

THE VOICE OF THE HEAVENS. JANUARY, 1909.

THE New Moon of the month occurs just after midnight of the 21st, when the last face of Libra will be rising, Saturn will be in the sixth house and Jupiter in the eleventh. The lunation falls on the cusp of the fourth house in sextile to Mars and Saturn. Venus is in the third in square to Saturn. Venus ruler of the figure in square to Saturn points to much nighter in square to saturn points to much want and privation in the land, a great deal of sickness, and much mortality among the fair sex. Some artist or writer will be numbered among the great majority. The Exchequer Returns will be considerably augmented, but expenditure will be exceptionally heavy, naval and military matters claiming a large amount. Dissatisfaction and unrest will be shown in railways and postal affairs, depreciation of stocks, and a falling off of The weather is likely to be very revenue. cold. Children and young people will benefit, although disputes over education and religion will still cause trouble. Saturn in the sixth points to epidemic disorders, influenza, and cerebral com-plaints. Foreign affairs will be more satisfactory, but Neptune in the ninth will affect shipping, and colonial matters. South African and Indian affairs will still seethe with perplexities. The strong position of the Sun is good for the King and Government, though the latter will have much opposition to contend with. Jupiter in the eleventh, shows legislation affecting the working classes, but owing to the planet being retrograde, it is doubtful whether much will result therefrom.

Turkey will benefit from this lunation, and reforms in Armenia may be inaugurated for Jupiter culminates at the moment of the New Moon in that country.

THE VOICE OF THE HEAVENS.

THE VOICE OF THE HEAVENS. MAY, 1909.

THE lunation on June 17th, occurs just before midnight, and falls in the fourth house, an augury of trouble to the Government, losses at bye-elections, and differences in the Cabinet. The above table will be found very useful for my gardening and farmer readers, for they will now be able to see at a glance when the moon is in a good sign for their operations. Page 30 explains the nature of the signs. Suppose I wish to plant some peas in April, on the 24th and 26th, I find the moon is in a good (Cancer), and which I find on page 30 to be a fruitful sign, hence I plant my peas on either the 24th or 26th of April. And if I wish the seed to grow very quick, I should plant as the moon is rising; for I find on page 30 that \mathfrak{F} is a moveable sign, and hence it will accelerate the germination and growth of the seed. This is also a good time for cabbages, lettuces, beans, and all sorts of rules.

In April I think of putting in some beet, and it is necessary that these should germinate very quickly, so that I must have the moon increasing in light, in a moveable sign, and a moveable sign rising. I find on page 10 that there is a new moon on the 20th, so from that date to the end of the month the moon will be increasing in light, and by looking down the column of April, page 29, I find 52 (Cancer), and by examining page 30, I discover that this is a moveable sign and that the moon is in that sign on the 24th and 26th April, and as the) is in that sign, it follows that when the moon is rising that sign is rising too; hence I drill my beet with all speed during those days and hours. At the end of April the sign Cancer will rise from 8 to 10 a.m.

I think these examples will make the use of the table quite apparent,

FAIR AND FOUL WEATHER TABLE.—This Table is the result of many years' actual observations, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the earth; and will by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of her quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail.

1. The nearer the time of the Moon's change, First Quarter, Full, and Last Quarter is to MIDNIGHT, the fairer will the Weather be during the seven days following.

2. The space of this calculation occupies from Ten at night till Two next morning.

3. The nearer to Midday or Noon these phases of the Moon happen, the more foul or wet the weather may be expected during the seven following days.

4. The space of this calculation occupies from Ten in the Forenoon till Two in the

Atternoon. These observations refer principally to Summer, though they affect the Spring and Autumn nearly the same.

5. The Moon's change, First Quarter, Full, and Last Quarter happening during Six of the Afternoon hours, i.e., from Four to Ten, may be followed by fair weather;

Six of the Arternation noise, i.e., from Four to fell, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the Wixt, as noted in the Table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of Autumn, the whole of Winter, and the beginning of Spring, yet in the main the above observations will apply to those periods also.

In deep caverns the heat of Summer is felt at Mid-winter, and the cold of Winter at Mid-summer.

Light travels at the rate of about 191,000 miles per second.

The velocity of sound is 1,125 feet in a second at a temperature of 61°, or about-50 miles in 4 minutes. Great discrepancies exist in the measurement of the velocity of electricity. For

copper wire the estimates vary from 112,680 to 2,700 miles per second. For iron wire from 62,000 to 18,780 miles per second.

One cubic foot of pure gold weighs 1,210 lbs., pure silver 655 lbs., cast iron 450 lbs., copper 550 lbs., lead 710 lbs., tin 456 lbs., and pure platinum 1,220 lbs. Standard gold consists of 22 parts pure gold and 2 parts of copper, or other metal. One lb. of silver is coined into 66 shillings.

PAWNBROKERS' REGULATIONS.

FORFEITURE.—Pledges for 10s, and under must be redeemed within twelve calendar months and seven days from the date of pledging. At the end of that time they become the property of the pawnbroker.

Pledges above 10s. if not redeemed within twelve calendar months and seven days from the day of pledging, may be sold by auction by the pawnbroker, but may be redeemed at any time before the day of sale.

Within three years after sale the pawner may inspect the account of the sale in the pawnbroker's books on payment of one penny, and receive any surplus produced by the sale. But deficit on sale of one pledge may be set off by the pawnbroker against surplus on another.

If any pledge is destroyed or damaged by fire, the pawnbroker will be bound to ray the value of the pledge after deducting the amount of the loan and profit—such value to be the amount of the loan and profit and 25 per cent, on the amount f the loan.

If any ticket is lost, mislaid, or stolen, the pawner should at once apply to the pawnbroker for a form of declaration to be made before a magistrate, or the pawnbroker will be bound to deliver the pledge to any person who produces the ticket to him and claims to redeem the same.

When the loan is 5s, or under the charge on form of declaration is one halfpenny; when the loan is above 5s, one penny.

LEGAL TENDER OF MONEY.—The tender of Bank of England Notes is legal in England and Wales for every purpose, and by any (except by the Bank of England). Noone, however, can be compelled to give change. Silver is not a legal tender for sums over two pounds, nor pence and halfpence for sums over one shilling.

Farthings are not a legal tender for more than sixpence.

One-half of the hearing fees will be saved by giving written admission of the debt five clear days before the hearing, to the Registrar; or if the defendant and plaintiff arrange and sign a memorandum of the conditions of payment at the Registrar's Office, or in presence of a solicitor, before the cause is called on.

When the plaint is for £5 or upwards, either party can claim a jury five clear days before hearing, paying 5s.

No charge for paying money into or out of court. No mileage for serving summonses or executing process, with the exception of serving subpoenas. In plaints for recovering possession the fees are to be calculated on the amount of rent for the letting—that is, by the week,

that is, by the week, month, or year. Arrears of rent to the extent of £50, calculated to the day of hearing, may be included in the same plaint.

When a debt is admitted as to part, such part may be paid into court, with the proportionate fees. When a less sum than the amount sued for is recovered, the defendant is only to pay the costs on the sum found to be owing, unless the amount is reduced by set-off.

RAILWAY INFORMATION.

The real inventor of the Locomotive, as well as the Motor Car, was Richard Trevithick, a young Cornish engineer, who, on Christmas Eve, 1891, conveyed the first load of passengers ever moved by mechanical traction or the force of steam; and in February, 1804, he completed the first Locomotive that was ever made to run on rails. Five wagons, loaded with ten tons of iron and 70 men, were coupled to the engine, and a journey of ten miles was completed in a little over four hours. The engine was made to travel five miles an hour. In 1816, Trevithick went to Peru as a mining engineer, winning and losing several fortunes, and in 1832 he returned to England, and died penniless, without a friend or relative, and was luvied in a prayard's grava.

returned to England, and died penniess, without a friend of relative states buried in a pauper's grave.

The next train was run between Stockton and Darlington on September 27th, 1825. The speed did not exceed five miles an hour. The engine was driven by George Stephenson himself, and is now preserved in the workshops of the N.E. Railway Company at Darlington.

COMPULSORY REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS.

In the case of births, parents must effect registration within 42 days after birth, under a penalty in default; and when the 42 days have expired, the Registrar is under a penalty in default; and when the 42 days have expired, the Registrar is empowered to compel their attendance at his offices for the purposes of such registration. The period during which births may be lawfully registered (subject to payment of fees after three months) is extended from six to twelve months. In case of death the nearest relatives of the deceased present at death, or in attendance, are liable to a penalty if the registration be not effected within five days, except when notice is sent to the Registrar with a medical certificate.

REGISTRATION IN SCOTLAND.

In Scotland a birth must be registered within 21 days. A marriage must be registered within three days. A death must be registered within eight days.

English bids fair to become the universal language; already it is more widely spread and more freely spoken than any other tongue. In Europe it is regarded as the language of polite society. On the vast Australian and North American Continents it is the one speech, and in the East fully 18,000,000 of Hindus, Mohammedans, Buddhists, and others, read and speak English. In point of numbers at the present time it is exceeded by the Chinese alone.

WHERE TO FIND A PROVED WILL.

To find a will proved before 1st January, 1858, the date on which the Court of Probate Act, 1857 (20 & 21 Vict. c. 77), came into operation, it is best to search first the index to the wills proved in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, which is kept at Somerset House. Failing this, the will is probably to be found in the registry of the district in which it was proved. The wills proved prior to 1858 were all distributed among the district registries when these institutions came into existence. To find a will proved since 1858 is a far simpler task. It must have been proved either at the Principal Registry at Somerset House, or in the registry of the district in which the testator lived. In the former case the original will itself is carefully preserved at Somerset House, the copy of which probate has been granted is in the hands of the executors who proved the will, and another copy for Parliament is bound up in a folio volume of wills made by testators of that initial and date; the indices to these volumes fill a room of considerable size at Somerset House, which is freely open to the public. In the latter case, the original will, proved in the District Registry, is there kept, but a copy is sent to and filed at Somerset House, and may there be seen. Any will may be read by anybody who is ready to pay a search fee of one shilling; but the reader may not copy any part of the will except the names and addresses of the executors, and the date and private number of the will. If he desires a copy, he can order one to be made, for which he will pay according to the length of the will, at the rate of six pence a folio (ninety words) for an ordinary copy, and ninepence a folio for a certified copy, which, with a shilling stamp impressed thereon can be produced and read in any court of law. VEGETABLE POISONS AND SUITABLE EMETICS.

Belladonna, or Deadly Nightshade, is a fatal poisonous plant; its round, large, smooth, deep purple-coloured berries, with sweetish, violet-coloured juice, should never tempt anyone to taste them.

Hemlock is violently poisonous, any part of the leaves or stem rapidly producing delirium and death.

Water Hemlock and Water Parsnip have frequently proved fatal.

Foxglove.—The leaves are an exceedingly fatal poison, producing great debility. An emetic should be given, and brandy and sal-volatile in doses of half a tenspoonful of each in water.

Monkshood is a common garden flower which is very poisonous, a small portion of the leaves proving fatal. Its roots have also been mistaken for horse-radish, and proved fatal.

Laburnum Seeds are exceedingly poisonous.

Common Laurel.—The leaves and berries are powerfully poisonous.

Yew.—The leaves and berries are poisonous, and have proved fatal. The berries should never be eaten, as the poison is found in the seed.

Common Arum or Lords and Ladies is an irritating poison, and its leaves have proved fatal.

Nightshade, Opium, &c.—In cases of poisoning with these, give mustard emetic; and as long as the patient is drowsy, he must be kept walking about. After the emetic has fully acted, lemon-juice or vinegar and water may be given.

EMETICS.—An emetic is the proper first treatment in all these cases. A dessert spoonful of salt and mustard in a tumbler of water and tickling the throat with a feather is an excellent one.

To Estimate the Weight of a Stack of Hay.

To the height in feet of the stack to the eaves add one-half of the height from the eaves to the ridge. Multiply the result first by the length in feet, then by the width in feet, and divide the result by 27, which will give the contents of the stack in cubic yards. A yard of new hay averages 6 stones (of 22 lbs.) in weight, and old hay from 8 to 9 stones; therefore, to get the weight of the stack, the number of cubic yards must be multiplied by from 6 to 9 according to the age of the hay.

Fee for registration of each letter, book, packet, or newspaper, is 2d. Letters containing coin must be registered, or they will be charged 8d. on delivery.

INLAND NEWSPAPER AND BOOK POST.

The Book Post Rate is one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz. No book packet may exceed 5 lbs. in weight, or two feet in length, one foot in width and depth.

Prepaid Rate.—On each registered newspaper, the postage when prepaid is one halfpenny; but a packet containing two or more registered newspapers is chargeable at the rate of one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz.

The postal rate for letters to foreign

countries is 2\frac{1}{2}d. first oz., and 1\frac{1}{2}d. each oz. after.

GELESTIAL PHENOMENA IN 1909.

ECLIPSES DURING THE YEAR.

In the year 1909 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

1. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, June 3rd, partly visible at Greenwich.

First contact with the Penumbra, June 3rd, 10h. 36m. P.M. Shadow 11h. 43m. P.M. ,, Beginning of the Total Phase ,, 4th Oh. 58m. A.M. 1h. 29m. A.M. Middle of the Eclipse ,, End of Total Phase 2h. 0m. A.M. Last contact with the Shadow 3h. 14m. A.M. ,, ,, 4h. 21m. A.M. Penumbra Magnitude of the Eclipse ()'s dia. = 1) 1.164. At Greenwich the Moon sets at 3h. 56m. A.M., June 4th.

2. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, June 17th, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, June 17th, 9h. 1m. p.m., mean time at Greenwich, in Longitude 122° 59′ E., and Latitude 25° 49′ N. Central Eclipse at apparent Noon, June 17th, 11h. 31m. p.m., in Longitude 172° 39′ W., and Latitude 88° 10′ N.

Ends on the Earth generally, June 18th, 1h. 37m. A.M., in Longitude

93° 52′ W., and Latitude 38° 42′ N.

This Eclipse will be visible over nearly the whole of North America and the north-eastern parts of Asia and Europe. The line of Central Eclipse will pass very near the North Pole. It is doubtful if any human being will be there to observe it!

A Total Eclipse of the Moon, November 27th, partly visible at Greenwich.

First contact with the Penumbra, November 27th, 6h. 12m. A.M. Shadow, 7h. 11m. ,, ,, Beginning of Total Phase 8h. 14m. ,, Middle of the Eclipse 8h. 55m. ,, End of Total Phase 9h. 36m. 27 ,, Last contact with the Shadow, 10h. 38m. ,, Penumbra, 11h. 38m. Magnitude of the Eclipse ()'s dia. =) 1.372. At Greenwich the Moon sets at 7h. 34m. A.M., November 27th.

4. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, December 12th, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, December 12th, 5h. 57m. P.M., mean time at Greenwich in Longitude 159° 10′ E., and Latitude 39° 4′ S. Greatest Eclipse, December 12th, 7h. 45m. P.M., in Longitude 86° 4′ E., and Latitude 65° 10′ S.

Ends on the Earth generally, December 12th, 9h. 33m. p.m., in Longitude 17° 35′ W., and Latitude 54° 59′ S.

Magnitude of Eclipse (O's dia. = 1) 0.543.

At Wellington, New Zealand, the Eclipse is visible and will begin on December the 13th, 5.34 A.M., and end at 6.11 A.M. This Eclipse will be greatest in Latitude 65° South, in which there appears to be no inhabited land.

Periods in the year 1909 when the Planets will be most favourably situated for Observation.

& MERCURY.

As the year opens this planet will be too near the sun to be seen with the naked eye, but on January 26th, May 20th, and September the 16th it may be seen shortly after sunset. It will be visible in the mornings just before sunrise, on March the 9th, July 8th, and October 28th. The best time to observe it will be in the mornings about March the 9th. At no other time during the year will it be well situated for observation.

9 VENUS.

As the year opens this beautiful planet will be a morning star, reaching the conjunction of the sun at the end of April, when it will be an evening star for the rest of the year. The best time to observe it will be in the evenings during the Autumn, when it will be a brilliant and beautiful object in the South-western sky.

& MARS.

This planet will be a morning star until August, then an evening star for the rest of the year. The best time to observe it will be during the evenings in the Autumn, when it will rise about sunset, and be a conspicuous object in the Eastern sky. There should be no difficulty in finding this planet as its red light is unlike that of any other planet or star.

4 JUPITER.

This planet will be a morning star during January and February; an evening star until September, then a morning star to the end of the year. The best time to observe it will be in the evenings during March and April, when it will be a conspicuous object after sunset in the Eastern sky, culminating about midnight. It shines with a beautiful silvery light and cannot be mistaken for any other planet or star.

ħ SATURN.

This planet will be an evening star until April, a morning star until October, then an evening star for the rest of the year. The best time to observe it will be in the evenings during October and November, when it will culminate near midnight, and its moons and rings may be seen to advantage. It is not very brilliant and to the uninitiated it will appear as an ordinary star.

H URANUS OR HERSCHEL.

This planet will be a morning star until July, then an evening star for the rest of the year. At no period of the year will it be well situated for observation, on account of its great southern declination. Its appearance to the naked eye is similar to that of a star of the 8th magnitude, consequently a telescope is necessary to see the many moons with which it is surrounded.

W NEPTUNE.

As the year opens this planet will be well situated for observation, reaching the Meridian about midnight. It will then be an evening star until July, when it will become a morning star for the rest of the year. The best times of the year to view it will be during January and December, when it will culminate, or be near the Meridian about midnight. A telescope of good power will be necessary to see it, as, on account of its great distance from the earth it is invisible to the naked eye.

The beautiful Sun which cheers the heart and spirit of all mankind will be nearest the earth on January the 3rd, and farthest from it on July the 4th. It will suffer eclipse on June 17th and December 12th. The Moon will be eclipsed on June 3rd and November 27th.

STATIONARY POSITIONS OF THE PLANETS DURING THE YEAR 1909.

Mercury,—February 2nd and 24th, June 2nd and 26th, September 30th and October 21st.

Venus .- Not stationary during the year.

Mars.—August 23rd and October 24th.

Jupiter .- May 1st.

Saturn.—August 5th and December 19th.

Uranus.—April 25th and September 26th.

Neptune.—March 25th and October 23rd.

The Sun and Moon are never stationary. A planet stationary means stationary in the Zodiac, and not in the sky.

There will be no occultation of any planet by the Moon this year visible at Greenwich, but on February 15th the Moon will occult Mars, also on July 8th, August 5th and September 2nd and 29th. On September 3rd and 30th she will occult Saturn, and again on October 27th. On November 17th, she will occult Venus, but none of these will be visible in this country.

GENERAL PREDICTIONS.

THE WINTER QUARTER.

The Sun in Capricorn, December 22nd, 1908, 5h. 34m. A.M.

THE end of the sign Scorpio, with Venus therein, rises at the time when the Sun touches the most southerly point of its declination, and winter commences. The Moon and Mercury are rising in Sagittarius. Mars is on the cusp of the twelfth house in sextile to Uranus in the second and trine to Neptune in the eighth house. The ingress takes place on the cusp of the second house in square to Saturn in the fourth. Jupiter is close to the midheaven, in good aspect to Mars, Uranus and Neptune, but in square to the Moon. With many planets rising there will be much unrest among the people, immorality and strife. The affliction of the Sun by Saturn indicates great want and privation in the land, a cold wintry quarter, with much snow, financial losses and a depreciation in securities. Agriculture will be in a bad way. Death will occur among titled people, and there will be much sickness in high places. The position of Uranus in the second well aspected by Mars and Jupiter will benefit the revenue, but there will be heavy expenditure on naval and military matters. Foreign affairs will be more satisfactory, though treachery on the part of another Power is to be feared. There will be many strange deaths by drowning, suicide, and poison. Colonial matters will not be peaceable and some dispute with the Australian Government may arise. The elevated position of Jupiter in sextile to Mars is favourable for the Government and King, and will give them increased prestige and popularity. Parliamentary affairs may be more peaceable. Mars in the twelfth is not good for hospitals and institutions, and denotes some rigorous measures to put a stop to the malpractices in workhouses, &c, There will be an increase of crime,

In the tenth degree of E. Longitude, Saturn will be exactly on

the Lower Meridian denoting a disastrous earthquake.

At Washington the ingress takes place close to the lower Meridian in square to Saturn just setting, denoting grave danger of war. Heavy military and naval expenditure is shown, much activity on railways, and scandals in high places. The President will have a thorny path to traverse. Destructive storms are to be feared off the coasts of Maine.

THE SPRING QUARTER.

The Sun enters Aries, March 21st, 1909, at 6h. 13m. A.M.

The Sun enters the sign Aries just after sunrise, with Saturn just below the Ascendant, Mercury, Venus, and the Moon in the twelfth house, Mars in conjunction with Uranus in the eleventh, Neptune in the fifth, and Jupiter in the sixth. The rising position of Saturn in the ruling sign of England, bodes ill for this country, want, privation and discontent being prevalent; much crime and disorder are to be feared. The financial condition of the country will show an improvement, and the Budget will be more satisfactory. There will be trouble among Railways and Post Office employees, and many cases of slander and libel. Neptune close to the fifth is not good for the younger generation, and shows a low birth rate, much immorality and vice, also disasters in theatres and music halls. The education question is again likely to crop up in Parliament. Foreign affairs will be more peaceful, but misunderstandings and diplomatic blunders are to be feared with the Colonies. The affliction of Saturn ruler of the tenth is unfavourable for the Government and Royalty. Mars ruling the eighth is ominous of many sudden and terrible deaths by fire and explosion, also suicides. Death will be busy in Parliamentary circles, and an outrage is to be feared in the Commons, angry debates, and exciting scenes. The Moon and Venus conjoined in the twelfth house is good for hospitals. workhouses and institutions.

At Washington, the ingress takes place in the third house, while Saturn will be in the fourth, pointing to a cold and inclement Spring with much snow; privation among the people. Mars and Uranus will be rising, exciting the populace, and causing some great strike or uprising. Railways will prosper, and traffic will be much above the average. Neptune in the seventh points to much double dealing

with foreign countries.

The ingress is evil for the Rulers of Germany and Austria, for Mars and Uranus culminate at the time, warning them of warlike actions and internal disturbances, as well as personal danger. Indian and South African affairs will now cause much alarm, especially in the former country, where insurrections and rioting are to be feared. Volcanic eruptions are threatened in the South of Europe, and also in the Pacific Ocean.

THE SUMMER QUARTER.

The Sun in Cancer, June 22nd, 2h. 6m. A.M.

THE beginning of the sign Gemini will rise at the moment of the Sun's entry into the sign Cancer, the ingress taking place in the second house, the Sun applying to the sextile of Jupiter in the fifth. Mercury ruler of the figure is in the second house, Venus and Neptune conjoined in the third, in opposition to Uranus in the ninth and square to Saturn in the twelfth, but in trine to Mars in the eleventh. Moon is close to the cusp of the fifth in trine to Saturn. This is a much more favourable figure for the financial state of the country, trade being better and the Exchequer returns above the average. Accidents and outrages are to be apprehended on Railways, Socialistic intrigues among employees and in the Post Office will be prevalent, but traffic returns will be very heavy. The Moon and Jupiter in the fifth will bring an increase in the birth rate, will benefit theatres and music halls, and also tend to settle the education difficulty, although as Mars is near the opposition of Jupiter, there will be heated discussions thereon in Parliament. The public health will not be good, influenza and chest complaints being prevalent. Foreign affairs will be more satisfactory though some dispute is likely to occur during the early part of August, probably with Turkey. Uranus in the ninth is unfavourable for colonial and shipping affairs, while Indian and South African matters will still cause much anxiety. The affliction of Saturn, ruler of the tenth is ominous for Royalty and the Government, and the latter will have much to contend with. Mars in the eleventh, in square to Mercury points to excited and acrimonious debates in the Commons, especially to do with financial and religious matters, while some notorious cases of fraud, theft, and forgery, will be brought to light. Saturn in the twelfth is evil for hospitals and institutions, and crime will be on the increase, while there will be much privation and want throughout the land. England will have cause to regret the passage of Saturn through her ruling sign, but the worst is yet to come. There will be great expenditure on naval and military matters.

At Washington Uranus rises, pointing to strikes, differences between master and man, and much lawlessness and unrest. Mars in the second in square to Mercury, points to much fraud, theft and forgery, also heavy expenditure, probably to do with naval affairs and munitions of war. Terrible railway accidents are threatened, depreciation of railway stock, also trouble in the Postal department. The ingress takes place on the cusp of the sixth house, with Venus and Neptune therein, pointing to much sickness, also many notable suicides by drowning and poison. Foreign affairs will be more satisfactory, and some marriages of note will occur.

In Armenia and the Čaucasus, Mars will be culminating, pointing to a reign of terror in those parts, insurrections, murders, and rapine. In Delhi and central India, Saturn will culminate, warning the Viceroy to guard against a native rising, and also to safeguard his position. A violent storm or tidal wave is threatened in Longitude 134° West, and a terrible earthquake in Longitude 101° West.

THE AUTUMN QUARTER.

The Sun in Libra, September 23rd, 4h. 45m. P.M.

AT the time of the Sun's entry into the equinoctial sign Libra, the last decanate of Aquarius will be rising, while the ingress will fall in the seventh house in opposition to Mars rising. Saturn will be in the second in square to Uranus in the twelfth and Neptune in the sixth. Jupiter will be in the seventh close to the opposition of Mars, Mercury and Venus in the eighth, and the Moon in the eleventh. The application of the Sun to the opposition of Mars is ominous of disputes with other Powers, and warlike rumours, and although Jupiter is in the seventh, the Sun is ruler of that house, and it will require great tact on the part of the Government to steer clear of the trouble, which is very threatening. There will be a restless and warlike feeling throughout the country, great depreciation in securities, falling off in trade, and the Exchequer returns will be very unsatisfactory. Railways will be more prosperous, and traffic returns above the average. The affliction of the Moon is bad for the younger generation, showing a low birth rate, trouble to music halls and theatres, while the public health will suffer, and there will be much sickness and mortality in the land. There will be a high death rate among young people, artists, literary folk and the gentler sex and one, or more, of note among these will pass to the Great Beyond. The Government will be weak, and have much trouble to face, while the Moon afflicted in the eleventh points to differences in the Cabinet and party splits. Hospitals and institutions will suffer, and crime and disorder will increase.

At Washington the ingress takes place just past the cusp of the tenth house, but Jupiter is exactly culminating. This position is evil for the President, who should safeguard his health and person. An unsettled state of the atmosphere and cyclonic disturbances will be experienced in the Eastern States, while a great conflagration is threatened in the near vicinity of the Capitol. There will be a heavy fall in securities, loss of trade and commerce, decrease in the revenue, dissensions in the Senate, disputes with other Powers, and much danger of war. Suicides and deaths by drowning will be unusually

frequent.

In Longitude 72° West, Mars will be on the lower Meridian denoting fires, explosions and incendiarism. In 53° West Longitude, earthquake shocks are threatened. Mars will culminate in 108° East Longitude, denoting rioting, insurrections and bloodshed in those parts. Saturn culminates in Korea which is ominous for the Ruler of that country, it indicates his death, as well as those of people of high rank in that country. Serious troubles will engross the attention of the Rulers of Europe, especially Russia and Turkey, for Uranus will be close to the Meridian at the ingress. At 17° East Longitude Mars will rise and the Sun set, a very ominous indication for the Ruler of Austria, denoting insurrections and bloodshed in his dominions. The events of this quarter will be but the prelude for greater and more startling occurrences.

ECLIPSES.

Eclipse of the Sun, December 23rd, 1908. This eclipse is a very important one, taking place just after the entry of the Sun into the sign Capricorn. The rule of this eclipse will extend for just over three years, and the chief effects will fall on India, and countries ruled by Capricorn. Falling in the first decanate of Capricorn it denotes the "transmigration of some King, and the rebellion of nobles and rustics." Though not visible in our own country it signifies evil to our King and people, much illness, want and privation in the land. It is dangerous for Royalty and the Government, and with Mars in the eighth house there will be many sudden and terrible deaths. The eclipse falls on the place of Saturn in the King's horoscope warning him against ill-health. The President of France should safeguard his health and person, for the eclipse falls exactly on the meridian at Paris. The French Government may resign. Uranus culminates in 18° East Longitude indicating trouble with authorities, and as Neptune is on the Lower Meridian there will be storms and floods, and seismic disturbances as well. Heavy troubles are threatened in India and Burma, where Saturn culminates, and a native rising should be guarded against. In Longitude 85° West, a serious tornado or earthquake is indicated. At Rio de Janeiro, Mars will culminate at the moment of the New Moon, warning the authorities of a rebellion, many sudden deaths and a great conflagration in the city. In Chili, Uranus will be rising, pointing to disturbances among the people and double-dealing with neighbouring Powers. Mars is on the Lower Meridian in Japan, close to Kioto and Tokio, an indication of a serious volcanic eruption or earthquake.

Eclipse of the Moon, June 3rd, 1909. This eclipse takes place in the ninth house, and in the second face of Sagittarius. It is said to denote "destruction to horses and mules," and will have an adverse effect on shipping. Saturn rises at the moment of full Moon at London causing much privation, and as the eclipse falls close to its descendant it will affect the city adversely. There will be much crime and trouble. Troubles also threaten the Rulers of Germany and Austria. Mars culminates at Merv and Herat, warning the Rulers in those places to guard against insurrections and incendiarism.

Eclipse of the Sun, June 17th, 1909. This eclipse is not visible in our country, only in Eastern Asia and North America. It denotes the death of some King and will affect the States chiefly, while London will also suffer therefrom. There will be much trouble and dissension in the Commons, and danger of defeat. Mars culminates in India; a grave indication of danger, uprisings and incendiarism in those parts.

Eclipse of the Moon, November 27th, 1909. This is not very important except that the weather will be cold and wintry, and underground troubles will be threatened in 3° West Longitude. Saturn will be on the Lower Meridian at Madrid, warning the authorities to be prepared for discontent and trouble in the city, especially as the eclipse fall in the ruling sign of Spain.

THE CROWNED HEADS OF EUROPE.

ENGLAND.

King Edward is the most popular Ruler in Europe and is welcomed in any country. His chief aim is peace and goodwill amongst the

Rulers of that Continent. Long may he live!

The year 1909 promises to be less favourable than the past year. The eclipse of the Sun on the place of Saturn at birth will seriously affect the health, while danger in travelling by water is threatened in April, the Moon being in parallel with Uranus. March is, however, the worst month for health. The transits of Mars over the opposition of the Moon in July and September will bring serious trouble if not warfare in some of the Colonies, but as the Moon makes a sextile of Mars and trine of the Sun in September and October, and Jupiter transits the Moon, success will accrue to the English Arms and bring increased prestige and popularity to the King. December is an evil month, for Mars and Saturn will be conjoined in Aries afflicting a vital point in the horoscope, denoting grave danger of war at the end of February, when Mars passes the place of the Solar Eclipse.

The Queen. The influences in her horoscope are still rather evil, for Mars afflicts the Sun, threatening indisposition, especially in January. Venus, however, is in parallel to the Sun, and in conjunction with Mercury, denoting many royal functions, popularity,

and good will.

The Prince of Wales. The directions operating here are unfortunate, the Sun being in square to Saturn, indicating ill-health and bereavement. August will be an evil month for Saturn by transit will then be in square to the progressed Sun, and in opposition to his own place. The Moon is conjoined with Venus in the Spring, indicating domestic events of a pleasurable nature.

The Princess of Wales. The directions in this horoscope are not very re-assuring, for the Sun is still close to the square of Neptune, and Mars is only just past the opposition of the Moon. The summer will be an unfavourable time, and indisposition or bereavement is

shown

The Duke of Connaught. The Sun is still close to the opposition of the Moon, which is unfavourable for health, and also for the Duchess. The Sun is also in trine to Neptune, and as the Moon makes the trine of the Sun and conjunction of Neptune at the fall of the year some important naval command will be given to the Duke. An accident or injury is threatened in the early spring.

GERMANY.

The German Emperor made a sad mess of himself in writing privately to Lord Tweedmouth, and upset the British people very much. Why he thought it necessary to write to the First Lord of the Admiralty remains a mystery. The only interpretation is, that he wished to lull England into a false sense of security, as he is building warships at express speed.

Very critical influences operate during 1909 in his horoscope. The Sun is only just past the conjunction of Mars, and the Moon comes to the opposition of both in May and June. In July Mars will transit the Sun and its own place, then becoming retrograde and falling stationary thereon in October and November. The Moon is also in conjunction with Neptune and square to Venus in the winter of 1909. All these influences point to serious troubles ahead, and war will be avoided with great difficulty; in fact, the directions point very strongly to serious troubles in the summer. A family loss is also threatened.

RUSSIA.

This year is a very critical and dangerous one, for Mars is now exactly conjoined with the Sun, and close to the parallel of the same orb, while the Sun is in parallel to Uranus and close to the square of the Moon. All these terrible influences point to heavy troubles, ill-health, bereavement, and grave danger of personal violence. The critical period is at the end of May for the New Moon falls exactly on the conjunction of Mars and the Sun. March will also be an evil time, for Saturn will transit the Moon.

AUSTRIA.

Age begins to tell upon this Emperor and rumours of indisposition are frequent. He is a good and sound Ruler and a friend to this country.

The influences operating in his horoscope are rather more favourable, for the Sun is close to the sextile of Jupiter, but as Mars is in transit over the seventh house of the horoscope and stationary therein, there is danger of foreign trouble, especially during the summer and autumn.

ITALY.

The directions in the King of Italy's horoscope are still of a martial nature, for the Sun is close to the parallel of Mars, and the Solar Eclipse falls close to his progressed Sun. The early part of the year seems to be rather troublesome in many ways. Indisposition is denoted, and violence against his person should be guarded against.

SPAIN.

This country seems to be riddled with sedition, and as Mars is rising at its King's nativity, he will have many narrow escapes, even if he does not meet with a violent end. The Spaniards are an excitable people, and inflammable words have great influence with them.

The King is under evil directions during 1909, for the Sun will be near the square of Mars, and in the early spring the Moon will pass the square of the Sun and conjunction of Mars and will also be in parallel to the latter planet. This points to great danger of feverish complaints and personal injury, but as the Moon will be in good aspect to its own birthplace, he may escape any serious results. The Moon also forms the conjunction of Jupiter and trine of Neptune and the Sun later in the year, hence some benefits will also come. A voyage seems probable.

BELGIUM.

If the King of the Belgians could wash his hands clean of the terrible atrocities in the Congo State, he would stand much higher in the estimation of Europe. Unfortunately he has a mania for moneymaking and must be a very rich person.

The Sun is still close to the trine of Jupiter in his horoscope, but Venus has reached the square of the Moon, showing losses in Colonial affairs, and trade. Saturn's transit over the Sun will affect the health

and bring disputes with his Ministers and Parliament.

DENMARK.

The influences operating in the King's nativity are fairly good, and with the exception of indisposition, some benefits may be expected during the year, in commerce and trade, and also among his people.

HOLLAND.

Unfavourable influences are still operating in this horoscope, Venus being in opposition to Saturn, and Mars to Jupiter. The former will bring many disappointments, probably bereavement, while the latter will affect the financial condition of the country.

NORWAY.

The influences are generally quiet in King Haakon's horoscope, and the Moon makes several favourable aspects which will bring many benefits to his country and people. The Queen of Norway has also several benefic Lunar influences operating, hence the year will prove successful to her also.

GREECE.

Some very powerful benefic influences operate in the horoscope of the King of Greece, Jupiter being in sextile to the Sun, and the latter in trine to the Moon. This will bring popularity and increase of prestige, decrease of taxation, and many benefits to his country and people. It is hoped, however, that the transit of Mars over the places of Mars and Uranus, and to the square of the Sun and Mercury at birth will not bring about disputes with other Powers, especially as the eclipse of the Sun at the end of 1908 falls on his Sun at birth, and in the ruling sign of Greece. It must be pointed out that the indications of war are rather strong.

TURKEY.

The Sultan is surrounded by fire-brands, which may set his kingdom in a blaze at any moment. It is not generally known that the Turks are a very sober people and drink coffee instead of alcohol. What the country wants is a thorough reform. The Sultan will have considerable trouble to face during the coming year for the Moon passes successive evil aspects of Mars, Saturn and Jupiter. Danger of disputes with other Powers, financial difficulties and indisposition are threatened. He will no doubt try to run close

to the wind as on previous occasions, but he may find that it cannot be done too often with impunity. The transits of Mars over the opposition of his Sun during the summer and autumn, and the Lunar eclipse on the progressed Sun will be likely to make things very awkward for him.

SWEDEN.

The new King of Sweden was born on June 16th, 1858, but the hour is not known. There are no very important influences operating, but the Sun is near to the sextile of Jupiter, which is favourable for his country and people. He has Mercury, Jupiter and Uranus in conjunction in Gemini, so that he will advance the study of science and literature in his kingdom.

PORTIGAL.

The young King Manuel of Portugal, called suddenly to the throne consequent upon the awful murder of his father and elder brother, was born on November 15th, 1889. His present directions are rather favourable, the Sun and Mercury being near the sextile of Mars, pointing to great activity in his kingdom, and a better state of affairs generally. The eclipse of the Sun at the end of this year falls on the place of Jupiter at his birth, bringing popularity and increase of prestige.

JAPAN.

The Japanese Government is now busy putting its finances on a sound basis. It is also picking the cream of European methods, whether in finance, science or work. It would be a good thing if England followed suit.

The Mikado has the Sun in trine to Neptune, and this will bring important naval success, extension of commerce and many benefits to shipping. Mars however, is still close to the opposition of the Moon hence many dangers are shown, both to his person and of actual warfare. Chinese affairs seem likely to play an important part in the Emperor's life during 1909. In Korea many difficulties will occur.

ROMAN CHURCH.

The Pope was born on June 2nd, 1835, hour unknown. He is said to suffer much from his heart, and this is well shown for he has the Moon and Mars conjoined in the sign Leo. His directions at present are rather quiet, though a recurrence of his heart trouble will be experienced during the year.

EXPLANATION OF THE HIEROGLYPHIC FOR 1908.

In the left-hand corner we see rioting and window-breaking, which was eminently fulfilled at the Mid-Devon election, when rioting and window smashing were rampant, particularly at Barnstaple. It reminds one of the Parliamentary elections of fifty years ago.

The next picture to the right is a fire, fulfilled by the great fire at a Master's house at Harrow, also one at Kingsland, where several

persons were burnt and otherwise injured; two children being burnt to death, another at a house in Watertownmas, near Kirkealdy, resulting in the death of the whole family. Severe fires also occurred at West Ham, Londonderry, Leeds, and many other places. Further to the right we have depicted nurses and sickness, which was amply fulfilled by the great prevalence of Influenza, attacking high and low alike all over the country and causing many deaths. Next comes fighting depicting the trouble of the Bazar Expedition India, also the severe fighting on the Afghan border, and more of this is to be feared. Beneath this is seen a train falling over an embankment, this was fulfilled at Wembley Park when five coaches left the metals and fell over an embankment and 140 persons were injured; also, at Braybrook Junction, Australia, when two cars and a guard's van were telescopes, 41 persons being killed.

The next picture is a disaster at sea, terribly fulfilled when the destroyer "Tiger" was run down by the cruiser "Berwick," and thirty-five lives lost, and the cruiser "Gladiator" was run into by the American liner "St. Paul" when twenty-seven lives were lost.

The bottom picture represents a funeral and of Royalty, most terribly fulfilled in the sad deaths of the King of Portugal and his eldest son, which affected the people of this country most seriously.

The remaining symbol is as yet (May, 1908) unfulfilled.

Fulfilments.

Four small coasting vessels were wrecked off the coast of Delaware. 24 persons drowned

The Amsterdam steamer damaged during the fog; passengers and crew took to the boats.

Two naval collisions occurred resulting in serious damage to the destroyer "Quail."

Collisions occurred between a London and North-Western Express and to a Lancashire and Yorkshire Express, injuring twelve persons. Another occurred at Wimbleton, owing to fog, fourteen persons injured. Several other serious collisions occurred.

Fatal fire panic at an Opera House at Boyertown, Pennsylvania, where upwards of 160 men, women and children met their death.

The Maple Leaf Flour Mills at Winipeg were destroyed by fire, loss over 1,000,000 dollars.

India has been in an unsettled state for some time past and things do not appear to be getting better, fighting has commenced on the North West border and sixty of our men were killed.

Many persons have been killed and injured by bombs, and the whole country seems to be rifled with sedition.

No less than six cases of suicide were reported occurring in one day in East Anglia alone.

Mr. Balfour, Sir A. Acland Hood, Mr. J. H. Campbell, Mr. Haldane and very many others suffered from influenza at this time.

Influenza raged with great virulence, especially in London, where the death rate from that cause ran very high.

Debates in Parliament were very severe, particularly over the new Licensing Bill and the Scottish Small Holdings Act.

The Rev. Benjamin Waugh, children's great friend, died.

The German Expropriation Bill is a grave

cruelty to the unfortunate Poles under German Rule.

An attempt was made on the Shah's life.

These amounted to something like

£373,000 more than the Chancellor of the Exchequer estimated. This was particularly noticeable in respect to the Licensing and New Educa-

tion Bill, for conflicting controversies were heard on all sides.

A great deal was heard about cattle driving in Ireland and its neighbourhood, and Mr. Redmond was keen on his Home Rule Bill.

Surplus about £7,000,000.

The birth rate was exceptionally low in Scotland, 3,131 births less than in 1906.

The German Emperor's letter to Lord Tweedmouth caused great excitement and

uneasiness in the land.

A strike of tea waitresses occurred in London, and over 1000 Motor Omnibus . drivers turned out, while at Newcastle and Sunderland quite 20,000 Engineers turned out. There was also trouble with Railway employees.

A Henley gentleman killed his wife, daughter and two servants, afterwards shooting himself. The papers have been full of gruesome tales of murders and suicides.

Major-General Sir F. Goldsmid, K.C.S., and Lieutenant-General Sir H. Newdigate, K.C.B., both passed away, and both had had distinguished careers in the Army.

The Emperor of Austria was unwell. The Grand Duke Ferdinand IV. of Tuscany died, and King Carlos and his eldest son were cowardly murdered.

The bad weather in America took the form of a blizzard said to be the fiercest since March, 1888, and has caused widespread misery.

Sir R. Paget, Duke of Devonshire, General Sir Drury-Lowe, Sir Howard Vincent, and many others passed away.

Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman succumbed to influenza.

April was the coldest and stormiest month known for many years.

HINTS TO FARMERS.

The year 1907 was the best the Arable Farmer has had for many a long day. Not only was the yield of Cereals above the average, but the prices also, were higher than they had been for many years. At present these prices have not been maintained, but have gradually fallen to their normal level of the last few years. There seems nothing to advance them, except we get a change of Government. when Tariff Reform may make a small alteration, but whether the electorate will support Tariff Reform is doubtful. The present Government is in bad odour chiefly on account of the new Licensing Bill and Eight Hours Miners' Bill which will mean a great and permanent increase in the price of coals, of from 3s. to 5s. per ton, which will effect in a most prejudicial manner our chief industries. extra cost will also fall heavily on the labourer and poor people. It must be noted that the present Government has passed a law very favourable to the agriculturist giving him a practically free hand in his farming operations, and securing for him good compensation in the event of unjust disturbance in his Holding. My agricultural readers should secure a copy of the "Agricultural Holdings Act, 1906," price 1d., which comes into operation on the 1st of January,

Sow oats in Southern counties, 4 to 6 bushels per acre; also peas in favourable seasons, and barley in sheltered fields; also beans. Proceed with drainage operations, irrigation work, and marling; and with field and road-carting during frost. Prepare compost manures. Finish top-dressing grass. Attend to folding sheep; also to ewes and lambs, and to milch cows, the earlier of which will be calving.

February.—2nd and 3rd, 8.15 to 9.0 a.m., 9.55 to 10.55 a.m., 0.55 to 3.25 p.m.; 24th and 25th, 6.50 to 7.35 a.m., 8.40 to 9.40 a.m., 11.40 to 2.10 p.m.; 26th, 6.45 to 7.30 a.m., 8.35 to 9.35 a.m., 11.35

Work to be done.—Sow spring wheat, also barley on a dry seed bed; and peas and beans; also oats. Sow cabbage and kohl-rabi, in beds for transplanting, also spring vetches; plant early potatoes. Give calves pure milk, afterwards linseed soup and hay tea. Horses require full allowance of food. Buy seeds. 14 lbs. per acre of clover seed, with 1 bushel per acre of grass seed; 3 bushels per acre of Italian rye-grass; 5, 7, and 4 lbs. per acre respectively of carrot, mangel-wurzel, and turnip seed; 3 or 4 bushels per acre of rough sainfoin.

Work to be done.—Finish sowing spring wheat, continue barley-sowing, also oats, peas, and spring vetches. Apply when necessary top-dressings of soluble manure—I cwt. of nitrate of soda or sulphate of ammonia, with 2 to 5 cwt. of common salt, to corn crops in wet weather. Harrow, roll, and sow land for carrots now or in April; sow cabbage seed in plots for autumn crop in the field; sow sainfoin on calcareous soils, plant potatoes. The ewes as they lamb may be thinly distributed over the pastures. Sows should farrow their first litters.

April.—2nd and 3rd, 6.10 to 7.10 a.m., 9.5 to 11.35 a.m., 5.15 to 7.55 p.m.; 21st, 5.0 to 6.0 a.m., 7.55 to 10.25 a.m., 4.0 to 6.40 p.m.; 24th and 25th, 4.50 to 5.50 a.m., 7.45 to 10.15 a.m., 3.45 to 6.25 p.m.; 26th, 4.40 to 5.40 a.m., 7.35 to 10.5 a.m., 3.40 to 6.20 p.m.

Work to be done.—Wheat-hoeing; finish barley and oat-sowing; hand and horse-hoe beans; sow grass and clover seeds. Mangel-wurzel may be drilled or dibbled, 6 to 7 lbs. per acre, any time this month. Carrots may be sown, with a few ounces of turnip seed to show the rows. Plant drumhead cabbages 3 feet asunder each way, 4,840 plants to an acre; manure heavily for them. Potatoes may be coming through; harrow down, and then immediately "set up" the drills against frost. Sow flax early this month and hemp on rich soil; also lupines, in sandy soils; also lucerne, on good soils.

May.—1st, 7.15 to 9.45 a.m., 3.20 to 6.0 p.m.; 4th and 5th, 7.5 to 9.35 a.m., 3.10 to 5.50 p.m.; 22nd and 23rd, 5.55 to 8.25 a.m., 2.0 to 4.40 p.m.; 27th and 28th, 5.35 to 8.5 a.m., 1.40 to 4.20 p.m.

Work to be done.—Hoe wheat, oats, barley, beans, peas, potatoes, carrots, and parsnips; sow buckwheat, hemp, vetches, lucerne, and lupine; also rape for early feed, and swede-turnips in the north; finish mangel sowing; plough in manure for turnips; fallow operations of all kinds, whether for a crop or not. Grazing stock should be taken to the grass; attend to brood mares timed to foal about the beginning of the month. Gentle exercise is good before foaling.

June.—1st and 2nd, 5.10 to 7.40 a.m., 1.20 to 4.40 p.m.; 18th and 19th, 4.10 to 6.40 a.m., 0.15 to 2.55 p.m.; 20th, 4.5 to 6.35 a.m., 0.10 to 2.50 p.m.

Horse and hand-hoe mangels; also kohl-rabi and swedes as soon as they are in broad leaf, and single them. Mow clovers for hay, and meadows as they ripen. Sheepwashing and shearing to be attended to. Dairy management is at its height this month.

JULY.—3rd, 11.15 to 1.50 P.M.; 20th and 21st, 10.10 to 0.45 P.M.; 26th and 27th, 9.45 to 0.20 P.M.

Work to be done.—Hay-making; prepare for corn harvest. Flax-pulling is carried on towards end of the month; rye ripens, and peas

are ripe towards the end of the month. Hand-hoe root-crops; also lucerne, after every cutting. Pastures will require thinning, except where cabbages are ready to help. Sheep-shearing to be finished in the north; watch for fly. Insure all harvest produce against fire and hail.

Work to be done.—After harvest work get in stubble-turnips, trifolium, mustard, rye. Seeds for permanent pastures may be sown now on a clean stubble; also trifolium incarnatum simply harrowed in after rain. Clean stubbles and prepare for wheat sowing and winter beans. Cabbage (drumhead), for planting next year, sow now. Flocks require dipping, salving, or smearing. Put rams to ewes for lambing in January.

Work to be done.—Dig potatoes; pull mangel-wurzel, carrots, and parsnips. Sow winter beans and winter vetches. Autumn fallow and manure with farm-yard dung for crops next year. Ditches should be cleaned out. In dry weather, sheep do well on rape.

Horses may have a diminished allowance of oats towards the end of November; hay or straw and carrots being continued. Put a whole mangel in the manger.

Work to be done.—Attend to claying, marling, and all cartage work during frost. Plough leas for spring corn. Cattle must be kept warm, dry, and clean. A dry bed is important in early lambing. Sheep in sheds must be attended to with reference to foot-rot. Draining, road-making and earth-work of all kinds may be attended to in hard weather.

HINTS TO GARDENERS.

Seasons have much to do with the success of the Market Gardener. and, except under glass, it is impossible to garden against them, as one night's frost may destroy several crops and weeks of labour. There is no doubt that in course of time the main bulk of our garden produce will be grown under glass, otherwise the French and Italian growers will flood our markets with their produce, and, although a change of Government might bring in Tariff Reform, yet, I do not see in what way it would benefit the Market Gardener, as garden stuff would not come under the denomination of manufactured articles, on which they threaten to place an Importation Tax. Glass, and the liberal use of artificial manures appear to be the only way in which to combat the foreign imports. It should however, be remembered, that in no country in the world can fruit and vegetables be grown with such excellent flavour as in England, and it is to be hoped that this natural advantage will keep our home growers at the head of the market.

The following are the most favourable times to sow, plant, transplant, prune, and do other garden work during the year 1909:—

JANUARY.—1st and 2nd, 10.20 to 11.10 A.M., 0.5 to 1.5 p.m., 3.0 to 5.25 p.m.; 5th and 6th, 10.5 to 10.55 a.m., 11.50 to 0.50 p.m., 2.45 to 5.10 p.m.; 24th and 25th, 8.55 to 9.45 a.m., 10.40 to 11.40 a.m., 1.40 to 4.5 p.m.; 28th and 29th, 8.35 to 9.25 a.m., 10.20 to 11.20 a.m., 1.25 to 3.50 p.m.

Work to be done.—For succession, a few early frame peas, common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw. Plant, prune, and train fruit trees and bushes. Form new flower gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, tulips, &c. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, &c. Herbs to be gathered are groundsel, chickweed, archangel, and others which are in flower.

FEBRUARY.—2nd and 3rd, 8.15 to 9.0 a.m., 9.55 to 10.55 a.m., 0.55 to 3.25 p.m.; 24th and 25th, 6.50 to 7.35 a.m., 8.40 to 9.40 a.m., 11.40 to 2.10 p.m.; 26th, 6.45 to 7.30 a.m., 8.35 to 9.35 a.m., 11.35 to 2.5 p.m.

Work to be done.—When the weather is favourable, continue to sow peas, beans, onions, spinach, savoys, lettuces, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes. Cut early kidney potatoes for seed, and put them in a stove or hot-bed, in order to start them for planting out. Plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses, &c. Prune vine and fruit trees. Herrs to be gathered: foal-foot, lingwort, pilewort, speedwell, chickweed, shepherd's purse, and broom.

March.—1st and 2nd, 6.25 to 7.10 a.m., 8.15 to 9.15 a.m., 11.10 to 1.40 p.m.; 24th and 25th, 5.0 to 5.45 a.m., 6.55 to 7.55 a.m., 9.50 to 0.20 p.m.; 28th and 29th, 4.40 to 5.25 a.m., 6.40 to 7.40 a.m., 9.35 to 0.5 p.m.; 30th, 4.35 to 5.20 a.m., 6.30 to 7.30 a.m., 9.25 to 11.55 a.m.

Work to be done.—The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflowers, broccoli, spinach, onions, carrots, peas, beans, savoys, parsnips radishes, &c. Plant red cabbage and sea-kale; sow cucumbers and melons in hot beds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. This is the best time for grafting fruit trees, perpetual and moss roses, &c. Pot dahlias and cuttings. Plant pinks, polyanthuses, carnations, &c. Herbs to be gathered for medicinal purposes: coltsfoot, fumitory, pilewort, ladyfrocks, lesser celandine, violet, and comfrey roots, and all kinds of herbal bark.

April.—2nd and 3rd, 6.10 to 7.10 a.m., 9.5 to 11.35 a.m., 5.15 to 7.55 p.m.; 21st, 5.0 to 6.0 a.m., 7.55 to 10.25 a.m., 4.0 to 6.40 p.m.; 24th and 25th, 4.50 to 5.50 a.m., 7.45 to 10.15 a.m., 3.45 to 6.25 p.m.

Work to be done.—Plant rhubarb, artichokes, asparagus, sea-kale, Dutch turnips, German greens, and small salading. Earth up peas, tie up lettuces, and in dry weather water seedling beds. Sow annuals, biennials, and perennials. Plant evergreens, and propagate by cutting, jasmine, lavender, sage, rosemary, rue, &c. Sow early Dutch turnips. Herbs to be gathered: ground ivy, dandelions, avens, buttercups, and others which are in flower, as well as all kinds of bark.

Hoe and stake peas, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant dahlias, and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, &c. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots. Herbs to be cut: celandine, milkwort, moonwort, wood sorrel, and adder's tongue.

Heres to be cut: avens, brooklime, centaury, comfrey, woodbine, valerian, eyebright, pimpernel, speedwell, and elecampane.

Work to be done.—Sow turnips, radishes, &c. Plant out broccoli, cauliflowers, savoys, leeks, and winter cabbages, and earth up celery. Lift full-grown winter onions, and prepare mushroom spawn. Gather medicinal flowers and sweet herbs, when in bloom, dressing them first in the sun, and then in the shade for winter use. Heres to be cut are all that are in flower, as lavender, tansy, vervain, bedstraw, agrimony, cinquefoil, mountain flax, foxglove, and meadow-sweet.

Plant cuttings of gooseberries, currants, raspberries, and strawberries taking out the old stools which have twice produced fruit. Herbs to be gathered: angelica, field gentian, valerian, featherfew, southernwood, briony, and wild berries.

LEGAL AND COMMERCIAL NOTES.

A master or mistress need not give a character, but if given it must be true.

In searching a servant's boxes a search warrant should be obtained. If a servant leaves without notice he can be sued for damages unless

his life or person is in danger.

A month's wages or warning may be given to a servant at any time; it matters not whether the wages are paid quarterly, monthly, or weekly. If a servant wilfully disobeys, or is guilty of misconduct, he may be

dismissed at once.

A servant's wages cannot be stopped on account of illness.

A servant is not bound to do work for which he or she was not engaged.

A servant is liable for wilful damage done to her master's property; the amount must not be deducted from wages; a summons should be taken out.

Yearly tenancies require a half-year's notice, to expire at the time of year it began.

The birth of a child must be registered within six weeks.

A will must be in writing, signed by the testator, and witnessed by two persons. A will does not require a stamp.

An executor must distribute the testator's property within one year

of his death.

An illegitimate child cannot take property or money under the term "children.

When a man dies without a will and without children, his wife takes half the property, the next-of-kin the other half. When there are children the wife takes one-third. See Almanack, page 60.

A person under twenty-one cannot make a will.

A gamekeeper may kill a dog pursuing game on his employer's land. The police can enter licensed premises at any time.

Publicans must not sell spirits to any person under sixteen years of

age.

A husband has no power over his wife's property without her consent.

A wife is liable for her debts contracted before marriage.

The age for consent to marriage is twelve for females and fourteen for males.

Cousins in any degree may marry.

A marriage is not valid when either party is impotent, idiotic, or

No one under twenty-one can marry without the consent of their parents or guardian.

A farrier is bound to shoe a horse if required to do so. No one must resist arrest even if they be innocent.

I.O.U.'s are received in evidence as acknowledgments of debt.

The penalty attaches only to a person giving a receipt on unstamped paper.

EXPLANATION.

THE following Birthday Information must not be taken as correct in every case, as the *hour of birth* will sometimes make a great difference either for better or worse, and, in accordance with the *nature* of the hour, whether it was a fortunate or unfortunate one.

SHOULD WOMEN HAVE VOTES.

In my opinion every woman who is a householder, or who pays rates and taxes, should have a vote. It is only fair, right, and just that she should; but to a married woman living with her husband, it would not be wise to extend the franchise, and, for the following reason:— In many cases the husband and wife hold different opinions concerning the Church, and many other national institutions; and if the wife had a vote, she might be compelled to side with her husband, otherwise serious unpleasantness might arise, and the once comfortable home would be converted into a most unhappy one. Many men have strong political opinions, and cannot argue or talk about politics without getting angry or excited. Think of what this would mean if the wife had a vote; she would be compelled to go the way of her husband, or quarrelling, and even violence might ensue.

VIVISECTION.

The terribly cruel practice of vivisection is on the increase. In 1907 there were 27,301 more experiments performed than in 1906, the total number being 73,374. It is stated in the report that 44,789 were experiments almost entirely of inoculations into mice, for the purpose of finding out the origin or cure of Cancer. It seems difficult to believe that so many mice were employed, or why such a small animal should be used, differing, as it does, so very much from the human being. An animal is not a human being, its brain and stomach differ immensely; and if Cancer could be induced in the animal organization, it would form no sure guide to its cause in the human being. At present the origin and cause of this terrible disease are totally unknown, and although hundreds of thousands of hapless animals have been made to suffer or die, everything remains still a mystery. In Scripture we are told that good cannot come out of evil, therefore, it seems impossible to expect a blessing from the cruel practice of vivisection.

Vivisectors maintain that they have learned much from vivisection. Equally competent authorities state that nothing has been learned from it which could not have been learnt at the bedside of a patient, and that in many cases vivisection has led to error and confusion.

THE NEW LICENSING BILL.

The intention of the Government appears to be to do away with some 32,000 public-houses, in the hope of reducing drunkenness, but it has been shown over and over again that the number of public-houses has nothing to do with the number of cases of drunkenness; and in many towns where the number of public-houses is greatest compared with population, the cases of drunkenness are fewest. In my opinion all this tectotal legislation is a mistake. It is not the beer or spirits that are to blame, but the persons who will drink more of it than is good for them; and I do not see why the majority of moderate drinkers should be made to suffer for a few misguided persons who will get drunk.

But suppose it was 8 A.M. on February 3rd, I turn to the table and find an influence at 11.15 A.M. which is B, or bad, consequently the news or proposals will not turn out satisfactorily, and had better be left alone.

Suppose a person comes to me on January 16th at Noon, and wants me to buy something, or proposes something new to me, I turn to the table and find at 3.45 P.M. there is a large G, which shows that the proposal is favourable, or that I may buy; but if the same thing occurred on the 28th, I find the influence is bad, and consequently I should leave everything alone.

If the influence is signified by a small letter, use great care, as it is of a weak nature, also if a little g is followed by a large B; but a small b followed by a large G shows a little trouble at first, then that the matter will turn out favourable in the end.
