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OBJECT OF EUGENICS ASSOCIATION.

In September of last year the *Examiner* printed an article that the Breeders' Association of Washington, at the request of Dr. W. M. Hay, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, had decided to appoint a national committee to form an association for the study of the laws of reproduction of the human race. Though animals, the flora and fauna of the world had long been carefully studied in their multiplication by the highest and best means and minds, and united had accomplished wonders for their classes, man with highest number of nerves on each side of the brain, was last to receive this careful study, and there they appointed on the work called "Eugenics" the following famous committee:

David Starr Jordan, President of Stanford University.

Dr. Aleander Bell, of telephone fame.

Dr. C. B. Henderson, President of the University of Chicago.

C. W. Ward, of New York.

Major Charles Woodruff of the United States Army.

Rev. J. B. Gilbert of Washington, L.L.D.

Dr. Whiting of Washington.

Also a physician of Holland.

Dr. W. M. Hay, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, Secretary of this Committee.

The object—to make a careful and scientific study of the propagation of the human race, and the acquiring of means whereby the race can be made more healthful, intellectual and successful, which is the inherent right of every child.

A glorious inspiration came to me, but its inception was from the mind of an old friend, a mine promoter, whom I met on the street in Oakland, Sunday, December 2nd. He spoke of the article in above paper and



said: "Why do you not open the Eugenics work here? Your theories are good of planetary influences; you helped me; and this work is in your line." I said 'I had read the article and would go to work at once.' Too busy Monday and Tuesday, however, to think outside of office work, on Wednesday, at 4 P. M., and darkness closing for the eve, I suddenly thought of my promise and went to the phone and called up reporters from the Examiner, Call, Chronicle, Bulletin and Oakland Tribune; they all came inside of twenty eager to know what was new. I gave each a different talk on Eugenics and set the first meeting only two days ahead. We had an excellent class of people, thirty-seven in number, representing quality, not quantity, ready for the work, and now we have two clubs in San Francisco and one in Oakland, called the "American Eugenics," and a large club in Los Angeles. We also now have a State Association, Mr. A. C. Grimmer, President, with nine members of the Board of Directors, incorporated, and the work is progressing wonderously.

Mr. Burbank and Prof. Larkin of Mt. Lowe, who is State Honorary President, have been specially helpful, as the papers they send to be read in our clubs are treasures. Prof. Sawvell and Gen. O'Brien of Berkeley have kindly framed our constitution.

We have also an invitation from the London Club, England, to join their society, which we have accepted. Their President is Right Hon. Lord Avebury, L.L.D., F. R. S.; their presiding officer Sir Edward Brabrook, C. B.; their corresponding secretary Hon. Victor V. Bradford at 24 Buckham street, Strand, W. C.

It was a strange coincidence that Bernard Shaw of London and a man of same name here should be the inspiration to Eugenics.

We have met with many obstacles, such as the rainy season, the little troubles that come to all good works. but fearlessly the five newspapers above mentioned have stood with us. They have done all we have asked and have invited us to report often.

Our first impulse was to get ready to publish a little handbook, setting forth the principles of Eugenics. Watched by good angels we have now closed that chapter, and hand you this little treasure, filled with the sweet incense of unselfishness. We have often stumbled and run against rocks; once we thought we had gone on a lee shore; but no! everything in nature, said Eugenics, had come to California to stay.

Done by loving, kindly hands, the little book just asks you to turn a while from the commercial side of life and let us take a step higher in theories for the emancipation of children. Who will respond? We are not one-idea people, but mortals asking for light and wisdom that will produce a clean, high-born child. Prof. Overbeck has a knowledge of the functions of the appendix and cæcum, which he offers to give to the public through Eugenics. We have letters from an Alaska miner who says: "Now, that is the kind of work! Eugenics is what is needed. Call on me to help at any time." Also from many localities and every county in dear old California has now reported by letters of encouragement.

We say this is the "August broadening of the light," of which Richard Realf, the dying poet, prophesied, somehow, somewhere, sometime matchless power will fall on this work, and blessings will reach out from the poor in distress, benedictions from the haunts of shame, and little children's love, and old men's prayers, because in the principles of Eugenics the arching skies will brighten, because Eugenics teaches love and peace and natural law. The moment of procreation will be a scientific study; the prenatal influences which are about 12 per cent; the hereditary, 6 per cent; environment, 18; the remaining 64 charged to the planets operating at birth are suggested as a fair division of influences. Who has a better division is needed at once in this work.

1906 in June ushered in an era of romance to continue for 147 years, and now all nature sings together for advancement in purity of conception, freedom for the bodies of women and higher knowledge of procreation

for men. The inaccuracies surrounding the philosophies of propagation are great. I have a specific idea as to the evoluton of the race, which Dr. Kepler, the great German scientist, said was "the best he had ever heard." With the support and co-operation of the leading scientists of the world, and the best that is in the minds of all good men and women, Eugenics promises to revolutionize the present status of society and change Section 96 of the Civil Code of California.

DESTINY OF EUGENICS ASSOCIATION.

Women of the United States, will you not form thousands of eugenic societies everywhere for selfprotection and child culture? Would that I could travel throughout the nation, visit every eugenic-well-bornsociety, and personally tell the women in their own lecture-rooms what I cannot put into print. For eugenics, the highest science, is "very low," you know! How many women have ever heard of arrested embryonic development? On this mountain I have seen several cases where love changed to hate within one second of time. You now see how prisons are filled.

PLANT LIFE AND CHILD LIFE.

I am constantly impressed with the similarity between the organization and development of plant life and human life. The crossing of species is important—the environment greater—and a child the most sensitive of al living things to its surroundings. They are the sensitive plate of the camera.

Every influence leaves its impress upon them. The



task of education is to assist natural development toward its destined end.

As the beginning gives a brace to the whole afterdevelopment, so the early beginnings of education are of most importance. A child should be reared close to nature.

I do not work with diseased plants. A child must be a healthy animal. A properly prepared child will make immediate, pronounced and permanent progress if the forces are rightly and constantly applied. Do not be cross with a child;—love it;—be gentle;—surround it with an atmosphere of peace and beauty. I do not mean for a day or a month, but for all the years. We cannot treat a plant tenderly one day and harshly the next, and expect it to thrive. We are training not for a day, but for the future, for posterity.

The injury wrought to the race by keeping too young children in doors in school is beyond the power of anyone to estimate. They should not be pressed into school 'til the brain is formed, which is from 8 to 10 years of age.

The most dangerous man in a community is the one who would pollute the stream of a child's life. Nothing is doing so much to break down the nervous systems of Americans as this mad rush, this over-crowding and cramming of child life before the age of ten.

We must care tenderly for the orphans and the waifs. They must have wise, sane, consistent State aid; I am opposed to all sectarian aid. I would do away with all asylums of all types for the indigent, except under care of our nation. The ancients destroyed the physically weak, and thereby maybe destroyed a poet,—a painter,—a statesman,—a scientist,—a leader of great thought,—what we should do is to cultivate the weak. I would enlist the broadest of State aid for the unfortunate in environment, as well as for the unfortunate in mind.

Plants are most stubborn living things in the world; the most difficult to swerve, as their habits are intensified by thousands of years,—may be traced backward through eons of time in the very rocks themselves.

Their wills are of unparalleled tenacity. Where it comes to so sensitive and pliable a thing as the nature of a child

the problem is easier.

Heredity is simply the sum of all the effects of all the environments of all past generations on the responsive, ever-moving life forces. As time goes on in its endless and ceaseless course, environment must crystallize the American nation.

FREEDOM.

Looking up the word "wife," the term used as the feminine of the masculine "husband," I found it did not mean "mistress of the house," as husband means "master of the house." That "wife" is not by derivation a word of honor at all, but rather the reverse; being derived from the same root word as "weaver," a menial household employment in olden times similar to that of kitchen servant or "scullion," and thus by both derivation and immemorial custom the word wife came to mean a household drudge, a servant without wages, but to whose other numerous employments were added the duty of satisfying her husband's sex-appetite—his gender sense and also that of bearing to him children—especially sons, of whose paternity there could be no reasonable doubt. so that the master of the home could have an heir of his own begetting, to inherit his estate. The fact also that the wife was required to take the family name of her husband, the same as his other bond slaves or chattels, is additional proof that "wife" was not intended to be a title of honor, as was that of "husband," but rather a token—a badge of servitude of serfdom. The ancient history of institutional marriage shows as soon as a man began to accumulate property, horses and cattle, fields and houses, gold, silver, etc., he found he needed slaves, serfs, to help him accumulate, and to help care for his property, so he bound the woman, the weaker and more dependent specie of the human family, to himself as a servant, a household drudge and to minister to his passions, and lest she should become tired of his service, lest she should want to be self-owning, or want to serve some other man in these capacities, he bound the woman to him for life, and by the most solemn of religious. public ceremonies and vows of obedience, of eternal constancy and affection, and as men made the laws they



gave to each other the right to kill their wives if they should become "unfaithful" to their marriage vows, also the right to kill the man who should invade the husband's vested right of property in the person and service of his particular woman.

This death penalty is not now so common, owing to the slow but gradual growth toward civilization and enlightenment. What the husband wants is a salve for his wounded pride as serf holder and demands a good round sum to be paid by the seducer for the offense of "alienating the wife's affections," whose affections had likely been alienated by her husband long before the seducer appeared.

CAN AMERICA AFFORD TO LOSE?

Professor William I. Thomas, in the American Journal of Sociology, has sent forth a series of articles that has aroused the ire of women. Professor Thomas, who is connected with the department of Sociology of the University of Chicago, speaks of the "Adventitious character of Women," and when we scan his statements closely we find them to be very useful as arguments in favor of equality of men and women before the law. His conclusion has all the egotism of finality that the male teacher has always relegated to himself. He is not to be blamed for that, for therein lies the strength of the argument we desire to use.

If Dr. Thomas could look at woman from woman's point of view, there would be no real need for the evolution of the woman into the elector. He cannot do this nor can any man. That is why women must speak for themselves. No one but a woman can express her private judgment at the ballot box, or anywhere else.

Women as slaves of slaves are bound to men by chains stronger than welded steel. They keep the whole race in bondage, and thus make the Eugenics Association more than a necessity.

All that each human being can do to help enlighten humanity is needed right now. Women are getting awake and the power they will exert will be enormous, when they accept responsibility.

The great mother principle in nature, the conservative force by which humanity is perpetuated, is the special gift given to woman, for which she must account at the last. She will account and humanity will have joy on that day.

The world has been too long a man's world. Women have been forced into the background by an environment well recognized and admitted by all students of history. Men have defeated their own effort because they have not comprehended the truth; that a race cannot rise while one-half of that race is in bondage. If men were the sons of their fathers only, and women the daughters of their mothers, then it might be good for men to take all they can by physical force, and for men to browbeat and flatter women into being their slaves. But the stern law of nature makes the offspring partake of the qualities of both parents. All the silly talk about the superiority of one part of the race over the other, ought to be laid aside as too childish for use.

If women have developed certain traits by reason of their environment, those very characteristics are needed everywhere; that is, the expression of opinions coming from that character. The good will be conserved, the bad eliminated in time. The inexorable fact is that woman is half and that half must be free to help or it will forever hinder and the high purpose of Eugenics never be realized.

One means of awakening women is the ballot. Women who vote and are responsible for the laws under which they live are bound to be more responsible than so many wards who miss that opportunity.

The mother nature is different from the father nature.

It is to be hoped they will remain different. Women do not need and do not wish to vote as men. They do not wish to vote as imitation men. It is as women they wish to be known and felt in the politics of their country. The emancipated woman will not be a man. She will not be an imitation man. Imitations of any sort are disgusting. All her centuries of slavery have not destroyed her. Will a little freedom annihilate her? It is woman, woman, without prejudice or apology, at the ballot box that America needs. America needs her women, not for the sake of the improvement that will come to the women alone, but partly because women will certainly improve upon the science of man government.

Woman's opinion has weight because she is different, because her environment has forced her to look at things in different light from that in which men see them. The argument presented by learned professors and other people that women are not in the game, is the one argument that forever proves that women should have expression.

If men had made a notable success and women were liable to interfere with that success, if things were so well with the world that there was no need of Eugenics and other correctives, then the fact that women are different might be a reason for barring her. But the hideous failure of our man-made civilization is a self-evident proof of the fallacy that half of a thing can ever be greater than the whole.

"Before law made us citizens, great nature made us women," and by denying us electorship, the man citizen has robbed himself of his own freedom and best development.

Let America look well to this, for Professor Thomas is surely prophetic when he says: "Certain it is that no civilization can remain the highest if another civilization adds to the intelligence of its men the intelligence of its women."

CONSTITUTION OF THE EUGENICS ASSOCIA-TION OF CALIFORNIA.

Having in mind an ideal state of society, in which perfect human beings shall be developed, we hereby organize ourselves together for the attainment of that high standard.

ARTICLE I.

NAME.

This organization shall be known as the EUGENICS ASSOCIATION OF CALIFORNIA.

ARTICLE II.

OBJECTS.

The objects of this Association shall be the promulgation of human culture.

ARTICLE III.

OFFICERS.

The Officers of this Association shall be a President, a Vice-President, a Recording Secretary, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, and four Directors, the whole constituting a Board of Directors. The above Directors and Officers shall be elected at the annual convention of delegates from local organizations. All elections shall be determined by a majority vote of those present.

ARTICLE IV.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

The duties of these Officers shall be those usual to such offices. The nine Directors shall have general supervision of this Association between conventions. Five shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE V.

AMENDMENTS.

This Constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of delegates at any annual convention, previous notice of same having been given.

D. 1907, which Articles and the copy thereof contained the required Statement of Facts, to wit: First, the name of the Corporation as aforesaid; second, the purpose for which it is formed; third, the place where its principal business is to be transacted; fourth, the term for which it is to exist; fifth, the number of its directors or trustees, and the names and residences of those who are appointed for the first year. And I do hereby further certify that the Articles of Incorporation set forth the holding of the election for directors, the time and place where the same was held, that a majority of the members of such Association were present and voted at such election, and the result thereof; which facts were verified by the officers conducting the election.
