THE VOICE OF THE HEAVENS. MARCH, 1910.

THE lunation of the 11th inst. occurs just after noon, with the Luminaries exactly culminating, in sextile to Mars and Uranus. It is unlawful to kill pheasants, partridges, grouse, moor game or hares, on a Sunday or Christmas Day. Sand grouse may not be killed at any time.

In England, hares, rabbits, woodcock, snipe, quail, landrail, and heath or moor game (and the eggs of swan, wild duck, teal and widgeon) are protected under the Game Laws, though no close time is fixed for them by those laws. In Scotland the same remarks apply to deer and hares, to the first four birds and to wild duck; in Ireland to all these five birds, with the further addition of widgeon, teal and plover. The close time for these birds (except quail and landrail in Ireland, for whose close time see above) is under the Wild Birds Protection Acts, 1880 to 1902. From 2nd March to 31st July, both inclusiv throughout the United Kingdom, except the Island of St. Kilda

The Secretary of State in Great Britain, or the Lord Lieutenant in Ireland, has power to

vary or abolish the close time.

There is no statutory close time for foxhunting or rabbit-shooting, nor is there, except in Ireland, for deer or hares. November 1st is the recognised date for the opening of the fox-hunting season, which continues till the following April. Otter-hunting lasts from mid-April to mid-September. The period for deer-hunting or stalking varies from about 12th August to 12th October for stags, and from 10th November to the end of March for hinds. Hares are in best condition in January, February and March.

Improved and Illustrated by Rev. Dr. A. Clark, the Celebrated Wesleyan Preacher.

FAIR AND FOUL WEATHER TABLE .- This Table is the result of many years' actual observations, the whole being constructed on a due consideration of the attraction of the Sun and Moon in their several positions respecting the earth; and will by simple inspection, show the observer what kind of weather will most probably follow the entrance of the Moon into any of her quarters, and that so near the truth as to be seldom or never found to fail.

1. The nearer the time of the Moon's change, First Quarter, Full, and Last Quarter 1. The nearer the time of the Mooth strange, the quiter, full, and last quarter is to Midnight, the fairer will the Weather be during the seven days following.

2. The space of this calculation occupies from Ten at night till Two next morning.

3. The nearer to Midday or Noon these phases of the Moon happen, the more foul

or wet the weather may be expected during the seven following days.

4. The space of this calculation occupies from Ten in the Forenoon till Two in the Afternoon. These observations refer principally to Summer, though they affect the Spring and Autumn nearly the same.

Spring and Autumn nearly the same.

5. The Moon's change, First Quarter, Full, and Last Quarter happening during Six of the Afternoon hours, i.e., from Four to Ten, may be followed by fair weather; but this is mostly dependent on the Winn, as noted in the Table.

6. Though the weather, from a variety of irregular causes, is more uncertain in the latter part of Autumn, the whole of Winter, and the beginning of Spring, yet in the main the above observations will apply to those periods also.

RULES FOR FORETELLING THE WEATHER.

A RISING BAROMETER.

A rapid rise indicates unsettled weather

A gradual rise indicates settled weather

A rise with dry air and cold increasing in summer indicates wind from the northwards; and if rain has fallen, better weather may be expected.

A rise with moist air and a low temperature indicates wind and rain from the

A rise with southerly wind indicates fine weather.

A STEADY BAROMETER.

With dry air and seasonable temperature, a continuance of very fine weather is indicated.

A FALLING BAROMETER.

A rapid rise indicates stormy weather.

A rapid fall with westerly wind indicates stormy weather from the northward. A fall with a northerly wind indicates storms, with rain and hail in summer, and

snow in winter. A fall with increased moisture in the air, and heat increasing, foretells wind and

rain from the southward. A fall with dry air and cold increasing in winter foretells sno

A fall after very calm and warm weather indicates rain with squally weather.

The barometer rises for northerly winds, including from north-west by north to the eastward for dry or less wet weather, for less wind, or for more than one of these changes, except on a few occasions, when rain, hail, or snow comes from the northward with strong wind.

The barometer falls for southerly winds, including from south-easterly south to the westward for wet weather, for stronger wind or for more than one of these changes except on a few occasions, when moderate wind, with rain or snow, comes from the northward.

Pledges above 10s. if not redeemed within twelve calendar months and seven days from the day of pledging, may be sold by auction by the pawnbroker, but may be redeemed at any time before the

day of sale.

Within three years after sale the pawner may inspect the account of the sale in the pawnbroker's books on payment of one penny, and receive any surplus produced by the sale. But deficit on sale of one pledge may be set off by the pawnbroker against surplus on another.

If any pledge is destroyed or damaged by fire, the pawnbroker will be bound to ray the value of the pledge after deducting the amount of the loan and profitsuch value to be the amount of the loan and profit and 25 per cent, on the amount

of the loan.

If any ticket is lost, mislaid, or stolen, the pawner should at once apply to the pawnbroker for a form of declaration to be made before a magistrate, or the pawnbroker will be bound to deliver the pledge to any person who produces the ticket to him and claims to redeem the same. When the loan is 5s.or under the charge

on form of declaration is one halfpenny; when the loan is above 5s., one penny.

It is estimated that the total length of railway constructed and open all over the world, down to the end of 1905, amounted to 562,436 miles. The annual rate of mileage increase varies from about 3.4 per cent. to 2.3 per cent.; the total increase in the number of miles open for traffic in the five years ended with 1905 was 10.9 per cent. LUNACY IN GREAT BRITAIN.

A serious side to the strenuousness of modern life is the fact that lunatics in England and Wales are still increasing in number, though the rate of increase is not so rapid after 1902-3. Melancholia, however, is affecting a greater number of people.

The total number of certified insane persons under care on January 1 last was 126,084. This was 2,096 above the number on January 1, 1907. But the average annual increase for the last ten years was 2,462, and for the last five years 2,655.

A survey of forty-eight years shows 36,762 insane persons under care at the beginning of 1859. The rise since then is shown by the figures at the commencement of each decennial period in totals and in percentages of increase:—

COMPULSORY REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS AND DEATHS.

In the case of births, parents must effect registration within 42 days after birth, under a penalty in default; and when the 42 days have expired, the Registrar is empowered to compel their attendance at his offices for the purposes of such registration. The period during which births may be lawfully registered (subject to payment of fees after three months) is extended from six to twelve months. In case of death the nearest relatives of the deceased present at death, or in attendance, are liable to a penalty if the registration be not effected within five days, except when notice is sent to the Registrar with a medical certificate.

REGISTRATION IN SCOTLAND.

In Scotland a birth must be registered within 21 days. A marriage must be registered within three days. A death must be registered within eight days.

WHERE TO FIND A PROVED WILL.

To find a will proved before 1st January, 1858, the date on which the Courted Probate Act, 1257 (20 & 21 Vict. c. 77), came into operation, it is best to search first the index to the wills proved in the Prerogative Court of Canterbury, which is kept at Somerset House. Failing this, the will is probably to be found in the registry of the district in which it was proved. The wills proved prior to 1858 were all distributed among the district registries when these institutions came into existence. To find a will proved since 1858 is a far simpler task. It must have been proved either at the Principal Registry at Somerset House, or in the registry of the district in which the testator lived. In the former case the original will itself is carefully preserved at Somerset House, the copy of which probate has been granted is in the hands of the executors who proved the will, and another copy for Parliament is bound up in a folio volume of wills made by testators of that initial and date; the indices to these volumes fill a room of considerable size at Somerset House, which is freely open to the public. In the latter case, the original will, proved in the District Registry, is there kept, but a copy is sent to and filed at Somerset House, and may there be seen. Any will may be read by anybody who is ready to pay a search fee of one shilling; but the reader may not copy any part of the will except the names and addresses of the executors, and the date and private number of the will. If he desires a copy, he can order one to be made, for which he will pay according to the length of the will, at the rate of sixpence a folio (ninety words) for an ordinary copy, and ninepence a folio for a certified copy, which, with a shilling stamp impressed thereon can be produced and read in any court of law. VEGETABLE POISONS AND SUITABLE EMETICS.

Belladonna, or Deadly Nightshade, is a fatal poisonous plant; its round, large, smooth, deep purple-coloured berries, with sweetish, violet-coloured juice, should never tempt anyone to taste them.

Hemlock is violently poisonous, any part of the leaves or stem rapidly producing delirium and death.

Water Hemlock and Water Parsnip have frequently proved fatal.

Foxglove.—The leaves are an exceedingly fatal poison, producing great debility. An emetic should be given, and brandy and sal-volatile in doses of half a teaspoonful of each in water.

Monkshood is a common garden flower which is very poisonous, a small pertion of the leaves proving fatal. Its roots have also been mistaken for horse-radish, and proved fatal.

Laburnum Seeds are exceedingly poisonous.

Common Laurel.—The leaves and berries are powerfully poisonous.

Yew.—The leaves and berries are poisonous, and have proved fatal. The berries should never be eaten, as the poison is found in the seed.

Common Arum or Lords and Ladies is an irritating poison, and its leaves have proved fatal.

Nightshade, Opium, &c.—In cases of poisoning with these, give mustard emetic; and as long as the patient is drowsy, he must be kept walking about. After the emetic has fully acted, lemon-juice or vinegar and water may be given.

EMETICS.—An emetic is the proper first treatment in all these cases. A dessert spoonful of salt and mustard in a tumbler of water and tickling the throat with a feather is an excellent one.

The area returned as reserved for hay shows on the whole a decline of less than 5,000 acres, an increase of over 13,000 acres in the case of permanent grass being more than counterbalanced by a decrease in the case of clover and rotation grasses. Of the area for grazing there has been a decline of more than 51,000 acres among the clover and rotation grasses, but permanent grass has increased by nearly 125,000 acres.

THE FARMYARD.

The national farmyard of Great Britain in 1908 contained 1,119,324 horses used for agricultural purposes, an increase of 3,397 over 1907. Unbroken horses one year and above numbered 299,809, and under one year 126,538

Cattle have declined in number as well as horses. The cows, heifers and other cattle numbered 6,905,134 head, as against 6,912,067 in 1907, a decrease of 6,933. Sheep have increased to 27,039,730, an increase of 924,275, or 3½ per cent.—a total number not reached since 1899. Pigs show an increase of 187,000, or more than 7 per cent.

To Estimate the Weight of a Stack of Hay.

To the height in feet of the stack to the caves add one-half of the height from the caves to the ridge. Multiply the result first by the length in feet, then by the width in feet, and divide the result by 27, which will give the contents of the stack in cubic yards. A yard of new hay averages 6 stones (of 22 lbs.) in weight, and old hay from 8 to 9 stones; therefore, to get the weight of the stack, the number of cubic yards must be multiplied by from 6 to 9 according to the age of the hay.

Prepaid Rate.—On each registered newspaper, the postage when prepaid is one halfpenny; but a packet containing two or more registered newspapers is chargeable at the rate of one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz.

CELESTIAL PHENOMENA IN 1910.

ECLIPSES DURING THE YEAR.

In the year 1910 there will be two Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

1. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, May 9th, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, May 9th, 3h. 38m. A.M., mean time at Greenwich, in Longitude 61° 26′ E., and Latitude 55° 58′ S. Central Eclipse begins generally, May 9th, 5h. 9m. A.M., in Longitude 111° 22′ E., and Latitude 72° 47′ S.

Ends on the Earth generally, May 9th, 7h. 46m. A.M., in Longitude

147° 38' E., and Latitude 15° 37' S.

This Eclipse will be visible chiefly in Australia and Tasmania, in which countries it will have a very important effect.

At PERTH it will begin on May 9th, Oh. 15m. P.M., and end at

2h. 48m. P.M.

- At ADELAIDE and MELBOURNE it will begin between 2h. 30m. and 3h. 0m. P.M. The greatest Phase will occur between 3h. 30m. and 4h. 0m. P.M., when nearly the whole of the Sun's disc will be obscured.
- At SYDNEY it will begin at 3h. 30m. P.M. The greatest Phase occurring at 4h. 38m. P.M.
- At Hobert Town a total Eclipse is visible. Begins at 2h. 56m. p.m. The totality will last from 4h. 3m. to 4h. 6m. p.m. All the above are for Mean Time and not Standard Mean Time.

2. A total Eclipse of the Moon, May 24th, partly visible as a Partial Eclipse at Greenwich..

First contact with the Penumbra, May 24th, 2h. 33m. A.M. Shadow 3h. 46m. A.M. Beginning of the Total Phase 5h. 9m. A.M. ,, .. Middle of the Eclipse 5h. 34m. A.M. ,, End of Total Phase 6h. 0m. A.M. " 7h. 22m. A.M. Last contact with the Shadow " Penumbra 8h. 36m. A.M. Magnitude of the Eclipse (D's dia.=1) 1.099. At Greenwich the Moon sets at 3h. 57m. A.M., May 24th.

3. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, November 1st, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, November 1st, 11h. 51m. P.M., mean time at Greenwich, in Longitude 118° 22' E., and Latitude 63° 5' N. Greatest Eclipse, November 2nd, 2h. 9m. A.M., in Longitude 155° 2' W., and Latitude 62° 4' N.

Ends on the Earth generally, November 2nd, 4h. 26m. A.M., in Longitude 165° 18' W., and Latitude 17° 36' N

Magnitude of Eclipse (O's dia. = 1) 0.854.

This Eclipse will be visible chiefly in the North Pacific Ocean, in Alaska, Japan, Korea, Manchuria, and the North Eastern part of Siberia.

4. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, November 16th, visible at Greenwich.

First contact with the Penumbra, November 16th, 9h, 46m, P.M. Shadow, ,, 10h. 44m. Beginning of Total Phase, 11h. 55m. Middle of the Eclipse, 17th Oh. 21m. A.M. " End of Total Phase, 0h, 47m. 22 Last contact with the Shadow, 1h. 58m. 2h. 56m. Penumbra, Magnitude of the Eclipse ()'s dia. = 1) 1.131.

This will be a very important Eclipse for this country, and startling

events will speedily follow.

Periods in the year 1910 when the Planets will be most favourably situated for Observation.

\$ MERCURY.

This planet will be visible in the evenings, about January 10th, May 2nd, August 30th, and December 24th, and in the mornings about February 19th, June 20th, and October 11th. The best times to observe it will be in the evenings, about May 2nd, and in the mornings about October 11th. This planet revolves very closely to the Sun, consequently, it can only be seen just after sunset, or shortly before sunrise.

Q VENUS.

As the year opens, this beautiful planet will be an evening star until the middle of February. A morning star until November, then an evening star for the rest of the year. It will attain its greatest brilliancy in the first week in January, and will be a splendid object in the Western sky after sunset. About the middle of March it will again be seen to great advantage in the East, shortly before sunrise.

MARS.

This planet will be an evening star until September, then a morning star for the rest of the year. The best time to observe it will be during the evenings of January, February, and March; at no other time of the year will it be favorably situated for observation. It shines with a reddy light, and is quite unlike any other planet in the solar system.

11 JUPITER.

This beautiful planet will be a morning star until the end of March, an evening star until the middle of October, then a morning star for the rest of the year. The best time to observe it will be during the evenings of March, April, and May, particularly in March, when it will rise at sunset and culminate at midnight. This planet shines with a beautiful silvery light, and is next to Venus in brilliancy.

h SATURN.

This planet will be an evening star until the middle of April, a morning star until October, then an evening star for the rest of the year. The best time to view it will be during October, when it will rise at sunset and culminate at midnight. Its rings and moons are very interesting objects, but cannot be seen without the aid of a good telescope.

H URANUS.

As the year opens, this planet will be too near the Sun to be observed, but from March until July it will be visible in the mornings. After the latter date it will be an evening star for the rest of the year. At no period during the year will it be well situated for observation. To the naked eye it is similar to a star of the 8th magnitude, and a good telescope is needed to see its moons.

W NEPTUNE.

This planet will be well situated for observation during the first three months of the year, as it will rise about sunset and culminate about midnight. After July it will be a morning star for the rest of the year. On account of its great distance from the earth it cannot be seen by the naked eye.

The beautiful Sun will be nearest the earth on January 1st, and farthest from it on July 5th. It will suffer eclipse on May 9th and November 2nd. The Moon will be eclipsed on May 24th and November 17th.

STATIONARY POSITIONS OF THE PLANETS DURING THE YEAR 1910.

The Sun and Moon are never stationary. A planet stationary means stationary in the Zodiac, and not in the sky.

On April 13th the Moon will occult the planet Mars, visible at Greenwich. Disappearance, 10h. 28m. P.M.; re-appearance, 11h. 4m. P.M. The Moon will occult Saturn on February 14th, March 13th, June 4th, July 2nd and 29th, August 25th, November 15th and December 12th. She will also occult Mars on March 16th; Jupiter on November 28th and December 26th, and Venus on June 4th; but none of these occultations will be visible in this country.

GENERAL PREDICTIONS.

THE WINTER QUARTER.

The Sun in Capricorn, December 22nd, 1909, 11h. 20m. A.M.

AT the time when the Sun reaches the most southerly point of its annual course, the first decade of the sign Pisces arises; Mars and Saturn being intercepted in Aries in the ascendant, in square to Mercury and Uranus in the 11th, and in opposition to Jupiter in the 7th. The Ingress takes place in the 10th house, and the Moon is on the cusp of the 2nd in trine to the Sun. Venus holds the 12th, and Neptune the 5th. The rising position of the two Malefics in the 12th house points to an excited and riotous state of the populace, a strong warlike tendency, much crime and incendiarism, and great distress in the land. The indications of International disputes and actual warfare are exceptionally strong, for Mercury, ruler of the 7th, is in square to both the Malefics, and Jupiter in the 7th opposes them; hence it will require much care and diplomatic skill to avert the horrors of war. The Sun is strong in the 10th, so the Government will hold its own, while the National Exchequer will be satisfactory, more so than it has been for some time. Railways and postal matters will be disturbed; accidents being denoted on the former, also danger of strikes and outrages. The weather will be stormy and unseasonable, while agriculture will be backward, and the landed

interests will suffer. Neptune afflicted in the 5th shows much vice and immorality, crimes against women and children. Mars ruling the 8th, denotes much mortality, many terrible and sudden deaths, especially in military circles; possibly some noted soldier will pass to the Great Beyond. In Colonial circles trouble will occur. Parliamentary affairs will be disordered, much disputation, acrid debates and personal recriminations. Hospitals and workhouses will benefit. The figure indicates exciting events, and the danger of war is exceedingly great.

At WASHINGTON the Ingress takes place in the 1st house, with Mars and Saturn in the 4th, pointing to heavy storms off the Eastern coasts. The Revenue will be deficient; losses and fraud will occur, while, as Mcreury rules the 7th house, there is grave danger of war or disputes with other Powers. The birth rate will be on the

increase, and theatres and music halls will benefit.

In Longitude 68° and 65° West, Mars and Saturn will be on the lower Meridian respectively, indicative of terrible earthquakes in these parts of the world. At the opposite points, 122° and 125° East, they are on the Meridian. This falls in China and Korea, where insurrections and bloodshed will be in evidence. In Central Europe the two planets will be rising, which is an indication of war and bloodshed. England and Germany will suffer much from this conjunction.

THE SPRING QUARTER.

The Sun in Aries, March 21st, 1910, 0h. 3m. noon.

THE Sun enters the sign Aries when the last decanate of Cancer rises, and will be placed close to the Meridian in sextile to Mars. Saturn will be also in the 10th in square to Uranus setting. The Moon will be on the cusp of the 2nd in exact sextile to Jupiter, but in parallel to Mars; Mercury will be in the 9th in trine to Neptune rising, Venus will occupy the 8th. Neptune rising points to much socialism in the land, but being in trine with Mercury from the 9th, shows psychic discoveries and much excitement in scientific circles. The Moon in the 2nd, well aspected by Jupiter, is good for the Revenue, also for trade, and the Exchequer receipts will be above the average, but the parallel of Mars will make expenditure very heavy, especially in Arms and Munitions of war. Railways and postal matters will benefit; traffic returns being above the average. The weather promises to be fine and warm, and agriculture and the landed interests will benefit from the position of Jupiter in the 4th. The health of the people will be good. Foreign affairs will still be disquieting, for Uranus is just setting in square to Saturn. Disputes and unexpected troubles with other Powers will arise, causing much annoyance to the Government. Venus in the 8th house denotes mortality among the fair sex; some artist of note will join the Great Majority. Mercury in the 9th is good for shipping and Colonial affairs, and will benefit the scientific world. Government will be strong, but Mars in the 11th points to heated debates in Parliament, deaths and dissensions among Members, and much discussion on Military affairs.

At Washington the Ingress occurs just after sunrise, with Saturn on the Ascendant. A wave of discontent will pass over the Eastern States. The Revenue will be good, but expenditure will be very heavy, especially in military matters. The weather will be wet, and floods will occur in places. Theatres and music halls will prosper. Scandals will occur in high places, and the President will have much to contend with. Jupiter near the cusp of the 7th is good for Foreign relations, and many marriages of note will take place.

In the Balkans and at Athens, Saturn culminates, warning the Rulers of those parts to take care of their persons, and to guard against insurrections. Mars culminates in Turkestan, an augury of bloodshed and incendiarism in that country. Fires and railway

accidents are presignified in Longitude 117° West.

THE SUMMER QUARTER.

The Sun enters Cancer, June 22nd, 1910, 7h. 49m. A.M.

When the Sun reaches the most northerly point of its course the middle of the sign Leo will be rising, Mars will be just above the Ascendant, in square to Saturn, sextile to Mercury and Jupiter. The Ingress takes place in the 11th house in square to Jupiter, with the Moon applying to the opposition of the Sun. Saturn is close to the Meridian, in sextile to the Sun. Venus will be in the 10th in trine to Uranus in the 6th, and in sextile to Neptune in the 12th. Jupiter holds the 3rd. The rising position of Mars points to a martial tendency among the people, danger of rioting, and an outcry against the Ruling Powers. The Sun and Mercury in the 11th, the former in good aspect to Saturn, and the latter in good aspect to Mars and Jupiter, shows an active and enterprising session, much good work being done, new laws and measures of far-reaching nature being under discussion. The Revenue and trade will improve considerably, for Saturn has now left Aries, and a brighter outlook appears to be in store for the country, though the danger of war is not yet over. Railways will benefit much, and increased postal facilities are anticipated. There will be a large expenditure of public money. The weather will be hot and dry, and accidents in mines and seismic disturbances are likely. The birth rate will increase. Theatres and music halls will benefit, though the approaching opposition of the Luminaries is likely to adversely effect educational matters. Naval and military affairs will be prominent. Our foreign relations will still be unsettled. Deaths will occur among noted people, railway magnates, judges, and authors. Colonial affairs are more prosperous. Saturn close to the meridian is bad for the King, and indisposition is denoted. The Government will be strong as Saturn has the sextile of the Sun.

At Washington the Ingress takes place in the 2nd house in sextile to Saturn, but in square to Jupiter. The Revenue will be good, but expenditure will be very heavy, and panies and bank failures are denoted. Trade will improve. Railways will suffer. Fraud and swindling will be prevalent in the postal service. The

weather will be excessively hot, whilst forest fires, mine explosions, and seismic disturbances are to be apprehended. Jupiter near the cusp of the 6th house in square to the Sun, points to heavy expenditure

in Naval and Military matters.

In Belgium and Holland Saturn culminates, which is evil for the Rulers of those countries. Mars culminates in Burmah, warning the Viceroy of India to be on guard against a native rising. The same planet will be on the lower Meridian in 83° West Longitude, denoting volcanic eruptions or seismic troubles. Havana will be in danger of a disaster. Earthquake shocks are also likely in France Italy and Persia, about the latter part of July.

THE AUTUMN QUARTER.

The Sun in Libra, September 23rd, 1910, 10h. 31m. P.M.

WHEN the Sun reaches the first point of the sign Libra the 11th degree of Cancer will ascend. The Moon ruler of the figure will be in Gemini in the 12th house, in trine to the Sun, Mars, and Mercury this trinity of planets being close to the cusp of the 5th house. Neptune will be on the cusp of the 2nd house in exact opposition to Uranus, on the cusp of the 8th, and in square to Jupiter in the 5th. Saturn will be in the 11th, and Venus close to the lower Meridian. The figure is not a very important one, except for the conjunction of the Sun with Mars, which denotes danger to Royalty, and international disputes and warlike tendencies. Neptune in the 2nd shows fraud on the revenue, heavy expenditure and waste of public money. The Sun ruling the 3rd afflicted by Mars is ominous of terrible railway accidents, and troubles with employees, and also among postal servants. Venus in the 4th promises a mild quarter, which will benefit agriculture. Cases of cruelty to children will be very frequent. Theatres and music halls will suffer, and a fire or disaster is probable. The public health will be good. Foreign affairs will occupy much attention. Uranus on the cusp of the 8th presignifies many terrible and sudden deaths. Saturn in the 11th denotes dissensions, party splits, and deaths of Members of Parliament. The Moon in the 12th well aspected will benefit hospitals and institutions, and a great financial improvement will be manifest.

At Washington the Ingress takes place in the 7th house, and the Sun being conjoined with Mars, shows grave danger of disputes, strikes, and an unsettled state of the labour market. The revenue will be deficient, depreciation of stocks and shares, and a general gloom in financial circles. Uranus in the 11th points to discord in the Senate, deaths of Members, &c. Mars ruling the 8th denotes

much mortality, many sudden and terrible deaths.

Saturn culminating in the ruling sign of Persia warns the Shah to take care of his person. It is an evil position for the Monarch of that country. In Poland, Hungary, Servia, and Turkey, the Sun and Mars will be on the lower Meridian; the ruling authorities in those countries should be careful of an outbreak or revolution.

Seismic disturbances are also threatened. Forest fires are denoted in British Columbia. Seismic or volcanic troubles will occur in the Pacific, about 158° West Longitude. Austria will suffer much from the conjunction of the Sun with Mars in her ruling sign. Saturn afflicts Ireland, Poland, and Persia. Indian and South African affairs will still be unsettled.

ECLIPSES.

Eclipse of the Sun, May 9th.—This is not visible here, so the effects will be small. It will be visible in Australia and Tasmania. At Hobart, Libra will rise with Jupiter therein, but much afflicted. Bank failures and financial disasters are likely to occur. Mars is culminating, hence fires will be frequent.

Eclipse of the Moon, May 24th.—This is partly visible in England, the Moon setting just after the first contact with the shadow. It falls in the first decanate of Sagittarius, denoting much "theft and rapines." There will be a good deal of epidemic sickness, pulmonary

complaints, &c.

Eclipse of the Sun, November 1st.—This is a partial eclipse, visible in Japan and the Pacific. Bank failures will be prevalent, and much fluctuation in stocks and shares. Serious earthquake shocks will follow on the heels of this eclipse, especially in South America,

Brazil, Persia, &c.

Eclipse of the Moon, November 16th.—This is a total eclipse visible in this country. No less than seven planets are in fixed signs, denoting terrible earthquakes in divers places. The eclipse is central in 9° West Longitude, which falls close to Lisbon, where shocks are likely to be felt. Persia, Poland, Calabria, &c., will suffer also. The eclipse falling in the third decanate of Taurus, signifies much pestilence and famine. It will affect Ireland adversely.

Terrible railway accidents are signified.

Conjunction of Mars and Saturn, December 29th, 1909, 7h. 2m. A.M. This falls in the 3rd house, denoting some terrible railway accidents. Serious earthquakes are threatened in about 8° West. This meridian runs through Barra, Ireland, Portugal, Montalva, Morocco City and Liberia. The two planets are rising in Central India, pointing to lawlessness and rioting in those parts. Fires and catastrophies will occur in New Zealand. The Czar of Russia should beware of plots, for the conjunction falls on the place of Neptune in his horoscope. It also occurs in the ruling sign of England, a portent of war and grave troubles.

Oppositions of Mars and Jupiter with Saturn. These occur on the 9th and 18th November respectively. The former denotes severe earthquakes in the Antilles, close to St. Vincent and Martinique, also in South America. Violent storms and incendiarism and seismic troubles are threatened in China. The latter will cause

a serious earthquake about 11° East Longitude.

THE CROWNED HEADS OF EUROPE.

ENGLAND.

King Edward still maintains his place as the foremost Ruler in Europe. His aim is peace and goodwill, and it is the sincere wish of all his subjects that he may live long to continue his beneficent

reign!

Unfavourable influences are again shown to be operating in the King's horoscope. The conjunction of Mars and Saturn falls on a critical point, in square to the place of Mars and the progressed Sun, which is strongly indicative of ill-health and personal danger, but I hope not fatal. February and March are evil months for travelling, especially by water. November is also a dangerous month, the Moon being then in opposition to its radical place, in square to Saturn, and in parallel to Uranus. Serious indisposition is threatened. The opposition of Mars to Saturn, Jupiter to Saturn, and the conjunction of Mars and Jupiter are formed from the midheaven and fourth house, all of which are ominous as regards health and country.

The Queen.—In the Queen's horoscope Mars still keeps close to the Sun, which will affect the health of the King. Some important Court functions are shown in the summer. The fall of the year is

not a favourable time by any means.

The Prince of Wales.—The influences are fairly favourable in the Prince's horoscope, though the Sun is only just past the square of Saturn. Some important journeys are likely to be undertaken, for

Mercury reaches the sextile of the Sun's place at birth.

The Princess of Wales.—The directions are better than in previous years. Travelling seems to be very strongly shown during the year. Some unpleasant occurrences are foreshadowed in June and September.

GERMANY.

No one in this country believes in the sincerity of the Emperor. For what purposes does he want a powerful navy? Why is he anxious to lull us into a sense of false security whilst he is building warships in hot haste? Why did he write to the First Lord of our Admiralty, Lord Tweedmouth? the purport of which has never transpired. The German professions of friendship are hollow. They have got their answer in the splendid assistance which the Colonies have offered us in the shape of warships. Now the bloated Germans can see that they would have to fight not England, but the British Empire. We are threatened by no other nation in the world, and, except for the deplorable loss of life, it would be cheapest and best to smash the German navy and settle it once for all. When the reducement of armaments was discussed at the Hague Peace Conference, it was Germany alone which stuck out. Nothing but a good thrashing will bring these German bigots to their senses.

The Kaiser has an important year before him, and evil directions are very pronounced. January and February are bad for health and the country's finances, and also denote family troubles. March to June is very evil, for the Moon passes the opposition of Neptune,

opposition of Mars and parallel of the same planet and opposition of the progressed Sun. All these influences are strongly indicative of ill-health, war, accident, or personal violence. Mars transits the square of these planets in April. Two other evil periods are May and the end of August. It is to be hoped that the trine of Mars and the Moon at birth will prevent war, although the influences at present are strongly inclined that way.

RUSSIA.

Russia has come to a friendly understanding with us, and there is now very little fear of trouble from that quarter, thanks to the noble efforts of King Edward. I sincerely hope and expect, that British capital will open up that great country, the possibilities of

which are simply immense.

The Czar is still under evil influences. The Sun has now reached the exact parallel of Uranus, while it is close to the square of the radical Moon. This denotes internal trouble in his Empire, probably some insurrectionary movement. A bereavement or loss is shown in the early spring, but some favourable directions of the Moon to the Sun, Venus and Uranus, operate towards the end of the year and will benefit him.

AUSTRIA

The Austrian Emperor has grievously disappointed this country by violating Treaty obligations. The annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina was an unwarrantable piece of business, and it was only the good offices of the British Government which prevented a terrible war between Austria and Servia; but Austria was backed by Germany, and this may explain the extraordinary conduct of the former. The influences in the aged Emperor's horoscope are not favourable, for the Moon passes evil aspects of the Sun and Uranus. These are bad for health, and denote internal disturbances in the country. The Sun, however, is still close to the sextile of Jupiter, so that I do not anticipate serious results.

ITALY.

The King of Italy seems to have a rather quiet year before him, there being no important influences in operation. The financial state of the country is likely to be poor, and during the autumn grief and bereavement are shown.

SPAIN

The King of Spain is under very evil influences, for the Sun is not far from a square of Mars, while Mars in the early part of April will transit the Sun, and in September the square of the Sun. Both these times are very evil for health and person, and care must be taken to avoid accidents and attempts on his life. Disputes are shown with Ministers, and financial troubles are indicated.

GREECE.

Favourable influences are operating in the horoscope of the King of Greece, benefitting his kingdom and people. The Sun is in good aspect to Jupiter and the Moon, and increase of honour and dignity and national success are shown.

TURKEY.

The Sultan Abdul Hamid has been dethroned, and Mohammed V. reigns in his stead. He was born November 3rd, 1844, with the Luminaries in quartile aspect to each other. Unless the hour of his birth was a successful one his nativity is not favourable by any means, and in the coming year, plots and financial troubles are threatened. The Autumn will be a critical time.

NORWAY.

The influences in the King's horoscope are very benefic and promise advancement and success. Slight indisposition is shown about August. As the Moon is passing through the ascendant of the horoscope, travelling will be indulged in, and the general welfare of his country will be good.

HOLLAND.

The Queen of Holland is still under evil influences, for Venus opposes Saturn, and Mars opposes Jupiter. These are bad for the country and its finances, also for the domestic affairs of the Queen. With Neptune in the ruling sign, an unfavorable year is shown; many disappointments.

BELGIUM.

Unfavourable influences are operating in the horoscope of the King of the Belgians, for the Moon forms squares with Mars and Uranus as well as with Venus. It is unfavourable for the finance of the country, and will cause disputes with Ministers and much unpleasantness and danger of ill-health.

DENMARK.

Th King of Denmark was born on June 3rd, 1843, at 10.15 p.m. The Sun is now in trine with Mars, which will benefit his country and denotes expansion of trade and commerce. He has a very successful year before him.

SWEDEN.

Favourable influences are operating in the King of Sweden's nativity, for the Sun is close to the sextile of Jupiter, and the Moon makes some benefic aspects. All these point to increase of honour and dignity, and will bring success and prosperity to his country.

PORTUGAL.

The influences in King Manuel's horoscope are somewhat contradictory. The Sun is close to Mercury and a sextile of Mars, but the Lunar influences are inimical. Plots are to be guarded against, indisposition and danger of accidents.

JAPAN.

Favourable influences are operating in the horoscope of the Mikado. The Sun is in sextile to Neptune, denoting naval expansion. Mars, however, is still close to the opposition of the Moon, hence disputes with Foreign Powers are likely to occur.

ROMAN CHURCH.

The Pope is not under good influences, the Moon being in square to the Sun and Uranus. Indisposition and many troubles are shown. The attacks of heart trouble are likely to recur.

EXPLANATION OF THE HIEROGLYPHIC FOR 1909.

In the upper left-hand corner we see depicted two trains in collision, engine to engine, which was tragically fulfilled between a Goods and a Denver and Rio Grande Passenger train, in which twenty-five persons were killed and many injured. There was also a collision at Hindley and Blackrod Junction, between a passenger train and two light engines, when the driver of the passenger train was killed, the fireman and twenty-two others injured. Lower down we see fires, which one has had only to read the newspapers to have seen verified. For instance, there was an extensive outbreak at John Tod & Son's Paper Mills, at Lasswade, Midlothian, estimated loss about £20,000; another at Messrs. Cook. jute manufacturers, at Millwall Docks, damage estimated at £30,000, besides minor fires which occurred at private houses and resulted in death and injury. At the bottom corner is seen a colliery explosion; how terribly this was fulfilled we all know, by the sad fate of the 164 men and boys who lost their lives in the West Stanley Colliery explosion in Durham.

In the centre of the picture are shown earthquakes, suicides, distress, sickness and accidents. Up to the present (May, 1909) the year has produced more suicides than for years past, and distress among the poorer classes has been very keen. Influenza has played its part, victimizing Members of Parliament and many other noted persons, and accidents have been rife. The fearful earthquake at Messina and Reggio will be remembered by all, and earthquake shocks were felt in the province of Luristan, in Persia, also at Palmi, Calabria.

At the top right-hand corner we have a scene of a strike, remarkably fulfilled by the great strike of Postal employees at Paris; then follows a wreck, a Clyde steamer was sunk, also the Argentine liner, "President Roca," bound to Buenos Ayres, caught fire and was wrecked, about forty lives lost. The British steamer, "Clan Ranald," with a cargo of wheat for Adelaide and Durban, became a total wreck at Edithburgh, forty persons were drowned, other casualities too numerous to mention here also occurred.

The remaining symbols are as yet (May, 1909) unfulfilled.

Much excitement and unessiness have prevailed in military and Government circles owing to the trouble between Servia

and Austria-Hungary.

Fulfilments.

The towns of Messina and Reggio were destroyed by earthquake, about 200,000 persons perished. This earthquake happened within six days and within 6° of place of locality, being only twenty minutes difference in time!

Lord Amherst, Lord Burton, Sir Owen Tudor Burne, Lady Fletcher Moulton, and

many others died.

Col. Podmore Clarke, Lieut. A. A. Hayshe, and many other noted persons committed suicide. Great alterations were proposed by the

Government in connection with the Poor Law administration, and will probably become law. The Tzar's uncle, Duke Valdimir, passed

away.

The Pope was indisposed during the months of February and March.

There have been much unrest and dis-

satisfaction among the poorer classes, chiefly on account of the lack of employment.

Great excitement ran through the land during this month, and many meetings were held condemning the inadequate measures of the Government.

The trouble between Servia and Austria was happily settled by the good offices of Great Britain.

HINTS TO FARMERS.

Tariff Reform appears to be forging ahead judging by the recent Bye-elections. If it does not increase the price of cereals, it will certainly make feeding stuffs much cheaper, and bran which now costs something like £5 per ton, will be bought for £3. On the other hand, agricultural implements will cost slightly more, yet, on the whole, I think a duty on manufactured articles from abroad will benefit Farmers in this country. For instance, Margarine and Butter would come under the duty, making dairy farming more profitable; the same with cheese. Taken altogether, it is a most difficult problem to solve from the Farmer's point of view, so I must leave it for my farming readers to decide which they think best, Free Trade, or Tariff Reform.

The following are the most favourable dates during 1910 for all

kinds of farm work, sowing seeds, &c. :-

JANUARY.—14th and 15th, 9.35 to 10.25 A.M., 11.20 to 0.20 P.M., 2.15 to 4.40 P.M.; 19th and 20th, 9.10 to 10.0 A.M., 10.55 to 11.55 A.M., 1.55 to 4.20 P.M.; 23rd and 24th, 8.55 to 9.45 A.M., 10.40 to 11.40 A.M., 1.40 to 4.5 P.M.

Work to be done.—Finish ploughing stubbles; plough after sheepfold. Sow wheat on dry and early soils, 8 pecks per acre, in 8 to 10-inch drills. Sow oats in Southern counties, 4 to 6 bushels per acre; also peas in favourable seasons, and barley in sheltered fields; also beans. Proceed with drainage operations, irrigation work, and marling; and with field and road-carting during frost. Prepare compost manures. Finish top-dressing grass. Attend to folding sheep; also to ewes and lambs, and to milch cows, the earlier of which will be calving.

FEBRUARY.—11th and 12th, 7.45 to 8.30 A.M., 9.30 to 10.30 A.M., 0.30 to 3.0 P.M.; 15th and 16th, 7.30 to 8.15 A.M., 9.15 to 10.15 A.M., 0.15 to 2.45 P.M.; 19th and 20th, 7.10 to 7.55 A.M., 9.0 to 10.0 A.M.,

noon to 2.30 P.M.

Work to be done.—Sow spring wheat, also barley on a dry seed bed; and peas and beans; also oats. Sow cabbage and kohl-rabi, in beds for transplanting, also spring vetches; plant early potatoes. Give calves pure milk, afterwards linseed soup and hay tea. Horses require full allowance of food. Buy seeds. 14 lbs. per acre of clover seed, with 1 bushel per acre of grass seed; 3 bushels per acre of Italian rye-grass; 5, 7, and 4 lbs. per acre respectively of carrot, mangel-wurzel, and turnip seed; 3 or 4 bushels per acre of rough sainfoin.

March.—14th and 15th, 5.40 to 6.25 a.m., 7.30 to 8.30 a.m., 10.25 to 0.55 p.m.; 18th, 19th, and 20th, 5.20 to 6.5 a.m., 7.15 to

8.15 A.M., 10.10 to 0. 40 P.M.

Work to be done.—Finish sowing spring wheat, continue barley-sowing, also oats, peas, and spring vetches. Apply when necessary top-dressings of soluble manure—I cwt. of nitrate of soda or sulphate of ammonia, with 2 to 5 cwt. of common salt, to corn crops in wet weather. Harrow, roll, and sow land for carrots now or in April; sow cabbage seed in plots for autumn crop in the field; sow sainfoin

on calcareous soils, plant potatoes. The ewes as they lamb may be thinly distributed over the pastures. Sows should farrow their first litters.

APRIL.—11th and 12th, 5.35 to 6.35 A.M., 8.30 to 11.0 A.M., 4.35 to 7.15 P.M.; 15th and 16th, 5.20 to 6.20 A.M., 8.15 to 10.45 A.M., 4.20 to 7.0 P.M.

Work to be done.—Wheat-hoeing; finish barley and oat-sowing; hand and horse-hoe beans; sow grass and clover seeds. Mangel-wurzel may be drilled or dibbled, 6 to 7 lbs. per acre, any time this month. Carrots may be sown, with a few ounces of turnip seed to show the rows. Plant drumhead cabbages 3 feet asunder each way, 4,840 plants to an acre; manure heavily for them. Potatoes may be coming through; harrow down, and then immediately "set up" the drills against frost. Sow flax early this month and hemp on rich soil; also lupines, in sandy soils; also lucerne, on good soils.

MAY.—9th, 6.45 to 9.15 A.M., 2.50 to 5.30 P.M.; 12th and 13th, 6.35 to 9.5 A.M., 2.40 to 5.10 P.M.; 22nd and 23rd, 5.55 to 8.25 A.M.,

2.0 to 4.40 P.M.

Work to be done.—Hoe wheat, oats, barley, beans, peas, potatoes, carrots, and parsnips; sow buckwheat, hemp, vetches, lucerne, and lupine; also rape for early feed, and swede-turnips in the north; finish mangel sowing; plough in manure for turnips; fallow operations of all kinds, whether for a crop or not. Grazing stock should be taken to the grass; attend to brood mares timed to foal about the beginning of the month. Gentle exercise is good before foaling.

June.—9th and 10th, 4.40 to 7.10 a.m., 0.45 to 3.25 p.m.; 18th

and 19th, 4.10 to 6.40 A.M., 0.15 to 2.55 P.M.

Work to be done.—Sow turnips; ten loads of dung and 3 cwt. superphosphate are a common dressing; 4 lbs. of seed. Sow rape— 2 quarts of seed per acre in rows 12 inches apart; single carrots and parsnips; transplant cabbages. Horse and hand-hoe mangels; also kohl-rabi and swedes as soon as they are in broad leaf, and single them. Mow clovers for hay, and meadows as they ripen. Sheepwashing and shearing to be attended to. Dairy management is at its height this month.

JULY.—7th, 11.0 to 1.35 P.M.; 15th, 16th and 17th, 10.25 to noon. Work to be done.—Hay-making; prepare for corn harvest. Flaxpulling is carried on towards end of the month; rye ripens, and peas are ripe towards the end of the month. Hand-hoe root-crops; also lucerne, after every cutting. Pastures will require thinning, except where cabbages are ready to help. Sheep-shearing to be finished in the north; watch for fly. Insure all harvest produce against fire and hail.

August.—12th and 13th, 8.35 to 11.15 A.M.

Work to be done. - After harvest work get in stubble-turnips, trifolium, mustard, rye. Seeds for permanent pastures may be sown now on a clean stubble; also trifolium incarnatum simply harrowed in after rain. Clean stubbles and prepare for wheat sowing and winter beans. Cabbage (drumhead), for planting next year, sow now. Flocks require dipping, salving, or smearing. Put rams to ewes for lambing in January.

SEPTEMBER. -8th and 9th, 6.50 to 9.30 A.M., 3.0 to 4.30 P.M.

17th, 18th and 19th, 6.10 to 8.50 A.M., 2.20 to 3.50 P.M.

Work to be done.—Thatch and trim corn ricks; thresh rakings; plough stubbles. Apply lime to stubbles; also manure on clay lands and to meadows. Harvest potatoes. Sow wheat on a stale furrow, not too dry. A pound of blue vitriol dissolved in a gallon of water is a good dressing for a coomb of wheat.

OCTOBER.—5th, 6th and 7th, 5.40 to 7.40 A.M.; 1.15 to 2.40 P.M.

15th and 16th, 0.35 to 2.10 P.M., 3.30 to 4.15 P.M.

Work to be done.—Dig potatoes; pull mangel-wurzel, carrots, and parsnips. Sow winter beans and winter vetches. Autumn fallow and manure with farm-yard dung for crops next year. Ditches should be cleaned out. In dry weather, sheep do well on rape.

NOVEMBER.—2nd and 3rd, 11.25 to 0.55 p.m., 2.25 to 3.10 p.m., 4.10 to 5.10 p.m.; 11th and 12th, 10.50 to 0.15 p.m., 1.50 to 2.35 p.m., 3.30 to 4.30 p.m.; 15th and 16th, 10.35 to noon., 1.35 to 2.15 p.m.,

HINTS TO GARDENERS.

The bona-fide market gardener is placed in a very difficult position. He has to compete with Lords and Squires who have turned many of their acres into market gardens, and who, to be intents and purposes, are really market gardeners. It is scarcely fair, but being a free country, every one is at liberty to do as he likes. How many of these gentry would have tolerated such a proceeding on the part of their gardeners even thirty years ago. They would have scouted the idea, but times have changed since then; in fact, everything has changed, and it is difficult to find the stately Hall and the generous Lord of fifty years ago.

The following are the most favorable times during 1910 for

pruning, planting, transplanting, sowing seeds, &c.:-

JANUARY.—14th and 15th, 9.35 to 10.25 A.M., 11.20 to 0.20 P.M., 2.15 to 4.40 P.M.; 19th and 20th, 9.10 to 10.0 A.M., 10.55 to 11.55 A.M., 1.55 to 4.20 P.M.; 23rd and 24th, 8.55 to 9.45 A.M., 10.40 to 11.40 A.M., 1.40 to 4.5 P.M.

Work to be done.—For succession, a few early frame peas, common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw. Plant, prune, and train fruit trees and bushes. Form new flower

gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, talips, &c. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, &c. Herbs to be gathered are groundsel, chickweed, archangel, and others which are in flower.

FEBRUARY.—11th and 12th, 7.45 to 8.30 A.M., 9.30 to 10.30 A.M., 0.30 to 3.0 P.M.; 15th and 16th, 7.30 to 8.15 A.M., 9.15 to 10.15 A.M., 0.15 to 2.45 P.M.; 19th and 20th, 7.10 to 7.55 A.M., 9.0 to 10.0 A.M.,

Work to be donc.—When the weather is favourable, continue to sow peas, beans, onions, spinach, savoys, lettuces, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes. Cut early kidney potatoes for seed, and put them in a stove or hot-bed, in order to start them for planting out. Plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses, &c. Prune vine and fruit trees. Heres to be gathered: foal-foot, lingwort, pilewort, speedwell, chickweed, shepherd's purse, and broom.

March.—14th and 15th, 5.40 to 6.25 A.M., 7.30 to 8.30 A.M., 10.25 to 0.55 P.M.; 18th, 19th and 20th, 5.20 to 6.5 A.M., 7.15 to

8.15 A.M., 10.10 to 0.40 P.M

Work to be done.—The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflowers, broccoli, spinach, onions, carrots, peas, beans, savoys, parsnips, radishes, &c. Plant red cabbages and sea kale; sow cucumbers and melons in hot beds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. This is the best time for grafting fruit trees, perpetual and moss roses, &c. Pot dahlias and cuttings. Plant pinks, polyanthuses, carnations, &c. Heres to be gathered for medicinal purposes: coltsfoot, fumitory, pilewort, ladyfrocks, lesser celandine, violet, and comfrey roots, and all kinds of herbal bark.

Heres to be gathered: ground ivy, dandelions, avens, buttercups, and others which are in flower, as well as all kinds of bark.

Work to be done.—Sow peas, cucumbers, red beet for pickling, and a full crop of kidney beans. Transplant cabbages, winter greens, cauliflowers, and celery. Hoe and stake peas, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant dahlias, and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, &c. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots. Herbs to be cut: celandine, milkwort, moonwort, wood sorrel, and adder's tongue.

and sow turnips. Thin out onions, lecks, carrots, parsnips, and early turnips. Shade and air melons, plants, &c. Bulbous roots that have done flowering should now be taken up, and the off-sets separated. Heres to be cut: avens, brooklime, centaury, comfrey, woodbine, valerian, eyebright, pimpernel, speedwell, and elecampane.

In searching a servant's boxes a search warrant should be obtained. If a servant leaves without notice he can be sued for damages unless his life or person is in danger.

A month's wages or warning may be given to a servant at any time; it matters not whether the wages are paid quarterly, monthly, or weekly.

If a servant wilfully disobeys, or is guilty of misconduct, he may be dismissed at once.

A servant's wages cannot be stopped on account of illness. A servant is not bound to do work for which he or she was not

engaged.

A servant is liable for wilful damage done to her master's property; the amount must not be deducted from wages; a summons should be taken out.

Yearly tenancies require a half-year's notice, to expire at the time of

year it began.

The birth of a child must be registered within six weeks.

A will must be in writing, signed by the testator, and witnessed by two persons. A will does not require a stamp.

An executor must distribute the testator's property within one year

of his death.

An illegitimate child cannot take property or money under the term

"children."

When a man dies without a will and without children, his wife takes half the property, the next-of-kin the other half. When there are children the wife takes one-third. See Almanack, page 58.

A person under twenty-one cannot make a will.

A gamekeeper may kill a dog pursuing game on his employer's land.

The police can enter licensed premises at any time.

EXPLANATION.

THE following Birthday Information must not be taken as correct in every case, as the hour of birth will sometimes make a great difference either for better or worse, and, in accordance with the nature of the hour, whether it was a fortunate or unfortunate one,

The information is for the year following the birthday; that is, if a person's birthday is in July, the information will extend from July, 1910, to July, 1911 or if the birthday is in December, the information will extend from December, 1910, to December, 1911; the same with any other month. To see what is going to happen before your birthday in 1910, an Almanae for 1909 should be obtained; these can still be had by sending stamps, or by ordering through any stationer.

With respect to the birth of children, the following remarks apply even in a more marked manner, and the information given is such as will occur in about nine cases out of ten; that is, out of ten children, nine will exhibit the characteristics ascribed to them, but the tenth may not. I cannot tell if a child will live or die, as this depends entirely and solely upon the hour of its birth.

The best hour, in a general way, for a child to be born, is from 11 A.M. until NOOM, for at that time the Sun, Mercury, and Venus must be well elevated, or near the meridian. Children born in the morning are generally more fortunate than those born in the P.M. Morning children usually become their own masters; afternoon or evening children are generally content to work for others. Sunrise is also a favourable hour for male children to be born. From 2 A.M. up to NOON is a favourable time, and the worst time is from sunset to midnight. Yet persons born then are usually fortunate in the employ of others, and will stay for years with the same master; in short, they have not a very ambitious turn of mind, and are content to pass their lives in obscurity, whereas the child born in the morning is of a restless, ambitious nature, courting responsibility, and not content in holding an inferior position. EARTH TIDES.

M. Flammarion, the celebrated French Astronomer, has put forward the very probable idea that there are earth tides as well as ocean tides corresponding to the motion of the Moon. That such is the case there can be very little doubt. Dr. Hecker, the German Astronomer, declares that he has detected and measured these movements in the earth, by the use of an elaborate pendulum, similar to that employed in the seismograph which is fixed in a chamber deep in the earth, and which, automatically records its oscillations by photography.

The rise and fall of these tides seldom exceed a few inches. This is not to be wondered at considering the difference in weight between earth and water. Now if the moon can attract or influence such a heavy body as the earth or the billions of tons of water in the occan, is it unreasonable to suppose that she may exert an influence on mankind whose body is composed of earth and water? Those people who do not believe in Astrology should ponder over that fact, at the same time taking into consideration the extreme sensitiveness of the mind and body of man compared with the earth and ocean.

Sir George Darwin, who is the greatest living authority on the subject of tides agrees with M. Flammarion, so that there is little doubt that these earth tides really do take place.

Professor Hecker telegraphs to the "Daily Mail" the following information:—"Through the attraction of the moon a tidal wave takes place in the firm terrestrial body exactly as in the waters of the ocean. The tidal wave, the crest of which always points toward the moon, runs round the earth on account of the latter's revolution.

"We know that when a ship is ploughing through the sea and mounts the crest of the waves its masts bend backwards. Therefore a plummet hanging from the top of the mast will then be removed from the base of the mast. If, then, we suspend a plummet from the peak of a column standing firmly upon the outer surface of the earth the plummet must execute vibrations as the tidal wave under the earth's surface rolls along.

"The vibrations, of course, are only slight. To measure them we use the horizontal pendulum of Yon Reben, which is extraordinarily sensitive, being capable of recording oscillations up to 1-25,000 inch."

Sir George Darwin speaking on "The Influence of Tides on Men," said, "In very early times the moon and earth were one body, which spun so fast that it broke in two, the smaller body, the moon, being sent away by tidal friction to where they now saw it. Although the moon looked so big in the sky, it was small in comparison with the earth, being one-eightieth part as heavy. Perhaps they thought that was fanciful, but it was not. It had been suggested that the Pacific Ocean was the hole left by the moon.

"If they looked forward they would find the earth going slower, with the result that eventually the day would last fifty-five times as long as it did at present. Such changes would make an immense difference to mankind. In that leisurely age the dinners would have fifty-five times as many courses, and the speeches would be fifty-five

times as long.

NOTES BY THE WAY.

I am sorry to say there has been no progress whatever made in the subject of Cancer Research, and our Professors and Medical men are as ignorant as ever regarding the origin and cure of this most painful and fatal complaint which is increasing year by year at a most alarming rate. Just as Consumption is decreasing, so is Cancer increasing. It is strange that this increase should coincide with Vaccination. Considering the great number of cattle which suffer from Cancer it seems very probable and not unreasonable that the Cancer germ may be transmitted to the human system through Vaccination. Instead of torturing thousands of animals in the endeavour to find the origin of Cancer I heartily wish the investigators would turn their attention to Vaccination and its dangers.

Teetotalism is just the thing for a man or woman who is not master of him or herself. So far as economy is concerned, everything is in favour of the moderate drinker. As a rule total abstainers are enormous eaters. The human system requires a large amount of alcohol to keep it in health, and as the various foods contain but a small amount of it, total abstainers have to consume a great quantity of food to supply the waste of everyday life. Personally, I do not believe in tectotalism, and consider a glass of good beer, or good wine, beneficial to the system.

Few people are aware of the slaughter effected by the horse. A fair-sized village of about 400 inhabitants is decimated every year by that noble creature. Or, in other words, the horse manages to kill about 400 people every year, and to be the cause of about 3,000 accidents of a serious nature. The slaughter and accidents are attributable to viciousness in some animals, and nervousness in others. The fatalities from this source exceed those of the railways, tramways, motor-cars, and bicycles all put together.

Years ago, some of the old turnpikes were kept well watered, so there was practically no dust. When the railways came they took the greater part of the traffic off the roads, and the watering was discontinued. Considering the extra traffic in the shape of motors and bicycles, something will have to be done to lay the dust. The watering of the main highways would not be altogether a loss to the ratepayers, for the reduction in the labour bill, and the smaller cost for repair, would go a long way towards meeting the cost of watering, let alone the comfort to the users of, and the dwellers on, the highways.

The Fiscal question seems uppermost in many minds. There is no doubt it would benefit some and injure others. The point to discover is: Would it benefit the majority? Personally speaking, it does not appear to me to be fair or right that other nations should flood our markets with their produce free of duty, when every article we export is taxed to the utmost. If such a one-sided policy were practised between individuals it would soon lead to trouble, and the bankruptcy of one of the parties.

RAPHAEL'S EPHEMERIS FOR 1910.

There are scores of times in the course of a year when one does not know how to act or what to do. My "Everyday Guide" is simply a rough forecast of what should be done. There is no room in the pages to extend it and make it more comprehensive. I have, therefore, had the time of each planetary aspect for 1910 carefully calculated and put into a table, and published in my Ephemeris for 1910. The Table shows whether the influence is good, bad, or doubtful, thus:—

A large G shows the influence to be good.

A small g , , , to be slightly good.

A large B , , , to be bad.

A small b , , , , to be slightly bad.

D, or no letter at all, shows that it is doubtful, or not applicable to the events of daily life.

The way to use it is thus:-

If you receive any letter, hear any news, have anything offered to you to buy, any one taken suddenly ill, or any other event that may happen, see the time when you *first* hear about it, refer to the table, and see of what nature the influence is that happens next.

For instance, suppose on January 9th I receive a letter containing important news, or an important proposal, which I read at 8 A.M. I turn to the table and find that the first influence after 8 A.M. occurs at 8.17 A.M. and is G, or good; it is also followed by another good one at 6.29 P.M., consequently the news or proposals will, in all probability, turn out successful or beneficial. But suppose it was 8 A.M. on February 2nd, I turn to the table and find an influence at 11.27 A.M. which is B, or bad, consequently the news or proposals will not turn out satisfactorily, and had better be left alone.

Suppose a person comes to me on January 4th at Noon, and wants me to buy something, or proposes something new to me, I turn to the table and find at 3.18 P.M. there is a large G, which shows that the proposal is favourable, or that I may buy; but if the same thing occurred on the 11th, I find the influence is bad, and consequently I should leave everything alone.

If the influence is signified by a small letter, use great care, as it is of a weak nature, also if a little g is followed by a large B; but a small b followed by a large G shows a little trouble at first, then that the matter will turn out favourable in the end.

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
