earth, is not fit for such a Dominion; besides what come into light with the Ascendant.

Whatsoever Honse of the twelve above the earth, bath no familiarity with the Horoscope, is not proper to be taken; and that which riseth before it which is called the evil Demon,*

[^7]seeing that it not only dectines, but also hurts the influence of those Stars that are in it flowing from them on the earth, for it disturbs, and as it were deqtroys the thick and dark vapour proceeding from the moisture of the earth, whereby they appear contraty to nature, buth in colour and magnitnde-

## of the pabt of fortune.

The $\Theta$, or Lunar Horoscope is computed from the inter. cepted degrees between $\odot$ and $\mathbb{\checkmark}$, ind hath equal degrees from the Horoscope, according to the following Signs. This therefore, is always computed by night and day, that what proportion and configuration the $\odot$ hath to the Horoscope, $t^{\text {he }}$ same hath the $\mathbb{C}$ to $\Theta$, that it may be as a Lunar Horoscope.

For the better uncicrstaincing the tue meaning of Dtolony, observe the following Rules.

in his herary circte, be stortreted from the Oblique Ascerssion of the Horoscope, and thie difference be added or subtracted (as Ptolemy teacheth) to or from the Oblique A scension or Oblique Descension of the d in her horary Circle, the product will be the Oblique Asconsion or Oblique Descen. sion of $\oplus$ in its horary Circle. Or you will do the same if you subtraet the dirtance in the Equator, botimeen the thorary Circle of the $\mathcal{C}$ and \& from the Oblique Ascension of the Horoscope.

The Oblique Ascensions and Descensions you may find thus. If the Semidiurnal or seminocturnal Arch, give the right distance of the Planet, what will 90 :degrees of the Equator give ? aud the Quotient apply to the Riglt Ascension of the neridian.

If the Planet be between the Ascendant and the Mediumcoeli, or the Immu-coeli, add the Quotient to the Right-Ascension, but in the other two quarters subiract it, and the sum or difference, is the Oblique Ascension or Descension of the point; then making comparison of the Oblique Ascension or Oblique Descension of $\oplus$, with the Right Ascension, of the Menidian, you toay kuow how many degreses of the Equator it is distance from thence: and seeing every House coutains 30 degrees of the Equator, if you cast away so often as you can 30 degrees from this disțance, you may know in what House the $\oplus$ is, and how far from its cusp. Then take notice of the Poles intercepted ; between that House in which the $\oplus$ is placed, and the following; and say, if 30 degrees of the Equator, give the Poles intercepted, haw many, wi.l the distance of the $\oplus$ give? add or subtract the Quotient, to

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or from the Pole of the House, youn took the distance of the $\oplus$ from, according as it recedes from, or draws nearer to the Meridian, and you have the pole of the $\oplus$, under which, in tables of Oblique Ascension gain: the degree of the Ecliptic.
Besides what the Greek or Latin Translation of Alatius hath here, concerning the $\oplus$, Cardan adds, "But we ought also to observe- which of the Luminaries is more than the other iniconsequenoe of the Signs; for if the © be, we ought to add towards the consequence of the Signs, the number of degrees from the Horoscope; but if the © be towards the precedent more than the $\mathcal{O}$, to subtract it." The meaning of which is, that from the New © to the Full, the difference is to be added to: from Full 《 to the New, to be subtracted from the Horoscope.

## GOVERNOR OF THE APHETIC PIACE.

The four principal places to be taken as Governors of the Aphetic, are those of the $\odot, \mathbb{Q}$, the Horoscope, and the $\oplus \cdot$ Of these again let the $\odot$ be preferred by day, if he be in the Aphetic places; if he be not, let the $\mathbb{C}$; if she be not, that Planet shall be prefered that hath most titles of Dominion in the place of the $\odot$, the preceding $\sigma$, and the Horoscope; that is when he hath dominion three ways or more, in one of the mentioned places; for all the ways of Dominion are Five. But if there be none such, the Horoscope shall be taken.
By night © shall be prefered, if she be likewise in Aphetical places, but if she be not, the $\odot$ shall, if he be; and if he be not, that Planet which hath more Prorogatives of Do-
minion in the place of the $\mathbb{1}$, the preceediug Full $\mathbb{C}$, and the $\oplus$; and if there be none sucb, the Horoscope shall be taken, if a o preceded: but if it was a Full $\mathbb{C}$, the $\oplus$.
If both the Lights or the Ruler of the proper condition are in Aphetic places, he shall be taken that is more principal : but if the Ruler of the Lights possess the more principal place, and hath Prorogative of Dominion in both conditions, he alone shall be prefered to others.

## THE WAYS OF PROROGATION.

The Prorogator being so determined, we ought to admit two ways of Prorogation : one of which is made only on the consequent Signs, under that which is called Actinobolia, or a projection of Rays, when the Prorogator is in Oriental places, that is, in the places from the Mid-heaven to the Horoscope. This therefore we ought to assume, and not only this which is to consequent Signs, but also to the precedent Signs; according to that which is called Horimea, which is when the Apheta is in places declining from the Mide beaven.
These things being so, there are interficient degrees according to the prorogation which is made to the precedent Signs. The degree of the Occidental Horizon only is interficient, because it destroys the Lord of Life. But the other degroes of the Stars so occuring or testifying, subtract them from or add them to the collected numbers, until the Prorogator is set : but observe also that they do not kill, I, $\mathbf{L}$

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because they are not carried to the Aphetic place, but that rather to their places.

The Benefics therefore add, and the Malefics subtract ; but $\Varangle$ is adapted to those by whom he is bebeld. The situation of the degree of each, indicates the number of addition or subtraction; for how many shall be the horary times of the degree of each, such shall be the number of years : but by day, the times of the diurnal parts, by night the nocturnal must be considered; but this ought to be observed when they are in the Ascendant.* Afterwards to subtract according to the proportion of distance, until they coming to the werst, nothings remains.

But the place of the Malefics $h$ and $\delta$ till according to the prorogation made to the followiug Signs, when they either meet bodily or cast their rays from any where, whether it be $\square$ or 8 , and sometimes in *'s, proceeding from Signe obedient or beholding, because of their equipoletace, and also a II configuration from tive following Signs to the Aphetic place; and also a * evilly affected, when it is in Signs of Long Ascension: yea and besides, the $\Delta$ in Signs of Short Ascension kill, as will the solar place, 'if. the be Flyleg: and the rancounters made in such a prorogation can kill or save, because such occursces are carried to the Aphetic place direct.

These places are not always Anaretic, bnt only when they

[^8]are evilly affected; and their Anaretic part is impeded, when it falls in the terms of a Benefic, or if any of the Benefics cast a $\square, \Delta$ or 8 , to the very Anaretical point, or to those which follow it. In 4 not above 12 degrees, and in 9 not above 8، Or if both the body of the Prorogator and the $\alpha^{-}$ curent part have not both the same latitude.

Therefore when the Assisting or Anaretic Rays are found two or more on each side, you must observe which is strongest in power and number; in number when some exceed others in multitude : in power when the assisting or kitling Stars are same of them in proper places, and others not; and chiefly when some of them are Oriental, and some Occidental : for generally none of these that are under the $\odot$ beams, are to be left either to kill or save, unless when the $\mathbb{C}$ is Apheta, the place of the $\odot$ afflicted by some Milefics joined to it, and receiving freedom from none of the Benefics, causeth death.

The number of years arising from the distance between the Aphetic and Anaretic place, is not taken simply and indiscroetly, always from the Ascensions of the times of each Planet, but then only when the Orient possesseth the Prorogation, or some other which ariseth in the Oriental Horizon. For there is one scope aloue proposed to him that would naturally consider after how many Eqinoctial times the place of the following body or ray cometh, to the place of that which precedeth in the Geniture, because the Equinoctial times equally pass the Horoscope and Mid-heaven, according to both $Q f$

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which, the likenesses of the local distances are taken, and each time signifies a solar year.

Therefore seeing those things are so, it is fit when the Aphetic and precedent place be in the Oriental Horizon, that the Ascensions even to the meeting of the degrees be taken for the Anareta after so many Equinoctial times cometh to the Aphetic place, that is to the Oriental Horizon; but when the Aphetic place is found in the Mid-heaven, we ought to take all the Ascensions in a right sphere: in which Ascensions each aertion passeth the Mid heaven.

But when the Aphetic place is in the Occidental Horizon, we ought to take the Descensions in which each degree of the distance is carried down, that is, in which the degrees opposite to them are carried apwards.

But when the Aphetic and preceding place is not in these three mentioned limits, but in some space between the times of these Ascensions and Descensions, or Culminations, they do not carry the following places to the precedent, but others; for the places are like the same which have have one position, and is in the same degrees in respect to the Horizon and Meridian : but this happens to them which are situate nearest to one of the Semi-circles described by Sections of the Meridian and Horizon ; each of which Semi-circles according to the same situation, maketh the temporal hours very equal.

Therefore, as it is carried by the same places, it comes to the same position both of the Herizon and the Meridian; and maketh the times unequal and diverse, by the transit of the Zodiac : and in the same manner according to the posi-
tions of the other distanges it maketh transits, by times unequal to them : but we have one method, that if the Apheta and precedent places have an Oriental position, or Meridional or Occidental, or any other from the analogy of the times, which are brought to the Aphetic places, we take the following place. The way is thus.

Taking the degree of the Zodiac which is on the Mid-heaen, and the precedent; and also the subsequent; first we cot." sider what position the precedent degree hath, and how mapy unequal hours it is distant from the Meredian, and numpering the Ascensions of right sphere, which we find between the considered and the precedant degree, and the Midheaven, whether it be above or under the earth, we divide them into the number of horary times of the precedent degree, either diurnal or nocturnal. But if it be above the earth, diurnal; if under the earth, pocturnal; seeing the sections of the Meridian are distant from the Zodiac, the same horary times they are contained under ope and the same Semicircle, Then we enquire after how many Equinoctial times the following sections or place is distant so many equal temporal hours, from the same Meridian as the precedent degree is distant from it. And assuming these, we consider again, by the Ascensions of a right sphere, how many Equinoctial times, according to the position from the begining, the following degree was distant from the degree of the Mid-heaven, and how many it was distant when it made the equal temporal hours in the precedent; and multiplying these inte

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the number of horary times of the following degree; it they be above the earth, of the diurnal; if under the earth, of the nocturnal ; and assuming the times arising frem the excess of both distances, we have the mumber of years cought after.

Note here that no Converse Direction kills but that of the Hyleg or Prorogator to the Cusp of the 7 th.

All the Directions of the Hyleg to Mundane (not to Zodical) Rays, which happen between it and the 71h, are to be calculated, and the Arch of Directions to the Benefic's rays are to be added together, and so are the Ach of Directions of the Malefic aspects : and the sum of the Benefic rays are to be added to, but of the Malefic's subtracted from the Arch of Direction of the Prorogator to the Cusp of the 7th, and the result is the true Arch of direction, according to Ptalemy, which most certainly kills, if no Benefic ray assist.

## OF RICHES.

We will take those things which concern posseassive Fortone, from that point called the $\oplus$ alone, according to which we cast away the distance from the © to the $\mathbb{C}$ from the $\mathrm{Ho}-$ rosocpe, alike in things that are by day and by night. This being supposed, we will take the Lordship, and consider the strength of then, and their familiarity, and also of those that are configurated with them, or elevated, whether they $b$ be of the same or contrary condition.

They therefore which assume the Lordship of the $\boldsymbol{\epsilon}$, being in strength, cause much richer, and chicfly when the

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Lights give proper testimony to them. But $h$ will increase riches by building, husbandry, or navigation; $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ by protection, or by those thing that were committed in trust to him, or by priesthood: $\delta$ by warfare and general-sbip: $i$ by friendship and gifts of women : $\zeta$ by eloquence and business.

Saturn having familiarity with the $\Theta$, and in configuration with 4 , properly causeth hereditaments, and chiefly when this is in superior Angles, $\psi$ being Occidental, in a doublebodied Sign, or expacting the d's application, for then being adopted, they will be the heirs of others: and if they which are of the same condition with the Lords, give testimony of dominion, the possession will remain with them: but if they which are of the contrary condition are elevated above the principal places or succeed; the possession will not endure : but the general cimes is taken from the inclining of the Stars, which produce the cause to the Angles and Succedants.
If the Significator of Fiches be angular, the riches will be acquired in youth, if near the Cusp, very early; if in succedants, in middle age; in cadents, late, and in old age. The same is to be said if they be Oriental or Occidental in respect of the Sun and the World.

## OF HONOUR AND DIGNITY.

We consider those things which concern dignities, and this blessed part, from the disposition of the Lights, and the familiarity of the Stars by which they are gaurded. Therefore if both the Lights be found in masculine signs, and either both or one of them angular, that is, the $\odot$ by day,

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and the \& by aight chiefly the conditionary ; and especially if they have the Satellitium of the five Planets, the $\odot$ being gaurded by Oriental Stars, and the $\mathbb{C}$ by Occidental, they that are born will be kings: $f$ and if the guarding Stars be angular or configurated to the superior Cardinal House of heaven, they will be great and powerful, as Lords of the World, whese happiness and hopour will indeed be greater : If the Satellities make configurations Dexter; but if otherwise thus it happens, that the $\odot$ plone is in a masculine Sign and the in feminipe, and of the two one only being in an Angle, they that are born shall only be princes, having power of life and death. If the Luminaries being so in these, and neither of the Sattellities ba angular, nor give testimony to the Angles, they shall be great, but have particular honours, as guardians; geperals, or princely dignity; but not having principality : and if the Lights not being in Angles, it happens that most of the guarding Stars be angular, or configurated to the Angles, they will not give the more illustrious dignities; nevertheless they will moderately excel in civil affairs. If neither of the Satellities are configurated to the Angles, they will be obseure, and not promoted to honour: and if not one of the Lights be found either in a masculine Sign, nor angular, nor gaurded by the Benefics, they are born to be extremely abject, and of a very unhappy mind.

Thesefore, the general deweription of highness and lownegs

[^9]of dignities hath such a speculation; but an infinite number of things in a mediocrity are to be considered from the mutation and variety which happens particularly about the Lights themselves, and the Satellitium, and the dominion of the Satellities.* For the Benefics assuming the dominion, or they which are of the same condition, they will possess dignitios with greater authority, and will be more firm : but if the Malefics assunie the dominion, or they of the contrary eondition, they will be of a lower order, and more uncertain-

And we observe the kind of dignities from the properties of the Satellities : for if $h$ hath dominion he will give rich and wealthy government. The rule from $\psi$ and $q$ will be pleasant, full of gifts and bonour. That from ${ }^{\boldsymbol{T}}$ will be about expeditions, victories, and terrible to subjects. That from $\succcurlyeq$ by understanding, prudence, learning, diligence, and care of affairs.

* First, In the preceding part of this treatise I have told you, that the Satellities of the Sun are Saturn, Jupiter, Mars, Venus and Mercury; and those and no other are the Satellites so often mentioned here; and the Satellitiuna and guards, are the concourse or number of them at ang time respecting the Luminaries.
8econdly, That though the Author here is very particular and positive concerning respective dignities, yet we are not to understand that hereby he intends that aH that are so born shall arrive to such dignities, nor that every one that doth shall be equal therein: for many who have such princely positions, bave also others that cute the thread of life before they can arrive to them $:$ and of such as do arrive thereto, their respective significators are not of equal fortitude to support it; and if they were, the title to such dominion is not the same in all Priuces; for the dominions


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## OF THE QUALITY Of THE PROFEgsion.

The Lord of the Profession is taken two ways, from the O, and the Sign which hath dominion of the Mid-heaven. Therefore we ought to observe the Star that maketh Oriental appearace next to the ( ) : and that which agrees with the Medium-ceeli, either therein, or in familiarity thereto; chiefIy when it reapects the application of the 8 : and if one and the same Star: hath power in both respects, we take that alone, for what is enquired after; and if it is not found in both respects, but only in one of the two, that alone shall be taken : but if one next appear befor the 0 , and anotber be in the Mid heaven, and hath familiarity with the $\mathbb{C}$, both shall be taken; but he shall be prefered who is the most strogg unto the dominion.

If none be found making application, nor in the Mid-heaven, he that hath dominion of the Medium-coli, we take the proper significater of the office, exercise, or study to which
to which some have tille, is far short of what others have: and tbough some by reason of the extraordinary power of their proper significaton of honour and dominion, do often invade the rights of others; yet as sach more powerful significators are not so common as others; neither are such invasions as general as the particular fites of Princes to respective dominions. The like is to be understood of riches, pleasures, wiedlock, children, friends, and ememies, travelling, or the like; for though there may in the nativity be testimonies very targe for such matters, yet where there are other testimonies of short life, it follows that where death thereupon accordingly ensuea, that all other extemals naturally cease ad are prevented.

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the Native will be agreeable to apply himself; at least when we know the business is commodioas to the situation in lifo; because some are born for idleness from the constitation of their Stars : and the things which coacern the Lord of the ac$t_{\text {ion }}$ is thus investigatod.

And the kind of profession will be made known by the properties of the three Stars, that is, when they have dominion of the profession, viz. $\delta^{\prime}, \mathcal{F}$, and $\%$, and the Signs in which they are : for makes scribes, managers of business, calculators, masters, dealers, exchangers, diviners, astrologers, and those who live by learning and interpretation, and the stipends and gifts of others: and if $h$ give testimeny to him they will be stewards to others, or interpreters of dreams, or conversant in churches for the sake of divination and enthusid am : if $\psi$ give testimony, they will be limners, orators, sophisters, conversant with great personages.

If $q$ have dominion of the profession, she will make those conversent with the scent of flowers, unguents, and wines, colours, tinctures, spices; as unguent makers, plaiters of garlands, vintners, apotheearies, weavers, sellers of spices, limners, dyers, sellers of garments : and if $\boldsymbol{h}$ gives testimony to her, she will make men dealers in things whioh relate to pleasure and adoraing, sorcerers, poisoners, deceivers, and those that deal in such like : but if $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ give testimony to her, they will be champions, bearers of armory, prometed to bonour by favour of the women.

But $\wp$ ruling the profession, configurated with $\Theta$, he will make those who work at the fire, as cooks, founders, burners,

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breakers, workers about mettles : but being with the $\odot$, he makes ship-wrights, carpenters, husbandmen, stone-cutters, cutters of wood, under workmen. If $\boldsymbol{h}$ gives testimony to him, he makes seamen, emptiers of vaults, feeders of beasts, cooks, butchers. If $\psi$ give testimony, he will make soldiers, servants, tax-gatherers, inn-keepers, custom-gatherers, sacrificers.

Again, two being found rulers of the profession together, if they be $\zeta$ and $\varphi$, they make musicians, causers of melody, and they that are busied about instruments, songs, and poos try, and chiefly when they change places; for then they make stage-players, actors, buyers of men, instrument-makers, dancers, players on stringed instruments, caperers, alias tumblers, workers in wax, paifters: and if $h$ gives testimony to them, he will make with those mentioned, those that deal in women's ornaments: and if $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ give testimony, they will be Jawyers, employed in the common wealth, teachers of children, rulers of the commons.

If $\delta$ and $\forall \not \subset$ together be Lords of the magistery, they will be makers of statues, of armour, engravers of boly things, formers of animals, wrestlers, (Cardan says physicians,) surgeons, accusers, adulterers, evil-doers, forgers of writings: and if $h$ give testimony to them, they will be homicides, stealers of clothes, rapacious, thieves, stealers of cattle, conjurors.

If $\delta$ and 9 together take the Lordship, they will be dyers, ointment makers, workers in tin and lead, gold and silver, dancersin armour, apothecaries, husbandmen, physici-

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ans caring by medicines : and if $\zeta$ give testimony, they will take care of sacred animals, be sextons, lamenters and pipers at funerals, enthusiasts, conversant in mysteries, lamentations, and blood: and if $h$ give testimeny, he will make men sacrificets, augurs, bearers of holy things, rulers of women, interpreters, and they wo live by such things.

Moreover the quality of the Signs in which the Lords of the profession be, confer the variety of the profession : for they of the human-shape conduce to all those sciences and exercises which are for the use of man. But four-footed Signs conduce to metalic arts, negotiations, buildings, smiths and carpenters art. Tropical and equinoctial Signs, to interpretations, commutations, measuring, husbandry, and priesthood. Earthy and watery Signs, to arts convers.nt about water, and by water, herbs, and ship-makers, and also burying, pickling and salting.

Again, the © properly possessing the place of profession, and having a course with $\vartheta$ from the $\delta$-with $\odot$, in $\zeta$ and vp, and $\varsigma$ will make diviners, sacrificers, diviners by bason; in $f$ and $\mathcal{F}$ she makes mourners, and those moved by devils; in $\mathbb{X}$ and $m$ magicians, astrologers, speakers of oracles, having foreknowledge; in $\bumpeq, r$ and $\Omega$, she makes enthusiasts, interpreters of dreams and conjurors.

Therefore the kinds of profession is distinguished by these ; but the greatness thereof is manifested from the strength of the ruling Stars : for being oriental or angular, they make the profession powerful; but occidental or declining from angles, makes them subordinate.

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If the Benefics are-superior, they will be great, gainful, firm, glorious and joyful. "If the Malefics be superior to the Lords of the profession, it will be mean, inglorious, anprofitable and wacertain.
Saturn therefore bringeth opposition by cold, and mixture of colours: (slowness and lukewarmnese, says Cardan ;) but or through boldness and divalgation; and both are opposite to the perfection of the profession : but the general ume of increase or diminution of arts, is judged from the disposition of the Stars, which cause the effect, which they bave in the sespect of the Oriental and Occidental Angles.*

## of marriage.

To what is said, followeth the discourse about the fit conjunction and living together of man and woman according to the law, which we ought thus to consider.
In men the disposition of the shall be observed. Yor when she shall be found in the Oriental Quadrants, she ma'keth men marry while young; or to marry young women when they are old: $\dagger$ and if she be in these oppressed by the

O beams, and configurated with $\boldsymbol{\xi}$, she catseth that men do not marry at all. Moreover, if she be in a Sign of one form and apply to only ome of the Stars, she makes men marry but once. If in a Sign Bicorporeal, or of many forms, or apply to many Stars (in the sarme Sign, says Cardan) she causeth many marriages; and if the Stars which receive the application, either by propinquity of place, or by testimony + are Benefics, they will get good wives; but if the Malefics, evil; therefore $b$ receiving the application; he promiseth laborious and austere wives; but if $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ possesseth the application, grave and taking care of the houre; if $\sigma$, bold and refactory ; if $\mathcal{Q}$, chearful and merry ; if $\mathcal{Y}$, wise and brisk; if $q$ be with $\zeta, 2$, or $\not \subset$. she promiseth those that are advantageous ; lovers of their husband and children : but if with $\sigma^{\top}$, passionate, unstable, and inconsiderate; in men thus.

In women, let the $\odot$ be observed instead of the $\mathbb{\mathbb { C }}$, for he being situate in the Oriental Quarters, they will marry young or (Cardan adds, when in age) be married to young men : but (lbeing. Occidental, they w.ll marry late, or to men aged or stricken in years : and if he be in a $S$ gn of one form, or configurated to one Oriental Star, he will cause that they will marry büt once. If in a double-bodied or of many forms, or configurated to many Oriental Stars, he will give many husbands.

Saturn configurated to the Sun, will promise husbands mo* dest, rich, and laborious; 4 grave and magnanimus ; $\delta$

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violent, without natural affection, and unruly; $q$ neat and handsome; $\rangle$ one who procures what is necessary for life, employed in business. If $q$ be found with $h$, dall and $i^{-}$ morous; with $\delta$ quick, prone to venery and adulterous; with $\lcm{\text {, }}$, she will give those desirous of boys.

They are called Oriental Quarters in respect of the Sun, which precede the Oriental and Occidental Sign of the Zodiac: in respect of the $\mathbb{C}$, they from the New and Full to the Quarters : the Occidental are opposite to these Quarters.

W'hen therefore both the Genitures of the Man and Wifr, have the Lights so configurate with agreement, that is being $*$ or $\Delta$ to each other, their living together for the most part continues, and chitfly when the agreement is with change*: and the duration will be more firm, when the husband's © agrees with the $\mathcal{O}$ of his wife: but if the position of the Lights be in Signs inconjunct or opposive, or in a equare, the living together will be disolved on light occasions, and they will be finally estranged from each other.

If the Benefics behold the configuration of the Lights which they make with agreement, the duration of their marriage shall be honest, pleasant and profitable: but if the Malefics behold the configuration, it will be quarrelsome, contentious, and hurtful.

So likewise when the I.ights are not well configurated with agreensent: if the Brnefics give testimony to these, the marriage shall never be cut off, but receive conciliation and rest.tution : but if the Malefics give testimony to the disagree.

ing position, the marriage will be dissolved with scandal and disgrace. $\%$ alone being with the Malefics, the dissolution shall be for public disgrace, and if $q$ be found with triem, the divorce sball be for adultery, sorcery and such like.

But they who in the other manner cantract together, are considered in both genders from the Star of $\%$, agreeing with $h$, or $\delta$, because these meeting the Luminaries, they will be descerned living together with tamiliars, and with near relations or kindred ; and it will te according as. $\uparrow$ shall be affected towards the others; for if she be affected towards $\delta^{\prime}$, it will be with those of a younger age; seeing they each one have exaltation in mutual Trigonal Signs. But if she be affected to $b$ it will be with those of older age, seeing they have House Triganal to each other : whence 9 with $\sigma$ manifestly produces amorous affection; and if the Star of ४ be with them it will not be without divulgation\|.
If she be found in familiar and promiscuous Signs, as vs and ' $\mathcal{f}$, she causeth contracts with brothers and relations: and in men if $q$ be with the $\mathbb{C}$, she causeth them to join to two sisters, or relations; and in women if she be with $\psi$,

- As Mars in Capricorn the triplictity of Venos, and Venus in Pisces the triplicity of Mars. Or Mars in Pisces the exaltation of Yenus, and Venus in Capricorn, the exaltation of Mars. So Capricorn and Libra are common to Baturn and Venus, for Vemus in Libra hath House, and Raturn triplicity; and in Capricorn, Saturn hath House, and Yenus triplicitys and so'are eaid to be in promiscuoms Signs.
$\mathbf{M} \times 3$
(Cardan says the Sun) she causeth them to join to two brothers or kinsmen.

Again, $Q$ being with $h$, causeth that the living together be pleasant and constant : and if $\wp$ be with them, they will be profitable : but if $\delta$ be there, unstable, hurtful and jealous. After the same manner, if $q$ shall be configurated with thero, agreeably the contracts of matrimony will be with those that are of equal age. If she be more Oriental, that is easterly, with young men or women; if more Orcidental, with older men or women. If $\boldsymbol{\rho}$ and $\boldsymbol{h}$ be found In promiscuous Signs, that is in vp and $\bumpeq$, the copulation will be with kindred: but this configuration of the Stars on the Horoscope, or Mid-heaven, if the $\mathbb{C}$ concur, the men will go in to their mothers, or aunts, or mothers-in-law : but the women to their sons, or their brother's sons, or their daughter's husbands. If instead of the $\mathbb{C}$, the $\mathcal{O}$ concur in the said configuration, and chiefly if the Stars are occidertal, the men will go in to their daughters or their sons wives; but the women to their fathers, or their uncles, or their daughters husbands.

If the mentioned configurations, not being in Signs of one Kind ${ }^{\bullet}$, are found in feminine places, they wholly affect to lust and immodesty; as if they be found in the fore parts and latter parts of $r$, and the Hyades, the Pitchers, the last part

[^13]of $\Omega$, and the face of $v 9$ : and if the mentioned Stars, that is $h$ and 9 , be in the two chief Angles of the cast and Midheaven, they will make the affections altogether open and public: but being? in the two last Angles, the west and the porth, they will make eunuchs and barren, and without passage.

The things which concern men in copulation, we consider from $\delta$, for if he be separate from $h$ and 9 , aided by the testimony of $\psi$, he maketh men pure and modest in their copulations, and disposed only to the natural use : when found with $h$ alone, and he in strengh, they will be dull and cold. If $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ and $\bar{f}$, be configurated to both these being together, they will be easily moved on, desirous of venery, but continent, and refrain themselves, and avoid the shame. If $h$ (and Cardan says $\psi$ ) being away, $\delta$ he with 9 alone, or if $\psi$ be with her, they will be lascivious, taking all manner of pleasure : and if one of the Stars be Occidental, and the other Oriental, they will be disposed to both men and women, but not above measure. If both the Stars be found Occidental, they will burn after men. If the Sign be masculine, to men of all ages.

Further, if $₹$ be found more Occidental, he will go in to mean women servants and externals; if $\delta$ be found Occidental, with more eminent, gentlewomen, snd married folks. So it is concerning Men.
In Women, let $q$ be obsorvad, for she being configurated with $\psi$ or $\forall$, makes them sober and pure in copul tions: but having familiarity with $\boldsymbol{q}, \boldsymbol{\gamma}$ not being with them, she

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will make them prone to lust, but contain themselves, and avoid the shame. $q$ being configurated to $\delta$ alone, will make them lascivious, and prone to venery: if to both of them being together or configurated, if the Star of $\boldsymbol{\psi}$ shall be with them, they will be more dull : $\delta^{\top}$ being under the $\odot$ beams, they will copulate with servants, mean persons, or externals: but if $q$ be under the $\odot$ beams, they will copulate with more eminent and genteel persons . and the Stars be in Feminine places, or configurated after a feminine manner, they will be only prone to be passive; if they be disposed after a masculize manner, to be active also. \& having familiarity to these configurations, (and he in feminine Signs, adds Cardan) contributeth to the greater filthiness : if Oriental and Masculine, obnoxions to infancy and reprehension by reason of detestable lust: if helped by the Star of 4 , to the greater modesty; $\ddagger$, to the actions being more notorious, dangerous and open.
Cardan here adda; And so if the Sigma be Feminine, to women. if both be matutine, they will burn after boys.

## of childiden.

It follows after these that we pass to the treatise concerning Children. Therefore this observation is to be taken from the Stars that are in or configurated to the Mid-heaven, or the succedant, which they call the Good Demon. If there be not any Stars in that place, or configurated, you ought to observe the opposites.

The $\mathbb{C}$ and 4 and 8 are assumed for givers of Children;

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the $\odot, \delta$ and $\zeta$ are assumed for sterility or paucity of.Children: but $\S$ being common to both, contributes according to that to which he is configurated : giving when he is Oriental in the east, but takıng away.when he is Occidental in the west.

Therefore the Stars that are givers of Children, being so disposed, and by themselves, give one child; but in doublebodied Signs, or in feminine, they cause the generating of twins.

So also being in fruitful Signs, as $\ddagger ; \ldots, \notin$, they give $t$ wo or more. If they be of a masculine nature, because of the configuration to the $\odot$, and because of being in masculine Signs, they will give males; but if of a feminine nature, females. If they be overcome by the Malefics, or be found in barren places or Signs, such as $\Omega$ and $\operatorname{mp}$, they will give children, but not for good or vital. If the $\mathcal{\odot}$ and the Malefics possess the said places, that is the Mid-heaven and tho succedant of the Good Demon, if they be in masculine or steril Signs, and have not the Benefics superior, they shew utter want of children : but if they be in feminine or frutful Sigas, or aided by testimony of the Benefics, they give children indeed, but such as are hurt and short-lived.

Both conditions $\dagger$ being configurated and having respect to prolific Signs, there will happen a rejection of children according to the excess which the Stars giving testimony have

+ That is, if the Malefirs have Dominion, and the Benetics give Testimony.

By the Good Depon here mentioned, the Author intends the eleveath

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in each condition, either of all the children, or of a few at most, as they are found more powerful by being more Oriental, or more angular, or more elevated, or more succedant.

Therefore, if the Lords of the mentioned Signs being givers of children, be Oriental, or in proper places, the given childred will be famous anil glorious. If Occidental, or not in proper places, they will be obscure and mean.

Morcover, if theyagree with the $\Theta$ and Horoscope, they will make them beloved by their parents, pleasant, and heirs of their goods. But if they be found, unconjoined, and disagreeing, they will be rebellious, odious and burtful to their parents, and will miss the inheritance of their substance.

Moreover, if the Stars which give children are agreeably configurated among themselves; they will make them lovers of their brethren, and respectful to each other.

And such is the general considoration of children, bat in those particulars which frollow, .we ought to assume the Horoscopo, at each Star of those which give the children, and observe and judge the other dispositions as in a nativity.

## OF TBATELIING.

The things which coneorn travelling we comsider from the position of the Luminaries to the Angles ; of both, but chief-

House : and by assuming the Horoseope of each Star of those that give children, we are advised to make the degree in which such Star is, the degree ascending; and having marte the Figure of eaten conformable to the Ascendant, to.judge it as though a nativity to tho-respective children...

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Iy of the (: for the being Occident $\ddagger$, and declining from Angles, causeth Travelling, and change of places. And sometimes $\delta$ himself Occidental or declining from the place of the Mid-hearen causeth the same, when hath an opposite or quartile aspect to the Luminaries. If the $\oplus$ also falleth in Signs which cause travelling, the whole life, conversation, and actions will be spent in a foreign country.

Moreover, when the Benefics beholds the mentioned places", or succeed, the travelling life will be famous and profitable, and the returns will be quick, and without hindrance. But if the Malefics behold or succeed, the travelling will be hurtful and dangerous, and the return difficult; but wo ought every where to assume the temperatement, and observe the stronger of the made configurations.
For the most part if the Lights fall to the inclining of the Oriental Quadrants, the travelling will happen to be towards the east and routh parts, but if in the Occidental Quadrants, the peregrination will be towards the north or west.

Moreover, if the Signs which cause travelling be of one form, either in respect to themselves, or the Stars which have the Lordships over them, travelling will be rare, and nct without some leisure; but if they be double-bodied, or of two forms, they will be continual, and in many times.

Jnpiter and $\mathcal{Q}$ being rulers of the Lights, and the places which cause Travelling, the travelling will not only be without danger, but also pleasant; for by the Governors of those

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countries, and concourse of friends, he is sent away with pleasure, the constitution of the air, and the plenty of necessaries favouring.

If $\%$ be joined to them, there will be an addition of gain, gifts, and honours.

But $\zeta$ and $\delta$ possessing the Lights, especially if they are opposed mutually to them, they will cause great dangers and unprofitable travelling. But being in moist Signs, they will produce dangers by ship wrecks, or by desart and unaccessible places. In fixed, by precipices and contrary winds. In tropical and equinoctial, by want of necessaries, and a sickJy constitution of the air. In human shaped, by robbers, ambushes, and thefts. In earthly, by the increase of wild beasts, or earthquakes. But if $\nLeftarrow$ concur, the danger will occur through accusations, and creeping things and casters of venom.

The reason of these peculiar judgements, whether they wil! be gainful or hurtful, is taken from the difference of that Planet which gives the cause; and the cause of the comprehended places, works and posessions, power, and dignities is to be considered according to the first and principal constition : but the signification of the times appears from the configuration meeting in succeeding times, that is to say, from directions.

Some are of opinion, that what is said of the Lights is also be understood of $\delta$ and the $\Theta$. But though they are $a^{2}$ owed to cause travelling, and shew the success of such tra-

velling; yet the Luminaries alone and only do point out the quarter towarde which the peregrination shall be.
The Signos said to cause travelling, are the Signs in which the aforesaid Significators of traveling are found.

## OF THE QUALITY OF DEATH.

It remans that we speak of the quality of death And we know this from what has been said in the discourse about the space of lifc, how death will happen, the ruling place being Oriental or Occidental.

For if death happens by the Orientality, or occurse of the beams, the place of the occurse ought to be observed, and according to that judge of the quality of death. If it be occidental; consider the Occidental place, for such as they are which rule the mentioned places; or if none rule then such as before others are carried to these places, such ought we to esteem the deaths, the configurating Stars concurring, and also the quality of the mentioned kulling places, and the nam ture of the Signs and the Terms.

Therefore $h$ possessing the dominion of death $\dagger$, causetly death by chronic distempers, phihisics, fluxions, colliquations, agues, spleen diseases, dropsies, chyliac and hysteri distempers; and in a word those arising from abundance of cold.

Jupiter, by quinsey, inflammation of the lungs, apoplexy;

+ That is, tine causer of the Quality of death.

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cramp, and cardiac affections, and in some, they which happen with vehetnent breathing, its disorder and stink. $\delta$ caluseth death by continual fevers, semitertians, sudden'strokes aud nephretic affections, spitting of blood, and hemorrhage; by abortion, birth, and St. Anthony's fire; and in a word, they which arise from abundatice and ametry of heat. $q$ by affections of the stomach and liver, ring worms, bloody-flux, putrefactions, fistulas, and giving of poison; and in a word, those which proceed from abundance of moisture, or through want or wasting thereof : but $\zeta$ by madness, extasy, melancholy, falling sickness, falls, coughs, spitting affections, or those which happen simply through much dryness or want thereof: but thus they die naturally, when the rulers of death are in their proper and natural quality, and none of thes Malefics concur.

But violent and remarkable deaths happen when both the Malefics are Lords of the Anaretic places, or, are joined, square, oppose, or otherwise evilly affect borh the Lights, or the $\mathcal{O}$ alone, or the $\mathbb{\square}$; or both; for then the mischieronsness of death proceeds from the congress of the Malefics; but the greatness of the death, from the testimony of the Lights.

Its Quality is known from the rest of the aspecting Stars, and the Signs containing the Malefics.

Salurn therefore squaring or opposing the $\mathcal{O}$, contrary to , condition, in fixed Sigus, causeth death by suffocation, by tumults of the people, by hanging, or strangling.. In like manner he doth the same if he be Occidental, and the fol-
low. If he be in beast-like formed, either Signs or places, he causeth to perish by wild beasts. And if $\mathbf{\psi}$ favours, and is iafeoted by the Malefics, it will be in pablic and celebrated places, sometimes by condemnation to die; if he be in the west opposing either of the Luminaries, the Native will end his life in prison ; being configurated to $\boldsymbol{\%}$, especially about the serpents which are in his sphere, or if found in earthy Signs, they will die by poison.

And $q$ being joined to them, death will occur by poison, and the treachery of women; in $x_{X} \mathrm{O}, \mathcal{A}$, or in moist Signs coufigurated to the $\mathbb{C}$, he will cause death by water, beipg suffocated and drowned. If he be found about Argo, by shipwreck. If he be in tropical or equinoctial Signs, and instead of $\mathcal{O}$, $\delta$ be there, he will cause death from falling. If they culminate, death will happen by precipitation from on high; $\boldsymbol{b}$ therefore will cause such things being configurated with the Luminaries.

Mars squaring or opposing the $\odot$ or (contrary to condition, in Signs of buman form, he will cause death by slaughter, either civil, hostile, or by himself.

If $q$ give testimony to them, death will ensue by women:
If $\psi$ be configurated to them, death will happen by robbers, evil doers, and pyrates. If he be in mutilate or imperfect Signs, or with the Gorgon of Perseus, or Caput Madus $\mathfrak{x}$, he will induce death by beleading, or catting off of members; being found in $\boldsymbol{m}$ or $\ddagger$, be will cause death byi nedical catting, barning, or contractions; if he be found in the N $n 2$

Mid-heaven, or opposite to the Mid-heaven, be will cause death by crucifixion ; and chiefly if found about Cepheus and Androneda. If he be found in the west, or oppostre to the Horoscope, be will cause denth by burning of fire; in four. footed Signs, by falling and the breaking of limbs.

If $\psi$ evilly affected, or deprived of all his dignities, give testimony to $\delta$, death will happen through the anger of Princes and King:, and condemnation. If the Malefics especially agree together, and so oppose any of the said places, they make the cruelty of the death the more; but the quality of death and the dominion, will offer near that which is in the Anaretic.

Death happens in strange places when the Stars which possest the Anaretic places fall from Angles, and especially when the either is found with, or in square, or oppose the axid places.

It is here evident, first, that Ptolemy, whom the generality of Astrologers by one consent, have acknowledged to be the Prince and principal of their profession, had not the least regard tio the 8 th House, or its Lord, for the cause and quality of death; as taught in vulgar astrology ; but, in all vital nativites to directions, either direct by which the Anaretic point is carried to the place of the Givers of life, or converse by the Hyleg's being carried to the west Angle, which alope of all converse directions hath fower to cut off life.

Secondly, in such nativities as are vital, one direction, how malevolent soever, rarely kills; tut in all or most Nativities whatscever, there is required a tain of malevolent directions
to concur to death; for it hath been most admirably proved by the laborious Partridge in his Opus Reformatum and De-fectio Qeniturarum, even but one single direction, though it be a $\square$ or 8 of the Benevolents, intervening among such trains of malevolent directions, (that is directious of the malevolents) concur so together with the aid or intervenings of the Benevolents, they fail not to destroy life.

Thirdly, in such trains of directions, the author here distinguisheth between the killing Planet and the causer of the Quality of death ; for one Planet doth not give both. The foremost of the malevolent train is the killing Place, and shews the time of death; but the following directions, though Benevolent, shew the quality. If the train fall all together, and none follow, for the quality observe those which precede, though at a distance and benevolent also ; for though the Benevolent contribute to the preservation of life as aforesaid, yet they frequently specify the disease which is the cause of death. And with these our author tells us concur the configurating Stars, the quality of the Stars and Signs, and the terms in which their Lords happen,

Fourthly, In violent deaths the Genethliacal positions of the Lights are to be observed, and how the Malefics affect them, and are also concerned by directions in the quality of death.

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The Signification of several fixed Stars in Natitities.
The significatcr of substance, or cusp of the 2 nd, $\Theta$ or its dispositor in of with Regulons, or with Arista shews mach Riches.

The significatore of substance, $\oplus$, or its Lord, in $\delta$ with Aldebaran or Caput Algol, strew loss of estate and poverty. The $\odot$ or $\mathbb{\$}$ with the Pleiades, or Proesepe, Antaras, or Deneb, the Native will suffer some hart or defect in his ejes; and it is incurable if that Light be angular. The in $\sigma$ with Cinguta Orionis, and combust, shews blindness of one eye at least.

The significators of honour, in $\delta$, or within $5^{\circ}$ of $\delta$ forward or backward, with Akdebaran, or with Hercules, Regulous, Arista, Lanx Borux, or Antares, shew great honour and preferment. The $\mathcal{O}$ or $\mathbb{\top}$ in $\delta$ with the Pleiades, or the Hyades, shews military preferment ; the same if those Stars culminate. Caput Algol culminating gives the Native authority over others. Aldebaran or Antares in $d$ of $\mathcal{O}$ or $\mathbb{C}$ in the Ascendant or 10th, give the Native honour, but with many difficulties and casualties. Arista ascending or culminating gives the Native religious preferment. Fomahaut and Rigel in the Ascendant, gives an immortal name. Regulous or Arcturus in $\delta$ of $\odot, \mathbb{৫}$, or $\psi$ in the loth, give ample fortunes, and very great preferment. Syrius, or Procyon, ind with $\odot$ in the Ascendant, or 10th, gives royal preferment and favour.

One or both of the Luminaries in $\delta$ with Caput Algol, $\alpha$ with Aldebaran, Hercules, or Antares presage a violent dealh.

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O. in $\boldsymbol{\delta}$ with Caput Atgol in the Bth, and his dispositer in 1 or 8 to ${ }^{\delta}$, the Native will be in danger of losir $g$ bis head; if the Light culminates he may die by some wound. \& with Hercules, or Arcrures in the Ascendant, 7 th, or 10 hh, in o with $\delta$, the Native will be in danger of being suffocated with Autaras, and $\delta$ in the 4 th, 7 th, 11 th, or $12 t h$ Houses with Aldebaran, the Native will die by the sword, or by a blow, or a sudden fall. \$with Aniares, in 8 of 5 with Aldebaran, shews that if the Native be not hanged, he will at least die a violent death. 5 or $\delta^{2}$ with Caput Algol, and the © with Deneb or the Tail of the Lion, he dies by the sentence of the Judge. The $\mathbb{\square}$ with Cor Hydra afflicted by $b$ or $\delta$, he will be in danger of poibon, br of drowning $;$ and if the Iaftortane be angular, it is so much the more certain. The with Procyon, aud the $\mathcal{O}$ or $\delta$ with Lucida Vulturis, or Pomahatt chews danger of being bit by a venemons beast. The wrih Syrious, and h or $\overline{\text { § }}$ with Ultima in ala Pegasi aviolent death by the fury of violent beasts, or martial menThe with Cingula Orionis and h, or with Capnt Hurcules, cur Antares, shews the Native will be in danger of perishling by water, or by wicked persons. The $\mathbb{C}$ with the Pleiades, bad bo or with Reguloas, shews the hoss of one or both the eyes; and this jodgreseat is confirmod if at the tathe time be combust. The Pleimese in of with $\mathrm{O}^{\prime}$ : and Reguloas with $h$ are thintent significations of a wiodent and antimely death. Fixed Skurs of the A st maggitude near, the cusp of the 7 th , shews a good and rich wife; but her condition will much sympathize with the nature of the Stars, Signifi-

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cators joined with fixed Stars of the lat or 2nd magnitude, near the Ecliptic, shew great preferment, and eminent honourr. Fixed Stars of the nature of $h$, in $\delta$ with the $\mathcal{O}$, involves the Native in a succession of troubles by repeated af. fiction. Fixed Stars of the nature of $\delta^{\circ}$ and $\mathcal{O}$, or $\vartheta$ and $\mathbb{C}$, give glory and renown; of the nature of $\psi$ and $\%$, or $\xi$ and $q$, honour and wealth. Fixed Stars in Angles, especially with the Benefics give admirable preferment, and many great gifte, and clevate from poverty to an extreme heighth of fortune.

The Signification of the Sun Directed to fixed Stars.
The 0 to the Pleiades, Hyades, Caster Apollo, Pollox, Presepe, dangerous and violent diseases, contentions, quarrellings, he commits murders, sapes, or other insolencies; he will be in danger of death, by the shot of a gun, (especially if the $\odot$ be Hyleg,) the cast of a stome, or a stab, or may be beheaded, or banished, or wrecked: I have known these Directions to cause violent fevers, and $\odot$ to the Pleiades, a pestilential discase of which the Native afterwand died, but to Prásepe, danger of being murdered; to North and South Assellus, sickness, and sharp burning fevers; in danger of fire, loss of honour and fortune, mischiefs from martial men; the Native may be in danger of hanging, beheading or imprisonment. To Cingula, Orionis, Lanx. Boo realis, Axilla Sagittarii, Coruii Capricomi sustralis, tibia des-

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tra Aquarii, these signify a noble healthful, pleasant and profitable time, and all things go according to the Natives desire. To Aldebaren, Regulons, Prons Scorpio, Autares, Humerus, Praceedens and Leguens Orionis; these directions presage sickness to the Native, it may be some violent or phe trid fever, they often exalt him to the top of honour and preferment, but makes hiin factious and proud, and thereby endanger all his happiness. To the Virgin's Spike Arista, this cerainly gives the Native eminent honours, with a great augmentation of his fortune and estate ; if Arista culminates and the $\mathcal{O}$ comes to it by direction it shews ecclesiastical preferment, or some eminent place under government. To Cauda Leonis, though no very good direction, yet it augments the Native's es tate, and raises him to some bonour, but withal destroys it again, causing much melancholy and diseases from thence. To Lucida Maxilla Ceti, Genucastoris, Genu Pollucis, Gemin-i, Cynosura; these directions foreshew much evil to the Native's body, estate, honour, and liberty; and betoken, if not the deatruction, yet the injury of them all, as sicknosm, loss of meney, scandal, danger of imprisonment. To Lucida Colli Leonis, Laux Australis, Gena and Tibia dextra Ophinci, Deneb, Ultima in dorso Capricomi, Sinister Humerus, and Cubitus dexter Aquarii, these directions precipitate the Native's honour and eredit, and makes bim go under many evil reports to his great prejudice. To Hircus, it shews martial preferment, honour in war, exalts the Native both in wealth and dignity, makes bim ingenious, and apt to find out many rare inventions.

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The C to the last Star in Ala Pegasi, Ocalus Tauri Borealis, Lucida Pedis Gemini, in femore Leonis, foreshews a healthful time, with augmentation of wealth and honour. To the Pleiades, Hyades, Cantor, Pollux, or Proesepe, make the Native suffer the scandal of evil tongues, vexes, and afflicts him with cross neighbours, law-suits, and other troubles. To Assellus; this direction afflicts the body with many evils, and if it falls near the 8 of $b$ and $\delta$, or the $\mathcal{O}$, tis much if the Native be not blind, or bave some continual distemper in the eyes, or pains in the head. To Aldebaran, Regulous, and Antares, these directions foreshew honour, glory, renown, and wealth from the King and other noble persons, gives the Native a command over others, and makes him famous in his generation. To Arista, bonour, glory and preferment both in church and state, the overcoming of an adversary ; dominion over the common people, and gain by them.

## OF SECONDARY DIRECTIONE.

By Secondary Directions, we are to understand those configuration and familiarities of the Planets which arise daily from the time of birth, and are applied to the prediction of events that are to come to pass in the same succession of years from the birth, as correspond with those days. For example, all aspects of the Stars, both to the Luminaries and cardinal Houses, that happen on the first day after birth, are applied to the first year; those of the second.day after pirth, to the second year; thuse of the third day, to the

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hird year, and so on in progressive rotation, as far as this peculation can extend.
In the management of these direction we are principally to sbserve what configurations © has to the other Planets; for if she be joined with benefic Stars, or irradicated by their good anpects, or even by the good aspects of the Infortunes, it denotes a happy, healithful, and prosperous year to the Native, in nature and quality peculiar to the principal significator in each configuration, and to the Houses and Signs in which they fall in the Radical figure. But on the contrary, if © be joined to malevolent Stars, or irradiated by them, or in parallel declination of the Infortunes, it forebodes to those years pointed out by the days in which these evil configurations happen, great afflictions either in mind, body, or estate; and if a primary direction should correspond with them, of the same malignant nature, a complication of temporal misfortunes will most probably ensue.

In the consideration of these directions, we are particularly to attend to the critical days and climacterical years; for at those times the good or evil conggurations of the Planets are most powerful in their operation, If upon either of those occasions the (be found in 0 or 8 to the place in which she was posited at the time of birth, and an evil primary direction of the signification of life eorrespond therew ith, Death is then at the door, or at that time very much to be feared even in the strongest constitutions, or however healthy they may appear to be when they begin to take effect.

And so likewise if $Q$ or $\mathbb{f}$ in the secondary directions, are afflicted by the malignant rays of inauspicious configations, with an evil primary direction, with which both the pevolution and Transit agree, it is considered an irrevocable iadication of death to the Native.

These secondary directions have always been in reputation among the Arabs and Egyptians, who in comasos practice, preter this method of predicting from the genethliacal Eigure, to the more complicated and laborions mode of calcuJation by the primary directions. The farmer practice bas doubtless, the advantage in point of expedition; for by the use of it in those countries, they will, upen the bate inspection of a Nativity, give an account of the general and parnicular incilents, during the whole cowrse of the Native's life. It is a doctrine much on a level with that of Horary Questions, and may be used to give a general idea of the Native's figure of birth, and of his probalkle bent of fontane, where time or circumstances will not adpit of particular calculations.

Brute creatures may perhaps.enjoy the faculty of betoolding yisible things, with a more penctrating eye than oursolves; but,spiritual objects are as fan ontorf sheir exach 25 though they had na being. Nensest; therefore, to the brute creation are those men, who giffer themelves to bo so fir governed by exalermal objects, as to balieve nothing but what they, see and feel and can accommodate togtheir shallonpims. ginationṣ. Let guch men dofibt! whether: they have a cotl in their bodies, because their eyes never saw it; or that there
are Stars it the firmament at noon day, because they appear not: or that it is not air in which they breath, becauso mothitig appears to them but an insensible vacuity? Surely afl that know they possess a soul must of neeessity beliens the rule and government of Angels, which they see not; and from no other grounds, they must, I think, from that apparent analogy, which they cannot but percoive botween the greater and the lesser world; for as the little world man, consists of an outward visible body, and an inward spiritual sonl, which gives life and mation. to the organioal frame, so possessing all parts to be wholly in all, and in each distinet part wholly; so must it be also in the great universe the sensible and material part whereof hath being and motion from those spiritual powers, which dwell in, and wholly fill and actuate it: therefore the Astrologian regards Nature with the eyes of St. Paul, 2 Cor. iv. 18 verse, he looks not at the thinge which are seen, but at the things which are net seen : for things which are not seen are eternal.

Having now laid down the rudiments of this pleasing and instrinctive science in as plain and intelligent a manner as pos. sible; I shall immediately procoed to teach the application thereof, in briefly calculating the following Nativities. It is my wish to perform this task in guch a manner, as to enable the young learner to accompany me in the business, and to follow me in bringing ap some priacipal directions to their - proper Aspects, as they shall respectively occur in the Genethliacal figures. If I can do this, I have no doubt of goon
convincing the most obstinate uabeliever of the Science, that It has both utility and truth on its side ; and. that the beings of reason, who bear the image of their beneficent, Creator, are not wholly left without the help of foresight and foreknowledge, if they will but adopt the necessary means of acquiring it.

The following Nativities fall under my own observation and knowledge, and I have chose them in preference to any that have been before published or to those of persons not now living, becatase I would avoid putting, it in the power of any person to sey, that our calculations are in the least founded upon enqainies into peoples way of life, of their good or ill forture, of their sickness or health, of the particular incidents of their past life, or of the external causes of their death; for if the rules which I have so fuily laid down, will not enable us to accomplish all this, from the situation of the Planets, or face. of the Heavens in the figure of birth, our science is indeed a mere delusion, and its followers nothing better than jugglers and imposters.

But to make this enquiry easy to my readers, and to save them as much as possible the trouble of tedions calculations, I have introduced a variety of Tables, which are so contrived as to resolve every question that is of a mundane nature. I shall reduce them to practice, in calculating the following Nativities, in such a manner as to make them eany and familiar: hoping by this means to remove, if possible, that sudden impression of difficulty and embatrasment, which is felt by most readers on the first view of mathematical Tables. I

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am persuaded no difficulty whatever will attend the acquisilion of a competent knowledge of these, if a proper attention be paid to them: without which little progress can be expected. The most accomplished Artist of us all could nover yet bestow the gift of inspiration, which is only given to a few, since we read, that " to one is given the word of wisdom, to another the wond of knowledge, to another faith, to another the gift of healing, to another the working of miracles, to another divers kinds of tongues, to anoiher interprehtion of tongues. But all these worketh that one and the self same spirit dividing unto every man severally as he will,", and therefore without suitable endeavours, let none hatempt the intricato paths of science.

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a great degree of indolence and inactivity.
Jupiter within orbs of a $\delta$ with $: 9$ altbough going off and in the 6th, disposes bis mind so mentiments of liberality and justice, gives him ingenuity and perseyerance, strengthens his intellect (though $\%$ is in his detriment) by a good memory; and this is further confirmed by $\%$ and 9 being united, which bestow an admirable conception in literary pursuite, with a mind formed for invention and study.

This serves to shew that there certainly is a fate in nature, which nothing but the rational means made use of by Hettekiah, IInd. of Kings, Chap. 20, can alleviate or preveoti namely, unfeigred prayer, and a determined spirit to abandoo the allurements of vice, and to walk perfect in the ways of Gow and Truth, which verefies the ancient proverb, "That wise men rule the Stars, and none but the giddy and thongbt less are ruled by them.".

The Native I was particularly acquainted with, and having obtained the $t$ ue time of her birth, was requested to give her parents an i ea of the length of life, which transpired at so early a period as not to allow her to attain her meridian altitude; this may be readily discovered in her Geniture : the $\mathbb{C}$ Lady of the Ascendant is posited in the 4th or Imum-coeli, which signifies the grave or final termination ; she is out of all her dignities, seperatiug from the $a$ of $h$ Lord of the 8 th, who is posited in the 6th, and much afficted by the Zodiaenl parallel and violent 8 of $\delta$, to whom she next applies, and this fiery Planet hath dignities on the Cusp of the 8th, which are erident testimonies of a short duration, I have therefore correctly bronght up the direction of death, and found ber dissolution would take place when the $\odot$ came to the $\delta$ of in the Zodiac by converse motion : for the $\Theta$ is Hyleg in Zodiacal parallel of $h$, who is Anareta, both having the same decliation.
If those that are studente herein will take the pains to $e_{\text {, }}$ quate this direction, under the Pole of $\mathbf{k} 48$ deg. 46 min. they will find the content of its Arch to be 21 deg. 35 minwhich if turaed into time and reokoned from the hour of Birth, will be foand to come up the 21 st of April, 1002, when the Native died. The disease of which she died proceeded from a violent chill deated by $\mathbf{h}$.

I am induced to give the foregoing Horoscope a place in my work, as a rebarkable example of the influence of the Stars, upon a malefactor, whose crimes exposed him to the forfeiture of his liberty and life, by the iron hand of the law.

This unfortunate man resided in Bãth, but the particular occurrences that prompted him to commit the barbarous act of murder is so well kown, that I presume it will not be required of me to enter into a detail thereof.
Here the Sign ascending is in the terms of $h$, aqd deccribes the Native to be of i short statyre, of a lowering vinage, and dark complexio because $h$ casts a strong and powefful $x$ pect to the Ascendant.

Q, Lady of the Ascendant is placed in the Ascendavi, but in the terms of $\delta$, with the Pleiades, and within 5 degrees of Caput Algol one of the most mischipvous Stary in the whole heavens, and of the nature of $\psi$ Lopd of the 8th; she is therefere' significatrix of the Native's manners.-The Pleiades united widh 8 -makes him ambitious, tyrbulent and libidinous, byt Caput Meduse foreshew the Nąive to be of a most violent nature, even to murder or-be murdered; besides $万$ casts ${ }^{\prime}$ a malicious $\square$ to tijem, and thergby encreases the evil. .

There are many evil confgurptions in this Geniture, not only tending to shew a short life, toue violent and untimely death. $\ddagger$ joint ruler of the Aspendant is retrograde and combust of the $\odot$, in the 12 th House, which is an infallible argod ment of a short life and wretched end; and this is further confirmed by the position of the $\odot$ in $\delta$ with Caput.Algat,

which always presages violence. The $\odot$ and $\xi$ in the 12 th , in $\square$ to $\zeta$; and $\%$ combust in the 12 th always shews imprisonnient and many sorrows: and this happened on the 23rd of December, 1808, when the $\mathbb{C}$ transited the Cusp of the 12th, and $\overline{\text { C }}$ Lord of the 12 th.

Here let is be remembered is partly the Native's significator, and his 1 with $b$ foreshews the Native to be unfortunate in all his actions, of a perverse, self-willed, evil, malicieus, eavious, treacherous dispositon, and it may be a murderer, for $h$ stirs up mercurial men to all manner of wickekness; he will be deceitful above measure, of a dejected mind, revengeful, and bringing nothing to perfection.

The $\square$ of the $\odot$ and $\zeta$ is much to be regarded, it is always the aspect of contempt and infamy ; it shews danger of 2 violent death, and it may be by the band of justice, especially if $b$ is Lord of the 10 th; the Native aims at high and great things, but always misses his expectations, for his very attempts are only his. ruin both of goods and estate, and may sometimes cost his life. Saturn therefore, not only in $I$ or 8 of the $\odot$, oriental and in fixed Signs, but in Zodiacal parallel and parallel of Declination with him likewise, always causeth death by suffocation, tumults of the people, or by hanging or strangling. $\delta$ and the $\vartheta \%$ in the 4 th with evil fixed Stars, not only foreshew the death of the Father by accident, in the early part of life; but also an evil end to the Native.

Here being evident testimonies of a violent death in this Geniture, we here direct the Mid heaven to the $\square$ of the 0
and body of $h$, or bring $\boldsymbol{b}$ the Anareta to the Meridian, so as to be in mundane $\square$ to the Ascendant, which is here Givef of life, followed by $\delta$ to the 8 of $\bar{b}$ in Mundo and $\mathrm{Zo}_{0}$ diac, in the following manner.


Here you see the first direction points out his unfortunate copnexion in gaming, because the $\odot$ is Lord of the 5 ti, and his unfortunate position in the 12th, under such destructive configurations, fareshews the worst of evils, and the murder he committed in consequence thereof.

Those who will take the paius to equate the second direction will find the content of its Arch, $23^{\circ} 18^{\prime}$, which turned into time, and reckoned from the bour of birth, will be found to come up on the 10th day of April, 1809, when the Native was planged into eternity.-It gives the space of life, 22 years, 11 months and 3 days, which exactly answered to the Native's age.

Let the young learner always remember, that when there are arguments of a violent death,. under simitar positions, this direction will always put an inglorious period to the Na tive's life. And here let me just remark, that this Geniture net only points out by the Zodiacal parallel, parallel of De-

But though the Native was born under such destructive aspects, yet during his confinement, it appears he conducted himself with the most becoming propriety and christian-like behaviour, strictly adhering to the pious admonitions of those who seriously interested themselves in preparing him to meet his awful fate.

When sentence of death was passed, he received it with grear firmness of mind and christian fortitude; he returned to the place of confinement, fell on his knees and prayed for those who gave evidence against him, hoping that the Lond would shew his mercy upon them, and awaken their hope in the grace of God; he had no desire to live but as an instrument in the hand of providence, to bring his wife and mother to the knowledge of the love of Carist; to guilty men, in seeking and saving those that were dead in trespasses and sins, plucking them out of the fire as brands for the burning. -He spent the evening in prayer and praise to God, who had called bim out of darkness into his marvelous light; he was quite composed, and slept easy that night; during the short period he had to remain in this life, he continued in unabated devotion to Him who was able to save his soul from hell, and present him before a just God, being washed from

his sins in the blood of Cerist, he being made a sacrafice for sinners, even the chief.

On the morning of his execution he said he was happy, bis mind was serene and composed, happy in the expectation of meeting his God in peace and love; Gos being well pleased in his beloved Son, and will call sin no more to remem-berance.-He was takèn from the place of confinement to the fatal spot, a space of about three miles, with a smile upon his countenapce, praying and praising the God of his salration for his abundant mercy, and that he might be supported in the hour of death with the light of his countenance ; this there is every reason to believe was granted him, and that he died in full assurance of a better resurection.-He requested the erecutioner not to pull his legs, or do any thing to basten his death, but that he might feel all the punishment the law had sentenced him to bear:-he acknowledged the justnes of his sentence, that 'whoso sheddeth man's blood, by man shall his blood be shed."

The road was filled at an early hour with spectators, to witness the awful and melancholy sight of a young man in the prime of life, going to suffer the law for murder, committed on the body of John Dyer, in the momenis of violent passion and intemperance.

The Figure of this unfortunate Native's birth is propenty settifiod, as the different positions and directions will amply , nffice.

Here the Cusp of the Ascendant is beheld by a $*$ of the 1 and $\Delta$ of $\zeta$, and the body of the $O$ and $\delta$, and all debiftated, which shews him to be at one time furious and headtrong, another time melancholy and stupid, regreting his former wulfulness, always at extreme, immutable in all his actions to his great prejudice. In person strong, well-tet, of a sanguine complexion, litule bent in the knec, with a sandy curling hair.

Mars unfortunate in the Ascendant, and $\$$ peregrine and retrograde, in $\delta$ with $\psi$, both combust of the $\mathcal{O}$, in the 12th, not only foreshews a short life, bat declares powerful Cirinjes and imprimonsent ; the two Mafortunes Angular, and the Fortunes Cadent declares much sorrow; the Cadent and with a vioient fixed Star of the nature of $\boldsymbol{b}$ denotes the same; the Cusp of the 8th House adornod with evil fixed

Stars and the 8 , all these declare an uatimely death. b retrograde though in his own House and Angular, cannot be but of an evil tendency, he being retrograde: a Planet retrograde is by no means benevolent, and in the 4th Howse nufortunate, always shews an evil end to await the Native though he be a Prince. The following directions will point out ther time.

As a treat and curiosity to my readers, I have here introduced the Nativity of Napolear Bomapamte, pourtraying the chief events of his life, and the time and manaer of his death. From the time given by himself to an eminent Astronomer in Corsica, vis. August the 15th. 1769, at a quarter before 10, A.M. calculations have been made, but as there is a small difference in the manner of erecting the Horoscope; \&c. I present mine, in mhy opinion, more congenial with the writings of Ptolomy than any of them. By only turning the equal time into the Solar, and working the directions, If find that at 15 years and 2 months, the Ascendant was directed to the $\Delta$ of 9 in Mundo, and $\odot$ to the $*$ of $q$ in the Ecliptic: at this time Bonaparte had an intrigue with a Washerwoman's daughter; and a few months afterwands $\sigma^{7}$ was directed to the $*$ of $\boldsymbol{h}$, and 9 to the $\&$ of the $C$ when he poisened ber with a pill of Arsenic and Fardigrease. At 20 years 10 months, the $\oplus$ to the $\Delta$ of $\mathcal{O}$, and at $2 s$ years, $(\boldsymbol{O}$ to the $*$ of 9 ; and parallel of $\psi$. At these timen. he was in great repute with these who were disaffected to government, but at at 22 years 10 months, the 1 ta the 8 of of the $\mathcal{O}$, when the disaffected were in joppardy, he was liven to poverty and diagiace; and tle like at-25, when the $O$ came to the 8 of , and almost at 26 , whem the ( $\ddagger$ came to the $\square$ of $b$, and the Ascendant to the n of the $\mathcal{O}$ : but at 26 years 5 monihs, the $\mathcal{O}$ came to the $*$ of 2. whem he was made general of the armed force of France, and soon after the Accendant to the $\Delta$ of $\Omega$ in the Ecliptic.
when he married the widow of Beauharnois, who had beer mept mistress of Barras. In his 28th year, he had $q$ to 1 parallel of 4 , and $\mathbb{C}$ to the parallel of $Q$, shewing success, but $\odot$ to the body of $h$, shews danger of death. The Directory who feared and hated him, being anxious to destroy him, (according to Carnot,) sent him on that tedious and uncertain expedition to Egypt. At 29 years, 6 months, the $\oplus$ to the $\square$ of ( when he was defeated before Acre, by Sir Sidney Smith, and all his hopes blasted by the Victor of the Nile. At 30 years, 5 months, the $\Theta$ to the $\Delta$ of $\mathcal{O}$, and 9 , to the body of $\psi$ when be was first made Consul. At 31 years, 3 monihs, $\odot$ to the $\Delta$ of $\mathbb{C}$, and soon after $\ngtr$ to the $*$ of $q$, at this time he was very successful over the Austrians, and likewise in his 33rd year, when the $\mathbb{}$ came to the $\Delta$ of $q$, and $\odot$ to the $\Delta$ of $\psi$; but at 33 jears, 9 months, the Ascendant to the $\square$ of $\delta$, and the $\oplus$ to the $\square$ of $\mathbb{C}$, when the French gun-boats were bombarded, and obliged to take shelter in their Batteries from the $r$ tack of the English vessels. At 34 years, 8 months, the Mid-heaven to the body of the $\odot$, when he was made Emperor of France. In his 37 th year he had the Ascendant to the body of 4 , shewing the success he had over the Austrians, but the Ascendant to the $\square$ of $\psi$, and $q$ to the paratlel of $b$ and body of $\delta$, came up the same year, viz. 1805, and shew ill-luck, which was verified in that grand Victory of Lord Nelson. In the beginning of his 38th year, to the $\Delta$ of $P$, and the Ascendant to the body of $\psi$, in the Ecliptic, which points out his success in Prussia and Poland;

but the latier end of the year, the $\oplus$ came to the $\square$ of $\underset{\sim}{ }$ : and I of the $\mathbb{C}$, and in the b ginning of his 39th year, ( to the 8 of $\delta$ : these point out the loss of the Danish Fleet, and the Emigration of the Portuguese to the Brazils; about the same time, © came to the $\Delta$ of $\mathbb{C}$, and shews his Victory over, and Friendship with Russia. In his 40th year, viz. 1808 and $1809, \forall$ to the $*$ of $\psi$, ( to the Parallel of $\varphi$, and $\mathbb{C}$ to the $\Delta$ of $\odot$; these point out great success, probably the downfall of the Turkish Empire, and an end to the Roman Catholic religion. In bis 41 st year, $b$ and $\Varangle$ to the $*$ of 9 , these also give him success, and raise his ambition to such an extravagant degree, that the eyes of Europe will be alarmed, and no longer duped by his treachery, and in the beginning of his 43 rd year, viz. the latter end of 1810, or beginning of 1811, O which is undoubtedly Hyleg, cames to the Parallell of $\mathbb{C}$, to the Parallel of $b$, and to the * of $\delta$ (evilly affected,) as appears by the following direction s; at this time I expect the World will be convinced that he has reigned too long; and his death will be suddèn and violent, either by suffocation or drowning. The merhod here taken admits of two kinds of Aspects, viz one in the Ecliptic without latitude, and the other in mundo, viz with the Planets declination, and is a proportional part of the Diurnal and Nocturnal Arches; and the Meridian and Horizon, as well as the Planets may be directed to both; the modern Aspects, viz. the semiquadra e, sesquiquidrate, \&c are here rejected, because not mentioned by Piolomy, the Imperans and Obedians are equal distances trom the Tropics, wathout

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latitpde, and the measure of time, contracy wsed by some of the moderns of reducing the diatance by the geometric paotion of the $\mathbf{O}$; (bat perfectly agrecable to the doctrine of Prolomy) is one degree of directiomal motion to one yerr, and consequently five minutes to one month. The Mundane parallele are equal distances from the Meridian and Horizon; ind becmase the $O$ and $\mathbb{C}$ are not qualified for being Hjleg. Prolomy takes that Planet which has dignities in the plaseof the 0 and $\mathbb{C}$, (even in cases of life and Death,) I conclude that ho directed all the Planets for other purposes, which were of less importance.
The $\mathcal{O}$ with $\forall$ in his own Sign $\Omega$, in the loth Hoose, vis. the House of honour and preferment, and near to the Cuap of the llth House, (the House of friendship).sbew that the Native will arrive to the greateat degree of eminence, and that he will be very skilful and successful in his undertalinge. But $\delta$ in the 11th, near to the Cosp of the 12th. (which is called the evil demon,) shews that his success aripes chieAy through treachery. $\%$ Lady of the Ascendant pear the Cusp of the 10:H, in $\Delta$ to 4 in the 2nd, (the House of riches.) shews he will become very rich, for it in the Aspect of honour, preferment, and vast foriunes in the World, besides another argument of the dignity of this Native is dedaced from the circumstance of cardinal Signs pormesing the principal Angles of the Figure : for as the greateat actions of the World depend on the cardinal points of the Heavens, viz $r$, $\Phi$, so and vf, so the noost emiaent persons, such as riec to bonour and prefermont higeth

superior to their binth and expectancies, have those cardinal points upan all the angles of their nativities. Thusit was in the geniture of.Cicero, whose parentage, if authors may be credited, was so obscure as scarcely to be known; yet he was elevated to such a pitch of honour, as to be called "THE FATHER OF HIS COUNTRY." And thus it was with Oliver Cromwell; and may be seen in the genitures of a thousand,others, who have risen highly superior to all their cotempararies, by having these cardinal Signs thus fortunately posited on the Angles of their figures of Birth, with other concording. testimonies of dignity and honour. But amidst all these propitious configurations there are some that produce, an opposite. effect. $b$ the significator of his manners evilly affected riearthe Meridian, in 8 to the (who is in Zodiacal Parallel of $b$ shews. him to be tyranical, cruel, revengeful, deceittul, ambitious, and.destitute of every quality that * may be called generous or honest. This position also shews that he will die a violent death, for Ptolomy says, " $h$ posited in moist Signs, configurated to $\mathbb{C}$, will cause death by water, being suffocated or drowned;" and there are other testimonies of a violent death, either civil, hostile, or by himself. We may always import danget of death when the Hylegs comes to the evil beams of the killing Planet, and according to the force of the direction or directions, then operating judge of the quality of death.

It is here just necessary to remark that every personiborn under the.same jufluence of .the Stars, cannot expect to arsive to the.same degree of "honour and preferment as the Native, the quality of birth, parents and education must bee consideret and guide everg.judicious Axtist in his judgment.

[^2]:    || Observe Mars unfurtunate in any Angle of a Geniture by day doth varions ways affict the Native; if by day Mars possess íne Angle, Savurn another, nnd Jupiter another, he signifies a violent deuth to the Niative born under their influence, and also shesrs them to be self Marder-ers.-If by day Mars possess one Abrile and the Sun aunther, loss and death by fire, if the Moon, they foresher a violent death, and the mo. ther to die a cruel death.

[^3]:    * Observe Mercury in the Ascendant in a diurnal Geniture in his dignities sigaifies Philosophers, Grammarians, Geometricians, and such as study celestial sciences.
