## GREENGROCERS' MEASURES.



Apples and Pears are put up in bushels, sieves, or half sieves, the sieve being equal to a bushel.

Asparagus.-A bundle contains from 100 to 150 heads.

Broccoli.-A bundle, according to size, from 6 to 20 heads.

Cabbages.-A tally is 5 dozen.
Carrots.-A bunch from 36 to 40.
Celery.-A bundle, according to size, from 6 to 20 heads.
Cherries.-A sieve or basket equals 48 lbs.

Currants.-A sieve about 20 quarts; half sieve about 10 or 11 quarts.

Grapes are put in $2-\mathrm{lb}$. and $4-\mathrm{lb}$. baskets.

Greens.-A bunch as many as can be tied together by the roots.

Mushrooms.-A pottle should hold about 1 lb . They do not always do so. Peaches, Nectarines andApricots. -Baskets of 6 or 12.
Pesas.-A sieve is equal to 1 bushel, contains $10 \frac{2}{2}$ imperial gallons and is $17 \frac{3}{4}$ inches in diameter at top and $11 \frac{1}{4}$ inches deep.
Potatoes, New, are generally put up into $2-1 \mathrm{~b}$. punnet baskets; old, are sold by the bushel, sack, or ton.
Radishes.-A hand from 12 to 30 in number, according to the season.
Rhubarb.-A bundle from 20 to 30 stems, according to size and season.

Strawberries.-A pottle should hold about half a gallon, but seldom holds more than $1 \frac{1}{3}$ pint.
Turnips.-A bunch from 20 to 25.

Example 1.-Required the time of high waterat Aberdeen on January 14th, 1903 Time of high water at London Bridge......4h. 32 m . afternoon.
Subtract the interval $0 \quad 58$

## .334 afternoon.

It may happen that the "tide interval" to be subtracted is greater than the quantity from which it has to be taken, in which case 12 hours must be added to the London Bridge time; the resulting difference will be the preceding day's afternoon tide where the Londou morning tide was used. Sometimes the sum, " high water at London Bridge" + "tide interval" will exceed 12 hours; in this case, the time of high water after the noon or midnight following, according as the London high water was either morning or afternoon.

Example 2.-Required the time of high water at Aberdeen, January 7th, after-noon:-

Forferture.-Pledges for 10s. and under must be redeemed within twelve calendar months and seven daysfrom the date of pledging. At the end of that time they become the property of the pawnbroker.
Pledges above 10 s . if not redeemed within twelve calendar months and seven days from the day of pledging, may be sold by auction by the pawnbroker, but may be redeemed at any time before the day of sale.
Within three years after sale the pawner may inspect the account of the sale in the pawnbroker's books on payment of one penny, and receive any surplus produced by the sale. But deficit on sale of one pledge may be set off by the pawnbroker against surplus on another.
If any pledge is destroyed or damaged by fire, the pawnbroker will be bound to pay the value of the pledge after deducting the amount of the loan and profitsuch value to be the amount of the loan and profit and 25 per cent, on the amount of the loan.

If any ticket is lost, mislaid, or stolen, the pawner should at once apply to the pawnbroker for a form of declaration to be made before a magistrate, or the pawnbroker will be bound to deliver the pledge to any person who produces the ticket to him and claims to redeem the same.

When the loanis 5 s.or under the charge on form of declaration is one halfpenny; when the loan is above 5 s., one penny.

## RAILWAY INFORMATION.

The real inventor of the Locomotive, as well as the Motor Car, was Richard Trevithick, a young Cornish engineer, who, on Christmas Eve, 1801, conveyed the first load of passengers ever moved by mechanical traction or the force of steam; and in February, 1804, he completed the first Locomotive that was ever made to run on rails. Five wagons, loaded with ten tons of iron and 70 men, were coupled to the engine, and a journey of ten miles was completed in a little over four hours. The engine was made to travel five miles an hour. In 1816, Trevithick went to Peru as a mining engineer, winning and losing several fortunes, and in 1832 he returned to England, and died penniless, without a friend or relative, and was buried in a pauper's grave.
The next train was run between Stockton and Darlington on September 27th, 1825. The speed did not exceed five miles an hour. The engine was driven by George Stephenson himself, and is now preserved in the workshops of the N.E. Railway Company at Darlington.

## COMPULSORY REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS.

In the case of births, parents must effect registration within 42 days after birth, under a penalty in default; and when the 42 days have expired, the Registrar is empowered to compel their attendance at his offices for the purposes of such registration. The period during which births may be lawfully registered (subject to payment of fees after three months) is extended from six to twelve months.

In case of death the nearest relatives of the deceased present at death, or in attendance, are liable to a penalty if the registration be not effected within five days, except when notice is sent to the Registrar with a medical certificate.

## REGISTRATION IN SCOTLAND.

In Scotland a birth must be registered within 21 days. A marriage must be registered within three days. A death must be registered within eight days.

## LEGACY AND SUCCESSION DUTIES.

Legacy and succession duties are charged at rates varying according to the relationship of the legatee to the deceased. Legacy duty is charged upon personalty; succession duty upon realty.
The rates for legacy duty are as follows:-


* The legacy duty, at the rate of 1 per cent., is not charged where probate duty has been paid.

Succession duty rates are as follows (excepting where probate duty has been charged, as in the case of leaseholds, when the rates are the same as for legacy duty) :-

English bids fair to become the universal language; already it is more widely spread and more freely spoken than any other tongue. In Europe it is regarded as the language of polite society. On the vast Australian and North American Continents it is the one speech, and in the East fully $18,000,000$ of Hindus,Mohammedans,Buddhists, and others, read and speak English. In point of numbers at the present time it is exceeded by the Chinese alone.

## WHERE TO FIND A PROVED WILL.

To find a will proved before 1st January, 1858, the date on which the Court of Probate Act, 1857 ( 20 \& 21 Vict. c. 77), came into operation, it is best to search first the index to the wills proved in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, which is kept at Somerset House. Failing this, the will is probably to be found in the registry of the district in which it was proved. The wills proved prior to 1858 were all distributed among the district registries when these institutions came into existence. To find a will proved since 1858 is a far simpler task. It must have been proved either at the Principal Registry at Somerset House, or in the registry of the district in which the testator lived. In the former case the original will itself is carefully preserved at Somerset House, the copy of which probate has been granted is in the hands of the executors who proved the will, and another copy for Parliament is bound up in a folio volume of wills made by testators of that initial and date; the indices to these volumes fill a room of considerable size at Somerset House, which is freely open to the public. In the latter case, the original will, proved in the District Registry, is there kept, but a copy is sent to and filed at Somerset House, and may there be seen. Any will may be read by anybody who is ready to pay a search fee of one shilling; but the reader may not copy any part of the will except the names and addresses of the executors, and the date and private number of the will. If he desires a copy, he can order one to be made, for which he will pay according to the length of the will, at the rate of sixpence a folio (ninety words) for an ordinary copy, and ninepence a folio for a certified copy, which, with a shilling stamp impressed thereon can be produced and read in any court of law. ## VEGETABLE POISONS AND SUITABLE EMETICS.

Belladonna, or Deadly Nightshade, is a fatal poisonous plant; its round, large, smooth, deep purple-coloured berries, with sweetish, violet-coloured juice, should never tempt anyone to taste them.
Hemlock is violently poisonous, any part of the leaves or stem rapidly producing delirium and death.

Water Hemlocle and Water Parsnip have frequently proved fatal.
Foxglove.-The leaves are an exceedingly fatal poison, producing great debility. An emetic should be given, and brandy and sal-volatile in doses of half a teaspoonful of each in water.
Monkshood is a common garden flower which is very poisonous, a small portion of the leaves proving fatal. Its roots have also been mistaleen for horse-radish, and proved fatal.
Laburnum Seeds are exceedingly poisonous.
Common Laurel.-The leaves and berries are powerfully poisonous.
Yew. The leaves and berries are poisonous, and have proved fatal. The berries should never be eaten, as the poison is found in the seed.

Common Arum or Lords and Ladies is an irritating poison, and its leaves have proved fatal.

Nightshade, Opium, \&c.-In cases of poisoning with these, give mustard emetic; and as long as the patient is drowsy, he must be kept walking about. After the emetic has fully acted, lemon-juice or vinegar and water may be given.

Emetics.-An emetic is the proper first treatment in all these cases. A dessert spoonful of salt and mustard in a tumbler of water and tickling the throat with a feather is an excellent one.

## To Estimate the Weight of a Stack of Hay.

To the height in feet of the stack to the eaves add one-half of the height from the eaves to the ridge. Multiply the result first by the length in feet, then by the width in feet, and divide the result by 27 , which will give the contents of the stack in cubic yards. A yard of new hay averages 6 stones (of 22 lbs .) in weight, and old hay from 8 to 9 stones; therefore, to get the weight of the stack, the number of cubic yards must be multiplied by from 6 to 9 according to the age of the hay.

Post cards 1d. each. Newspapers, books, printed papers, and circulars generally, the fee is $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. per 2 ozs. Patterns and samples $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. per 2 ozs . The postal rate for letters to foreign countries is $2 \frac{1}{2} \mathrm{~d}$. per $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{oz}$.

Greatest Eclipse, July 21 st, 1h. 14m. P.m., in Longitude $33^{\circ} 27^{\prime}$ W. and Latitude $68^{\circ} 44^{\prime} \mathrm{S}$.
Ends on the Earth generally, July 21st, 2h. 40m. p.m., in Longitude $11^{\circ} 37^{\prime}$ E. and Latitude $59^{\circ} 48^{\prime} \mathrm{S}$.
Magnitude of Eclipse ( $\bigcirc$ 's dia. $=1$ ) 0.337.
This Eclipse, like the one in February, will be chiefly visible in the Antarctic Ocean, far away from the habitations of Man.

Begins on the Earth generally, August 19th, 11h. 53m. p.m., mean time at Greenwich in Longitude $49^{\circ} 15^{\prime}$ E. and Latitude $71^{\circ} 46^{\prime} \mathrm{N}$.
Greatest Eclipse, August 20th, 1h. 13m. A.m., in Longitude $66^{\circ} 12^{\prime}$ W. and Latitude $71^{\circ} 0^{\prime} \mathrm{N}$.
Ends on the Earth generally, August 20ti, 2h. 32m. A.M., in Longitude $113^{\circ} 16^{\prime}$ W., and Latitude $46^{\circ} 49^{\prime} \mathrm{N}$.
Magnitude of Eclipse ( $\odot$ 's dia. $=1$ ) 0:315.
This Eclipse will be visible chiefly about the North Pole, Western Canada, and British Columbia.

Periods in the year 1906 when the Planets will be most favourably situated for Observation.

## ४ MERCURY.

As the year opens this "Swift-Winged Messenger of the Gods" will be seen shortly before Sunrise in the South-Eastern sky. Again, in the mornings about May 2nd and December 18th, he will be seen just before Sunrise, and in the evenings about July 15th and November 9th. His proximity to the Sun renders him a most difficult planet to observe with the naked eye. He shines with a bright, silvery light, which, however, is much inferior to that of Venus or Jupiter.

## 9 VENUS.

This beautiful planet will be too near the Sun during the first three months of the year to be seen with the naked eye, but in April it will gradually emerge from the Sun's beams and become a splendid object in the evenings right up to November when it will become stationary and soon be lost in the Sun's rays. Towards the end of December it will be a morning star, shining with great brilliancy in the SouthEastern sky shortly before Sunrise. This planet is the brightest in our system. Viewed with a good telescope it presents a crescent shape similar to the Moon about a week old.

## $O^{7}$ MARS.

The fiery Mars will be an evening star until July, then a morning star for the rest of the year. At no time during the year will it be well situated for observation. It will shine with a conspicuous ruddy light during the evenings of January and February, in the Western sky, and in the mornings, in the Eastern sky, during November and December. Not much has been heard lately about communicating with the inhabitants on this planet. It was a wild and chiidish idea. For aught we know the inhabitants of this planet may be as savage as wild beasts. Certainly the color of its rays does not lead one to think that there is much intellectuality or spirituality on its surface.

## 4 JUPITER.

This beautiful planet will be an evening star until the beginning of June, shining with a brilliant light in the Western sky during the early months of the year. After June it will be a morning star for the rest of the year. The best time to view it will be during December, when it will rise at Sunset and culminate at Midnight. During this month it will be a splendid object in the North-Eastern sky after Sunset. It is the largest planet in our solar system, and shines with a beautifully silvery light.

## h SATURN.

As the year opens this planet becomes lost in the Sun's rays, finally emerging from them as a morning star in the month of April. It will continue a morning star until August, when it will become an evening star for the rest of the year, appearing in the South-Eastern sky after Sunset. The best time to view it will be in October when it will culminate just before Midnight. On account of its Southern Declination it will not be well situated for observation in these parts at any time during the year. It is the most interesting planet to observe on account of its wonderful rings and the seven Moons which surround it.

## H URANUS.

This planet is often called "Herschel," Sir William Herschel being its discoverer. It is also called the Georgian planet, as it was discovered in the reign of George III. These names, however, are fast becoming obsolete. As the year opens this planet will be obscured by the Sun's rays, but in February it will be found in the South-Eastern sky before Sunrise. It will continue to be a morning star until the end of June, then an evening star for the rest of the year. It will be unfavorably situated for observation in these Latitudes the whole year, but in Southern Latitudes the best time will be in June, July, and August. It is a very distant planet and not much can be made of it without a telescope.

## 世 NEPTUNE.

The best time to view this distant and obscure planet will be during January, November, and December, when it will culminate near Midnight. Nothing, however, can be seen of it without the aid of a
good telescope, as its distance is too immense for the naked eye. Its motion is very slow, and it occupies something like 160 years to complete one revolution round the Sun.

The beautiful Sun, the fountain of all Light, Heat, and Life, will be nearest the Earth on January 3rd, and farthest from it on July 3rd. It will be Eclipsed, March 23rd, July 21st, and August 20th, (all invisible here). The Moon will be Eclipsed on February 9th, (partly visible), and August 4th, (invisible here).

The Sun and Moon are never stationary. A planet stationary, means stationary in the Zodiac, and not in the sky.

There will be no occultation of any planet by the Moon this year visible at Greenwich. The Moon will occult the planet Saturn several times but they will not be visible here. The Moon will occult the bright star a Tauri on February 3rd between 5.23 and 6.28 p.m., and again on September 10th between 2.27 and 2.43 a.m., both visible here.

## GENERAL PREDICTIONS. THE WINTER QUARTER.

The Sun in Capricorn, December 22nd, 1905, Oh. 4m. P.M.

The noon has scarcely passed when the beautiful Sun touches the first point of the Tropical sign Capricorn. At that time he will be on the Meridian, approaching the conjunction of the planet Uranus, and separating from the sextile aspect of Saturn and Mars, the latter planets being in conjunction in quartile to Jupiter and situated in the 12 th house. Mercury and Venus will be in conjunction near the cusp of the 9 th house. The proximity of the Sun to Uranus and in elevation denotes strange and unforeseen troubles to the Sovereign, probably sudden bereavement, or narrow escape from an accident. It also implies much trouble to the Government and the loss of a prominent Member by death. The position of Mars and Saturn shows much crime of a serious nature, and robberies and fires in abundance. The affliction of Mars and Jupiter does not augur well for trade and finance, and the Exchequer balances will be low, as a great expenditure is denoted. There will be much deceit and craft in the dealings of Foreign Countries with ourselves, for which our Government should be prepared, and a notable concession is likely to be wrung from us. Locomotion will not be successful. A heavy downpour of rain or snow for the quarter is threatened.

At Washington the Sun and Uranus will be in the ascendant, implying danger to the President, and strikes and an unsettled state of trade. Railroads will be particularly unlucky. In its foreign relations the Government will be successful.

At St. Petersburg Mars and Saturn will be in the 11th house, and the Sun and Uranus on the cusp of the 8th. These are unfavourable indications for the prosperity of Russia, and disaster will follow disaster with great frequency. Great and noble men will be in danger of a violent death, and the outlook for the Emperor is unusually gloomy.

At Tokio Jupiter will be strong in the mid-heaven, and Mars and Saturn will be setting. The former is an excellent position for the Mikado and his Government, but the malefics setting denotes an unsettled state of the foreign relations and powerful enemies.

## THE SPRING QUARTER.

## The Sun in Aries, March 21st, 1906, Oh. 53m. p.m.

The first face of the Regal sign Leo will be rising when the Sun touches the first point of Aries, and the latter sign will be culminating. The ingress takes place in the 9th division, and Venus and Mercury will be near the Meridian. Mars will be in the 10th house, Jupiter in the 11th, Uranus in the 6th in exact quartile to Venus and in sextile to Saturn on the cusp of the 9th. The Moon will occupy the 8th cusp. We find the Solar Orb in sextile aspect to the planet Jupiter, which is a favourable indication for the Sovereign and country, denoting prosperity. The lords of the 10th and 11th being
in mutual reception, but out of dignities, shows the Government will not be strong, but vacillating, changing its opinions, and hesitating in its policy. The 9th division, heavily afflicted, does not speak well for the shipping interest, which will suffer from low freights and competition. Sickness will be plentiful, and chiefly affecting the joints and chest, rheumatism and colds. The death-rate amongst the poor and common people will run very high. From the position of the ruler of the 2nd house the Revenue will be good, so that increased taxation will not be necessary.

At Washington Mars will have just risen, which implies quarrels and dissensions between master and man, as well as serious fires and accidents. Trade will not be good, and the Revenue not up to expectations.

At St. Petersburg Mars will be scarcely past the Meridian, which implies an anxious time for the Emperor and Government, although Jupiter in the 10th will help to ameliorate the worst significations. There will still be much unrest in that great Empire, and the flames of a revolution will be quietly smouldering, awaiting the first breeze of wind to fan it into a furious blaze.

At Tokio the Map is not important. Jupiter is setting, which is favourable in a general way, and the disposition of the other planets is unimportant.

At Vienna Mars will be near the Meridian, implying an unfavourable time for the Emperor and the Dual Monarchy. Much sedition will be prevalent. Shocks of earthquake will occur in the Southern Provinces.

## THE SUMMER QUARTER.

## The Sun enters Cancer, June 22nd, 1906, 8h. 42 m . A.m.

The last face of Leo will ascend and Taurus will be on the Meridian. Jupiter will occupy the cusp of the J1th, in which house the Sun, Moon, Mars, Neptune, and Mercury will also be found, either applying to, or separating from, the planet Uranus in the 5th house. Saturn will be near the cusp of the 8th, and Venus will be in the 12 th. The position of Jupiter is favourable for the Government, but the proximity of the Moon to Mars, and these two being in opposition to Uranus, denote sudden and unexpected events of a malefic nature; accidents and much crime. The death-rate during the quarter will be high, and bowel complaints will be prevalent and fatal. Young children and pleasure parties will be very unlucky, and the fatalities around our coasts will be heavy, as some very sudden and extraordinary accidents will occur.

At Washington Jupiter will be rising, denoting an improvement in trade, and the Revenue will improve. Much crime and some shocking murders will occur. There will be differences of opinion between the President and the Senate, which will not be easy of adjustment. The general weather for the quarter will be hot and dry.

At St. Petersburg most of the planets will be in or near the 10th house, which is a favourable indication, and some improvement will take place in the internal condition of the country. Saturn, however, is just setting, which looks like a bother with some Foreign Power.

At Tokio Jupiter will be setting, which is a good sign for peace and prosperity and friendly relations with Foreign Powers. Let us hope that the war with Russia will be ended long before now, if not, it will be brought about during this quarter.

## THE AUTUIVN QUARTER.

The Sun in Libra, September 23rd, 1906, 11h. 15m. P.M.
The Tropical sign Cancer will ascend and Pisces will culminate. Saturn will be entering the 9th house, the Moon will be on the cusp of the 6th, which denotes that the quarter will be unhealthy, and that much sickness, colds and influenza, will be prevalent. The ingress takes place in the 4th house, and the Solar Orb will be approaching the quartile of Uranus. This is unfavourable for the Sovereign and Government, denoting sudden and untoward events, and sickness or death in high places. Trade will not be good, and the Revenue will be deficient. The opposition of Saturn and Mars denotes many deaths through accidents and drotrning. Let those who travel beware, particularly if by water. It will be an unfortunate quarter for literary men.

At Washington the Map is important, as no less than five planets occupy prominent positions. The elevation of Uranus threatens the President with many evils, but let us hope he will escape personal violence. The significations are threatening. The affliction of the Moon on the cusp of the 9th denotes disasters at sea, and the sinking or destruction of vessels by storm or fire. Much sickness will prevail. The foreign relations will not be satisfactory.

At St. Petersburg Mars will be in the second, which denotes a poor Revenue, much distress and want in the land, and a great expenditure on war armaments.
At Tokio there will be unpleasantness with a Foreign Power, but the general state of the country will be healthy and prosperous.

## ECLIPSES.

Eclipse of the Moon, February 9th, parily visible.-This eclipse will produce foreign disputes, enmity, and danger of a rupture. It will affect the Sovereign and Government, and produce depression and doubt in the land. The weather will be very dry and the fruits of the Earth will perish for the want of moisture.

Eclipse of the Sun, February. 23rd, invisible,-As this eclipse will be visible chiefly about the South Pole, its effects in the Northern Hemisphere will be smail.

Ectipse of the Sun, July 21st, invisible.-This eclipse will only be visible in far Southern Latitudes, and will not affect this part of the world.

Eclipse of the Moon, August 4th, invisible.--Although this is a total eclipse, yet its effects will be small in these parts. In Australia and New Zealand it will produce drought, labour disputes, and depression in trade.

Eclipse of the Sun, August 20th, invisible.-This is a small eelipse and will be visible chiefly about the North Pole, the Western States of America, and British Columbia. Its effects will be small and unimportant.

## THE CROWNED HEADS OF EUROPE.

## RNGLAND.

The trine aspect of the Sun to the planet Uranus has made the King the most popular Ruler and person in Europe. He is on exceedingly friendly terms with every other Ruler, not even excepting the German Emperor, who is said to be jealous of the popularity of King Edward. Any one who compares the two nativities will see what a marked difference there is in the two natures, and what a frank, open, straightforward mind can accomplish towards the peace of the world.

From the positions of the Sun and Uranus the King's popularity is likely to increase rather than diminish, and for some time to come his influence in the Councils of Europe will be immense. The planetary influences are favorable for great and beneficent ideas, and by his tact and judicious handling of delicate questions he will place this country in the forefront of European Powers. The planet Neptune is creeping down to a quartile aspect to the Sun at birth, and by transit is in the 7 th division. This denotes many small troubles and anxieties in connection with his family, such as His Majesty has lately experienced with the Prince of Wales and the Princess Victoria, both of whom have undergone an operation. Should the King escape sickness during the present year (1905), he will be coming under better influences for health, although his family anxieties, denoted by the approach of Jupiter to Saturn, will not diminish.

The Queen was born December 1st, 1844, hour unknown, but I should judge very early in the morning, with the sign Libra rising, and Venus and Mars in the ascendant. Her Majesty is not yet clear of the unfavorable influences of Saturn, which will affect her health, and cause her much anxiety and sorrow, if not bereavement. This influence will last some time, and the passage of Uranus through Capricorn will not help matters. The outlook is not favorable.

The Prince of Wales was born June 3rd, 1865, 1h. 18m. a.m. The beginning of Aries was rising, and Neptune was in the ascendant. The influences operating during the latter part of 1905, and most of 1906, are decidedly unfavorable, and his Royal Highness will be fortunate if he escapes an accident or severe indisposition, the latter may entail an operation. The outlook is decidedly unfavorable.

The Princess of Wales was born May 26th, 1867, 11h. 59 m. p.m. It is curious that the planet Mars in the Prince's nativity occupies the exact degree setting at the Princess's birth! The influences for 1908 are not beneficial. The Moon gets heavily afflicted by Saturn, and Mars and Jupiter are approaching an opposition from the 1st and 7th houses. There seems a good deal of trouble ahead for this esteemed Princess and which it will be difficult to avoid.

## GERMANY.

Of all the Rulers in Europe there is not one more distrusted or held in more suspicion than the German Emperor. He has a way and will
of his own of a very capricious nature, in addition, he has a most intolerable conceit and aims at being the Arbiter and Ruler of nations not his own.

During the year 1906 we find the Sun heavily afflicted by Saturn, Mars, and Neptune, which will thwart his ambition and keep him in his proper place. In addition, there is very grave danger to his health, and a series of complications is threatened. Being vigorous and full of energy he may pull through, but the danger is great and real. The conjunction of Neptune and the Sun will harass and worry him in his family or domestic life, and there will be sickness or bereavement in his household.

There is no doubt that the Emperor's nerves are highly strung, and the victory of Japan over Russia has dashed to the ground his idea of a prepondering influence in China, and the acquisition of Chinese territory. He is anxious to be on good terms with the Japs, but the latter mistrust him, and not without very good cause.

## RUSSIA.

The Czar of All the Russias is under a cloud, a very dark cloud indeed! At present there is no silver lining to the cloud, but all is black, sombre, and appalling. The word has gone forth that the Czar's days are numbered, and, considering the planetary positions, it may be regarded as correct. Had the Emperor met the working men of St. Petersburg on that fatal 22 nd day of January, 1905, all might have been well, but, instead, his troops shot down the unarmed and defenceless crowd by hundreds. It has lefit its sting behind. Lord Byron says:-

> "Freedom's battle once begun, Bequeathed by bleeding sire to son, Though baffled oft is ever won!"
and so will it be in Russia. The Emperor has had his chance. He has thrown it away. The penalty must come. A bloody revolution will convulse the mighty Empire. Human progress cannot be stayed even by the hand of an Emperor. It may be checked at the point of the bayonet, but it cannot be finally arrested.

The influences operating are exceedingly evil. The Sun is in the Parallel of Uranus all the year, and the planet itself will be in opposition to the Sun's place, and will excite this Parallel. In addition to this, Mars is nearly in conjunction with the place of the Sun atbirth, and the Sun is approaching the quartile of Jupiter at birth. Such a combination of powerful and obnoxious influences seldom occur without some ameliorating position, but in this case there is none, consequently the curtain will fall. So far as the war is concerned there is no chance of retrieving the misfortunes which have dogged his Army and Navy from the very beginning. The only way to avert the crash would be to reverse everything. Conclude peace at once. Grant a generous Constitution. Kick the Grand Dukes out of the palace and let the Emperor take the nation into his confidence! By acting thus be would baffle the spirits of evil, but, alas, it will not be done.

## AUSTRIA.

The aged Emperor has trouble still before him, chiefly political, and in connection with Hungary, whose national aspirations aim at a separation from Austria. Great care should be taken of his person and health, for the influence of Uranus is powerful and obnoxious and threaten a sudden crisis. The Emperor is a great friend to England and one of the most just monarchs in Europe.

## ITALY.

Troubles threaten this young King. His nativity is not a fortunate one as many planets are in violent signs, yet the aspect of the Sun to Uranus will keep him popular with his subjects. He is threatened with some religious troubles. His exchequer will not be flourishing, and he will prove a very expensive Ruler.

## SPAIN.

The young King of Spain has his eye on the Princess Victoria Patricia, second daughter of the Duke of Connaught, who was born March 16th, 1886, just two months before the King. The positions at her birth are very striking, and an eventful life will ensue. I have already expressed my opinion of the King in previous almanacs, and hope an English wife will quiet him down, and help to allay his excitable temperament. There are strong testimonies of marriage, and, indeed, the influences generally are favorable for it. The parallel of the Sun and Saturn may produce indisposition, or an untoward event in his Kingdom.

## DENNARK.

The Fates are kind to this aged King. His nativity is a kingly one, and his mind and conduct are kingly. Born with the Sun in Aries he has all the attributes of a King. He has now the Solar Orb in opposition to Jupiter, and in semi-quartile to Mars, which are serious indications for an individual of his many years. Long may he live! It will be a misfortune for Denmark when he is no more!

## TURKEY.

The Sultan is still under adverse and sanguinary influences and will find it difficult to maintain his position. Let him be particularly careful of personal violence. With so many contrary and opposing races, he lives in the midst of conspiracy and revolution.

## JAPAN.

This little Country, with its $46,000,000$ inhabitants, has astonished the world. It has displayed qualities in strategy, in battle, and in victory, which European countries did not dream of. The patriotism of Japan runs deep. Its soldiers and sailors know no fear. Death is
preferable to defeat. They are not Christians. They do not understand the "forgiveness of sins" or "hell-fire." They believe that every one will be punished or rewarded according to his or her deserts. They are kind, hospitable, and devoid of revenge or resentment. What a good thing it would be if Christian Europe were like them! They have set Europe an example, let us hope it will follow it.

The Mikado is beloved by his people; and long may he live to deserve such devotion!

The planetary influences are on the whole, favorable. The Sun and Uranus are in trine aspect which will carry him through the present conflict with victory and renown. Let us hope peace will soon come and put a stop to the bloody struggle. There is strong evidence that it will take place in the summer of this year.

My desire is to see England, France, the United States, and Japan, all in one boat. It would be a guarantee of a favorable and lasting peace.

## FXPLANATION OF MHE HYEROGLYPEIC FOR 1905.

In the left-hand corner at the top are abundant testimonies of earthquakes, which have already been extensively fulfilled by the terrible earthquake in India, whereby some 14,000 lives were lost. In this country serious shocks have occurred, and in France and Switzerland seismic disturbances have been painfully frequent.

In the centre of the picture are shown a railway accident, also wrecks. Up to the present (May 1905) the year has produced more accidents on the railway than for years past, and the wrecks around the coast have been much in excess of the average. The fighting on land and sea at the bottom shows the great struggle between Japan and Russia, which is devastating Manchuria, and sending thousands of the unfortunate combatants to the grave.

We read of wars in the Old Testament, so I suppose there always were wars, and it is possible there always will be. "Those who take the sword shall perish by the sword." This does not look like peace. Until man is master of himself, not individually, but collectively, wars will occur.

April was an exceedingly cold and cheerless month, and kept vegetation very backward.
Quite right, it was not increased, but
The fall of Port Arthur at the beginning of the month. and the St. Petersburg Massacre on the 22nd, were sufficient to ar unse the dullest nature.

The numerous sudden deaths during the month will make it one to be remembered in many families for some time to come.

In every county scores of schools were closed owing to the prevalence of epidemic sickness.

Russia was in a turmoil. and thousands of persons in Poland were "done to death." The Grand Duke Sergius was assassinated.
Terrible wrecks occurred in March, and the loss of life was heavy. Colliery : xplosions and fatalities were also frequent.

His Majesty contracted a chill and was confined to his room for a short tine.
The disastrous defeat at Mukden was a cloud of the darkest nature.
A. "Jack the Ripper" murder of a little boy occurred at Manchester, and decrease was nothing to boast or.
The Princess Victoria had to undergo an operation for appendicitis, and the Prince of Wales also was operated upon, for what purpose was not stated.

The continual onslaughts of the Opposition reduced the majority of the Government to almost vanishing point.

A terrific fire broke out in some motor shops in Long Acre, and damage to the amount of $£ 250,000$ was incurred.

The Massacre at St. Petersburg occurred on January 22nd, and shortly after the Grand Duke Sergius was sent to his account by a bomb shell.
It is even so. From St. Petersburg to the Caucasus, and from Poland to Siberia the Russian peasants and workmen are waking up. Trampled under by despotism, starved and beaten into the bargain, they are turning like worms against the foot that oppresses them. Let us hope that the poor fellows will obtain their liberty without soaking the soil with their blood, or the blood of their oppressors.

## HINTS TO FARIMERS.

In last year's Almanac mention was made of the manufacture of alcohol in this country, instead of importing it. The Government appointed a Committee to go into the question, and it has issued a Report. Briefly it amounts to this:-That the present price of petroleum is so low that alcohol cannot be manufactured to compete with it, and that farmers cannot grow potatoes to sell at 20s. per ton, which they would have to do to compete with petroleum. That is how the question stands. But it does not appear to be a satisfactory settlement of the point. The wholesale price of alcohol is about 2s. 6d. per gallon. Now a ton of potatoes will produce 44 gallons of proof alcohol, or a total of $£ 510 \mathrm{~s}$. per ton. The cost of manufacture must be enormous if the manufacturer can only afford 20 s . per ton for the potatoes. However, there the matter rests, and I suppose it will end in nothing being done to give the Britisher a chance of participating in what is a most profitable industry in Germany.

There is a good deal of talk about the system of Co-operation in farming which exists in Holland, and it is stated that land can be cultivated on that principle at 25 per cent. less cost than independently, as in our country. It appears that the saving is chiefly through the use of machinery. But the more machinery the less manual labour required ; consequently, if the system were adopted in this country thousands of farm labourers would be thrown out of employment. Now, it is the bounden duty of our Government to do all possible to increase the number of farm labourers and not diminish it, because it is from this very class that the bone and sinew of our Army and Navy are drawn. Town-born children have not the stamina or constitution to stand the wear and tear of actual warfare, as was abundantly proved in the South African War. Therefore, the decadence of agriculture means a national loss which cannot be replaced, and which may one day result in a naval or military disaster of the first magnitude. This is not my opinion; it is the opinion of our great Naval and Military Officers and Instructors, who may be presumed to know what they are talking about. However, nothing influences any Government except votes; so, presumably, nothing will be done for agriculture.

Sow oats in Southern counties, 4 to 6 bushels per acre; also peas in favourable seasons, and barley in sheltered fields; also beans. Proceed with drainage operations, irrigation work, and marling; and with field and road-carting during frost. Prepare compost manures. Finish top-dressing grass. Attend to folding sheep; also to ewes and lambs, and to milch cows, the earlier of which will be calving.

Give calves pure milk, afterwards linseed soup and hay tea. Horses require full allowance of food. Buy seeds. 14 lbs. per acre of clover seed, with 1 bushel per acre of grass seed; 3 bushels per acre of Italian rye-grass; 5,7 , and 4 lbs . per acre respectively of carrot, mangel-wurzel, and turnip seed; 3 or 4 bushels per acre of rough sainfoin.

Work to be done.-Finish sowing spring wheat, continue barleysowing, also oats, peas, and spring vetches. Apply when necessary topdressings of soluble manure- 1 cwt . of nitrate of soda or sulphate of ammonia, with 2 to 5 cwt. of common salt, to corn crops in wet weather. Harrow, roll, and sow land for carrots now or in April; sow cabbage seed in plots for autumn crop in the field; sow sainfoin on calcareous soils; plant potatoes. The ewes as they lamb may be thinly distributed over the pastures. Sows should farrow their first litters.

April.- 2 nd and 3 rd, 6.10 to 7.10 A.M., 9.0 to 11.30 A.m., 5.10 to 7.50 P.M. ; 24th and 25 th, 4.50 to 5.50 A.M., 7.40 to 10.10 A.M., 3.45 to 6.25 P.M.; 30 th, 4.30 to 5.30 A.M., 7.25 to 9.50 A.M., 3.25 to 6.0 р.м.

Work to be done.-Wheat-hoeing; inish barley and oat-sowing; hand and horse-hoe beans; sow grass and clover seeds. Mangel-wurzel may be drilled or dibbled, 6 to 7 lbs. per acre, any time this month. Carrots may be sown, with a few ounces of turnip seed to show the rows. Plant drumhead cabbages 3 feet asunder each way, 4,840 plants to an acre; manure heavily for them. Potatoes may be coming through; harrow down, and then immediately "set up" the drills against frost. Sow flax early this month and hemp on rich soil; also lupines, in sandy soils; also lucerne, on good soils.

May. -3 rd and 4 th, 7.5 to 9.35 A.M., 3.10 to 5.50 P.M.; 26th, 5.40 to 8.10 P.M.

Work to be done.-Hoe wheat, oats, barley, beans, peas, potatoes, carrots, and parsnips; sow buckwheat, hemp, vetches, lucerne, and lupine; also rape for early feed, and swede-turnips in the north; finish mangel sowing; plough in manure for turnips; fallow operations of all kinds, whether for a crop or not. Grazing stock should be taken to the grass; attend to brood mares timed to foal about the beginning of the month. Gentle exercise is good before foaling.

JUNe.-1st, 5.10 to 7.40 A.m., 1.20 to 4.0 P.M.; 22nd and 23 rd, 3.55 to 6.25 A.M., noon to 2.35 P.M.; 27 th and 28 th, 3.35 to 6.5 A.M., 11.40 to 2.20 P.M.

Worlc to be done.-Sow turnips; ten loads of dung and 3 cwt . superphosphate are a common dressing; 4 lbs. of seed. Sow rape- 2 quarts of seed per acre in rows 12 inches apart; single carrots and parsuips; transplant cabbages. Horse and hand-hoe mangels; also kohl-rabi and swedes as soon as they are in broad leaf, and single them. Mow
clovers for hay, and meadows as they ripen. Sheep-washing and shearing to be attended to. Dairy management is at its height this month.
July.-5th and 6th, 11.5 to 1.40 P.M.; 24th and 25th, 9.50 to 0.25 P.м.

Work to be done.-Hay-making; prepare for corn harvest. Flaxpulling is carried on towards end of the month; rye ripens, and peas are ripe towards the end of the month. Hand-hoe root-crops; also lucerne, after every cutting. Pastures will require thinning, except where cabbages are ready to help. Sheep-shearing to be finished in the north; watch for fly. Insure all harvest produce against fire and hail.

AUGUsT.- 2 nd and 3 rd, 9.15 to 11.55 A.M.; 29th and 30th, 7.30 to 10.10 A.M.

Work to be done.-After harvest work get in stubble-turnips, trifolium, mustard, ryc. Seeds for permanent pastures may be sown now on a clean stubble; also trifolium incarnatum simply harrowed in after rain. Clean stubbles and prepare for wheat sowing and winter beans. Cabbage (drumhead), for planting next year, sow now. Flocks require dipping, salving, or smearing. Put rams to ewes for lambing in January.

September.-25th and 26th, 5.40 to 8.20 A.m., 1.50 to 3.20 p.m.
Work to be done. -Thatch and trim corn ricks; thresh rakings; plough stubbles. Apply lime to stubbles; also manure on clay lands and to meadows. Harvest potatoes. Sow wheat on a stale furrow, not too dry. A pound of blue vitriol dissolved in a gallon of water is a good dressing for a coomb of wheat.

October.-1st, 6.0 to 8.0 A.m., 1.35 to 3.0 p.M.; 22nd, 23rd, and 24th, 0.10 to 1.40 P.м., 3.0 to 3.45 P.M.; 27th, 11.50 to 1.30 P.M., 2.45 to 3.30 P.M.

Work to be done.-Dig potatoes; pull mangel-wurzel, carrots, and parsnips. Sow winter beans and winter vetches. Autumn fallow and manure with farm-yard dung for crops next year. Ditches should be cleaned out. In dry weather, sheep do well on rape.
November. - 1 st and 2nd, 11.30 to 1.0 P.m., 2.30 to 3.10 p.m., 4.15 to 5.15 P.M.; ; 19th and 20th, 10.20 to 11.45 A.M., 1.20 to 2.0 P.M., 3.0 to 4.0 P.M.; 23 rd and 24th, 10.0 to 11.30 A.M., 1.0 to 1.40 P.M., 2.45 to 3.45 P.M.; 28th and 29th, 9.45 to 11.15 A.M., 0.45 to 1.25 P.M., 2.25 to 3.25 P.M.

Work to be done.-Store roots, leaving heaps open at top for a fortnight before earthing up. Continue wheat sowing. Prepare water meadows for irrigation; plough corn stubbles; also clover stubbles for spring oats. Horses may have a diminished allowance of oats towards the end of November; hay or straw and carrots being continued. Put a whole mangel in the manger.
December. - 17 th, 8.30 to 10.5 A.M., 11.30 to 0.10 P.m., 1.10 to 2.10 P.M. ; 20th, 21 st, and 22 nd, 8.15 to 9.50 A.M., 11.10 to 11.55 A.M., 0.55 to 1.55 P.M. ; 25th and 26th, 7.55 to 9.30 A.M., 10.55 to 11.35 A.M., 0.35 to 1.35 P.M.

Work to be done.-Attend to claying, marling, and all cartage work during frost. Plough leas for spring corn. Cattle must be kept warm, dry, and clean. A dry bed is important in early lambing. Sheep in sheds must be attended to with reference to foot-rot. Draining, roadmaking and earth-work of all kinds may be attended to in hard weather.

## HINTS TO GARDENERS.

Gardening is not what it was ten or fifteen years ago. In the month of May forced strawberries would make 5 s . and 6 s . per lb . I see them quoted now at 8d. to 1s. 6d., which is a fall of 300 per cent., with every prospect of their coming cheaper still in the future. Cucumbers are down at least 100 per cent., and nearly all other garden produce has had a similar fall in price. Now, no amount of economy in production can balance this heavy drop, consequently profits must be very much less. The fall in the price is due more to over-production than to foreign competition, which in the spring months is not keen. Indeed, the Foreign fruit cannot compete with the English in flavour or quality. Take, for instance, the early French strawberries, which are sent over in shiploads. They are small, soft, tasteless things, not worth the name of strawberry. Again, what wretched things the foreign tomatoes are. Even the Channel Isles fruit is poor compared with the English. The same with cucumbers, the imported fruit is very poor and tasteless. Apparently, it must be our changeable climate that gives the quality to our garden produce.

The agricultural depression has driven thousands of farmers into gardeners, and it would be difficult to find a country mansion which does not send its surplus garden produce to market. Years ago it used to be given to the poor, and it may be so still in a few places, but such generosity is rare now.

A cure for the "spot" disease in cucumbers is announced, and subscriptions are being collected in order that it may be thoroughly tested. As my plants have never been troubled with this disease, I can offer no opinion about it, but the ravages in some districts are very serious, and hitherto it has baffled every attempt to cure. The cause is as much a mystery as the cure, and when once the plants get affected the crop is ruined. What is more serious, the spores of the disease remain in the soil, frame, or house (no one is sure which), and the next crop will be attacked, even if many years elapse, and the house or frame has been disinfected, washed, and painted, and the soil replaced. Sulphur, lime, and tar have been used, but to no effect. The spores survive, and spread with surprising and disastrous rapidity. It will be fortunate indeed if a real "cure" has been discovered.

The following are the most favourable times during 1906 for pruning, planting, transplanting, sowing seeds, \&c. :-

Jandary.-1st, 4th, and 5th, 10.15 to 11.5 A.m., noon to 1.0 P.m., 3.0 to 5.20 P.M.; 9 th and 10th, 9.5 to 10.40 A.M., 11.35 to 0.35 P.M., 2.30 to 4.50 P.M.; 27 th and 28 th, 8.40 to 9.30 A.M., 10.25 to 11.25 A.M., 1.30 to 3.50 P.M.

Worlc to be done.-For succession, a few early frame peas, common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw. Plant, prune, and train fruit trees and bushes. Form new flower gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, tulips, \&c. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, \&o. Herbs to be gathered are groundsel, chickweed, archangel, and others which are in flower.

February.-1st and 2nd, 8.20 to 9.5 a.m., 10.0 to 11.0 A.m., 1.0 to 3.35 P.M.; 6 th and 7 th, 8.0 to 8.45 A.M., 9.45 to 10.45 A.M., 0.45 to 3.15 P.M.; 23 rd and 24 th, 7.0 to 7.35 A.M., 8.45 to 9.45 A.M., 11.45 to 2.10 P.M. ; 28 th, 6.35 to 7.20 A.M., 8.30 to 9.30 A.M., 11.30 to 2.0 P.M.

Work to be done. When the weather is favourable, continue to sow peas, beans, onions, spinach, savoys, lettuces, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes. Cut early kidney potatoes for seed, and put them in a stove or hot-bed, in order to start them for planting out. Plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses, \&c. Prune vine and fruit trees. Herbs to be gathered : foalfoot, lingwort, pilewort, speedwell, chickweed, shepherd's purse, and broom.

March.-1st, 6.30 to 7.15 A.M., 8.20 to 9.20 A.M., 11.15 to 1.4 .5 P.M. ; 5th and 6 th, 6.10 to 6.55 A.M., 8.0 to 9.0 A.M., 11.0 to 1.35 P.M.; 27 th, 28 th, and 29 th, 4.40 to 5.30 A.M., 6.40 to 7.40 A.m., 9.30 to noon.

Work to be done.-The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflowers, broccoli, spinach, onions, carrots, peas, beans, savoys, parsnips, radishes, \&c. Plant red cabbage and sea-kale; sow cucumbers and melons in hot beds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. This is the best time for grafting fruit trees, perpetual and moss roses, \&c. Pot dahlias and cuttings. Plant pinks, polyanthuses, carnations, \&c. Herbs to be gathered for medicinal purpose: coltsfoot, fumitory, pilewort, ladyfrocks, lesser celandine, violet, and comfrey roots, and all kinds of herbal bark.

APRIL.-1st, 2nd, and 3rd, 6.10 to 7.10 A.m., 9.0 to 11.30 A.m., 5.10 to 7.50 P.M.; 24 th and 25 th, 4.50 to 5.50 A.M., 7.40 to 10.10 A.M., 3.45 to 6.25 P.M. ; 29 th and 30 th, 4.30 to 5.30 A.M., 7.25 to 9.50 A.M., 3.25 to 6.0 p.M.

Work to be done.-Plant rhubarb, artichokes, asparagus, sea-kale, Dutch turnips, German greens, and small salading. Earth up peas, tie up lettuces, and in dry weather water seedling beds. Sow annuals, biennials, and perennials. Plant evergreens, and propagate by cutting, jasmine, lavender, sage, rosemary, rue, \&c. Sow early Dutch turnips. Herbs to be gathered: ground ivy, dandelions, avens, buttercups, and others which are in flower, as well as all kinds of bark.

MAY. -5 th and 6th, 7.0 to 9.30 A.M., 3.5 to 5.45 P.M.; 26 th and $27 \mathrm{th}, 5.40$ to 8.0 A.M., 1.45 to 4.25 P.M.

Work to be done. -Sow peas, cucumber, red beet for pickling, and a full crop of kidney beans. Transplant cabbages, winter greens, cauliflowers, and celery. Hoe and stake peas, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant dahlias, and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, \&c. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots. Herbs to be cut: celandine, milkwort, moonwort, wood sorrel, and adder's tongue.

JUNE.-2nd and 3rd, 5.5 to 7.35 A.M., 1.15 to 3.55 P.M.; 22nd and $23 \mathrm{rd}, 3.55$ to 6.25 A.M., noon to 2.35 P.M. ; 30th, 3.30 to 6.0 A.M., 11.30 to 2.10 Р. M.

Work to be done.-Top beans and peas to assist the filling of the pods. Set kidney beans, and transplant cabbages, savoys, broccoli, and sow turnips. Thin out onions, leeks, carrots, parsnips, and early turnips. Shade and air melons, plants, \&cc. Bulbous roots that have
done flowering should now be taken up, and the off-sets separated. Herbs to be cut: avens, brooklime, centaury, comfrey, woodbine, valerian, eyebright, pimpernel, speedwell, and elecampane.

July.-26th and 27 th, 9.45 to 0.20 P.m.
Work to be done.-Sow turnips, radishes, \&e. Plant out broccoli, cauliflowers, savoys, leeks, and winter cabbages, and earth up celery. Lift full-grown winter onions, and prepare mushroom spawn. Gather medicinal flowers and sweet herbs, when in bloom, dressing them first in the sun, and then in the shade for winter use. Herbs to be cut are all that are in flower, as lavender, tansy, vervain, bedstraw, agrimony, cinquefoil, mountain flax, foxglove, and meadow-sweet.

August.-23rd and 24th, 7.50 to 10.30 A.M.; 29th and 30th, 7.30 to 10.10 A.M.

Work to be done.-Sow early cabbages and parsley for the succeeding year; also spinach, broccoli, and cauliflowers to stand the winter; earth celery ; hoe and thin turnips; transplant broccoli, savoys, and cauliflowers, and the principal crop of celery into the trenches for blanching. Make mushroom beds; propagate kitchen herbs by slips, and take up all onions, garlic, and shallots that are withered in the stem. Sow the seeds of bulbous flowers in pots. Herbs to be cut: mints and sage, golden rod, pond weed, yellow gentian, tansy, mugwort and loose-strife.

September.-2nd, 7.15 to 9.55 A.m., 3.25 to 4.55 p.m.; 25 th and 26th, 5.40 to 8.20 А.м., 1.50 to 3.20 P.m.; 30th, 5.25 to 8.0 A.M., 1.35 to 3.0 P.M.

Worlc to be done.-Plant savoys, broccoli, caulifowers, leeks, celery, and perennial aromatic and pot herbs. Hoe winter spinach and turnips, earth up celery and cardoons; prick out cabbage plants, gather ripe seeds, \&c. Pull onions if the tops appear dying. Plant cuttings of gooseberries, currants, raspberries, and strawberries, taking out the old stools which have twice produced fruit. Herbs to be gathered : angelica, field gentian, valerian, featherfew, southern-wood, briony, and wild berries.

October.-1st, 6.0 to 8.0 A.m., 1.35 to 3.0 P.M.; 27th and 28th, 11.50 to 1.30 P.M., 2.45 to 3.30 P.M.

Worlc to be done.-Plant home radishes, early cabbages, and other greens neglected last month, in sheltered situations; also cauliflowers, mint and tarragon, in frames for winter use. Earth up savoys and cabbages as high as the leaves. Take up carrots and parsnips; cut off their tops and bury them in dry sard. Crop the tops of parsley, to make fresh leaves for winter. Transplant fruit trees and shrubs after the 10th day. Gather tree seeds, and sow for stocks. Herbs to be gathered : ivy, yarrow, wall rue, shepherd's purse, broom, rape, wall cress, and wild berries.

November.-1st and 2nd, 11.30 to 1.0 r.m., 2.30 to 3.10 p.m., 4.15 to 5.15 P.M.; 23 rd and 24 th, 10.0 to 11.30 A.M., 1.0 to 1.40 P.M., 2.45 to 3.45 P.M.; 28 th and 29 th, 9.45 to 11.15 A.M., 0.45 to 1.25 P.M., 2.25 to 3.25 P.M.

Work to be done.-Dig the ground where crops are carried off, and which it is not intended to plant again till spring; manure and prune fruit trees. Shallots are readily propagated by offisets. A stiffish soil and open aspect should be preferred. These offsets or "claws" should bave their bases only pressed into the ground, without being covered.

Tulips and hyacinth roots may be planted. Herbs: not many to be gathered this month for medicinal uses, except rose moss, rock ferns and polypody.

December.-20th, 21st, and 22nd, 8.15 to 9.50 A.M., 11.10 to 11.55 A.M., 0.55 to 1.55 P.M.; 25 th and 26 th, 7.55 to 9.30 A.M., 10.55 to 11.35 A.M., 0.35 to 1.35 P.M.; 30th and 31st, 7.40 to 9.15 A.M., 10.35 to 11.20 A.M., 0.10 to 1.10 P.M.

Work to be done. - Set all sorts of stones, kernels, \&c. Complete tree planting, and forward all winter pruning. Continue planting various hardy roots, bulbs, and shrubs. If frosty weather, be particular to protect all tender plants, trees, \&c. Earth up celery. Sow small salad in warm borders, covered with mats. Herbs to be gathered: rose moss, rock fern, polypody, evergreens, and mistletoe.

It is to be regretted that very little baking is done at home now, and half the house-wives could not make a loaf of bread if they were paid to do it. Home-brewed beer, practically speaking, is a thing of the past. How many households brew their own beer? The duty on brewing, put on, I regret to say, by a Liberal Government, is responsible for much of this. Home-made beer can be drank to satiation without the slightest ill-effect; not so publicans' beer, which crazes the brain, unstrings the nerves, and ruins the kidneys. If a milkman adds a little harmless water to his milk, he is prosecuted and fined, but there is no law to prevent the Brewer from putting all kinds of injurious chemicals into his beer. Such is the common sense of our Legislators !

Hatching fowls by means of an Incubator is very common now; but the best and cheapest incubator is an old Cochin-China hen, which will sit three months at a stretch, and bring off two or three hatches of chickens. These hens are heavy and clumsy, so the chickens should be removed as soon as hatched.

## LEGAL AND COMMERCIAL NOTES.

A master or mistress need not give a character, but if given it must be true,
In searching a servant's boxes a search warrant should be obtained.
If a servant leaves without notice he can be sued for damages unless his life or person is in danger.
A month's wages or warning may be given to a servant at any time; it matters not whether the wages are paid qcarterly, monthly, or weekly.
If a servant wilfully disobeys, or is guilty of misconduct, he may be dismissed at once.
A servant's wages cannot be stopped on account of illness.
A servant is not bound to do work for which he or she was not engaged.
A servant is liable for wilful damage done to her master's property; the amount must not be deducted from wages; a summons should be taken out.

Yearly tenancies require a half-year's notice, to expire at the time of year it began.
Landlords are not bound to keep the outside of houses in good condition.
Notices to quit should be in writing.
Tenants can remove their goods up to the day before the rent is due.
If rent is not paid when due and applied for, distress may follow.
Rent is really not due till midnight, so a distress cannot be made on the day it becomes due; no distress can be levied on Sunday, Good Friday, or Christmas Day.

A distress cannot be levied between sunset and sunrise.
When a distress is made and the rent paid before entry, no expenses need be paid.
A bailiff must not break into a house, but he may enter by the chimney.
If a person finds anything he must make an effort to discover the owner.
It is illegal to set traps on land with strong-smelling baits or to poison birds and beasts.
Gleaners have no lawful rights as gleaners.
If the public way is out of repair a person may trespass on adjoining land.
To set spring-guns or man-traps anywhere is an illegal act.
If a lodger's goods are seized for rent due by his landlord, he should apply to a magistrate at once.
Any one holding a lottery is liable to a fine of $£ 500$.
Any one taking part in a raffle is liable to a fine of $£ 50$.
Payment of a debt need not be made on a Bank Holiday.
Marriages must be celebrated between 8 A.M. and 3 P.m.
A person is of age on the last day of the twentieth year.
If a person within arm's length threatens to strike another he is guilty of assault.
All wagers and bets are illegal, and money lost or won cannot be recovered, but he who cheats can be punished.

The birth of a child must be registered within six weeks.
A will must be in writing, signed by the testator, and witnessed by two persons. A will does not require a stamp.

An executor must distribute the testator's property within one year of his death.
An illegitimate child cannot take property or money under the term "children."
When a man dies without a will and without children, his wife takes half the property, the next-of-kin the other half, When there are children the wife takes one-third. See Almanack, page 60.

A person under twenty-one cannot make a will.
A gamekeeper may kill a dog pursuing game on his employer's land.
The police can enter licensed premises at any time.
Publicans must not sell spirits to any person under sixteen years of age.
A husband has no power over his wife's property without her consent.

The age for consent to marriage is twelve for females and fourteen for males.

Cousins in any degree may marry.
A marriage is not valid when either party is impotent, idiotic, or insane.

A copyright extends to forty-two years.

Waste Land by the side of the road belongs to the adjoining freeholder or the lord of the manor.
Copper coin is not legal tender beyond 1s., or silver beyond 20 s., but gold may be tendered to any amount.
Payment of interest on a debt takes it out of the operation of the Statute of Limitations.

Wearing apparel and tools are protected from seizure under an execution from the County Court.
The Bank of England does not allow interest for money deposited for security.
A guarantee or payment of a debt must be in writing.

## EXPLANATION.

## THE CANCER SCOURGE.

Up to the present the Cancer Research clique, with their fund of $£ 100,000$, have discovered nothing, absolutely nothing, either as regards the origin or the cure of this dreadful affliction. I am sorry, but not surprised. Knowing the great and increasing number of cows and bullocks which suffer from it, I still think Vaccination is the cause of its increase. At present thousands of poor cats and dogs are being experimented upon in the vain endeavour to discover the origin of it. The poor brutes are inoculated with the germs of the disease, they suffer and die, and science is not one whit the wiser.

I have received a great many letters during the past year on this subject. One writer affirms that its cause is syphilis; it may be so, but I fail to see what syphilis has to do with the Bovine tribe, or with cows and bullocks.

I would suggest to the Cancer Researchers that a committee be appointed to visit slaughter-houses and ascertain the approximate average number of animals suffering from the disease. If I mistake not, I think they would find a very high percentage; but this suggestion is likely to fall flat on account of the close connection between calves and vaccination.

Two of my correspondents have sent me recipes for the cure of cancer. One affirms that a tea made with the flowers and leaves of Red Clover, and a pint drank each day for three months, will cure it. I'wo bad cases he knows that were cured by it. Another says that the juice of the woolly-headed thistle or Friar's Crown put on the sore several times a day will arrest its progress. To keep the juice sweet, an eighth part of rectified spirits of wine should be added.

These remedies, as the writers call them, are very harmless, and if they don't do any good they cannot possibly do any harm. In the case of cancer and other incurable diseases, every known recipe should be tried, because constitutions vary so much, that what may be useless in one case may cure another.

## THEOSOPHY.

It is some time ago since I made any particular mention of Theosophy, but my readers must not suppose that my belief or interest in it has in any way flagged or declined. On the contrary, I am perfectly convinced and satisfied that it is the one Religion (if I may term it a Religion) that will stand the tests of time, science, and criticism. Theosophy is the trunk, and the other Religions are the branches, offshoots, or twigs. Look at the current literature of the day, and in nearly every book we find Theosophic ideas, more or less, although some are presented in a crude and indefensible manner. Re-incarnation, which, thirty years ago, was not dreamed of in this Country, is now a corner stone in the belief of many thinking men. In the far East, in India, China, and Japan, Re-incarnation is one of the main pillars of their religion; the other pillar is Justice; cold, merciless Justice, meting out to each one exactiy his or her due, whether in good deeds of bad; a reaping of what one has sown, as
mentioned by St. Paul in the Acts of the Apostles. Jesus preached the same doctrine, yet the Christians of the present day try to shield themselves with the idea that their sins will be forgiven if they simply ask for it to be done! How sensible people can delude themselves with this idea in the face of what is written in the Gospels is a mystery. The wish must be father to the thought. But I am digressing. Theosophy is the key to other Religions. It does not quarrel with, or contradict, Science or Geology. It explains the phenomena of Life in a clear and common-sense manner, without any "ifs" or "buts." It points out the way by which any one living can ascertain for themselves what the life after death is like, although very few possess the resolution or nerve to go through the ordeal.

Lastly, I would invite those who are not satisfied with the dogmas and teachings of the orthodox Religion to look with an open mind into the teachings of Theosophy, for, after all, our future existence is much more important than the present life, which, compared with the future, is no more than a bubble on the surface of water, it is formed, it floats for a short time, and disappears, swallowed up in its parent element. All that is born must die, and all that is wrong must cause sorrow.

## NOTES BY THE WAY.

There is a squabble amongst doctors over the cancer microbe. Some deciare that it does not exist. Others assert that they have found it! It may interest the former to know that there is a cancer microbe. It is of the same nature as the microbe which springs into existence upon the death of an individual, or when mortification sets in. It is really the microbe of dissolution. If from any injury or lack of vitality a portion of the human organism becomes, as it were, dead, the demon microbe springs to life and cancer sets in.

That cancer is hereditary no one will deny. It is the same with consumption and many other diseases; the individual is born with a disposition in his system towards these diseases, which only await the first opportunity to spring into active life. It is the outbreak of cancer in families with no hereditary taint which, apparently, must be laid to the charge of vaccination.

The hospitals are beginning to have a hard time of it. Subscriptions are falling off. People are beginning to see that these Institutions exist more for the education of the student than the alleviation of suffering. Instead of students paying for their medical education, as they ought to do, the subscribers and donors pay for it. The pockets of the charitable ought not to be drawn upon to educate young gentlemen who are quite able to pay for it themselves.

It would be interesting to know how many persons die each year under the iafluence of chloroform administered by medical men. In London alone it amounts to between 50 and 60 people, and if the average is the same all over the kingdom, it means that 250 to 350
are killed yearly through the clumsy administration of this most useful drug. It would be interesting if a question were asked in Parliament about this.

## OUR HOSPITALS.

There are some people who think that the hospitals are splendid Institutions to leave their money to. I think if they were better acquainted with what is going on inside of these so-called "splendid institutions" they would be far less enamoured of them, and would consider them as they truly are, but training colleges for the inexperienced student, who is allowed to try his skill on the poor patients. If the readers of this Almanac have read some of the following extracts from a book entitled, "Anti-Vivisection Evidences," by Benjamin Bryan, they must have felt horrified and shocked that such things could be allowec o go on in places which are supposed to be for the, if not cure, at least, relief of the patients:-
"Patients admitted to hospital in dying condition, made the subject of minute and tedions examinations, merely to furnish reports to the medical journals."-British Medical Journal, June 7th, 1879.
"Patient admitted to a hospital suffering from a most painful skin disease ; he was in a most miserable condition from pain and irritation! His cure was purposely delayed in order to demonstrate to the students that nature alone, without treatment, would not effect it."-British Medical Journal, January 7th, 1882.
"Poor woman, admitted to a hospital in a dying condition, made the subject of constant observation and examination with tuning forks, etc. These examinations were continued till her death, which occurred twenty-four hours after her admission."-British MLedical Journal, October 27th, 1883.
"Experiment of producing a hideous disease by inoculation with the matter from sores of persons suffering from it."-British Medical Journal, January 9th, 1886, p. 57.
I could quote scores of other cases worse than these, but will content myself with an instance which came under my own observation :-
"A lad was bitten by a dog which had rabies. He was stricken with hydrophobia; his mother called in a doctor, who after attending the poor lad for some time strongly advised her to send him to the hospital, as he said he might last a long time. After much persuasion she consented. He was taken away about 9.0 p.m., was a corpse by 4.0 the next morning, then, unknown to his mother, they made a post-mortem examination." I ask: What was he taken to the hospital for but to be a subject for the students?
In the case of my own brother, who was wishing to be treated in the hospital. When it was mentioned to our family doctor, he said, "Do not send him; and were he my brother he should not go. I have not walked the hospitals without knowing what they are like." We did not let him go, and he got well. If you want to give your money to good Institations let it be "Convalescent Homes," for these deserve it, as they do an immense deal of good, and have been the means of restoring to health thousands of suffering people.

I turn to the table and find that the first influence after 8 A.m. occurs at 11.15 A.M. and is G, or good; it is also followed by another good one at 11.19 A.m., consequently the news or proposals will, in all probability, turn out successful or beneficial. But suppose it was 8 A.m. on February 19th, I furn to the table and find an influence at $8.50 \mathrm{~A} . \mathrm{m}$. which is B, or bad, consequently the news or proposals will not turn out satisfactorily, and had better be left alone.

Suppose a person comes to me on January 18th at Noon, and wants me to buy something, or proposes something new to me, I furn to the table and find at 3.14 P.M. there is a large $G$, which shows that the proposal is favourable, or that I may buy; but if the same thing occurred on the 21st, I find the influence is bad, and consequently I should leave everything alone.

If the influence is signified by a small letter, use great care, as it is of a weak nature, also if a little $g$ is followed by a large B; but a small $b$ followed by a large $G$ shows a little trouble at first, then that the matter will turn out favourable in the end.
