

Know the Secret Yourself



For the benefit of those who may be a little skeptical in regard to the influence of personal magnetism, we beg to ask the following decisive questions:


I. Does not one person influence another?

In other words, if there is such a thing as personal influence, is it not presumable that the man who goes about it with a definite plan and system would accomplish more than one who went at it in a haphazard sort of a way? You cannot deny that some people do exert an influence over others. Neither can you deny the advantages of a systematic method over a careless perfunctory method.

What is Hypnotism?

AVING considered personal magnetism as applied directly to the individual and his successes in operating upon his fellow men while they are unconscious of it, it is pertinent to inquire into the mysteries of the great general science of hypnotism, of which personal magnetism is but a specia manifestation.

Different Theories

Hypnotism is one of the subtle mysterious forces of nature which can be more accurately described than defined. It is best known from its marvelous results. it as the crowning triumph of intellectual achievements, and mark a new era in the history of science. For what can be more wonderful than a force which molds the minds of men, which harnesses the intellectual faculties of a human being and directs the channel of his thoughts and his desires, and which alters his very personality?

Different Stages

Hypnotism may be divided into several different stages, each exemplifying different manifestations. You may cause one to obey your commands while he is perfectly conscious, knows you are influencing him and realizes everything that is going on as well as what he is doing, but still he cannot resist carrying out your suggestions.

There is another manifestation or stage in which the subject becomes unconscious, obeys your commands and when restored to consciousness does not remember anything that he has done. His mind is a perfect blank to all that has transpired. In this state all sorts of illusions and hallucinations may be created. The subject may be made to fish or swim upon dry land; to fight bees where none exist; to sing, speak or dance, or do any ridiculous thing the operator may suggest.

Post-Hypnotic Suggestion

You may give the subject a command to do something a month or a year hence; when awakened he will not know what has been told him, but when the time comes he will carry out your command, doing just what you told him to do and he will never suspect that you or any one else has given him a suggestion, but will firmly believe it his own idea, and think that he is doing it solely because he wants to do so. Suggestions of this kind are called post-hypnotic, and when given they should be of such a character as not to bring any great hardship upon the subject.

Certain in its Effects

Post-hypnotic suggestions may be used to inspire in persons a love for study or work, to correct bad dispositions in children, to endear one to his home, to dispel the "blues," to enable one to obtain control of that which legitimately belongs to him, to cure drunkenness, and the morphine habit, to restore the affections of those who have become estranged, to make one liberal who is stingy by nature, and in hundreds of other different ways. It is absolutely certain in its effects. When given under proper conditions a subject has never been known to fail to carry out the suggestion. When the subject obeys these post-hypnotic suggestions he is perfectly wide awake and in his natural state, and to those around him seems to be acting solely from his own impulses. This is one of the most marvelous, wonderful, and mysterious phases of hypnotism.





YALE GRADUATE USING HYPNOTISM

The Rev. George B. Cutten Successfully Treats Victims of the Alcohol Habit— Baptist Pastor's Power—Places a Youth Under the Influence and Removes the Taste for Cigarettes—Relieves Neuralgia Also

Cures Victims of Alcohol

New HAVEN, CONN.—Hypnotic experiments are being tried several times each week by a young clergyman in the psychological laboratory of Yale University to cure victims of alcohol and of cigarettes.

Persons who have passed the gloomy and somewhat dilapidated structure adjoining the Yale divinity school, in Elm street, about 10 o'clock three or four mornings of each week during the summer vacation, have wondered why such broken down men were seen going in. These men called to see the Rev. George B. Cutten, the football centre rush on the '96 eleven, who was graduated from the academic department in the class of 1897.

Mr. Cutten spent the three years following his graduation in special study in psychology,—theoretical and experimental. Hypnotism and magnetic influence took up much of his time when he was not busy preaching or making pastoral visits. A hard worker is Mr. Cutten, and a friend of the poor. His church, the Hope Baptist Congregation, has grown tremendously since he was ordained to that charge.

An Aid to Religion

Mr. Cutten's theology is of the practical sort. He visited police courts and eleemosynary institutions. What he saw led him to think of the influence of science as an aid to religion as a cure for sin, and he began to experiment first with a boy who was addicted to the cigarette habit in such a degree that his mind and body were suffering.

He brought the boy from the Calvary Baptist Home and began to experiment on him by hypnotism. When he had put him under the influence, he lectured him on the terrible effects of the habit, and told him to shake it off, and the result is that the boy does not smoke cigarettes now.

But it is with alcoholic victims that Mr. Cutten is most concerned. To-morrow morning at ten o'clock, three or four men will gather in the upper room. They look dissipated. The stamp of liquor is on their features, but they are better men than they were three weeks ago, and they are hopeful because they have seen other men who have become total abstainers because two months ago they began to take the hypnotic cure.



Dr. Fillebrown, of Harvard, Says that Hypnotism has Become a Standard Remedy

NEWARK, April 16.—Dr. Thomas Fillebrown, professor of dentistry at Harvard University, has come out publicly in favor of using hypnotism instead of medicine to prevent pain in treating sensitive teeth.

He talked on the subject to the Central Dental Association of New Jersey, and related instances where he had filled teeth and extracted them painlessly by hypnotic suggestion on the patient.

Hypnotism has long been used secretly by prominent dentists, but they have publicly denied the use of it.

Used in Filling Sensitive Teeth

Dr. Fillebrown said that he could fill the most sensitive tooth, or even draw it, without causing much, if any, pain. He didn't believe in throwing the patient into a complete hypnotic state. He said it was something like faith cure in some respects. He had often, he declared, persuaded a patient to forget all about the operation.

"I don't wish you to understand that I hypnotized the patients," he continued "But I did the next thing to it. They were conscious that they were in my chair, but they thought about all sorts of things except the fact that I was cutting into their teeth. It was better than laughing gas or medicine."

STRANGE POWERS OF J. C. MONTGOMERY

Who is a Picturesque Person—Could Go To Congress—He Prefers to Stay at Home and Enjoy Wealth While He Cures Hopeless Cases by Magnetism Montgomery's Hypnotic Mayor

CHARLESTON, W. VA., Dec. 7.—People in this county and Fayette have wondered for years why J. C. Montgomery, mayor of the town of that same name,

located on the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad, in the heart of the soft coal region, should be the most popular man in the whole section, and how he came to be elected mayor of his town, term after term in succession, till no one can remember when he was not at the head of the municipal government.

That Montgomery had the qualities which always rendered their possessor popular could not be denied. He is a democrat, and the town gives three hundred republican majority, but that makes no difference in the certainty of Montgomery's election every time a mayor is to be chosen. He has had opportunities to go to Congress and the Legislature, but he has refused all of them, preferring to rest content with modest honors among his own people. The squire owns half a dozen farms, business blocks, half a hundred cottages and property of all sorts.

He has never posed as the miners' friend, but he has more influence with them than anyone else on earth, and during a difficulty last year he dispersed a mob which even a show of bayonets would not quell.

He's a Hypnotist

But now, although the above qualities are good reasons for popularity, the true reason for Montgomery's power over his fellows is coming out. Montgomery is a hypnotist. About a year ago he became interested in a peculiar case of blindness, where a poor miner lost his sight in the mines, on account, as the doctor said, of the degeneration of the optic nerves, from constant work in the dark. Montgomery tried hypnotic influence upon the man. He decided that if his will power and that of the patient could be sufficiently controlled and directed toward restoring the lost sight, it would be accomplished. Montgomery called at the miner's home day after day and expatiated on his theory and used hypnotism on the patient, till at last there was a partial return of the sight. The work was kept up for fully a month until he was able to go to work, and now he can see very well with the aid of a pair of spectacles.

Cured Judge Brazie

The next person to be relieved by this healer was Judge Brazie, of the Fayette court. After the mine riots of last year he was completely broken down and forced to take to his bed from nervous prostration. He had eminent medical attention, but it did little good, and a trip for rest and health did not revive him. Mr. Mont-gomery, a close personal friend, called on Brazie one day and said he believed he could do him good. He held Brazie's head in his hands for half an hour, stroking it gently and rubbing the back of his neck. The next day Brazie was so nearly well that he notified the temporary judge in charge of his court that he would assume his duties again on the following Monday, which he did. He has been a well man since.

A few days after, the mother of Miss Mamie Brown, a near neighbor of Montgomery's, asked him to do something for her daughter who had been subject to epileptic fits constantly for seventeen years. The young woman was unable to leave her home, and Montgomery went to see her. She was in a fit when he arrived. By stroking her head and face he soon restored her to her normal condition. He called every day for a week, and at the end of that time, without the use of any



remedy except his magnetism, Miss Brown was restored to health, and today is a bright hearty girl, having recovered her strength and youthful spirits.

Rheumatism Banished

From time to time others came to be healed of rheumatism and other common ills, and in nearly all cases Montgomery was successful. He made no pretensions and promised no one to do more than try his power. From some of those who were able to pay and offered money he accepted it, but he was not making a business of healing, and asked that as little as possible be said about his work, as the people calling on him seriosly interfered with his personal desires as to the manner of spending his time. However, his fame spread abroad, and letters by the hundreds

In a minute the invalid realized that he was not being trifled with and began hopping about the room in ecstacy. He could jump, run and skip about like a boy, and so happy was he that he could not control his desire to use his legs and arms, and screamed and laughed for joy. Herrmann went to work in three days and has had neither pain nor stiffness since. Ex-Governor E. W. Kilson was a member of the party who saw this cure.


Hypnotism Over the Wires

The tests were pronounced absolutely fair by the physicians who attended. They were, indeed, surrounded with such complete precautions that it would have been impossible to practice any fraud or deception, even if such a thing had ever been thought of. Whenever the hypnotists were talking over the long distance telephone, the direct telegraph wires were clicking in the same room, telling the spectators just what was being done by telephone between the two cities. When the telegraph wires were in use by the hypnotists the critical spectators had the long distance 'phone at their disposal to keep check on the proceedings at both offices.

DR. QUACKENBOS TELLS MOTHERS TO USE HYPNOTISM WITH CHILDREN

In Paper Read Before State Convention of Clubs at Sandy Hill New York Scientist Startles the Delegates—How Influence Accomplishes Good

Paralysis of Will Inconceivable

MOTHERS who went to the State Convention of Mothers' Clubs held in Sandy Hill recently to get new ideas on the rearing of children got them. There were almost as many theories as delegates, and fathers and others tolerated by courtesy or invited to instruct the mothers presented opinions so varied and so novel that notebooks bulged large with their contents at the end of the session.

Nothing, however, startled the mothers quite so much as the paper of Dr. John D. Quackenbos, of this city, on the power of mothers to train their children in right thought and action through hypnotic influence. There were about eight hundred persons in the audience, the majority of them mothers, and they were variously moved by wonder, amusement and mystification during the reading of the paper. The doctrine was new to almost all, and the exposition of it bewildering to those who were hearing it for the first time. But the lecture produced a great impression and gave the mothers something to think about, report to their clubs and experiment with when they returned to their homes.

"In practical hypnotics," Dr. Quackenbos told his hearers, "the best thing one has to give is himself, but he must be as his inspiration. The regenerating force is • measured exclusively by the quality of soul in him who suggests.

"Suggestion of this high order is capable not only of transforming character, but of opening men's hearts to the divine illapse. On the contrary, to deflect by suggestion from the perpendicular of right a pneuma governing its body along ethico-spiritual lines is practically impossible to a hu:nan agent. Hence, moral injury can hardly be inflicted through suggestional channels. Those who are good may not be debased; so-called hypnotism is not used for criminal purposes.

Bad Soul And Bad Cell

"It is because ethical energy is potential in man as the created copy of God that successful appeal may be made to the transliminal self in states of unstable moral equilibrium. And assuredly there is no man or woman, however seemingly enthralled by sin, who is not capable of regeneration and of moral greatness. As in intellectual disqualification, some subtle degeneration of the cell—due to poisoning by tobacco, fusel oil, morphia or other drugs, or traceable directly to physical disease or to heritage—may explain the swoon of conscience. Brain defect unquestionably accounts for that distortion of God's image in the act of its transmission which we know as insanity. It were uncharitable, therefore, not to distinguish between a bad soul and a bad cell, and wise to remember that man is not by nature, but by unnature, sin loving and sin living. 'God hath made man upright,' and the image of God in the man cannot be obliterated by wrong doing. It prompts those periodic longings for escape from sin that characterize every depraved career.

"Yet the flesh may become so pronounced in its demands for indulgence **that** the objective will is impotent to grapple with the situation. The subject apprehends his spiritual danger and rallies at intervals, only to be drawn with resistless force back into the deep waters of his specific sin. For such a wretch the Almighty has **pr**ovided a way of escape through appeal to the godlike in his constitution. In **a**



state of hypnosis he is made to realize the inherent dignity and worth of his human nature; he is urged into revolt against the sin that holds him in durance, and in response to the inspiration abandons the life he is leading for one that is in harmony with his newly apprehended relationship to God and duty.

"While acquiescence in the treatment is essential, will power has nothing to do with the result. Paralysis of the will, which is the bête noire of the popular mind, is inconceivable. The mesmerizee works out his own salvation in his own objective life, without conscious effort of any kind, or, if the blacklisted feelings or impulses should fugitively recur, it costs him no struggle to banish them. Mark well, it is not the will of another that constrains and regenerates, it is not God compelling worthy action; it is the free man himself that has come to his own assistance. How true the words of Helena in "All's Well: "—

> Our remedies oft in ourselves do lie Which we ascribe to heaven.

Gospel of Self Help

"God helps those who help themselves. Grace may indeed be had for the asking; but the surest way to secure additional grace is to use that already bestowed upon us. This is the line of my exhortation to a sleeping subject. I preach the gospel of self-help, and transliminal interference to regulate a disordered function or straighten a crooked moral bent is self-help.

"The doctrine of the utter helplessness of man, which has for centuries unsouled the Christian, is taught neither by Jesus nor Paul. God does not create souls without good in them, without power in themselves to help themselves.

"To the personality that apprises an apparently helpless soul of its own intellectual and moral powers and makes plain the possibility of conquest through self-help, the truth an enfamined world craves today, that soul flows out in a great tidal wave of recognition, gratitude and reciprocal stimulation. And the possibility of asserting a slumbering intellectual courage that clearly discerns and a moral courage that grandly undercrests is open to all who have lost sight of the godlike in their own lives. There is a divine potency as well as an old Adam in every human being, and the divine potency will always win if given half a chance.

Applies to The Child

"I have dwelt thus at length on the nature and the efficacy of transliminal inspiration in order that you who are to teach it and use it as mothers, may fully appreciate the sovereign force you have at your command. What applies to the man applies with double force to the child.

"Children, as a rule, are more impressionable than adults and the fulfillment of suggestions given to them is more pronounced and more permanent. Here the result of suggestion amounts practically to regeneration, moral perversity not having become fixed by the indulgence of years.

"In the training of children tactful suggestion has power to exalt both the intellectual and ethico-spiritual nature. Differences induced by objective education may be obliterated; and the fundamental endowments of that finer_spiritual organ in which under God we have our highest being—endowments conferred by Deity on all human souls without favor and without stint—dominate the intellectual life.

"The divine image is supreme in the child, and creative communication on the broadest lines and the most exalted planes becomes possible. The principles of science, of language, of music, of art, are quickly appropriated and permanently retained for post hypnotic expression through appropriate channels. Confidence in talent is acquired, and embarrassment, confusion, admission of inferiority are banished from the objective life—by placing the superior self in control.

"Many children are contrary, disobedient, lacking in reverence for superiors, troublesome or destructive to an extreme. They are abnormally ungovernable. Kindly persuasive measures, the line upon line, precept upon precept treatment are inefficacious. Corporal punishment is equally impotent to accomplish reform. They are helplessly graceless or wicked because they have come into the world under the spell of some heteroclite impulse which compels acts for which they are not responsible.

"In some instances the tendency is distinctly hereditary. These subjects, born with brains perhaps capable of education, physically without stigma, lack absolutely the will power to resist temptation. Nor can that will power be created and reinforced by the ordinary means employed in case of children who 'know better' and yet are deliberate wrongdoers. How careful are parents to guard a child against the evils of hereditary in physical disease! Why should they not be equally concerned to discover the appropriate treatment in the case of maladies that are mental or moral in their nature? Such children left to themselves are certain to develop into moral monsters.

Black Sheep by Chance

"Other children are chance black sheep, bearing no recemblance in their unfortunate traits to parents, grandparents or remoter ancestors. In all such cases of inherited or accidental mental deformity, castigation is the remedy of fools. As well whip a child for multiple fingers, knock knee or spinal paralysis. The warped mind can be straightened and strengthened only by judicious suggestion; there is no other known instrumentality through which it can be speedily and permanently modified.

"There are children who are unnaturally stupid, of sluggish intellect, born without the ordinary ability to concentrate thought or rivet attention, with defective memories, easily confused, embarrassingly self-conscious, so that the mind becomes a blank under the pressure of a necessity for reflection, or if thoughts are there the vocal mechanism refuses to express them.

"For these conditions, as well as for habitual indolence, disinclination to exertion and cowardice, suggestion is the philosophical treatment. Where medication, moral influences, institutional discipline, change of scene and companionships are of no avail, carefully directed suggestion, if confidently persevered in, is, humanly speaking, sure to awaken intellectual perception, impart mental alertness, improve the memory conditions and substitute self-reliance for diffidence and timidity.

"A troubled mother writes to inquire whether a child of six can be satisfactorily influenced by hypnotic suggestion—'a sensitive, nervous, high strung, exceedingly affectionate boy, but cursed with a painful lack of courage in his contact with other boys. This leads to a perpetual persecution by his companions. besides being in itself deplorable, inasmuch as it is a trait indicating lack of manliness. By nature he is exceptionally truthful, but at times I suspect this supreme timidity may lead to deception through fear of consequences.'

Perfect Subject for Hypnosis

"But you are already asking yourselves whether you can accomplish such results, if the necessity should arise, in the children intrusted to your care. You certainly can. Each mother in the land can make her children what she wishes them to be, provided she is a woman of high moral principle, gentle and patient, apprehensive of the power of transliminal appeal, possessed of courage to apply it with intelligent persistence and having ardent faith in its effectiveness. And she may suggest with point before her child is born. All mothers know, or should know, the influence of maternal thoughts and feelings upon the nature of expected offspring. Useful In Reformatories



Balloon Ride

Next hypnotize a number of subjects and have them take an imaginary balloon ride. Show them various places of interest. Take them to England, tell them that they see London, etc. Also have them visit Paris. Tell them that they can see the pretty girls in Paris, and have them flirt with them. Tell them the girls are making faces at them, and that they must make the ugliest faces they can in turn. Also show them prize fights between noted prize fighters. Let them see tight rope walkers walking over rivers, etc. Anything that the operator may think of may be introduced. The comments and actions of the subjects in this scene will keep those present in a continuous roar of laughter.

Singing and Dancing

Hypnotize several of them, tell them that they belong to an opera company. Have them sing grand opera and comic opera. Also have them sing solos and make them waltz. As a closing incident to this scene, you may have some one dance around the room with a broom, telling him the broom is a young lady.

Hypnotizing by Telephone and Cards

If a telephone is convenient, as a matter of scientific experiment you might hypnotize some one by this means. This is a most startling feat, and never fails to astonish everyone present. Also hypnotize some one by having him look at a card which you have prepared for the purpose. A good plan is to put the card in an envelope, hand him the envelope, requesting that he open it. In these tests, suggestions are made to the subject when he is asleep. He is then awakened, and in his natural waking state he carries the suggestions out, not knowing from whom he received the command.

If there is a cigarette smoker present, hypnotize him, make proper suggestions for the cigarette cure, then awaken him. When he is awakened he will not remem-

ber what you have told him. A short time after, if he has any cigarettes about him, he will throw them away. If any person offers one to him the sight of the cigarette will make him deathly sick.



A Startling Experience

HE greatest difficulty is experienced in gaining any information concerning the secrets of the high-caste fakirs, so closely do they guard them from the profane mind, transmitting their stores of knowledge only to their chosen Then, too, the centuries of flesh diet and widely different mandisciples. ner of living have set up a barrier between men of the European races and these vegetarian sages that even the intensest concentration and purity of purpose on our part cannot tear away; in other words, we cannot, if we would, experience their feelings. Although many have tried it, from motives widely varying, few Westerners have had the strength of will and body to pass through the ordeal exacted from all those who seek for knowledge, and those few who have penetrated into the outer court of the temple of mystery are not apt to reveal their experiences to the world of vulgar curiousity. He was privileged to witness many marvelous feats, of which probably the most convincing and inexplicable one is now related for the first time.

While at Singapore I was the guest one evening of a gentleman who had long been a resident of India and who was a most profound Oriental scholar, and during a discussion of these very fakirs I expressed my opinions of their general humbuggery in the positive terms of youth. I looked eagerly at the man who possessed such wonderful power, and was somewhat disappointed to find him very little different from other aged natives, until we drew closer, then, never in all my life had I looked upon one who impressed me with the feeling of age-centuries instead of years might be the markers of this man's life-and yet he seemed young and vigorous. 

HYPNOTISM TO BE COLUMBIA'S NEW STUDY

Prof. Hyslop Gets Promise of \$100,000 to Establish Such a Department if Like Sum is Provided for the Course

Donor's Name is Not to be Made Public

THAT an institute for the special study of hypnotism as a science may become a part of the curriculum of Columbia University is now more than a mere possibility, and is the hope of Professor James H. Hyslop, who has already been promised \$100,000 as a nucleus for the large fund that would be required to successfully establish such a department.

A report which gained currency that John D. Rockefeller had signified his willingness to give \$100,000 toward the establishment of a department for the study of hypnotic suggestion caused much interest among disciples of the cult as well as among the friends and faculty of Columbia University, and was given credence because of the fact that several years ago Mr. Rockefeller had given the university a like amount for the department of psychology. * * * *

Will Not Disclose Identity

"No, I am not at liberty to tell the name of our would-be benefactor, nor can I even give the exact amount of his offer; but the report that a hundred thousand dollars is available so far for this purpose is not erroneous. However, to launch such a department successfully and to insure its continued success would require a million dollars. This amount is not in sight as yet, and possibly it may not be forthcoming, and it is too early to talk of any definite plans.

"The plan to which I referred in my paper, read before the Medico-Legal Society at the Waldorf-Astoria, is still in too nebulous a form for me to discuss it at present. * * * * *

Hypnotism Valuable

home rather late and found him suffering from croup, which I feared might develop into membraneous croup of a malignant type if not treated at once, as he experienced such difficulty in breathing. 


As Others See Us

Rochester is rapidly becoming the center of large educational interests. 




